**SENATE SUBSTITUTE AMENDMENT 2,  
TO SENATE BILL 70**

June 22, 2023 - Offered by JOINT COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

1     **AN ACT**; **relating to:** state finances and appropriations, constituting the  
2             executive budget act of the 2023 legislature.

*The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:*

3             **SECTION 1.** 13.106 (3) (d) of the statutes is created to read:

4             13.106 (3) (d) For the Medical College of Wisconsin, all of the following:

5             1. The financial status of the psychiatry and behavioral health practice  
6             residency sites.

7             2. The number of psychiatry and behavioral health residents choosing to  
8             practice in medically underserved areas of the state upon graduation.

9             3. The number of graduates entering psychiatry and behavioral health practice  
10            as a career.

11            **SECTION 2.** 13.48 (2) (L) of the statutes is created to read:

1           13.48 (2) (L) From the appropriation under s. 20.867 (3) (x), the building  
2 commission may supplement authorized state building program project budgets to  
3 offset cost overruns resulting from an increase in price levels due to inflation. No  
4 moneys may be expended under this paragraph without the approval of the joint  
5 committee on finance.

6           **SECTION 3.** 13.48 (3) of the statutes is amended to read:

7           13.48 (3) STATE BUILDING TRUST FUND. In the interest of the continuity of the  
8 program, the moneys appropriated to the state building trust fund under s. 20.867  
9 (2) (f) shall be retained as a nonlapsing building depreciation reserve. Such moneys  
10 shall be deposited into the state building trust fund. At such times as the building  
11 commission directs, or in emergency situations under s. 16.855 (16) (b), the governor  
12 shall authorize releases from this fund to become available for projects and shall  
13 direct the department of administration to allocate from this fund such amounts as  
14 are approved for these projects. In issuing such directions, the building commission  
15 shall consider the cash balance in the state building trust fund, the necessity and  
16 urgency of the proposed improvement, employment conditions and availability of  
17 materials in the locality in which the improvement is to be made. The building  
18 commission may authorize any project costing \$1,000,000 or less or, beginning in  
19 fiscal year 2023-24, \$2,000,000 or less in accordance with priorities to be established  
20 by the building commission and may adjust the priorities by deleting, substituting  
21 or adding new projects as needed to reflect changing program needs and unforeseen  
22 circumstances. The building commission may enter into contracts for the  
23 construction of buildings for any state agency, except a project authorized under sub.  
24 (10) (c), and shall be responsible for accounting for all funds released to projects. The

1 building commission may designate the department of administration or the agency  
2 for which the project is constructed to act as its representative in such accounting.

3 **SECTION 4.** 13.48 (6) of the statutes is amended to read:

4 13.48 (6) REVIEW OF PROJECTS. All reports submitted as provided by sub. (4)  
5 shall be reviewed by the building commission, which shall make its report as soon  
6 after November 20 as is possible. Such report shall include specific  
7 recommendations and establish priorities for the next 3 biennia from among all  
8 projects submitted which the building commission deems essential and shall  
9 recommend additional appropriations if necessary for the execution thereof. The  
10 building commission shall include in the report any projects proposed by the state  
11 fair park board involving a cost of not more than \$300,000, together with the method  
12 of financing proposed for those projects by the board, without recommendation.  
13 Beginning in fiscal year 2023-24, this amount is \$600,000. The building commission  
14 shall include in its report an appraisal and recommendation of available and  
15 alternative methods of financing buildings for the use of state agencies and shall file  
16 copies of its report with the governor-elect.

17 **SECTION 5.** 13.48 (7) of the statutes is amended to read:

18 13.48 (7) BIENNIAL RECOMMENDATIONS. The building commission shall prepare  
19 and formally adopt recommendations for the long-range state building program on  
20 a biennial basis. The building commission shall include in its report any projects  
21 proposed by the state fair park board involving a cost of not more than \$300,000,  
22 together with the method of financing those projects proposed by the board, without  
23 recommendation. Beginning in fiscal year 2023-24, this amount is \$600,000. Unless  
24 a later date is requested by the building commission and approved by the joint  
25 committee on finance, the building commission shall, no later than the first Tuesday

1 in April of each odd-numbered year, transmit the report prepared by the department  
2 of administration under s. 16.40 (20) and the commission's recommendations for the  
3 succeeding fiscal biennium that require legislative approval to the joint committee  
4 on finance in the form of proposed legislation prepared in proper form.

5 **SECTION 6.** 13.48 (10) (a) of the statutes is amended to read:

6 13.48 (10) (a) Except as provided in par. (c), no state board, agency, officer,  
7 department, commission, or body corporate may enter into a contract for the  
8 construction, reconstruction, remodeling of, or addition to any building, structure,  
9 or facility, in connection with any building project which involves a cost in excess of  
10 \$300,000 without completion of final plans and arrangement for supervision of  
11 construction and prior approval by the building commission. Beginning in fiscal year  
12 2023-24, this amount is \$600,000. This section applies to the department of  
13 transportation only in respect to buildings, structures, and facilities to be used for  
14 administrative or operating functions, including buildings, land, and equipment to  
15 be used for the motor vehicle emission inspection and maintenance program under  
16 s. 110.20.

17 **SECTION 7.** 13.48 (10) (b) 5. of the statutes is amended to read:

18 13.48 (10) (b) 5. Contracts for construction of any building, structure or facility  
19 for the state fair park board involving a cost of not more than \$300,000. Beginning  
20 in fiscal year 2023-24, this amount is \$600,000.

21 **SECTION 8.** 13.48 (20v) of the statutes is created to read:

22 13.48 (20v) GRANTS FOR LOCAL PROJECTS. (a) The building commission shall  
23 establish and operate a grant program under this subsection to assist nonstate  
24 organizations to carry out construction projects having a statewide public purpose.  
25 The building commission is prohibited from awarding a grant for a construction

1 project under this subsection unless the joint committee on finance both approves the  
2 grant and finds that the project is in the public interest and serves one or more  
3 statewide public purposes.

4 (b) From the appropriation under s. 20.867 (3) (x), the building commission may  
5 award a grant to any nonstate organization for a construction project that satisfies  
6 par. (a). The municipality, as defined in s. 59.001 (3), in which the construction  
7 project is or will be located shall apply to the building commission for the grant on  
8 behalf of the nonstate organization carrying out the construction project.

9 (c) No grant awarded under par. (b) may exceed \$4,000,000. Before approving  
10 each grant, the building commission shall determine that the nonstate organization  
11 carrying out the project has secured additional funding for the project from nonstate  
12 revenue sources in an amount that is equal to at least 50 percent of the total cost of  
13 the project.

14 (d) If the building commission awards a grant under par. (b), and if, for any  
15 reason, the space that is constructed with funds from the grant is not used for one  
16 or more public purposes determined by the building commission under par. (a), the  
17 state shall retain an ownership interest in the constructed space equal to the amount  
18 of the state's grant.

19 (e) The building commission is prohibited from awarding a grant under par. (b)  
20 unless the department of administration has reviewed and approved plans for the  
21 construction project associated with the grant. Notwithstanding ss. 16.85 (1) and  
22 16.855 (1m), the department of administration is prohibited from supervising any  
23 services or work or let any contract for the project. Section 16.87 does not apply to  
24 the project.

25 **SECTION 9.** 13.48 (29) of the statutes is amended to read:

1           13.48 **(29)** SIMPLIFIED POLICIES AND PROCEDURES FOR CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS.

2           Except as otherwise required under s. 16.855 (10m), the building commission may  
3           prescribe simplified policies and procedures to be used in lieu of the procedures  
4           provided in s. 16.855 for any construction project involving a cost of not more than  
5           \$300,000, except projects specified in sub. (10) (c). Beginning in fiscal year 2023-24,  
6           this amount is \$600,000.

7           **SECTION 10.** 13.48 (32c) of the statutes is created to read:

8           13.48 **(32c)** MARQUETTE UNIVERSITY SCHOOL OF DENTISTRY UPGRADES. (a) The  
9           legislature finds and determines that improving the experiences and training of  
10          Marquette University School of Dentistry dental students, increasing the chances of  
11          continuing the supply of dentists throughout this state in future years, and  
12          improving access to oral health care statewide, particularly for Wisconsin's  
13          underserved populations via the Marquette University School of Dentistry's Main  
14          Campus Clinic and its affiliated statewide clinics, is a statewide responsibility of  
15          statewide dimension. It is therefore in the public interest, and it is the public policy  
16          of this state, to assist Marquette University in carrying out construction and  
17          equipment upgrades to the Marquette University School of Dentistry's main campus  
18          clinic and classrooms, affiliated clinics and classrooms statewide, and patient  
19          experience center.

20          (b) From the appropriation under s. 20.867 (3) (x), the building commission may  
21          authorize a grant to Marquette University of up to \$10,750,000 to assist the  
22          Marquette University School of Dentistry in carrying out construction and  
23          equipment upgrades to its main campus clinic and classrooms, affiliated clinics and  
24          classrooms statewide, and patient experience center. Before approving any state  
25          funding commitment for the construction and equipment upgrades under this

1 paragraph, the building commission shall determine that Marquette University has  
2 secured additional funding for the project of at least \$17,250,000 from nonstate  
3 revenue sources.

4 (c) If the building commission authorizes a grant to Marquette University  
5 under par. (b), and if, for any reason, a facility receiving construction or equipment  
6 upgrades, or both, with funds from the grant is not used for dentistry purposes, the  
7 state shall retain an ownership interest in the facility equal to the amount of the  
8 state's grant.

9 **SECTION 11.** 13.48 (37m) of the statutes is created to read:

10 13.48 **(37m)** CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL AND HEALTH SYSTEM DENTAL CLINIC EXPANSION.

11 (a) The legislature finds and determines that reducing wait times and improving  
12 accessibility of dental care at the dental clinic of Children's Hospital and Health  
13 System, Inc., will improve health outcomes for children in this state, and reducing  
14 the burden on urgent care and emergency services at Children's Hospital and Health  
15 System, Inc., and improving economic development in the state by increasing the  
16 capacity of the pediatric dental residency program at the dental clinic at Children's  
17 Hospital and Health System, Inc., main Milwaukee campus, are a statewide  
18 responsibility of statewide dimension. It is therefore in the public interest, and it is  
19 the public policy of this state, to assist Children's Hospital and Health System, Inc.,  
20 in carrying out the expansion of its dental clinic at its main Milwaukee campus.

21 (b) From the appropriation under s. 20.867 (3) (x), the building commission may  
22 authorize a grant to Children's Hospital and Health System, Inc., of up to \$4,789,000  
23 to assist Children's Hospital and Health System, Inc., to expand the dental clinic at  
24 its main Milwaukee campus. Before approving any state funding commitment for  
25 the expansion of the dental clinic, the building commission shall determine that

1 Children's Hospital and Health System, Inc., has secured additional funding for the  
2 project of at least \$4,789,000 from nonstate revenue sources.

3 (c) If the building commission authorizes a grant to Children's Hospital and  
4 Health System, Inc., under par. (b), and if, for any reason, the money received for  
5 expansion of the dental clinic at its main Milwaukee campus from funds from the  
6 grant is not used for dentistry purposes, the state shall retain an ownership interest  
7 in the clinic equal to the amount of the state's grant.

8 **SECTION 12.** 13.48 (41m) of the statutes is created to read:

9 13.48 (41m) BADGERLAND AFTER SCHOOL ENRICHMENT PROGRAM FACILITY. (a)  
10 The legislature finds and determines that providing out-of-school care that inspires  
11 local youth to be contributing, productive, and responsible members of their  
12 communities through intentional programming that supports positive character  
13 development and unique opportunities to grow as individuals is a statewide  
14 responsibility of statewide dimension. It is therefore in the public interest, and it is  
15 the public policy of this state, to assist the Badgerland After School Enrichment  
16 Program, Inc., in the purchase and renovation of a building to serve as a facility to  
17 provide out-of-school care to youth.

18 (b) From the appropriation under s. 20.867 (3) (x), the building commission may  
19 provide a grant of up to \$1,000,000 to assist the Badgerland After School Enrichment  
20 Program, Inc., in the purchase and renovation of a building to serve as a facility to  
21 provide out-of-school care to youth. Before approving any state funding  
22 commitment for the construction of such a facility, the building commission shall  
23 determine that the Badgerland After School Enrichment Program has secured  
24 additional funding for the project of at least \$10,000,000 from nonstate revenue  
25 sources.



1 (c) If the building commission authorizes a grant to the Badgerland After  
2 School Enrichment Program, Inc., under par. (b), and if, for any reason, the facility  
3 that is purchased and renovated with funds from the grant is not used as a facility  
4 for out-of-school care, the state shall retain an ownership interest in the facility  
5 equal to the amount of the state's grant.

6 **SECTION 13.** 13.48 (46s) of the statutes is created to read:

7 13.48 (46s) FOOD AND FARM EXPLORATION CENTER. (a) The legislature finds and  
8 determines that providing hands-on learning experiences to teach students about  
9 agricultural innovation and sustainability will attract more interest in agricultural  
10 careers; assist in workforce and development training for elementary, secondary,  
11 technical college, and university students; and help the state retain talent and is a  
12 statewide responsibility of statewide dimension. It is the public policy of this state,  
13 and it is in the interest of the state, to assist Farming for the Future Foundation, Inc.,  
14 with the construction of the Food and Farm Exploration Center.

15 (b) From the appropriation under s. 20.867 (3) (x), the building commission may  
16 award a grant to Farming for the Future Foundation, Inc. The amount authorized  
17 for the grant is \$3,000,000. The grant shall be to assist in the construction of the Food  
18 and Farm Exploration Center. Farming for the Future Foundation, Inc., shall secure  
19 additional funding for the project of at least \$38,000,000 from nonstate revenue  
20 sources.

21 (c) If the building commission awards a grant to Farming for the Future  
22 Foundation, Inc., under par. (b), and if, for any reason, the Food and Farm  
23 Exploration Center constructed with funds from the grant is not used for agricultural  
24 education, the state shall retain an ownership interest in the facility equal to the  
25 amount of the state's grant.

1           **SECTION 14.** 13.48 (48) of the statutes is created to read:

2           13.48 **(48)** VERSITI BLOOD RESEARCH INSTITUTE. (a) The legislature finds and  
3 determines that research focused on blood health, including research in the areas of  
4 blood cancers, benign hematology, cellular therapy, and immunology is essential to  
5 the health and well-being of the people of this state and is a statewide responsibility  
6 of statewide dimension. It is therefore in the public interest, and it is the public policy  
7 of this state, to assist Versiti Blood Research Institute Foundation, Inc., in the  
8 expansion of the Versiti Blood Research Institute for purposes of blood research.

9           (b) From the appropriation under s. 20.867 (3) (x), the building commission may  
10 award a grant to Versiti Blood Research Institute Foundation, Inc. The amount  
11 authorized for the grant is \$10,000,000. The grant shall be to assist in the expansion  
12 of the Versiti Blood Research Institute. The Versiti Blood Research Institute  
13 Foundation, Inc., shall secure additional funding for the project of at least  
14 \$53,500,000 from nonstate revenue sources.

15           (c) If the building commission awards a grant to Versiti Blood Research  
16 Institute Foundation, Inc., under par. (b), and if, for any reason, the expanded space  
17 constructed with funds from the grant is not used for blood research, the state shall  
18 retain an ownership interest in the expanded space equal to the amount of the state's  
19 grant.

20           **SECTION 15.** 13.48 (49) of the statutes is created to read:

21           13.48 **(49)** REGIONAL FORENSIC SCIENCE CENTER. (a) The legislature finds and  
22 determines that offering training and continuing education opportunities to  
23 coroners and medical examiners, law enforcement, district attorney offices, and  
24 emergency medical and health services providers will improve the quality of the  
25 death investigation process for central and northern Wisconsin and is a statewide

1 responsibility of statewide dimension. It is therefore in the public interest, and it is  
2 the public policy of this state, to assist Marathon County with the construction of a  
3 regional forensic science center.

4 (b) From the appropriation under s. 20.867 (3) (x), the building commission may  
5 award a grant to Marathon County. The amount authorized for the grant is  
6 \$7,000,000. The grant shall be to assist in the construction of a regional forensic  
7 science center. Marathon County shall secure additional funding for the project of  
8 at least \$7,800,000 from nonstate revenue sources.

9 (c) If the building commission awards a grant to Marathon County under par.  
10 (b), and if, for any reason, the space constructed with funds from the grant is not used  
11 as a regional forensic science center, the state shall retain an ownership interest in  
12 the expanded space equal to the amount of the state's grant.

13 **SECTION 16.** 13.488 (7) (a) of the statutes is amended to read:

14 13.488 (7) (a) The building commission, with advice from the state fair park  
15 board, shall examine and review detailed design requirements for all state-owned  
16 facilities involving a cost of more than \$300,000 to be included in the development  
17 of state fair park. Beginning in fiscal year 2023-24, this amount is \$600,000.

18 **SECTION 17.** 13.90 (1) (intro.) of the statutes is amended to read:

19 13.90 (1) (intro.) The joint committee on legislative organization shall be the  
20 policy-making board for the legislative reference bureau, the legislative fiscal  
21 bureau, the legislative audit bureau, the legislative human resources office, and the  
22 legislative technology services bureau. The committee shall:

23 **SECTION 18.** 13.90 (1m) (a) of the statutes is amended to read:

24 13.90 (1m) (a) In this subsection, "legislative service agency" means the  
25 legislative council staff, the legislative audit bureau, the legislative fiscal bureau,

1 the legislative reference bureau, the legislative human resources office, and the  
2 legislative technology services bureau.

3 **SECTION 19.** 13.97 of the statutes is created to read:

4 **13.97 Legislative human resources office.** There is created a service  
5 agency known as the “Legislative Human Resources Office,” headed by a director.  
6 The legislative human resources office shall be strictly nonpartisan. The legislative  
7 human resources office shall have all rights and privileges pertaining to human  
8 resources records as are enjoyed by executive branch agencies, including those under  
9 s. 230.13 and subch. II of ch. 19.

10 **(1) DUTIES OF THE OFFICE.** The legislative human resources office shall:

11 (a) Provide human resources services to the legislative branch, as directed by  
12 the joint committee on legislative organization.

13 (b) Establish a formal complaint process to review and investigate allegations  
14 of harassment, discrimination, retaliation, violence, or bullying by legislators,  
15 legislative employees, and legislative service agency employees. The office shall  
16 investigate all such allegations, unless the director designates another person or  
17 entity to review and investigate any specific allegation.

18 **(2) DUTIES OF THE DIRECTOR.** The director of the legislative human resources  
19 office shall:

20 (a) Report to the joint committee on legislative organization.

21 (b) Direct the operations of the staff.

22 (c) Employ, train, and supervise the personnel assigned to the director.

23 (d) Supervise all expenditures of the legislative human resources office.

1 (e) Manage reviews and investigations of the formal complaint process  
2 established under sub. (1) (b). Upon completion of an investigation, report the  
3 findings to the appropriate legislative leader or employee supervisor.

4 (f) On a periodic basis, recommend to the joint committee on legislative  
5 organization improvements to human resources services and programs.

6 **SECTION 20.** 16.004 (22) of the statutes is created to read:

7 **16.004 (22)** ENDOWMENT FUND FOR WISCONSINEYE. (a) In this section,  
8 “WisconsinEye” means the WisconsinEye Public Affairs Network, Inc.

9 (b) From the appropriation under s. 20.855 (4) (dt), if the joint committee on  
10 finance approves a request for funding made jointly by the secretary and  
11 WisconsinEye, the secretary shall make a payment in the form of a grant to  
12 WisconsinEye for the establishment of an endowment fund.

13 (c) The department is prohibited from making a payment under par. (b) unless  
14 prior to June 1, 2025, WisconsinEye has raised for the endowment fund from  
15 nonstate funding sources total amounts that at least equal the amount of the  
16 payment, up to \$10,000,000.

17 (d) If, after a payment under par. (b), WisconsinEye ever ceases operations and  
18 divests its assets, WisconsinEye shall pay to the secretary for deposit into the general  
19 fund an amount equal to the total amount paid under par. (b).

20 (e) As a condition for receiving any payment under par. (b), WisconsinEye is  
21 prohibited from charging any fee for access to recorded content of public meetings.

22 **SECTION 21.** 16.009 (2) (a) of the statutes is amended to read:

23 16.009 (2) (a) Appoint an executive director within the classified service who,  
24 The executive director shall serve as employ the state long-term care ombudsman

1 as specified under sub. (4) (a) within the classified service, and who shall employ staff  
2 within the classified service.

3 **SECTION 22.** 16.009 (4) (a) of the statutes is amended to read:

4 16.009 (4) (a) The board shall operate the office in order to carry out the  
5 requirements of the long-term care ombudsman program, as defined in 42 USC  
6 3058g (a) (2), under 42 USC 3027 (a) (12) (A) and 42 USC 3058f to 3058h and in  
7 compliance with 42 CFR 1321 and 1324. The executive director ~~appointed by the~~  
8 ~~board shall serve as~~ employ the state long-term care ombudsman. The executive  
9 ~~director state long-term care ombudsman~~ may delegate operation of the office to the  
10 staff employed under sub. (2) (a), as designated representatives of the ombudsman.

21 Nation's collaboration with the Audubon Society concerning Audubon Great Lakes

3 compensation, including any management fee. Any management fee may not  
4 exceed, ~~annually~~ the following:

5           1. Annually, for no more than 4 years, 1 percent of the total moneys designated  
6 under sub. (5) (b) 1. and raised under sub. (5) (b) 3.

7           **SECTION 25.** 16.295 (4) (a) 2. of the statutes is created to read:

8           16.295 (4) (a) 2. Annually, for no more than 4 years, 1 percent of the total  
9 moneys designated under sub. (5) (b) 4.

12 investment manager \$25,000,000.

14          16.295 (5) (b) 4. The moneys under par. (am).

15          **SECTION 28.** 16.295 (5) (c) 2. of the statutes is amended to read:

16          16.295 (5) (c) 2. Of the moneys designated under par. (b) 1., 2. and 3., the  
17 investment manager shall commit at least one-half of those moneys to investments  
18 in venture capital funds within 12 months after the date the investment manager  
19 executes the contract under sub. (4) (a), and the investment manager shall commit  
20 all of those moneys to investments in venture capital funds within 24 months after

4 16.295 (5) (d) 1. Make new investments in an amount equal to the moneys it  
5 receives under par. (b) in one or more businesses that are headquartered in this state  
6 and employ at least 50 percent of their full-time employees, including any subsidiary  
7 or other affiliated entity, in this state, and invest at least one-half of those moneys  
8 in one or more businesses that employ fewer than 150 full-time employees, including  
9 any subsidiary or other affiliated entity, when the venture capital fund first invests  
10 moneys in the business under this section. The venture capital fund's contract with  
11 a business in which the venture capital fund makes an investment under this  
12 subdivision shall require that, if within 3 years after the venture capital fund makes

19 3. A salary adjustment under s. 230.12 (10) (c) for a deputy or assistant district

21 4. A deputy or assistant district attorney does not need to have served the state  
22 as a deputy or assistant district attorney for a continuous period of 12 months to be

10 changes may be made as proposed by the governor. If the cochairpersons notify the  
11 governor that the committee has scheduled a meeting for the purpose of reviewing  
12 the proposed action, the position changes may be made only upon approval of the  
13 committee.

14 (b) If a full-time equivalent position or portion thereof is created under par. (a),  
15 the appropriation that is used to pay salary and fringe benefit costs for the position

3 governor that the committee has scheduled a meeting for the purpose of reviewing  
4 the proposed action, the supplements may be made only upon approval of the  
5 committee.

6 **SECTION 9119. Nonstatutory provisions; Health Services.**

7 (1) **DEADLINE FOR IMPLEMENTING DENTAL SERVICES REIMBURSEMENT RATE INCREASE.**

8 The department of health services shall, by October 1, 2023, implement the Medical  
9 Assistance reimbursement rate increase under s. 49.45 (24n) (a).

10 (2) **FEE INCREASE PLAN FOR BUREAU OF ASSISTED LIVING STAFF.** No later than the

11 first day of the 7th month beginning after the effective date of this subsection, the  
12 department of health services shall submit a plan to the joint committee on finance  
13 to increase licensing fees for assisted living facilities and outpatient mental health  
14 clinics to cover the cost of staffing within the bureau of assisted living necessary to  
15 ensure adequate protection of the health and well-being of vulnerable individuals,  
16 as determined by the department.

17 (3) **NURSING HOME SUPPORT SERVICES.** The department of health services shall,

18 for purposes of reimbursement under the Medical Assistance program for nursing  
19 homes, establish and implement a priced rate for nursing home support services that  
20 matches the median facility costs plus 25 percent priced rate implemented by the

6 reimbursed under that rate.

7 (6) EMS FUNDING ASSISTANCE PROGRAM FUNDING FORMULA. The emergency

13 fiscal biennium, the department of justice may not award to a school board or  
14 governing body of a private school a grant under s. 165.88 for submitting critical  
15 incident mapping data if the school board or governing body has already received a  
16 grant under s. 165.88 for that purpose.

17 **SECTION 9128. Nonstatutory provisions; Legislature.**

18 (1) REQUIRED GENERAL FUND STRUCTURAL BALANCE. Section 20.003 (4m) shall not  
19 apply to the actions of the legislature in enacting any legislation during the 2023-24  
20 legislative session.

21 **SECTION 9130. Nonstatutory provisions; Local Government.**

22 (1) HARBOR COMMISSION OF THE TOWN OF LA POINTE. From the appropriation  
23 under s. 20.505 (1) (fy), the department of administration shall award a grant to the  
24 harbor commission of the town of La Pointe in Ashland County for costs incurred by  
25 the harbor commission in establishing the harbor commission and investigating the



1 potential of and preparing for the provision of ferry service between the Wisconsin  
2 mainland and the town of La Pointe in Ashland County.

3 (2) WALTER SCHROEDER AQUATIC CENTER IN THE VILLAGE OF BROWN DEER. From  
4 the appropriation under s. 20.505 (1) (fp), the department of administration shall  
5 award a grant to the Walter Schroeder Aquatic Center in the village of Brown Deer.

6 **SECTION 9131. Nonstatutory provisions; Military Affairs.**

7 (1) PAYMENT TO THE TOWN OF SILVER CLIFF TO REBUILD PUBLIC SAFETY BUILDING  
8 DESTROYED BY TORNADO. Notwithstanding the requirements under s. 323.31, from the  
9 appropriation under s. 20.465 (3) (b), the department of military affairs shall provide  
10 a payment to the town of Silver Cliff for the town to rebuild its public safety building  
11 that was destroyed by a tornado.

12 (2) CONSERVATION OF MEMORIALS AND MARKERS RELATED TO WISCONSIN. From the  
13 appropriation under s. 20.465 (1) (em), the department of military affairs shall  
14 provide a onetime grant of \$69,000 to the Friends of Vicksburg National Military  
15 Park and Campaign for the conservation of memorials and markers related to  
16 Wisconsin at or near the Vicksburg National Military Park in Vicksburg, Mississippi.

17 **SECTION 9132. Nonstatutory provisions; Natural Resources.**

18 (1) ATV AND UTV LAW ENFORCEMENT POSITIONS. The secretary of natural  
19 resources shall assign from the existing position authority of the department of  
20 natural resources 1.0 FTE position to serve as a conservation warden supervisor and  
21 2.0 FTE positions to serve as conservation wardens, for the purpose of all-terrain  
22 vehicle and utility terrain vehicle law enforcement. The department of natural  
23 resources shall report the reallocation of positions to the joint committee on finance  
24 for inclusion in the final ch. 20 schedule, as described in s. 20.004 (2).

1           (2) GRANT TO THE MIRROR LAKE MANAGEMENT DISTRICT FOR DREDGING AND GULLY  
2 REHABILITATION. In the 2023-24 fiscal year, from the appropriation under s. 20.370  
3 (1) (mu), the department of natural resources shall award a grant of \$449,200 to the  
4 Mirror Lake Management District for a project involving dredging and gully  
5 rehabilitation in or near Mirror Lake State Park.

6           (3) PATTISON AND AMNICON FALLS STATE PARKS.

7           (a) From the appropriation under s. 20.370 (7) (hu), the department of natural  
8 resources shall allocate \$2,161,300 for the purpose of completing the projects under  
9 pars. (b) and (c).

10          (b) The department of natural resources shall complete all of the following  
11 projects in Pattison State Park:

- 12           1. Construction of playgrounds and gazebos.
- 13           2. Electrification of campsites.
- 14           3. Repair of the Big Manitou Falls trail stairway.
- 15           4. Construction of a trail to the beach that is accessible to individuals with  
16 disabilities.
- 17           5. Landscaping.

18          (c) The department of natural resources shall complete all of the following  
19 projects in Amnicon Falls State Park:

- 20           1. Construction of playgrounds and gazebos.
- 21           2. Electrification of campsites.
- 22           3. Replacement of guard rails.
- 23           4. Construction of trail improvements.
- 24           5. Construction of a bridge over Now and Then Creek.
- 25           6. Construction of a 6-mile multiuse trail.

1           7. Construction of a road from the park entrance to and through the  
2 campground loop.

3           (4) GRANT TO BUFFALO LAKE PROTECTION AND REHABILITATION DISTRICT. During the  
4 2023-24 fiscal year, from the appropriation under s. 20.370 (6) (ar), the department  
5 of natural resources shall award a grant of \$100,000 to the Buffalo Lake protection  
6 and rehabilitation district to assist the district in fulfilling department of natural  
7 resources permitting and study requirements.

8           (5) LAPHAM PEAK LODGE GRANT. From the appropriation under s. 20.370 (7) (ht),  
9 in the 2023-24 fiscal year, the department of natural resources shall award a grant  
10 in the amount of \$250,000 to the Friends of Lapham Peak Unit - Kettle Moraine  
11 State Forest, Inc., to assist in the construction of a new ski lodge in the Lapham Peak  
12 Unit of the Kettle Moraine State Forest. Any grant moneys remaining after  
13 construction of the lodge is complete shall be used for lodge furnishings and  
14 snowmaking equipment for the Lapham Peak Unit.

24 the Lakeland STAR Academy.

25           **SECTION 9137. Nonstatutory provisions; Revenue.**

1 (1) INDIVIDUAL INCOME TAX WITHHOLDING TABLE ADJUSTMENTS. No later than  
2 October 1, 2023, the department of revenue shall update the individual income tax  
3 withholding tables under s. 71.64 (9) to reflect the tax rates, brackets, and sliding  
4 scale standard deduction that are in effect for taxable year 2024. The adjustments  
5 made under this subsection to the withholding tables shall take effect on January 1,  
6 2024.

7 **SECTION 9138. Nonstatutory provisions; Safety and Professional**  
8 **Services.**

9 (1) DE PERE GREENWOOD CEMETERY. From the appropriation under s. 20.165 (1)  
10 (a), the department of safety and professional services, with the approval of the  
11 cemetery board, shall award a grant in the amount of \$1,000,000 in fiscal year  
12 2023-24 to the De Pere Greenwood Cemetery to address erosion that affects burials.

13 **SECTION 9143. Nonstatutory provisions; Tourism.**

14 (1) OFFICE OF OUTDOOR RECREATION; PROJECT POSITIONS. Notwithstanding s.  
15 230.27 (1), the termination date of 3.0 GPR office of outdoor recreation project  
16 positions provided to the department of tourism under 2019 Wisconsin Act 9 is June  
17 30, 2025.

18 (2) GRANT TO THE EXPERIENCE GREATER GREEN BAY CORPORATION. From the  
19 appropriation under s. 20.380 (1) (b), in fiscal year 2023-24, the department of  
20 tourism shall award a grant to the Experience Greater Green Bay Corporation, also  
21 known as Discover Green Bay, for purposes consistent with s. 41.11 (4). The grant  
22 shall be in the amount of \$2,000,000.

23 (3) GRANT TO THE GREATER MILWAUKEE CONVENTION & VISITORS BUREAU, INC.  
24 From the appropriation under s. 20.380 (1) (b), in fiscal year 2023-24, the  
25 department of tourism shall award a grant to the Greater Milwaukee Convention &

1 Visitors Bureau, Inc., also known as Visit Milwaukee, for purposes consistent with  
2 s. 41.11 (4). The grant shall be in the amount of \$10,000,000.

3 **SECTION 9144. Nonstatutory provisions; Transportation.**

4 (1) FREIGHT RAIL PRESERVATION PROGRAM REPORT. During the 2023-25 fiscal  
5 biennium, the department of transportation shall conduct a cost-benefit analysis of  
6 the freight rail preservation program under ss. 85.08, 85.09, and 85.093. No later  
7 than June 30, 2025, the department of transportation shall provide a report of its  
8 findings to the joint committee on finance.

9 (2) PIPELINE GRANT.

10 (a) In the 2023-25 fiscal biennium, from the appropriation under s. 20.395 (2)  
11 (cq), notwithstanding the eligibility criteria under s. 85.095, the department of  
12 transportation shall award a grant of \$10,000,000 under s. 85.095 (2) (a) to entities  
13 for the purpose of assisting in the construction of a fuel pipeline extension from the  
14 Mitchell International Airport to the port of Milwaukee.

15 (b) This subsection does not apply unless the department of transportation is  
16 awarded a grant under the federal Port Infrastructure Development Program for the  
17 construction of a pipeline extension from the Mitchell International Airport to the  
18 port of Milwaukee.

19 (3) AIRPORT IMPROVEMENT PROJECT FUNDING FOR APPLETON INTERNATIONAL  
20 AIRPORT. Notwithstanding s. 114.34, in fiscal year 2023-24, from the appropriation  
21 under s. 20.395 (2) (dq), the department of transportation shall award a grant of  
22 \$7,000,000 to the Appleton International Airport for improvements as part of the  
23 airport's terminal expansion project.

24 (4) GRANT TO RICHLAND COUNTY FOR HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION. Notwithstanding  
25 limitations on the amount and use of aids provided under s. 86.31 or eligibility

1 requirements for receiving aids under s. 86.31, in the 2023–25 fiscal biennium, from  
2 the appropriation under s. 20.395 (2) (ft), the department of transportation shall  
3 award a grant under s. 86.31 (3g) to Richland County for the CTH O highway  
4 construction project. The grant under this subsection shall be in the amount of  
5 \$4,180,000.

6 (5) SOUTHERN BRIDGE PROJECT IN BROWN COUNTY. Notwithstanding limitations  
7 on the amount and use of aids provided under s. 84.11 or eligibility requirements for  
8 receiving aids under s. 84.11, in the 2023–25 fiscal biennium, from the appropriation  
9 under s. 20.395 (2) (aq), the department of transportation shall provide a payment  
10 under s. 84.11 to Brown County for the construction of the Southern Bridge project  
11 crossing the Fox River in Brown County. The payment under this subsection shall  
12 be in the amount of \$50,000,000.

13 (6) MAIN STREET BRIDGE IN WATERTOWN. Notwithstanding eligibility  
14 requirements for receiving aid or limitations on the amount and use of aid provided  
15 under s. 84.18, in the 2023–25 fiscal biennium, from the appropriation under s.  
16 20.395 (2) (eq), the department of transportation shall set aside moneys for  
17 reconstruction of the Main Street bridge in the city of Watertown. The amount of  
18 moneys set aside under this subsection shall be \$2,000,000.

19 (7) RAY NITSCHKE MEMORIAL BRIDGE. Notwithstanding eligibility requirements  
20 for receiving aid or limitations on the amount and use of aid provided under s. 84.18,  
21 in the 2023–24 fiscal year, from the appropriation under s. 20.395 (2) (eq), the  
22 department of transportation shall set aside moneys for repairs to the Ray Nitschke  
23 Memorial Bridge in Brown County. The amount of moneys set aside under this  
24 subsection shall be \$1,200,000.

1           (8) NOISE BARRIERS ON I 894. During the 2023-25 fiscal biennium, from the  
2           appropriation under s. 20.395 (3) (cq), the department of transportation shall set  
3           aside moneys to install noise attenuation barriers along I 894, between Loomis Road  
4           and 76th Street, in Milwaukee County. The amount of moneys set aside under this  
5           subsection shall be \$7,000,000.

6           (9) ADMINISTRATIVE FACILITY EXPENDITURES. In the 2023-25 fiscal biennium, the  
7           department of transportation shall expend \$18,500,000 from proceeds of  
8           transportation revenue bonds issued under s. 84.59 (6) for administrative facility  
9           projects.

10          (10) TRANSIT AID TRANSFERS. If the department of transportation makes  
11          payments under s. 85.20 (4m) (a) 6., 7., or 8. in fiscal year 2023-24 prior to the  
12          effective date of this subsection, the department of administration shall, in fiscal  
13          year 2023-24, transfer from the appropriation accounts under s. 20.395 (1) (hb) to  
14          (hf) to the transportation fund an amount equal to the amounts paid by the  
15          department of transportation in fiscal year 2023-24 prior to the effective date of this  
16          subsection. The department of administration shall make each transfer under this  
17          subsection from the appropriation account that corresponds to the applicable transit  
18          tier under s. 85.20 (4m) (a) 6., 7., or 8. for which the department of transportation  
19          made payments.

20          (11) MISSISSIPPI RIVER PARKWAY COMMISSION POSITIONS. The department of  
21          transportation shall assign the equivalent of 0.1 FTE position from the duties of the  
22          bicycle and pedestrian coordinator position to the Mississippi River parkway  
23          commission for the purpose of providing administrative support to the commission.

24          (12) REFUND AND CHARGE-BACK OF CERTAIN PROPERTY TAXES. Notwithstanding s.  
25          74.41, the town of Sanborn in Ashland County may not request a charge-back of

1 property tax refunds issued by the town, pursuant to the decision in *Lac Courte*  
2 *Oreilles Band of Lake Superior Chippewa Indians of Wisconsin v. Evers*, 46 F.4th 552  
3 (7th Cir. 2022), for tax years 2015 to 2021.

4 **SECTION 9147. Nonstatutory provisions; University of Wisconsin**  
5 **System.**

6 (1) POSITIONS RELATED TO DIVERSITY, EQUITY, AND INCLUSION. The 188.80 FTE  
7 positions for the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System that were  
8 funded from s. 20.285 (1) (a) in fiscal year 2022-23 and that are deauthorized on the  
9 effective date of this subsection shall be positions that perform functions related to  
10 diversity, equity, and inclusion.

11 (2) TRANSITION OF THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN-MILWAUKEE AT WASHINGTON  
12 COUNTY BRANCH CAMPUS. The University of Wisconsin System shall in the 2023-24  
13 fiscal year develop and submit to the joint committee on finance a plan for the  
14 transition of the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee at Washington County branch  
15 campus from the University of Wisconsin System to a joint operation of Washington  
16 County and the Moraine Park Technical College district board and a request for  
17 funds for that plan. The plan shall include information regarding matching funds  
18 provided by Washington County and private donations.

19 **SECTION 9148. Nonstatutory provisions; Veterans Affairs.**

20 (1) STUDY FOR A MASTER PLAN FOR THE WISCONSIN VETERANS HOME AT KING. From  
21 the appropriation under s. 20.485 (2) (u), during the 2023-25 fiscal biennium the  
22 department of veterans affairs shall contract with a vendor to study the campus of  
23 the Wisconsin Veterans Home at King. The study shall provide a framework to guide  
24 decision making for future operations and development on the campus of the



1 Wisconsin Veterans Home at King. The study shall be completed before January 1,  
2 2025.

3 (2) U.S.S. WISCONSIN. From the appropriation under s. 20.485 (5) (c), in fiscal  
4 year 2023-24, the department of veterans affairs may award a onetime grant to a  
5 private nonprofit organization or a nonstock corporation that is a nonprofit  
6 corporation whose sole purpose is to promote and support recognition of the  
7 Columbia-class submarine the U.S.S. Wisconsin. The amount of the grant under  
8 this subsection may be up to \$16,540. For purposes of this subsection, “nonprofit  
9 organization” has the meaning given in s. 108.02 (19), “nonstock corporation” means  
10 a nonstock corporation that is organized under ch. 181, and “nonprofit corporation”  
11 has the meaning given in s. 181.0103 (17).

12 **SECTION 9149. Nonstatutory provisions; Wisconsin Economic**  
13 **Development Corporation.**

14 (1) TALENT ATTRACTION AND RETENTION INITIATIVES.

15 (a) *Expenditures.* In the 2023-25 fiscal biennium, the Wisconsin Economic  
16 Development Corporation shall expend at least \$4,000,000 from the appropriations  
17 under s. 20.192 (1) (a) and (r) on initiatives for the attraction of talent to and retention  
18 of talent in this state under s. 238.155.

19 (b) *Veterans initiatives.* Of the moneys expended under par. (a), the Wisconsin  
20 Economic Development Corporation, in consultation with the department of  
21 veterans affairs, shall expend at least \$2,000,000 on initiatives for the attraction of  
22 veterans to and retention of veterans in this state’s workforce.

23 (c) *Program evaluation and reports.* The Wisconsin Economic Development  
24 Corporation shall evaluate its talent attraction and retention initiatives under s.  
25 238.155, including program outcomes and the number of veterans discharged on or

1 after July 1, 2023, who choose this state for their first move; and the corporation shall  
2 report its findings in the manner provided under s. 13.172 (3) to the assembly  
3 committee on jobs, economy and small business development or its successor and the  
4 senate committee on economic development and technical colleges or its successor  
5 on or before September 1, 2024, with respect to the 2023-24 fiscal year and on or  
6 before September 1, 2025, with respect to the 2024-25 fiscal year.

7 **SECTION 9201. Fiscal changes; Administration.**

8 (1) TRANSFER TO THE STATE BUILDING TRUST FUND. In fiscal year 2023-24, there  
9 is transferred from the appropriation account under s. 20.505 (1) (kc) to the state  
10 building trust fund \$18,000,000.

11 **SECTION 9227. Fiscal changes; Justice.**

12 (1) TRANSFER OF PROGRAM REVENUE MONEYS FOR GRANTS FOR ALTERNATIVES TO  
13 PROSECUTION AND INCARCERATION. There is transferred the unencumbered balance in  
14 the appropriation account under s. 20.455 (2) (kr), 2021 stats., to the appropriation  
15 account under s. 20.455 (2) (jd) on the effective date of this subsection.

16 **SECTION 9232. Fiscal changes; Natural Resources.**

17 (1) TRANSFER BETWEEN ACCOUNTS OF THE CONSERVATION FUND. During the  
18 2023-24 fiscal year, there is transferred from the forestry account of the conservation  
19 fund to the fish and wildlife account of the conservation fund \$25,000,000.

20 (2) PFAS FUND; TRANSFER FROM GENERAL FUND. In fiscal year 2023-24, there is  
21 transferred from the general fund to the PFAS fund \$110,000,000.

22 (3) PFAS FUND; TRANSFER FROM ENVIRONMENTAL FUND. In fiscal year 2023-24,  
23 there is transferred from the moneys in the environmental fund designated for  
24 environmental management to the PFAS fund \$15,000,000.

1 (4) PFAS FUND; TRANSFER FROM FIRE FIGHTING FOAM APPROPRIATION. The  
2 unencumbered balance in the appropriation to the department of natural resources  
3 under s. 20.370 (4) (ps) is transferred to the PFAS fund.

4 (5) WATER RESOURCES ACCOUNT LAPSE. Notwithstanding s. 20.001 (3) (c), in fiscal  
5 year 2023-24, from the appropriation account under s. 20.370 (7) (fw), there is lapsed  
6 to the conservation fund \$350,000. The amount lapsed under this subsection shall  
7 be credited to the water resources account of the conservation fund.

8 **SECTION 9244. Fiscal changes; Transportation.**

9 (1) TRANSFER FROM GENERAL FUND TO TRANSPORTATION FUND. In the 2023-24 fiscal  
10 year, there is transferred from the general fund to the transportation fund,  
11 \$555,523,900.

12 **SECTION 9251. Fiscal changes; Other.**

13 (1) TRANSFER TO THE CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT FUND. In fiscal year 2023-24, there  
14 is transferred from the general fund to the capital improvement fund  
15 \$1,234,081,900.

16 **SECTION 9334. Initial applicability; Public Instruction.**

17 (1) REVENUE LIMIT; HIGH POVERTY AID. The treatment of s. 121.90 (2) (am) 1. and  
18 (bm) 3. first applies to the calculation of revenue limits for the 2023-24 school year.

19 **SECTION 9337. Initial applicability; Revenue.**

20 (1) CRANBERRY RESEARCH AND EDUCATIONAL STATION. The treatment of s. 70.11  
21 (47) first applies to the property tax assessments as of January 1, 2023.

22 (2) COMMERCIAL LOANS. The treatment of ss. 71.05 (1) (i) and 71.26 (1) (i) first  
23 applies to taxable years beginning after December 31, 2022.

1 (3) FINANCIAL ORGANIZATIONS. The treatment of s. Tax 2.495 (4) (d) 1. and 3. of  
2 the administrative rules first applies retroactively to taxable years beginning on  
3 January 1, 2022.

4 (4) SALES TAX RETAILER'S ALLOWANCE. The treatment of s. 77.61 (4) (c) first applies  
5 to sales and use taxes payable on the first day of the 3rd month beginning after  
6 publication.

7 (5) CIGARETTE TAX STAMPS. The treatment of s. 139.32 (5) first applies to cigarette  
8 tax stamps purchased on the first day of the 3rd month beginning after publication.

9 **SECTION 9344. Initial applicability; Transportation.**

10 (1) NONHYBRID ELECTRIC VEHICLE SURCHARGE. The treatment of s. 341.25 (1) (L)  
11 3. first applies to an application for registration received by the department of  
12 transportation on October 1, 2023.

13 **SECTION 9400. Effective dates; general.** Except as otherwise provided in  
14 SECTIONS 9401 to 9451 of this act, this act takes effect on July 1, 2023, or on the day  
15 after publication, whichever is later.

16 **SECTION 9401. Effective dates; Administration.**

17 (1) TRIBAL GRANTS. The repeal of s. 20.505 (1) (ky) and (8) (hm) 16a. takes effect  
18 on July 1, 2025.

19 (2) LOCAL GOVERNMENT FUND. The treatment of s. 70.119 (7) (a) takes effect on  
20 July 1, 2024.
