Thank you Chairman Knodl and Committee Members for the opportunity to testify on Senate Bill 925.

The production and trafficking of counterfeit goods poses a significant health and safety threat to consumers while also impacting the economic growth of legitimate businesses and consumers through lost revenue, downtime, and replacement costs.

Today, with the rise of online purchasing, these dangerous knock-off lighters are cheaper and easier than ever to purchase. More than 300 million imported lighters entered the U.S. in 2017 alone and 70% of lighter models tested in the U.S. failed ASTM International Safety Standards.

China and other countries have imported counterfeit unsafe pocket and utility lighters into the United States for decades. These unregulated items have led to thousands of injuries, billions of dollars in damages, enormous health care costs, and unfortunately, death. By simply defining what an "unsafe lighter" is we can vastly reduce the unnecessary damages and injuries incurred every year as well as reduce the strain on our hospitals and first responders.

Studies continue to prove that upheld safety standards for lighters reduce health care costs by over \$1 billion, reduce hospital grade injuries by 84% and reduce burn injuries by 74%. Passing this bill will add no additional strain to businesses while reducing intellectual property theft from China and reducing the enormous burden of unnecessary hospital bills and damages.

Counterfeit products not only attack the name and value of a known business, but, in many cases, can cause harmful, and sometimes fatal, consequences for the unsuspecting buyer.

Thank you Chairman Knodl and members of the Senate Committee on Shared Revenue, Elections and Consumer Protection for holding this public hearing on Senate Bill 925 (SB 925), relating to the sale of counterfeit lighters and unsafe lighters.

I authored this bill with Senator Patrick Testin after learning about a disturbing trend in the rise of injuries particularly in children and counterfeit lighters. Particularly with unregulated, counterfeit, and unsafe lighters with ties to foreign countries.

Today, with the rise of online purchasing, these dangerous knock-off lighters are cheaper and easier than ever to purchase. More than 300 million imported lighters entered the U.S. in 2017 alone and 70% of lighter models tested in the U.S. failed ASTM International Safety Standards.

China and other countries have imported counterfeit unsafe pocket and utility lighters into the United States for decades. These unregulated items have led to thousands of injuries, billions of dollars in damages, enormous health care costs, and unfortunately, death. By simply defining what an "unsafe lighter" is we can vastly reduce the unnecessary damages and injuries incurred every year as well as reduce the strain on our hospitals and first responders.

SB 925 defines an "unsafe lighter" and prohibits their sale while adding no additional punishment or fees onto retailers. The bill will add no additional strain on local retailers as the bill does not include a penalty for retailers that possess and/or sale these unsafe lighters.

The bill does however send a clear message that Wisconsin will not tolerate intellectual property theft as well as the continued invasion of these unsafe lighters in Wisconsin retail marketplaces.

I am proud of the extensive list of supporters this bill has garnered, including Wisconsin retailer associations, as well as several law enforcement associations illustrating the strong support for consumer safety and protecting existing patent laws.

TESTIMONY IN SUPPORT OF 2023 SENATE BILL 925 Relating to the sale of counterfeit lighters and unsafe lighters

Good morning, my name is Katie Strother. I am the Program Coordinator for the Professional Fire Fighters of Wisconsin Charitable Foundation (PFFWCF).

The PFFWCF is a self-supporting public charity that serves as a champion for burn survivors fire fighters, and safe communities throughout Wisconsin through education, risk mitigation, and programming and services.

The organization we now operate started 36 years ago in the City of Milwaukee. Where within a 15-day period, 3 fires took the lives of 20 people, including 17 kids. Our organization is dedicated to supporting burn survivors and preventing fires and burns.

Because of modern furnishings, fuel load, modern construction, and building materials, fires today are faster, hotter, and deadlier than ever before. Flashover, the point where everything in a room is ignited, is reached 5 time faster today than 30 years ago. Fires are not only more dangerous, but children have more access to devices that are more likely to start an accidental fire if not operated properly. For these reasons, we are in support of any regulation that will make it harder for kids to start or play with fires.

Lithium-ion batteries are increasingly found in devices and systems that the public and first responders use or interact with daily. While these batteries provide an effective and efficient source of power, the likelihood of them overheating, catching on fire, and even leading to explosions increases when they are damaged or improperly used, charged, or stored***. While electronic lighters our not yet covered in the ASTM International standards covered in this legislation, we will soon need to address the safety concerns associated with them. As well as the need for regulation.

For the past 29 years, we have held our annual Summer Camp for Burn Injured Youth. Burn Camp is a free week-long summer camp, where 50-100 kids with life changing burn injuries come to have fun and heal emotionally – without having to worry about the world around them.

After attending Burn Camp myself as a counselor, I can't imagine the pain and hardships these kids have to go through. Burns are the most painful thing a person can experience. Seeing kids with burns covering 60, 70, 80% of their body is not easy. Especially now, knowing what treatments are involved, the cost of healthcare, and knowing the cause of a vast majority of these burns were preventable.

Looking back at the causes of burns listed on the camper applications of the 1,000+ kids that have attended Burn Camp over the last 29 years. We have at-least 10-15 kids each year with burns caused by playing with fire and at-least 3-5 kids each year with burns caused by playing with lighters specifically. Please support this legislation and help us create a fire-safe and burn-free Wisconsin.

Mr. Chairman and members of the Committee – Thank you for allowing us to testify on this matter of life and property saving legislation.

My name is Gerald Minor – I am a fulltime Chief of the Pittsville Fire Co, which is in Wood County – the actual geographic center of Wisconsin. My district encompasses portions of the 69th and 70th. Assembly as well as portions of the 23rd and 24th Senate districts.

We are a primarily rural fire and EMS operation not unlike the majority of the over 850 fire departments in this State.

One of the many jobs the fire service handles every day besides the response to emergencies, is mandated on-going fire prevention duties. SB 925 falls into our "wheelhouse" – the fire and EMS agencies in this State are well versed at dealing with fires related to lighters – most of the time they also involve children – often with tragic results.

Data from the NFPA (National Fire Protection Association) (ref document Richard Campbell page3 & 4) has shown time and time again that lighters are most of the time (over 50%) involved with "fire play." Causing millions of dollars in property damage as well as the cause of significant injuries and death. While a lighter is not a toy – we know they fall into young hands, a "counterfeit" or non-safety lighter makes it even easier for a child to use them. Lighters are tools and need to be managed and manufactured with the same safety <u>standard</u> we would apply to any power tool. SB 925 will make the unsafe lighter not accessible to all in this State.

A <u>standard</u> provides that a piece of equipment has been tested to an acceptable method or degree. Today regulatory standards are everywhere our food, our vehicles, our buildings are just some of the items that must meet some safety standard. Countries that do not manufacture to a standard, because of cost, materials etc. endanger the rest of the world – this is the case with a "counterfeit" lighter. We realize no one wants to see more regulations, but as firefighters coming from the side of the workforce that deals with hazards every day – we need them.

In Wisconsin our data collection, direct from the Fire Service which all departments are required to report, has also shown the lighter is consistently the # 1 device used by ages 1-18 years of age from yeas 2009 to 2014. New data from 2021 reflects little to no change to these numbers.

The damage from one fire may encompass one home or one entire block, one acre or thousands of acres – causing millions of dollars in damage, millions of dollars in medical treatment and life changing devastation. This affects all of us, whether it be in our community, our district, as well as our insurance carriers, we all pay for this.

During my 46-year tenure in the fire service, the last 15 years I have had a personal stake in this mission, by coming to this building and retelling the same story over and over again, to only allow safe lighters in this State. To make it more difficult for unsafe lighters to be present. We can't "fireproof" parents as much as we try, parenting is out of our hands. Many of you are parents and grandparents like me, I can't imagine any of you not childproofing your house to protect all of those that enter. However, we in the fire service respond to hundreds of calls to homes where all the tools are in place to create devastation, where smoke detectors are not present or not maintained and where tools that can start fires are available to all ages.

An emergency services risk manager by the name of Gordon Graham continually reminds us with this phrase.

"IF IT'S PREDICTABLE - ITS PREVENTABLE".

SB 925 has identified the problem – it's up to all of us to make this happen.

These incidents are enhanced due to the easy access to instruments that can cause fires. Some of these instruments are found to be counterfeit or unsafe lighters that can be used to ignite a cigarette, cigar or pipe that don't comply with ASTM F400- 20, Standard Safety Specifications for Lighters. Some other items that have been counterfeited over the years include utility, grill, or fireplace lighters. Our state restricts the sale of smoking items [cigars, cigarettes], yet we don't restrict the sale of counterfeit or unsafe lighters. We are asking that you create a Wisconsin State Law that prohibits the offer of a free sample, or the sale of these lighters deemed counterfeit or unsafe to minors and adults.
