

# Steve G, 2/9/2 Shooting Victims

Wisconsin had 15,969 violent crimes (murder, rape, sexual assault, robbery, aggravated assault) in 2014. Milwaukee was responsible for 54% of the violent crimes in Wisconsin.

African-Americans who made up 6.5% of the state's population, accounted for 66% of firearm homicide victims in 2014.

African Americans in Wisconsin are 30 times more likely to DIE as a result of gun violence than Non-Hispanic Whites.

Wisconsin ranks 8th in the nation for black homicide victims.

## **AB 220: Mandatory Minimums for Certain Felons in Possession of a Firearm**

### *Senate Committee on Judiciary and Public Safety*

Thank you Chairman Wanggaard and members of the Committee on Judiciary and Public Safety for holding a hearing today on Assembly Bill 220, authored by myself and Representative LaTonya Johnson, who is here with me today.

It is no secret that Wisconsin has seen a significant increase in gun related violence over the past year. Our city streets have become war zones and our children's playgrounds have become battlefields. It is clear that we as lawmakers must do something to help these communities rebuild with confidence and security.

Before I let Representative Johnson talk more extensively on how this violence is impacting Milwaukee, I would like to run through what the bill does and answer any questions you may have.

Under current law, a felon is prohibited from possessing a firearm. If a person violates this prohibition they are guilty of a Class G felony, which carries the potential for a fine not to exceed \$25,000 or confinement for not more than 10 years. Since current law does not prescribe a minimum term of confinement, more often than not, these felons are let back onto the street after paying a fine.

Assembly Bill 220 creates a 3 year mandatory minimum sentence for any violent felon caught in possession of a firearm. Additionally, it creates a 5 year mandatory minimum sentence for any violent felon caught in possession of a firearm during a commission of a violent crime.

For purposes of the bill, a "Violent Felon" is an individual who has been convicted with a "Violent Crime" as defined in the bill. Please see attached for a list of what would be considered a "Violent Crime" under the bill.

Assembly Bill 220 was amended on the floor, with a bipartisan amendment authored by Representative Bowen. Under the bill, as amended, a Violent Felon who is caught in possession of a firearm, would not be subject to the 3 year mandatory minimum sentence if at least 5 years have passed since the completion of their sentence for the Violent Felony, or any "Violent Misdemeanor". A "Violent Misdemeanor" is defined in the bill, please see attached for a list of what would be considered a "Violent Misdemeanor".

We believe adding this five year lookback amendment will ensure that individuals who have shown, over an extended period of time, that they are good citizens will be subject to judicial discretion, rather than a prescribed minimum sentence.

It is important to clarify that I do believe judicial discretion is an important part of the criminal justice system and in most instances I do not support mandatory minimum periods of confinement. In this case, as



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Representative Johnson will elaborate, judges are not taking into account the impact these criminals are having on their communities and as such are not providing an adequate penalty for a very serious crime.

While I would like to be optimistic, I am not under the impression that this legislation will create a massive deterrent effect on criminals wreaking havoc in Wisconsin. What I do believe is that this legislation will get violent criminals off of our state's streets and give communities, without being under the threat of violence, the chance to advance and improve their neighborhoods.

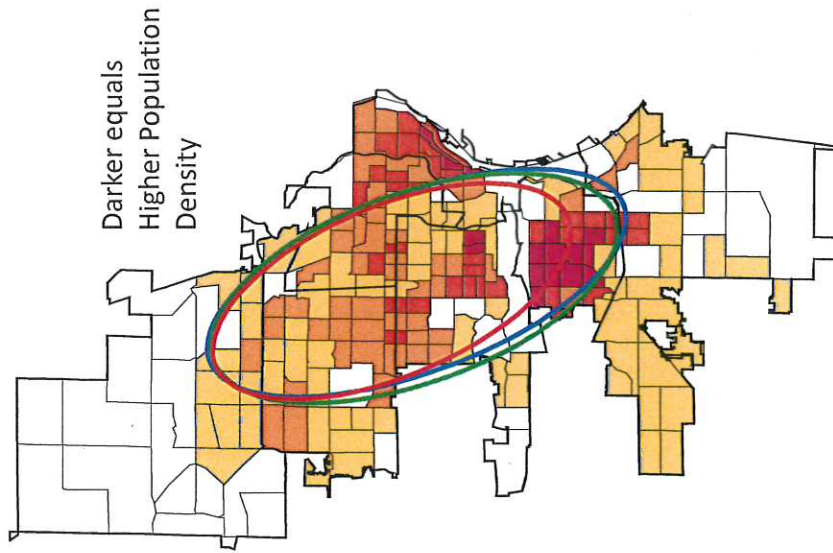

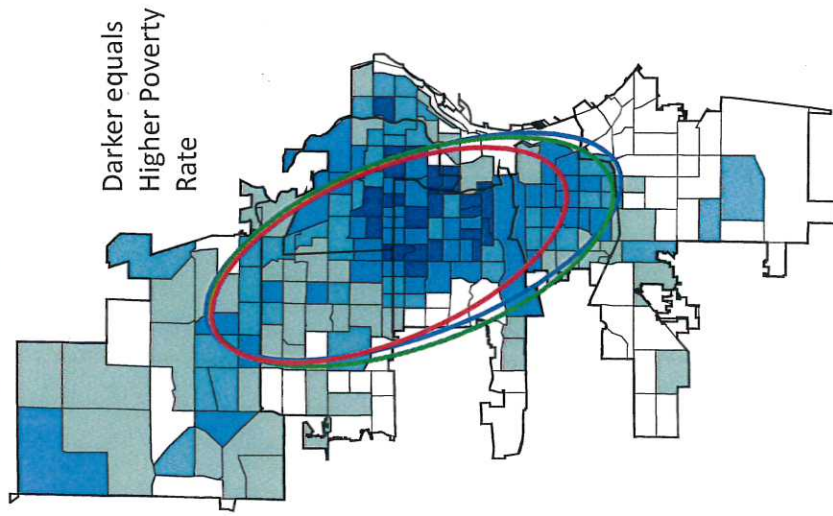

# 2013 calls for Service, Violent Crime, Proactive Activity, and Milwaukee Demographics

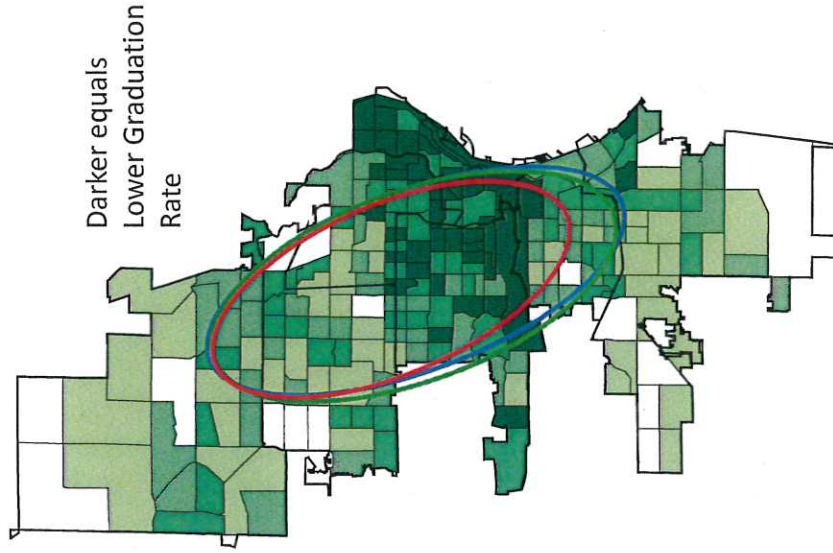
**Population Density**

**High School Graduates**

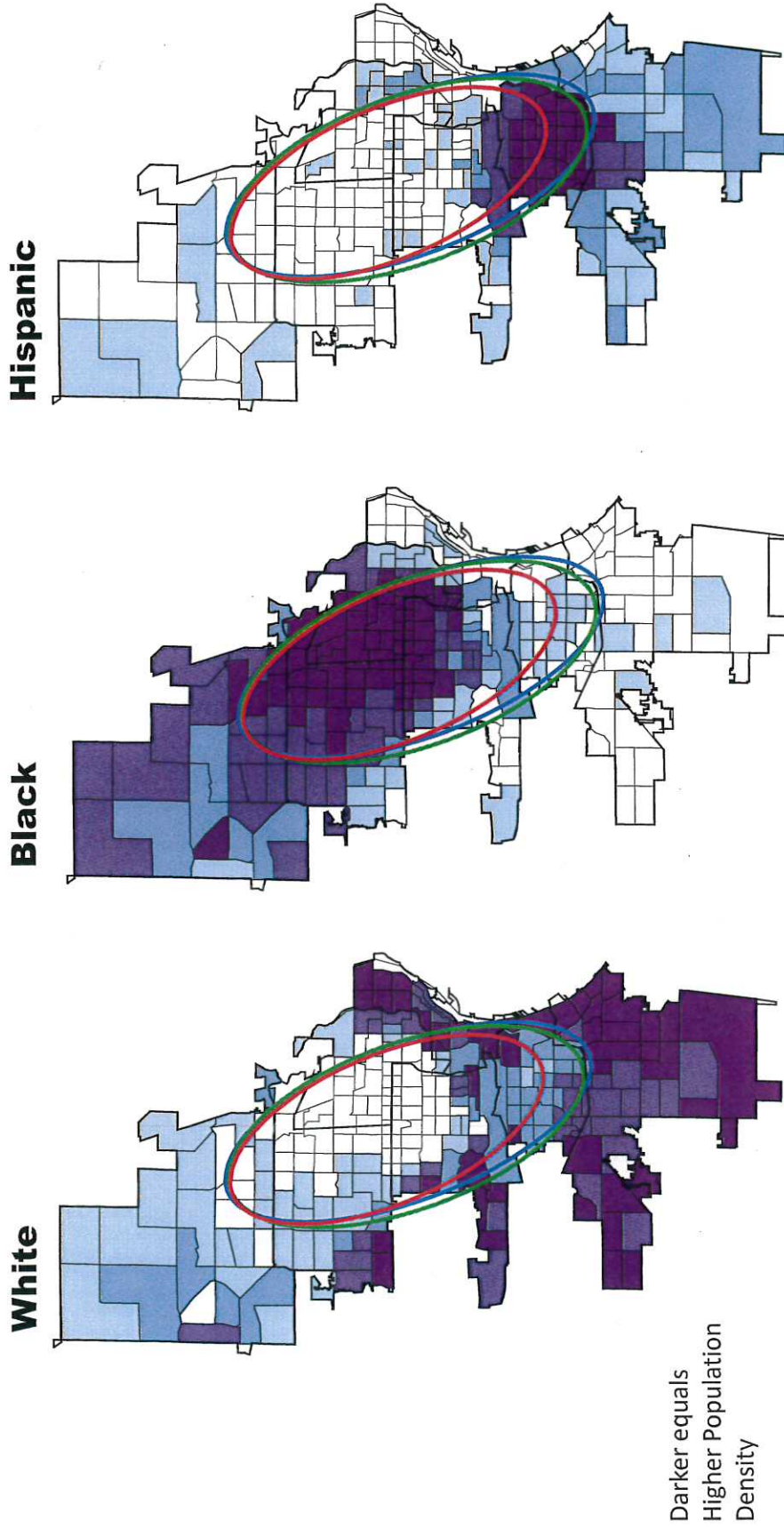

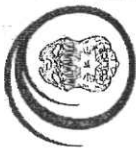

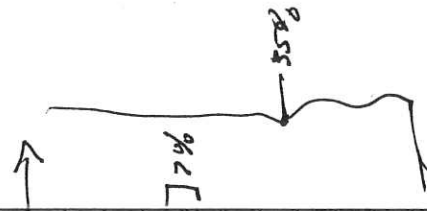
