<b>Description</b> participation in an apprenticeship program by a high school senior and granting rule-making authority					

### Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

This bill allows a high school senior to begin an apprenticeship program during the student's senior year of high school. Under current law, any individual 16 years of age or over may enter into an apprentice contract whereby the individual is to receive from his or her employer, in consideration for the individual's services, instruction in any trade, craft, or business. That instruction must include a minimum number of hours of related classroom instruction and on-the-job training.

Under the bill, a high school senior may enter into an apprentice contract if the school district in which the student is enrolled does all of the following:

- Certifies that the student is expected to graduate high school no later than the end of the current school year.
- Certifies that the student's proposed on-the-job training schedule allows adequate time for the student to complete any high school graduation requirements no later than the end of the current school year.
- Agrees to award the student high school credit for the hours of related instruction and on-the-job training the student completes during the first year of the contract.

At the end of the first year of the contract, the student must have earned his or her high school diploma or its equivalent in order to continue in the apprenticeship program.

State: None. This bill is not anticipated to have a fiscal impact on the Department or the state general fund.

Local: Indeterminate. Some school districts may incur additional administrative costs to certify eligible student under this program. As the number of students participating in the program would vary from district to district, the costs are indeterminate. Since the bill does not provide additional funding, these costs would need to be absorbed within a school district's existing budget.

### Long-Range Fiscal Implications
