# ADMINISTRATIVE RULES DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH SERVICES REPORT TO THE LEGISLATURE CLEARINGHOUSE RULE 10-003

CH. DHS 19, Discretionary Enforcement of Rules and Guidelines Against Small Businesses

# **Basis and Purpose of Proposed Rule**

The proposed rules are created under s. 895.59 (2) Stats., and are required to include a reduction or waiver of penalties for voluntary disclosure by a small business of actual or potential violations of rules or guidelines. Section 895.59 (2) Stats., further requires that the rule specify when the use of discretion in the enforcement of a rule or guideline against a small business will not be allowed, and includes a list of circumstances under which discretion is not allowed. These circumstances must also be included in the rule. The rules may include consideration of a violator's ability to pay when determining the amount of any monetary penalty, assessment, or surcharge.

The department proposes to create a rule consistent with the requirements of s. 895.59, Stats., by indicating when the department may use discretionary enforcement concerning small businesses and when discretionary enforcement concerning small businesses is prohibited.

# Responses to Legislative Council Rules Clearinghouse Recommendations

The department accepted the comment(s) made by the Legislative Council Rules Clearinghouse and modified the proposed rule where suggested.

# Final Regulatory Flexibility Analysis

The proposed rules will have a direct impact on a substantial number of small businesses that are not covered under s. 48.685 or 50.065, Stats. The economic impact on the businesses affected by this rule is indeterminate.
