11. Fiscal Analysis Summary

Section 256.15 (9m), Stats., requires the department to promulgate rules that require emergency medical technicians, first responders, and individuals who provide instruction to emergency medical technicians and first responders to complete training on the use of automated external defibrillators (AED). Section 256.15 (9m), Stats., also requires the department to specify, in rules, the content of the training, qualifications of providers, and frequency with which training is to be completed.

Emergency medical services professionals already receive instruction on the use of AEDs as part of their standard training and certification. Specifics, however, are not in administrative rules.

The fiscal effect of the proposed rule on the department is expected to be minimal. The fiscal effect of the proposed rules on private and public sector ambulance service providers who employ emergency medical services professionals should also be minimal, as the emergency medical professionals and instructors are already required by the department to receive the instruction required under s. 256.15 (9m), Stats. However, the fiscal effect may vary and depends on whether the provider or the individual pays for the course. Instruction on the use of AEDs is generally taught in a course that combines CPR and AED training. The cost of a certification course at one of the approved providers, e.g. the American Heart Association, American Red Cross, American Safety and Health Institute, American Academy of Orthopedic Surgeons, and Medic First Aid is approximately \$50. Instruction is required at least every two years under the proposed rule.
