Re: Assembly Bill 548, establishing a Wisconsin Conservation Corps Program

Chairman Mursau and Members of the Committee, thank you for holding this public hearing today on Assembly Bill 548, which will reestablish the Wisconsin Conservation Corps (WCC). We are pleased to co-author legislation that will conserve Wisconsin's precious natural resources and create jobs. We are proud to have co-sponsored this legislation in prior legislative sessions with former Representative Fred Clark. In 2010, recreation of the Wisconsin Conservation Corps that existed from 1983-2003 passed the Assembly with broad, bipartisan support on a 78-19 vote. This legislation is critically important to Wisconsin as we look for new way to create jobs and protect the environment.

This proposal builds on Wisconsin's proud stewardship of our natural resources while providing Wisconsin's young people with valuable employment training and educational opportunities. For twenty years, the WCC offered the opportunity for our youth to participate in conservation and natural heritage projects throughout the state, gaining work skills, educational opportunities, and developing practical career skills through meaningful work experiences.

As millennials struggle to find meaningful, family-sustaining employment, and as Wisconsin's precious natural resources are increasingly under threat, reestablishing the Wisconsin Conservation Corps is more important than ever. AB 548 creates a WCC committed to serving 18-25 year olds who have no postsecondary education, and who have a family income of less than 200 percent of the federal poverty line, thereby ensuring that our state's most vulnerable youth have the opportunity to not only protect our state's rich environment, but obtain the training and education they need to succeed. The bill directs the Department of Administration to secure grant funding through AmeriCorps and other youth job corps related program funding, develop a WCC program "brand", and contract with one or more NGO with experience in youth corps programs to operate a Wisconsin Conservation Corps. The program will be funded by leveraging federal AmeriCorps (National and Community Service Board) grants and existing state resources.

Thank you again for the opportunity to testify on Assembly Bill 548. It is our hope that this legislation is adopted soon.

Good Morning Chairman Mursau, Vice Chair Krug, and members of the Committee. My name is Don Hammes and I am here today as a former employee of the Wisconsin Conservation Corps and as a member of the Executive Committee for the Sierra Club – John Muir Chapter.

Founded in 1892 by John Muir, the Sierra Club is America's oldest, largest and most influential grassroots environmental organization. The Sierra Club's mission is to explore, enjoy, and protect the wild places of the earth. The Sierra Club – John Muir Chapter is made up of 15,000 members and supporters located throughout Wisconsin who work to promote clean energy and protect natural resources in Wisconsin.

I worked for WCC as their Communications Coordinator and Publications Editor for several years in the early 2000's. In this position I had the opportunity to travel all across Wisconsin visiting various WCC crews to write stories for our publications and to prepare news releases regarding the projects. This gave me an opportunity to talk with crew members and crew leaders as well as project sponsors. It was not long before I became convinced that this program was a perfect example of that often used expression....a win, win, win for Wisconsin.

It was a win first of all because the program successfully trained young adults and helped them gain self-confidence and direction. Many Corps volunteers came from difficult, unstable family situations and had not finished high school. Others were high school graduates who needed help setting their sights on attending a technical college or university. WCC worked to help them all.

It was a win secondly because the training and on the job experience these young people gained while working for WCC was just they needed to find a job once they left the Corps, or if they decided to pursue additional education, the direction they wanted to take in developing a vocation.

It was a win thirdly, because hundreds of conservation projects were completed all across Wisconsin in city parks, county parks, in state parks and on state owned lands managed by DNR. In many cases these were important projects that had been put off for years due to a lack of funding or manpower to get them completed. They worked on timber stand improvement, planted trees, created firebreaks, and collected seeds for nursery tree production or prairie restoration. They worked with field researchers from DNR, from the U.S. Fish and W9ildlife Service and the U.S. Forest Service to band osprey, geese and ducks or conduct population surveys of everything from deer to sturgeon and trout.

Crews also worked with communities to complete parks projects including park shelters, concession stands, skiing and hiking trails and shelters, boardwalks, bridges, ballparks, dugouts and bleachers. They also fenced streambanks, built retaining walls, grass waterways and water diversions, build and install sediment barriers and riprap banks to stem erosion.

I begin can't tell you how many times I witnessed these young men and women turn their lives around as they helped each other, as they helped communities and as they helped state, county and city conservation departments all across Wisconsin.

This program for many years enjoyed bipartisan support from the state legislature because it was a win-win-win program. I believe funding was just over \$1,000,000 a year, but economic payback was many millions. I urge you to vote in support of AB548.

Serve Wisconsin 2016-2018 State Service Plan

SERVE WISCONSIN is a 21-member citizen body appointed by the Governor to support community service and volunteerism. Federal AmeriCorps resources from the Corporation for National and Community Service are awarded to organizations seeking to deliver services using an evidence-based approach to solve identified community needs. Serve Wisconsin will support organizations using delivery system models that address one or more of the six national focus areas:

- Disaster Services
- Economic Opportunities
- Education

ACTION 5:

- Environmental Stewardship
- Healthy Futures
- Veterans and Military Families

State Service Plan Performance Targets OBJECTIVE 1: Serve Wisconsin will invest in sustainable service solutions that are supported by evidence-based community need. The service delivery system shall incorporate effective capacity building activities and strategies for recruiting, retaining, managing, and recognizing volunteers and AmeriCorps members. Serve Wisconsin shall allocate 100% of the available resources in support of the six national focus areas and capacity building activities to enhance program sustainability. Establish annual aggregate volunteer engagement targets and report the number of episodic and ongoing ACTION 1: volunteers engaged. Establish an annual aggregate volunteer hour target and report the number of volunteer hours completed ACTION 2: by episodic and ongoing volunteers. Annually establish the number of organizations to receive capacity building services that report the ACTION 3: implementing three or more effective volunteer management practices. Annually establish the number of organizations that will report that capacity building activities supported by ACTION 4: national service funding have helped to make the organization more efficient and/or effective. Serve Wisconsin 2016-2018 State Service Plan

DEFINITION OF KEY TERMS

AMERICORPS: A Federally-funded program that engages over 80,000 Americans each year to serve their community through community-based programs.

CAPACITY BUILDING: A set of activities that expand the scale, reach, efficiency, or effectiveness of programs and organizations. Activities may also leverage resources for programs and/or organizations. For example, capacity building activities may expand services, enhance delivery of services, or generate additional resources. These activities achieve lasting positive outcomes for the beneficiary populations served by CNCS-supported organizations.

CORPORATION FOR NATIONAL AND COMMUNITY SERVICE (CNCS): The Federal agency that engages more than 5 million Americans in service through its core programs: AmeriCorps, Senior Corps, Social Innovation Fund, and Volunteer Generation Fund. CNCS plays a critical role in strengthening America's nonprofit sector and addressing our nation's challenges through service.

CNCS's SIX FOCUS AREAS: The 2009 Serve America Act directs CNCS to focus national service on a core set of six priority issue areas, as follows: Disaster Services, Economic Opportunity, Education, Environmental Stewardship, Healthy Futures, and Veterans and Military Families.

CNCS-Supported Organization: Comprises a) organizations that have national service participants (AmeriCorps, VISTA and NCCC members, Senior Corps volunteers) and, b) organizations that receive CNCS funding.

COMMUNITY VOLUNTEER: Citizens or residents in the community who are recruited and/or managed by the CNCS-supported organization or assigned national service participant(s) to offer time, knowledge, skills, and expertise for free to support the CNCS-supported program or organization.

EFFECTIVE VOLUNTEER MANAGEMENT PRACTICES: CNCS has identified a series of practices that collectively maximize the capacity of volunteers to have an impact on behalf of the organization or community.

EFFECTIVENESS: Improved ability of the organization to achieve outcomes resulting in better success rates or better quality of outcomes achieved.

EFFICIENCY: Improved outcomes with the same level of resources; improved or consistent quality of services with fewer resources.

EPISODIC VOLUNTEER: A volunteer who participates in one-time service projects.

NATIONAL SERVICE PARTICIPANT: Refers to the individuals supported by CNCS who carry out service activities. CNCS' various programs refer to people who participate in national service in different ways, e.g. AmeriCorps members, Learn and Serve America participants and Senior Corps volunteers. The broad term "national service participant" encompasses individuals in all CNCS programs, excluding CNCS staff members.

ONGOING VOLUNTEER: A volunteer with an ongoing volunteer commitment to an organization or program.

Scale/Reach: The scope of a program's services. Increased scale/reach can be measures by the number of new people served, new populations served, and/or new or expanded services.

SUPPORTING/ENHANCING THE PROGRAM DELIVERY MODEL: Specifies that the services provided by the CNCS-supported organization or the national service participant engaged in the capacity building activity must be for the intended purpose of supporting or enhancing the CNCS-supported program delivery model. These capacity building activities cannot be solely intended to support the administration or operations of the organization.

Sustainability: A lasting outcome of the capacity building activity or intervention. This may include maintaining service after the CNCS resource is gone, maintaining enhanced or increased services after the CNCS resource is gone, or both. Sustainable projects and programs have institutional procedures, resources and processes that assure the continuation of expanded or enhanced beneficiary services.

UNDERSERVED POPULATIONS: Populations or groups that are specifically identified by the program as in need of program services or that currently receive inadequate service.

VOLUNTEER WISCONSIN: A collaborative initiative to connect volunteers with opportunities with the Volunteer Connection website (www.volunteerwisconsin.org), promote volunteerism, and support the capacity of nonprofit organization through service.






of AmeriCorps*State programs served by Serve Wisconsin 2002-2015

Program Year 2014-2015

During the 2014-2015 program year, through 26 AmeriCorps*State programs that operated across Wisconsin, 1,003 AmeriCorps members served 1,152,600 hours. These AmeriCorps service hours generated a local community value of \$26,590,482*.


Furthermore, 17,009 additional volunteers who served 205,775 volunteer hours were mobilized by these AmeriCorps*State programs, resulting in the equivalent of \$4,747,229* in local community value.

During the 2014-2015 program year, Wisconsin saw an investment of 6 million dollars in federal AmeriCorps funds, 4 million dollars in public and private support in match, which resulted in a \$5.82 return on investment for every federal dollar spent.




Wisconsin 2014-2015





