IV. DETAILED STATEMENT EXPLAINING THE BASIS AND PURPOSE OF THE PROPOSED RULE, INCLUDING HOW THE PROPOSED RULE ADVANCES RELEVANT STATUTORY GOALS OR PURPOSES:

Section OT 2.02 (1) (b) requires an applicant to provide evidence that the applicant is certified as an occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant by the National Board for Certification in Occupational Therapy (NBCOT). This requirement conflicts with the licensure provisions of s. 448.963, Stats., which require initial certification from NBCOT but do not require the certification be current. The proposed rules update s. OT 2.02 (1) (b) to reflect the requirements for licensure under s. 448.963, Stats.

V. SUMMARY OF PUBLIC COMMENTS AND THE BOARD'S RESPONSES, EXPLANATION OF MODIFICATIONS TO PROPOSED RULES PROMPTED BY PUBLIC COMMENTS:

The Occupational Therapists Affiliated Credentialing Board held a public hearing on June 7, 2022. The following people either testified at the hearing, or submitted written comments:

- Wayne Winistorfer, OTR

The Occupational Therapists Affiliated Credentialing Board summarizes the comments received either by hearing testimony or by written submission as follows:

- Mr. Welch submitted written comments on behalf of the WOTA. They rejected the proposed rule changes and instead proposed that the language in OT 2.02 (1) (b) be updated to read: "Evidence that the applicant has completed and occupational therapist education program, or an occupational therapy assistant educational program."
- Mr. Winistorfer testified in support of the proposed rule changes. They noted that NBCOT (National Board for Certification in Occupational Therapy) initial certification has been required in Wisconsin since the late 1980's. Additionally, most occupational therapy practitioners would not be able to maintain continuing or renewed NBCOT certification.

The Occupational Therapists Affiliated Credentialing Board explains modifications to its rule-making proposal prompted by public comments as follows: No further changes were made.
