The Department promulgated ch. DWD 802 to establish requirements and procedures for awarding technical education equipment grants to school districts under s. 106.275, Stats., which was created by 2017 Wisconsin Act 59. 2023					
Wisconsin Act 165 made changes to s. 106.275, Stats., regarding the subjects listed in item 4. As a result, ch. DWD 802					
no longer aligns with s. 106.275, Stats. The purpose of this emergency rule is to align ch. DWD 802 with the revised					
statute so that the Department can award grants in early 2025. The Department is in the process of promulgating a					
permanent rule (see Scope Statement SS 085-24) that has the same purpose as the emergency rule. However, the					
Department will not be able to complete the process for promulgating the permanent rule in time to award the grants in					
early 2025.

The emergency rule effectuates the anticipated economic impact intended by the Legislature in enacting 2023 Wisconsin Act 165. As noted above, the Department is working on promulgating a permanent rule that has the same effect.					
15. Benefits of Implementing the Rule and Alternative(s) to Implementing the Rule					
The emergency rule ensures that ch. DWD 802 aligns with s. 106.275, Stats., as revised by 2023 Wisconsin Act 165,					
while the Department works on promulgating the permanent rule noted above.					

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The alternative is to not promulgate the emergency rule. If the Department does not promulgate the emergency rule, ch. DWD 802 will not align with the revised statute when the Department awards grants in early 2025.

16. Long Range Implications of Implementing the Rule

An emergency rule is temporary and has no long range implications.

17. Compare With Approaches Being Used by Federal Government

The grants awarded under the emergency rule will complement existing job training opportunities under the Wisconsin Fast Forward programs, the federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act of 2014, and other local, state, and federal workforce training programs.

18. Compare With Approaches Being Used by Neighboring States (Illinois, Iowa, Michigan and Minnesota) Illinois. The Industrial Development Assistance Law allows local school districts and community colleges to apply for and receive grants under Act 100-0679 for the acquisition of land, construction of facilities, and purchase of equipment, dedicated solely to the instruction of occupations in manufacturing.

Iowa. The Iowa Department of Education announced \$1.7 million in Credentials to Career grants to support high schoolers in earning industry-recognized credentials in January 2024. The Credentials to Career grants are available to Iowa School Districts to align secondary career and technical education programs with industry-recognized credentials. Funding through the Credentials to Careers grant can be used by school districts to develop, broaden and enhance CTE pathway programs. Allowable costs include student exam fees, instructional equipment, non-consumable instructional supplies, computer equipment and software, wired and wireless internet connections, installation costs, instructor training related to new equipment purchases, instructor training expenses required to offer the credential and curriculum enhancements.

Michigan. The Michigan Department of Education (MDE) awards grants of up to \$250,000 through the Career Pathways Grant (CPG) opportunity for entities that are eligible for funding under the federal Strengthening Career and Technical Education for the 21st Century Act, which is commonly called Perkins V. Applicants for the grants may apply for more than one instructional classification or occupational career, which could include engineering technology, drafting and design technology/architectural, biotechnology, plumbing/pipefitting, heating, air conditioning, ventilation, refrigeration, small engine repair, etc. The CPG grant supports Michigan's state plan for career and technical education under Perkins V.

Minnesota. The Partnership Program allows Minnesota participating businesses to partner with accredited Minnesota educational institutions to develop and deliver custom training specific to business needs. Grants up to \$400,000 are available for training related costs such as curriculum development, instruction, training materials and supplies, training equipment, and instructor travel.
