Assembly Committee on Education Testimony on AB 103 March 6, 2025

Good morning, Chair Kitchens and fellow members of the Assembly Committee on Education. Thank you for allowing me to testify on Assembly Bill (AB) 103. This legislation is just another way of empowering Wisconsin parents to participate in their children's education.

A child's primary educator should be their parents, and those parents are being excluded from a major life decision. Set aside whether you think a child should be transitioning their gender. Parents are completely unaware that their children are being called a completely different name than their actual given name. While some parents may not have an issue with their children having a nickname or an abbreviated version of their actual name, other parents have significant concerns with their child using a completely different name.

Parents are alerted to their children's grades, if they are going on a field trip, or any disciplinary actions, but not if they are being addressed by a different name in schools. You can't give a child a Tylenol in school without parental permission, yet a school can keep a parent completely in the dark if their child is transitioning in school. Parents are there to support their children's development, and it's impossible to do that when they don't know what is going on about something so core to their child's being for eight hours of each day.

AB 103 simply requires school boards to develop a policy for the process on changing legal names and pronoun usage in school records and documents. Principals will be the initial determinant for name and pronoun changes, but that can only be done so if legal documentation is provided. The policy also gives parents the final say on what name or pronouns are used. Staff will be prohibited from using any names or pronouns that differ from the student's biological sex without parental consent. Using nicknames, shortened forms of first names, and middle names are exempt in this legislation.

One school district that I represent, Arrowhead Union High School, implemented this policy in recent years, and this is something that they were already doing before the policy was implemented. This commonsense legislation keeps parents involved in the education of their children. It is a model that should be replicated in every school district in the state.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify with Rep. Dittrich as the Senate author of Assembly Bill 103, which would require that schools respect and restore parental responsibility for the health and well-being of their minor children.

It is deeply troubling to me that school staff would seek, or even be encouraged, to keep parents out of major life decisions concerning their children, while at the same time, these same officials cannot give them aspirin without parental approval. Why would schools promote secrecy in such a way? Something has gone terribly wrong in our education system when officials inherently perceive parents as harmful to their own children.

Parents are legally accountable for the health and welfare of their minor children, and have the responsibility under the law to make decisions for them. More than that, we love them! Hiding from us important things that are going on in their lives is not only disrespectful to parents, it is harmful to our children and deliberately sabotaging the ability for vital communication to take place.

That's why we have introduced this bill to ensure school boards adopt policies requiring parental approval for changing legal names and pronouns on school records and documents, and confirm acceptable use of nicknames and pronouns within schools.

This legislation is consistent with the October 2023 ruling by the Waukesha Circuit Court that the Kettle Moraine School District's policy of changing students' names and pronouns at school without parental consent and over their objection violates parents' rights. This component is a very important part of AB 103, and it makes sense. You may have heard the famous Dale Carnegie quote that "A person's name is to that person the sweetest and most important sound in any language." You probably don't have to think very long to recall numerous examples of this that you've witnessed yourself.

People like their name to be properly spelled and pronounced. A person forgetting or misremembering someone's name can offend or disappoint them. As public figures, we get called all sorts of names a lot. But particularly in a school setting, in front of peers, deliberately calling someone by the wrong name or pronoun can be fighting words. Now imagine if the person using the wrong name or pronoun is a teacher, and the power they hold in that situation. Think of the pressure that could create for that child to conform.

And don't get me wrong, I had so many fantastic teachers throughout my elementary and secondary education. My own mom is actually a former public and private school teacher who

did so much that I will forever be grateful for to advocate for me when she found out that I was being picked on. Because I also experienced significant bullying myself in both public and private school settings, and that included repeated name-calling from a high school teacher who notoriously did the same thing to several students, knowing the leverage that he had. I remember a classmate who ended up tears after class from being mocked and shamed repeatedly out loud in the classroom by the same teacher as a teen parent.

Now perhaps some of you will say, well, that's not entirely what this bill is about. Or think perhaps that the teacher was just joking around, or however it might be rationalized by a teacher or administrator. But it should be clear regardless that if the educational establishment creates or facilitates a situation where they intentionally deceive parents and insert their own judgment in place of parental decision-making, and even in some cases encourage kids to question their own gender, that is enormously inappropriate. This legislation is a key step to ending the deception and restoring trust.

Good afternoon Chair Kitchens, Ranking Member Hong, and members of the Assembly Committee on Education.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify about Assembly Bill 103. I appreciate being able to testify but I do not appreciate this bill at all. I am the mom of a Transgender son. It is hard to know where to begin, there is so much wrong with this bill.

It is cruel, discriminatory, and inhumane. It incentivizes persistent mistreatment of not just transgender and nonbinary kids, but ALL kids, and creates unsafe learning environments. It is a mess of a bill that would lead to absurd situations. This bill would be laughable if not for the fact that it creates real harm for our trans and nonbinary students.

The only positive thing I have to say about AB 103 is that it will never become law in the State of Wisconsin.

AB 103 targets transgender and nonbinary youth who want to be called – and most likely are called – by a name different than their legal name. It targets youth who want to choose the pronouns by which they are identified. Using a student's preferred name and pronouns is not about ideology. It is about dignity and respect. This bill would force educators to create unsafe school environments for their students and that includes trans and nonbinary students. It would allow for students to be consistently mis-gendered. What problem is this solving? Study after study has found that using trans and nonbinary students' chosen names and pronouns directly positively benefits their health and well-being. It reduces mental health risks known to be high among these often-marginalized children.

This bill will take away what is maybe a child's only safe space – their school. Their only safe space to be their authentic self. Their safe space to try out pronouns and a name that fits them - their being- more accurately. Family rejection is a common experience for trans and nonbinary students. Many trans and nonbinary students are not out at home. They may only be out at school because it's their safe space with friends and where they are shown respect by teachers.

This bill would force students to make a terrible choice with no good outcome: exist every day in a school where you are called by a name that is not yours...or be forced to out yourself when you cannot do so safely at home or before you are ready to do so. This bill creates an unworkable, confusing, and nonsensical tangle of reporting and permissions ostensibly centered around a student's legal name. Here's just one of the absurdities: if your legal name was Barbara, under this bill a School Board could put in place a policy declaring you could not be called Barbie in school. Or perhaps your legal name is Richard and you can no longer be called Dick. Or perhaps Charles can no longer be a Chuck. The State Legislature should not be micromanaging policy choices local School Boards make. But ultimately and most importantly, the State Legislature has no legitimate reason to force itself into the lives of Wisconsin's trans and nonbinary students and their families.

These anti-trans bills aim to target a small percentage of our population- of our children! - who have not hurt anyone. This bill doesn't protect anyone. Trans and nonbinary students are all-too-often the victims of bullying in school. How deeply sad that there are bullies in the State Legislature who go out of their way to create bills that single out these vulnerable students...students who want nothing more – and nothing less – then to be recognized as who they are.

For all these reasons, I strongly urge this Committee to vote no on AB 103.

Chair Kitchens and committee members:

As Chair of the Wisconsin Legislative LGBTQ+ Caucus, I am submitting written testimony on behalf of caucus members in opposition to 2025 Assembly Bill 103. We ask that this testimony be shared with all members of the committee, and be entered into the committee record for this bill.

Assembly Bill 103 creates new procedural obstacles for students updating their school records to reflect a legal name change that has already been approved by a court. The bill would require that every district implement these obstacles, regardless of a district's current policy and/or the efforts made by local elected officials to best represent their district and the families who have students enrolled in it. We understand that this legislation is based on policies that some districts have adopted with the express intent to decrease LGBTQ+ representation in schools, but the fact that some districts have adopted a bad policy is not justification for expanding that policy and requiring that every district fall in line.

This bill puts forward a policy for updating school records that puts school boards on a course to deny updating records in spite of a court order legally changing the name of a student. There can be no justification for a school board denying the reality of a student's legal name for any reason. At the heart of this discussion is the fact that school records are key to every student's future, and a mismatch between the legal name of a student and their school records can cause confusion and hardship well beyond the time spent at a student's school. Rather than allowing a student to apply to college or apply for a job with a school transcript and diploma that match the legal name on their driver's license, AB 103 allows a school board to reject a student's new legal name. Whatever the reason is for a student changing their legal name – whether to distance themselves from an abusive parent whose last name they do not want or because they are a trans student whose gender identity does not align with their prior name or because they are updating their last name after their parents' divorce – we should be ensuring that school boards are helping those students be in the best position possible. This bill instead creates the distinct possibility that school boards will be forced to hold a hearing between parents who disagree about a name change a judge has already approved - with a student's records stuck in the middle.

This bill also goes beyond a student's formal records and tries to police everyday interactions between students and school staff. Through AB 103, the Legislature is trying to micromanage social interactions that are made in everyday life without great controversy. If a student has a nickname that they go by for literally any reason, school staff are now forced to ignore the individuality and personality of their



students until a written authorization appears before them. The nickname policy in this bill is more restrictive than even some of the policies that it is based on and only allows nicknames based on a student's first or middle name to be used without authorization. Make the winning shot at the championship game and go by "Champ"? Better fill out a form. Have the last name Roberts and go by "Bobby"? Not without your form. The impact of this proposal would reach far beyond its intention - to further complicate school life for LGBTQ+ youth - and would result in awkwardness and absurdity across our state.

On behalf of the LGBTQ+ Caucus, I ask that you not schedule AB 103 for a vote. AB 103 takes the overly restrictive policies of a few districts and tries to impose them on every district in our state. If AB 103 comes before you for a vote in this Committee or on the Assembly floor, we ask that you vote no. This bill represents a micromanagement of local school districts and will not improve students outcomes. Instead of supporting this misguided bill, we hope that you will join us in telling transgender and nonbinary youth in our state that they are seen, they are loved, and that they belong here in Wisconsin.

Testimony in opposition to Assembly Bill 103 relating to: school board policies related to changing a pupil's legal name and pronouns.

Members of the Wisconsin Assembly Committee on Education:

"What's the point?"

That's the question that so many folks have asked me about why on earth legislative Republicans would try for the second time in two sessions to give hearings to a slew of hateful, anti-trans, anti-non-binary legislation.

It didn't go well for you last time at all.

That hateful legislation was destroyed in Committee, by the community that it was targeting and their advocates and experts, by people who knew it far better than the authors.

By my count, for every person who flew in to testify in favor of denying peoples' identity, nine people testified against it.

Frankly I felt embarrassed for you.

So clearly the point wasn't some show of popular power.

And the point clearly isn't a show of legislative power. To his great credit, Governor Evers said publicly that he would veto all of this garbage. And he did, at least the bills that didn't wither and die from shame in committee after the authors crumbled under even the lightest questioning.

And Evers reiterated that promise earlier this year. And if you insist on bringing it to the floor again, he'll veto this, too.

So if the public is against it, and it's never going to be law, what's the point?

The point is not that your constituents in your districts are asking you to do this. In town halls and letters and calls and emails your constituents are begging legislators to take action to make their own lives better – to reduce the cost of housing and consumer goods and to help stop the massive harm that your federal Republican colleagues are inflicting on our communities. Your constituents are waking up in the morning not obsessing over other kids' pronouns but wondering how they'll pay their rent or afford medical care.

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That's why the handful of people testifying in favor of this garbage today, just like last session, with the same talking points they used when this was pushed in other states, are largely flown in from other places.

So what's the point?

It's not as if most Republicans sincerely believe this is good legislation. Last year, after I testified against the ridiculous bill attempting to ban gender-affirming care, one Republican member of that committee spoke to me (ironically, in a bathroom) and wanted to be sure that I felt as though the process was fair, because he hadn't cut anyone off and allowed everyone to speak. I pointed out that you all simply could have refused to give this garbage a hearing and saved a lot of hurt and the time of scores of people, but that, other than that, the process was okay. At least he let everyone speak.

And then he said, "But I get it. It's sort of like the abortion thing. I wouldn't want someone telling me what I can or can't do with my own body."

And I was nearly hopeful there for a minute. I said, "Yes! That's it exactly. So, then, you'll be voting against it?"

And then he laughed. Because although he didn't think the legislation was a good idea, each of you - even the ones who see this garbage for what it is - is too cowardly to stand up to your leader. So you'll probably toe the line on this one and vote for it, too.

So the point isn't that you believe in it.

I would be tempted to say that the cruelty is the point. But I don't think that's quite it.

Let's be clear: the impact of this legislation is cruel. It's based not in a need for mental health or compassion or empathy, and maybe not even in hatred, but largely in insecurity.

I was a teacher for many years. And many times over those years, I was the first trusted adult to learn about a big thing in a child's life, whether it was a pregnancy, or that they were gay, or that they had come to realize that the gender assigned to them at birth was not, in fact, who they really were.

And at least the first couple of times, I assumed that these big things were news that they didn't feel comfortable sharing with their parents. But that assumption was often wrong. It wasn't that many of these students didn't have amazing, supportive parents, but that these children valued their relationship with their parents so much that they sometimes wanted to walk through how the conversation would go, with a trusted adult who they still had some distance from.

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Because I hope they knew that I would take it well, and be non-judgemental, and listen, but that even if I did mess up, it wouldn't harm the relationship with their parents, and would still better prepare them for that more important conversation with the people they loved the most.

And so I would appeal to you, authors of this legislation, and members of the committee who are also parents, or who think that you're working on behalf of parents:

As a parent whose oldest son came out to me and my wife as trans, I get it. It's scary. I didn't react well right away. I was insecure about my own parenting and didn't understand what was going on and was concerned for my child.

But even at the worst of my insecurity, I wouldn't ever have wanted my child's teacher to be unable to have a conversation with him about his identity or to be unable to refer to him by his actual name or pronouns.

The cruel impact of this legislation is hard to even put into words. It doesn't protect parents. It doesn't protect kids. It doesn't protect our community. It tries to draw a wedge between children and trusting adults in their lives who want to listen to them and help them and respect them.

I'll make one last appeal to the Republicans on this committee: parents, or people who care about children. Find your spines. Vote this down and stop harming our kids to further your boss's agenda.

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Testimony in Favor of Assembly Bill 103 Assembly Committee on Education March 6, 2026

Chairman Kitchens and Members of the Assembly Committee on Education: Thank you for the opportunity to testify today in favor of Assembly Bill 103. My name is Luke Berg, and I am an attorney with the Wisconsin Institute for Law & Liberty. I have been our lead attorney on our parental rights litigation.

As you're probably aware, multiple school districts in Wisconsin have policies to allow and facilitate children changing gender identity at school without notifying the parents or obtaining their consent. Some districts will even hide a transition at school from the parents. Imagine discovering that, for months, school staff have been treating your daughter as if she is your son, or vice versa, without you knowing about it. I've received that call from far too many Wisconsin parents in the last few years.

These policies violate parents' constitutional right to raise their own children, and we have brought lawsuits against three Wisconsin school districts on that basis. We won our lawsuit against the Kettle Moraine School District, but other districts continue to have these poorly thought-out policies. The Legislature has a chance to correct this issue statewide, to protect parents and their children, and it should do so, as other states have done.

The premise of these policies is that the only appropriate response when a child questions their identity is to immediately and without question "affirm" that the child really is the opposite sex. Think about how bizarre that is for a moment. We don't treat any other issue that way. No good parent gives their child anything and everything they want, no questions asked. Nor do we make medical decisions based solely on a child's self-diagnosis. Part of our job as parents, sometimes, is to protect our children from themselves.

Moreover, a robust body of research has shown that most children who struggle with this eventually "desist"—they return to comfort with their biological sex. But desistance drops dramatically for kids who transition. Because of this, many experts believe that treating children as if they are the opposite sex can do long-term harm by reinforcing a false belief. For that reason, many countries in Europe now recommend a slower, more cautious approach, where the first step is psychotherapy to help children process what they are feeling and why. These school district policies effectively take that option away from parents. Whatever you think about this issue, it's beyond dispute that transitioning is not right for *everyone*, and for some, it does harm. More and more young people—especially girls—are telling us that this was their experience. You're going to hear from one in a moment. If you listen to their stories, they often say that they wish someone had the courage to tell them the truth about who they really are—not just what they wanted to hear at the time.

The bill allows parents to decide what's best for their own children. That's consistent with what parents expect when they send their children to school. Anything out of the ordinary requires parental consent: field trips, sports, taking an aspirin at school. These are far less significant than changing gender identity. As Judge Maxwell put it in our case: "The School District could not administer medicine to a student without parental consent. The School District could not require or allow a student to participate in a sport without parental consent. Likewise, the School District cannot change the pronoun of a student without parental consent."

I would hope this would be a bipartisan issue. We can disagree about when and whether a transition is the right answer for children struggling with their gender. But we should all be able to agree that parents, who know and love their children more than anyone else, should be the ones to decide what is best for their children. Not school staff who barely know them. I would urge your support for the bill.

The American Civil Liberties Union of Wisconsin appreciates the opportunity to provide testimony in opposition to Assembly Bill 103.

Bills like AB-103 are part of a nationwide coordinated effort to deny transgender people their freedom, safety, and dignity. Anyone paying attention can see that the ultimate goal of legislation like this is to push transgender people out of public life altogether. In just the first two months of 2025, over 450 anti-LGBTQ bills have been introduced in statehouses across the country.¹ To be clear, transgender people have always existed and they always will. School board members, state legislators, and the President of the United States do not get to decide that they don't.

AB-103 would force school boards to adopt policies banning staff from referring a student by a name or pronouns different from what was provided at the time of enrollment. A name or pronoun chance "may" be accepted if and only if:

- a student's parent or guardian provides documentation of a legal name change or an affidavit certifying that the student's legal name was changed and the student "consistently uses the new legal name for all official purposes"
- attempts were made to notify all of the student's parents/legal guardians who have access to their school records about the requested name and pronoun change; and
- all of the student's parents and legal guardians agree with the change

That's absurd.

Many parents may hope their children will come to them first with questions about gender and sexuality. But not every child has that option. Youth who are transgender face a real risk of rejection² by the adults who are supposed to care for them when they disclose their gender identity. Trans people are more likely to be abused³ by their immediate family based on their gender identity, and high risks of abuse and family rejection result in trans youth experiencing higher rates of homelessness and housing instability.⁴ These high rates of familial rejection and abuse dramatically increase the risks of suicidality, substance abuse, and depression. Not every child can be their true selves at home without risking their physical or emotional well-being. School may be the only place where trans youth can be themselves.

In addition, many supportive parents may want their children to be able to safely explore their identity without being worried that information will be disclosed against their will, and to have a safe space to ask questions they may be uncomfortable asking at home. Trans youth thrive when they are affirmed in their gender identity. Many schools across the country recognize that a supportive learning environment requires treating trans students with dignity and respect, including (at a minimum) calling them by the name and pronouns they want to use.

Finally, we must acknowledge that people — children and adults — have a constitutional right not to have intimate facts about their lives disclosed without their consent. That includes their sexual orientation or whether they are transgender. Children do not give up all their constitutional rights by enrolling in public school—minors have independent privacy rights and parents' rights to direct the upbringing of their children do not automatically abrogate those privacy rights. For example, a federal district court recently held that parents do not have a fundamental constitutional right "to be promptly informed of their child's gender identity, when it differs from that usually associated with their sex assigned at birth, regardless of their child's wishes or any concerns regarding the detrimental effect the disclosure may have on that child."⁵ In December 2024, the U.S. Supreme Court rejected an appeal from the dismissal of a lawsuit challenging the Eau Claire Area School District's gender support policy due the plaintiffs' lack of standing because neither the parents nor their children were actually affected by the policy.⁶

We urge committee members to oppose this legislation and let kids be themselves at school.

Good morning to the members of the Assembly Committee on Education. I am Abigail Swetz, my pronouns are she/her, and I am here as the executive director of Fair Wisconsin, Wisconsin's only statewide LGBTQ+ civil rights and political advocacy organization. I am also here as a former middle school teacher and a current mom. Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony in opposition of Assembly Bill 103.

This bill stands to harm trans kids, their parents, and their teachers if it were to become law.

As a former teacher, I am immeasurably lucky to have known many trans kids and had the honor of watching them grow up into healthy, happy, fully-realized adults. I'm thankful to have been a part of their journey because it means I know the power of using a child's affirming name and pronouns in a deeply personal way, having seen the smiles on their faces and the way they were able to blossom in my classroom. This ability for children to thrive in such an environment is backed up by research; for example, research published in the Journal of Adolescent Health found that trans youth who could use their affirming name and pronouns in all aspects of their lives (school, family, friends, and community) experienced positive mental health outcomes to the tune of a 71 percent decrease in depression and a 65 percent decrease in suicide attempts. This bill would prevent teachers and other school staff from engaging in the best practice of using the name and pronouns a child asks for, a best practice that research has shown can save lives.

Data from the Youth Risk Behavior Survey indicates that trans youth are more likely to discuss their feelings of depression and anxiety with teachers and school staff than they are with their parents or guardians. This makes it clear that we must have inclusive policies in our schools that support trans youth in seeking out the help they need, and this bill is the opposite of that inclusion. When I was a teacher, I worked alongside other school staff to help students get ready to share information about themselves with their families, and I know firsthand the need to follow the child's lead in that process. The youth themselves are the experts in their own experience and have a better understanding than anyone about the challenges they might face when it comes to safety and acceptance. I have witnessed that conversation go well, and I have heard it go badly, but either way, the children and their families knew they could turn to me and my fellow school staff when they had more questions, and that proved invaluable.

This bill also feeds into a false dichotomy being set up between parents and school staff when, in reality, the bill stands to hurt parents as they try to support their trans child. The barriers that Wisconsinites of any age already face when they want to legally change their name are numerous, and the level of documentation required by this legislation to change a name in a school information system is onerous to the point of prohibitive. Parents must be able to support their own child and know their child's affirming name will be honored at school without it being invalidated or inaccessible due to bureaucratic red tape.

To be clear, affirming names and pronouns and safe spaces do not create trans kids. They allow them to breathe and help them grow into awesome adults this state needs. The mental health struggles that trans youth face are not a self-fulfilling prophecy. They are a societally-pressured outcome, and bills like AB 103 add to that pressure. Inclusive policies, like making it possible for students to use an affirming name and pronouns that best represent their identity in school in an easily accessible way – that is a pressure valve, and makes it possible for them to live fully and healthily.

I want to end with a message to the trans kids of Wisconsin: remember that there are so many people in this state who love you exactly as you are and exactly as you will someday become. Always know you are worthy of that love, and of your own future. We are grateful for you, and Wisconsin is a better place because you are here.

Re: Testimony in opposition to Assembly Bill 103

The Wisconsin Council of Churches (WCC) is a network of Christian churches and faith-based organizations committed to working together across our many differences to promote collective good. We connect 23 Christian traditions, which have within them approximately 2,000 congregations and over one million church members. Exercising holy imagination, we help one another make courageous choices that lead toward peacemaking, social and economic justice for Wisconsin's most vulnerable residents, the vitality of the church, and the well-being of our neighbors.

Our Statement on Non-violence reminds us that we believe in a "God who is full of compassion and who ceaselessly works to transform the world through love" and that as his followers we should also live our lives in this way. Part of this call is to "speak out against violence, minister to its victims, and work tirelessly to reduce the level of violence in society." AB 103 is not a bill based in compassion and grace but one that promotes violence.

Our scriptures tell stories of individuals who have changed their names throughout their lives. We tell the story of Jacob who became Israel and Saul who became Paul. In Genesis, Joseph was known for wearing a flamboyant "coat of many colors." These are stories of individuals living into their sacred identity and God affirming them. These transitions are never without struggle, but blessings are experienced over time. We believe embracing students as they use names and pronouns that match their identity encourages their full flourishing and ask you to create legislation that promotes that flourishing.

We also recognize that not all homes are safe places where students' full identity is embraced, and school may be one of the few places they are affirmed in their identities. This bill may cause these students to be outed to unsupporting families or force them to hide their true identities. This is violence. We ask you to lean into the ethic of 1 Peter 3:8, "Finally, all of you, be like-minded, be sympathetic, love one another, be compassionate and humble."

My own Christian tradition, which is a member of the Council, begins with three simple rules, the first of which is to "do no harm." We believe this bill will do much harm to students who are growing in their understanding of who they are. We ask you to stop the harm. We believe the approach of our camps in several traditions that allow students to use different name/pronouns with no parent permission necessary and notification left up to the campers is one that our schools should also follow. This creates safe spaces for learning, exploration, and growth.

Transgender and nonbinary kids are some of the most vulnerable in our society and we, like Jesus, side with the vulnerable and seek to provide safety and care for them while affirming their identity as children of God. We ask you to do no harm and instead affirm the identity of all students and reject AB 103. Thank you.

RE: In opposition to WI AB103 - School board policies related to changing a pupil's legal name and pronouns

Dear Honorable Members of the Assembly Committee on Education,

I am writing to express my strong opposition to WI AB103, which seeks to impose statewide mandates on school districts regarding student name and pronoun usage policies. Wisconsin has a long-standing tradition of local control in education, recognizing that communities are best positioned to make decisions that serve their students' needs. This bill undermines that principle and threatens to erode the trust and autonomy of local school districts in addressing the well-being of all students, including LGBTQ+ youth.

As the Superintendent of the Shorewood School District, I see firsthand the critical role that trusted school personnel play in creating a supportive and inclusive environment for all students. Research, including studies co-authored by Dr. Mollie McQuillan of the University of Wisconsin-Madison, highlights the profound impact that affirming school policies and relationships with trusted educators have on the mental health and academic success of LGBTQ+ students. McQuillan's research demonstrates that when school staff provide support and validation, LGBTQ+ students report lower levels of anxiety and depression, higher engagement in school, and a greater sense of belonging. Restrictive policies that limit the ability of school staff to offer this support would directly contradict evidence-based best practices for student well-being.

The provisions in this bill requiring parental authorization for any name or pronoun changes in school settings create unnecessary barriers for students who may not have supportive home environments. For many LGBTQ+ youth, school is the only place where they feel safe and affirmed in their identity. Research has consistently shown that forcing students to use names and pronouns that do not align with their identity can contribute to negative mental health outcomes, including increased risk of depression and suicide. We see this in the statewide results of the Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS). Our LGBTQ+ youth face many risk factors, including discrimination, bullying, and lack of support. Bill AB 103 would exacerbate this harm.

Moreover, Wisconsin's commitment to local control means that school boards—elected by their communities—are best equipped to determine policies that serve their students. This bill represents an overreach that disregards this local decision-making process and imposes a one-size-fits-all mandate that may not reflect the needs and values of individual districts. It certainly does not represent our values in Shorewood.

I urge you to oppose this bill and instead support policies that affirm Wisconsin's commitment to local control and evidence-based approaches to student support. Protecting the ability of school personnel to build trusting relationships with students is not only beneficial—it is essential to ensuring that every child in Wisconsin has the opportunity to thrive.

Thank you for your leadership and commitment to serving every student in our state. I welcome the opportunity to discuss this matter further with you.

To the Assembly Committee on Education:

Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself. *Mark* **12:31**

My name is Tessa Price. I am a substitute teacher in Madison. With Assembly Bill 103, the state of Wisconsin seeks to restrict teachers' freedom to refer to students appropriately. It would also restrict students' liberty to use nicknames or go by a different name and pronouns if they ask for it.

Public schools of Wisconsin are already under-staffed. This bill would put additional onus on school staff to deal with even more paperwork that is unnecessary and cruelly targeting a tiny minority of students. AB103 would violate the Equal Educational Opportunities Act of 1974 by treating queer and trans students unfairly, and not giving them the same educational opportunities as other students.

Targeting nicknames that are opposite a student's "sex assigned at birth" is nonsensical. If a cisgender student were to go by Alex, they would likely be perfectly fine under this bill. A transgender student, on the other hand, who went by "Alex" might be targeted under this vague stipulation because of their identity.

School gives students a crucial space to explore and understand their own identity and self. By targeting queer and trans students you are not stopping them from being queer and trans. You are putting them in danger, excluding them from normal school activities, and illegally excluding and discriminating against them for their sex.

We have the choice, instead, to celebrate the diversity of Wisconsin students. You have the choice to advocate for civil rights instead of against them.

You cannot force teachers to hate their trans students. We are in the classroom because we care about all students and want to provide them an equal opportunity at education.

The State of Wisconsin should not meddle with teachers in classrooms on behalf of certain personal beliefs of prejudices. The Milwaukee Public School Board did not create a plan to desegregate their schools until 1979. Let's not repeat the atrocities of Wisconsin's history of discrimination in schools.

To the committee, please vote <u>AGAINST</u> AB103.

Hello Representatives,

My name is Tammy Fournier and not so long ago my family needed the protections outlined in AB103. In late 2020, my then 12-year-old daughter, Autumn, started to experience deep depression and anxiety and asked to speak to a counselor. Due to the increased need of youth mental health during COVID, services were impossible to find quickly. While we waited, she was largely isolated and spending too much time online watching content that introduced her to the idea that what could be causing all her discomfort was being born in the wrong body.

She shared her feelings with a friend at school and her friend informed a teacher's aid. The same day, before even informing me of the incident, the aid approached my daughter and informed her she could go to the office and fill out a form to change her name and gender at school. Only after my daughter shared that I would be upset if I wasn't involved in such a decision did the aid encourage my daughter to speak with me about her newly discovered feelings.

That evening Autumn shared her feelings with me and requested to go in inpatient care for help. I immediately reached out to local facilities and she was accepted within 24 hours. During the admittance process, I found out that staff would refer to my daughter using her preferred name and pronouns before even assessing if doing so was in her best interest. During the first meeting with Autumn's counselor, my husband and I were informed that if we did not follow Autumn's wishes with name and pronoun use and she committed suicide, we would be responsible. I asked if any of my daughters' other underlying issues were discussed and was informed that they hadn't come up. After I showed resistance to blindly following their suggestions, facility members started telling my daughter that I would be the largest obstacle in her life and her best chance of happiness was to convince me to allow her to start the path to transition.

Once out of the facility, Autumn emailed school staff directly and requested to return to school using her preferred names and pronouns. After much research and deliberation over what was best for Autumn, my husband and I decided we would not allow the use of preferred names and pronouns until Autumn received appropriate medical care. When we informed the school of our decision, they informed us that they were advocates of the child and not of the parent, and they would move forward, however, Autumn wished.

We removed her from the district, moved to a new area, and took legal action against the district for the blatant parental rights violation. Soon after the change of environment, Autumn realized that her confusion about her gender was related to her other underlying mental health issues. She is now happy and healthy, experiencing zero gender confusion, and speaks out against gender ideology. In October of 2023, the court ruled in our favor. AB103 would ensure no other Wisconsin families will have to experience the government overstep that we did. Thank you for your time.

Honorable Members of the Committee on Education,

My name is Christopher Forgie have been a resident of Brookfield for over a decade with my wife and two children. I am here today to strongly oppose Wisconsin Assembly Bill 103, which aims to undermine the rights and well-being of transgender and gender nonconforming students. This bill poses a severe threat to the support, safety, and freedom of expression for these students in our schools, who already face higher levels of discrimination and harassment.

Every school-aged child goes through a process of figuring out who they are and how they want to be seen by the world. For some this journey may not be welcomed by or approved by their parents - whether that be wearing certain clothes while at school, wearing makeup, talking a certain way, eating particular foods in the cafeteria or any other number of forms of expression. Schools do not police, prevent, or report on these activities nor should they when a student expresses a desire to be referred to by a name or pronoun which they prefer over what was assigned to them at birth.

Assembly Bill 103 requires schools to refuse to recognize how the student would like to be referred as until and unless a legal name change and written parental consent is achieved – either of which can be an onerous and potentially dangerous requirement. Neither of which is required for any other form of self-expression that students partake in every single day at every school in the state.

This bill imposes rigid and formal rules on the use of names and pronouns, which is impractical to implement and detrimental to the school environment. It puts an undue and needless burden on educators to monitor, verify and report instances of an alternate name being used whereas their time and effort could be better spent educating our children. This, coupled with the erosion of trust in school personnel from forcibly discarding students' identities, negatively impacts the overall school climate for all children by creating a divisive and hostile environment.

Students who do not feel safe and respected are less likely to engage in learning and are more likely to experience absenteeism and lower graduation rates. Disregarding a student's

Hello, my name is Scarlett Johnson, and I am here representing Moms for Liberty Wisconsin. I would like to express my support for AB 103 and share my deep concern and opposition to policies in Wisconsin schools that allow for a child's pronouns and names to be changed without parental consent or notification. Over the years, these unpopular and unethical practices that undermine parental rights, disregard child welfare, and prioritize gender ideology over education have gained support from organizations like GSAFE, GLSEN, and initiatives such as The Human Rights Campaign's "Welcoming Schools" program. Additionally, top-down DEI policies enforced by the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction under State Superintendent Jill Underly have encouraged a trend against parental involvement, driven by a fringe group of activist educators.

It is alarming that GSAFE has worked closely with the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction to promote Gender and Sexuality Alliance (GSA) clubs, even in elementary schools. These clubs, often framed as safe spaces, introduce complex gender identity concepts to young children who lack the developmental maturity to fully process them. GSAFE's mission may be presented as one of inclusion, but its push to affirm pronoun and name changes to third grade children over recess without parental knowledge or consent— bypasses the fundamental role of parents as the primary decision-makers in their children's lives. There is nothing SAFE about advancing an agenda that overrides family values and parental authority.

Similarly, the Welcoming Schools program, affiliated with the Human Rights Campaign, encourages schools to adopt policies that affirm a child's CHOSEN name and pronouns, often in secret from parents. This initiative, while marketed as compassionate, fails to consider the long-term consequences for children who may be experiencing temporary distress or more seriously a mental health crisis. Studies show that many children who question their gender identity during youth resolve these feelings by adolescence, often aligning with their biological sex. Affirming a child's pronoun or name change without parental input risks locking them into a path they may later regret, especially if so-called "gender affirming" medical interventions follow.

GLSEN (Gay, Lesbian, and Straight Education Network) further exacerbates this issue by providing resources and advocating for policies that instruct educators to use a child's preferred pronouns and names without question. Their influence in Wisconsin schools, often through training and toolkits, pressures teachers to comply with a "woke" ideology that dismisses biological reality and parental oversight. This is not education—it's indoctrination, and it comes at the expense of our children's well-being and the trust between schools and families. The Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction, under Jill Underly's leadership, has embraced this ideology with statements like "pronouns change lives." While Underly claims this reflects a commitment to supporting students, it ignores the potential harm of encouraging children to adopt identities without parental guidance or professional evaluation. Parents, not school officials, are best equipped to navigate these sensitive matters with their children, often in consultation with mental health experts. By sidelining parents, the Department of Public Instruction is not empowering students—it is disempowering families and exposing children to decisions they may not be ready to make.

This "woke" approach prioritizes ideology over academics at a time when Wisconsin students are struggling with basic literacy and math skills. Instead of focusing on reading, writing, and critical thinking, the Department of Public Instruction and its allies are diverting resources to social engineering experiments. Parents have a constitutional right, upheld by both the U.S. and Wisconsin Constitutions, to direct the upbringing and education of their children. Policies that allow schools to change a child's name or pronouns without parental consent violate this right, as affirmed by a 2023 ruling from Waukesha County Circuit Court, which struck down a similar policy in the Kettle Moraine School District.

Moreover, these policies can harm children psychologically. Affirming a child's gender identity in school while they live a different reality at home creates confusion and conflict. Medical professionals have warned that such inconsistencies can exacerbate mental health issues, not alleviate them. Yet, GSAFE, GLSEN, and the Department of Public Instruction dismiss these concerns, clinging to the unproven assertion that pronoun changes are inherently life-saving. Where is the evidence? Where is the consideration for the child's long-term stability?

I urge Wisconsin lawmakers and school officials to reject these policies and reaffirm the primacy of parental rights. Schools should not be in the business of secretly reshaping a child's identity. Organizations like GSAFE and GLSEN, and initiatives like Welcoming Schools, may think they have good intentions, but their methods erode trust and family unity. Jill Underly's claim that "pronouns change lives" should not dictate policy—it should spark a deeper conversation about who gets to decide what's best for our children. That decision belongs to parents, not bureaucrats or activists.

Thank you for considering this testimony. Our children deserve better than to be pawns in an ideological experiment.



Welcoming Schools

AFFIRMING GENDER IN ELEMENTARY SCHOOL: SOCIAL TRANSITIONING

One of the first steps that all people—adults or children—take, if they feel their internal sense of gender and their sex assigned at birth do not match, is to socially transition. This means adults and children live their lives in a way that expresses their internal sense of who they are—their gender identity. A person may use a new name and/or different pronouns than before. Some might change their gender expression—wear different clothes or have a new hairstyle. Students usually want to—and have the right to—use facilities or join school activities that align with their gender identity.

PLANNING AND COMMUNICATIONS

- Social transitioning goes more smoothly for a student when school personnel and parents/ guardians (when affirming) work together and maintain regular communication and check-ins.
- Assess steps needed for your particular school and district to become more gender affirming.
 - What will help transgender and non-binary students—and all students—to feel safe at school?
 - o Do you need professional development or advice to understand gender transitions
 - and develop specific steps that your school could take?
 - Who do you need to communicate with in your school or district?
 - What policies or forms need to be reviewed, such as dress codes, bullying and harassment policies and student information systems?
- Develop common language on gender and social transitions that educators can use when talking with parents, families and colleagues while maintaining confidentiality for students. Help people understand the <u>meaning of words</u> related to gender and transitioning.
- Have <u>resources</u> available for adults to help them understand transgender and non-binary children.
- Each student and each family have different concerns about privacy and confidentiality around social transition. Ensure privacy and share information with school staff only on a need-toknow basis. Legally, it should be handled the same as a medical issue under FERPA and a student's right to privacy.
- Educators should support students on their gender journey even if they do not have affirming family. School can be a supportive, affirming space for children to be themselves.
- Children are more resilient and able to cope when they feel affirmed and supported. Often, students who are transgender or non-binary have endured teasing and may not have felt safe to report it. Identify a safe person or people on staff for a student to talk to who will check in with them weekly while at school.
- Students have the right to talk about their transition with other students, but adults must carefully guard confidentiality. It is possible to have gender affirming schools without compromising the privacy of individual students.
- In school, it is the adults' responsibility to help other students understand transitioning and gender, not the student's.
- Identify key personnel responsible for answering more difficult <u>questions or concerns</u> parents and families may have and who can serve as a resource to others.
- If the media contacts your school or district, make sure that someone is prepared to respond and protect student privacy.

RESPECTING A STUDENT'S AFFIRMED GENDER

- Honor a student's pronoun and name. Discuss with the student and their affirming parents/caregivers what name to use on forms and which gender marker to check. (Note:
- ensure your forms allow students' gender identity to be written in rather than including only M or F as options.) Allow students and families to have the name that a student uses on lists that could be seen by other students or families, such as class lists, grade postings or seating charts.
- Ensure that students are welcome and safe to wear the clothes, hairstyle and accessories that reflect their affirmed gender.
- Be thoughtful about class placement for transgender or non-binary students. Take into consideration the classroom teacher's experience and training—in particular, their skills at developing a gender inclusive, welcoming classroom. Think about peer connections for the student.
- Be clear about restroom accessibility. Allow students to use the facilities that correspond with their gender identity. Have gender neutral restrooms available for all students who desire privacy for any reason.
- Avoid situations that force children to make gendered choices, such as lining up by boys and girls. Instead, divide students by last names, colors they're wearing or common interests.

STRATEGIES FOR DEVELOPING A GENDER AFFIRMING SCHOOL

- Building a strong sense of community and a climate of acceptance in the classroom and school is a critical proactive strategy for creating a safe environment for all students, including those who identify as transgender and non-binary.
- Provide <u>professional development</u> for all school personnel—teachers, aides, counselors, administrative staff, bus drivers and cafeteria workers—on strategies to prevent and stop LGBTQ and gender based bullying.
- Educate adults in the school about the complexity of gender and the importance of gender inclusive classrooms for all students. Consider Welcoming Schools <u>training</u> on "Gender Inclusive Schools" and "Supporting Transgender and Non-Binary Students."
- Adults in the school need time to practice and <u>be prepared for questions and put-downs on</u> <u>gender</u> with simple phrases to stop gendered teasing and bullying. Staff need practice intervening when students are limiting each other based on gender stereotypes, and they need to be ready to educate students on why it is wrong or hurtful.
- Listen for name-calling and <u>builying based</u> on gender stereotypes, gender identity or gender expression, so that you can interrupt it and be clear that all students are welcome and respected in your school. Develop plans to have extra coverage in hallways, the playground and the lunchroom to monitor and stop hurtful teasing and bullying behavior.
- Work with the students in your school to help them think of ways to be allies when someone is teased or bullied for any reason. (See the Welcoming Schools lesson: <u>Making Decisions: Ally</u> <u>or Bystander</u>.)
- <u>Talk with students</u> about the harmful effects of stereotyping and prejudice. Help your students see their potential to be all of who they are.
- Share with students <u>diverse books</u> with many gender identities and expressions. Use lesson plans to help students understand and discuss gender.



Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction's Website Features Activist Group GLSEN's Model Policy for Transgender Students and GSA Network's Student Activism Toolkit

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SEX AND GENDER

The Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction dedicates a section of its website to <u>"Safe Schools for</u> Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender Students."

This portion of the website recommends the GSA Network's <u>Beyond the Binary: A Tool Kit for Gender</u> <u>Identity Activism in Schools</u> and Gay, Lesbian & Straight Education Network (GLSEN)'s <u>Model Policy on</u> <u>Transgender and Gender Non-Conforming Students</u>.

The GLSEN's model policy states that if a <u>student has not disclosed his or her gender identity to their</u> parent or guardian, then the student's name should be listed as "preferred name".

Educators, staff, and peers are expected to respect a student's name and pronouns, once they have been made aware of said student's correct information.

Medical information, recognition, or documentation are not required to change a student's gender marker or name in the student database/information system.

When requested by the student and their parent/guardian, a transgender or nonbinary student's name should be changed in the Student Database/Information System to reflect their affirmed gender.

If a student has not disclosed their gender identity to a parent/guardian, and as a result the database/information system information cannot be changed, their affirmed name shall be noted as a "preferred name" in the system. This affirmed name should be used by staff and peers, according to the transgender or nonbinary student's wishes. Attendance rosters and ID cards should reflect the student's wishes with regards to name and/or gender marker/pronouns, regardless of the database/information system. The legal name should be used only where specifically required. Districts and schools should determine which uses require the legal name, including whether it is required for specific testing or reporting purposes.

Students may, upon request, have a diploma and course records reissued with a name change after graduat

<u>Gay, Lesbian & Straight Education Network (GLSEN</u>) is a national activist group focused on, according to the organization's website, "championing LGBTQ issues in K-12 education." GLSEN (pronounced "glisten") stands for the "Gay, Lesbian, and Straight Educator Network." It is the primary touchpoint between the LGBTQ activist agenda and K-12 schools.

The recommended GSA Network's <u>Beyond the Binary: A Tool Kit for Gender identity Activismum Schools</u>, encourages students to become activists in their schools and states, "If you want to use a restroom that matches your gender identity...you should be allowed to do so."

- Names/Pronouns: If you change your name to one that better matches your gender identity, a school needs to use that name to refer to you. The same is true when a different pronoun needs to be used. It can sometimes take time for teachers, staff or other students to get used to using your new name and pronoun. But it is not acceptable or legal for teachers, staff, or students to use your old name or pronoun as a way to harass you.
- Restroom Use: If you want to use a restroom that matches your gender identity (for example, if you have transitioned from female to male, you may

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want to use the boys restroom), you should be allowed to do so. And everyone should be able to use the restroom safely. Restrooms are often places where gender non-conforming students are harassed by other students. If this happens, you should report it and school staff should do something to protect you or other students.

 Sex Segregation: Restrooms may be the most common place where students are divided up based on gender, but they are not the only place. Whenever students are divided up into boys and girls, you should be allowed to join the group or participate in the program that matches your gender identity as much as possible.

 Dress Codes: Some schools have specific dress codes for boys and specific dress codes for girls. If your school does, it is important that you be allowed to wear clothes that match your gender identity. It is also important that school staff does not enforce a school's dress code more strictly against transgender and gender non-conforming students than other students. For example, if your school has a policy about skirt lengths, transgender girls can't be held to stricter rules than other girls.

GSA Network describes itself as, "a next-generation LGBTQ racial and gender justice organization that empowers and trains queer, trans and allied youth leaders to advocate, organize, and mobilize an intersectional movement for safer schools and healthier communities."

The <u>Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction</u> is, "the state agency that advances public education and libraries in Wisconsin. Our mission is to ensure that every child, regardless of zip code, has access to quality public education programs, enrichment opportunities, and special education supports, so that all of our kids can be successful."

It is located in Madison, Wisconsin and led by Dr. Underly, State Superintendent of Public Instruction who was elected in 2021.

Written Testimony: AB103 (School district policy provisions regarding student legal names and pronouns)

Members of the Education Committee: Thank you for accepting my written testimony in lieu of personal attendance. I am writing in favor of the advancement of AB103 through committee.

In a civil society, one assumes that the parent or legal guardian of a minor child holds the primary responsibility for their child's upbringing and welfare. Even more basic than that, however, is the constitutional right of the parent or guardian to name their child. Frankly, the fact that this creates any contention at all is simultaneously laughable and tragic, so I commend Representative Dittrich, Senator Jacque, and all of this bill's co-sponsors for taking steps to secure our most basic constitutional rights.

Parents and guardians should not be faced with the battles that have plagued Eau Claire, Madison, and other Wisconsin school districts who have placed student privacy above parental rights. Parents and guardians have the right to direct the education of their children, and that includes the environment and identity of their children. The 2023 KMSD decision made great strides in clarifying this order of primacy, but we still lack statute. Unfortunately, this leaves our state vulnerable to bad actors who unduly place themselves into a position superior to a parent or guardian in a child's life. Schools are subject to parents in the natural and constitutional order, and it's time to enshrine this order statutorily.

Speaking colloquially: It's silly that we're even at this point, but here we are. I appreciate that the "adults in the room" are accepting the responsibility to advance this legislation that, hopefully with many other bills, will restore common sense and order in our great state. Thank you for advancing this bill; in doing so, you are protecting our children and our parental rights.

Please pass AB103 through committee as soon as possible. Thank you!

Response to LRB 1245 Pronouns and Legal Names Bill

Dear Legislators: I am unable to attend the hearing on LRB 1245 Pronouns in person therefore, I am submitting my written testimony.

Over the last 2 years I have attended many school board meetings and parent group meetings where the subject of the use of preferred names are being used with students without the knowledge of the parents. Each district handles these situations slightly differently, but the common thread seems to be that it starts without any involvement from the parent. In most cases I have been aware of, the parent finds out because the school at some point accidentally notifies the parent using a different name for their child. This usually happens when they send information home, and the school forgets to change their preferred name back to their legal name. Imagine the shock that parents feel when they see a different name for their child. In one case, the school published the child's name in the year-book without parent authorization.

How would you like to be that parent? Once parents are finally aware of what is going on in the school, it is a huge battle for parents to get the school to listen and to follow the parents wishes. In many cases this fraud has been going on for many months, during which time the school has been working behind the parents back and telling the child their parents will not support them.

Some Wisconsin public schools, like those in districts such as Eau Claire or Madison, have faced scrutiny for policies encouraging staff to withhold such information from parents, often citing privacy. But minors aren't adults privacy doesn't trump parental responsibility. This legislation ensures schools remain partners, not gatekeepers, in a child's life. It also protects educators from legal gray areas, clarifying their role and reducing liability.

In summary, while some Wisconsin schools once allowed pronoun changes without parental consent, recent court rulings—especially the 2023 Kettle Moraine decisionhave largely halted such practices in affected districts, mandating parental involvement. No statewide law explicitly permits or prohibits this today, but the legal landscape increasingly favors parental rights, making it unlikely that many districts still openly maintain such policies without consent in 2025.

It is wrong on so many levels for a school to take on the role of the parent. Our constitution is very clear that a parent has the authority over their child. Our constitution does not state that a school or any other individual has the right over someone else's child. I support LRB 1245 which protects our children and parental rights. Regards,

This was huge in making our daughter feel safe and comfortable and a valued member of the school community. My name is **Dawn Berney**, and I live in **Madison**, **WI 53711**. I have been a proud resident of Wisconsin for several decades, am the retired Executive Director of Jewish Social Services of Madison, and I am writing to **strongly oppose Assembly Bill 103**.

My 20 year old son attended public school from kindergarten through 12th grade. When he transitioned in 7th grade, his school supported him fully with his name and gender changes—and as a result, his mental health improved significantly. By the time he graduated from high school, he was a percussionist at the highest level for the Wisconsin Youth Symphony Orchestra, volunteered regularly with older adults in the community, maintained nearly a 4.0 grade point average and scored in the 99th percentile on his ACTs. He would have been a great asset to the UW-Madison. However, despite growing up here, he chose to attend the University of Chicago in Illinois, in part because of worries about legislation like this. Wisconsin's population is expected to decline over the next 25 years. When my son graduates college, he'll be an incredible asset wherever he goes, but if Wisconsin does not protect children like the one he was, he will likely never return.

This story illustrates just how important it is for schools to be safe and welcoming places for all students, including those who are transgender. AB 103 imposes barriers that would make it harder for kids like my son to receive the support they need. Instead of letting them focus on thriving academically and socially, this bill introduces fear, uncertainty, and the risk of being outed to unsupportive parents—putting vulnerable students at risk.

I believe in a Wisconsin where every child can succeed and feel respected. AB 103 does the opposite: it creates a school environment that fosters mistrust and makes it harder for young people to safely and openly be who they are. Having watched my child, I know that he always knew who he was much better than his school or I did. I respectfully urge you to **oppose Assembly Bill 103** and protect the well-being of all our students.

Good Morning. I'm Rev. Jennifer Nordstrom, the Senior Minister of the First Unitarian Society of Milwaukee, and I'm here in opposition to AB103.

As a Unitarian Universalist minister, it has been my honor to minister to families with transgender and non-binary children, and to serve a faith that celebrates all our people in all their identities, including their gender expression. I serve a God who created infinite beauty in humanity, who created us in infinite variety, and who celebrates with us as we live into our divine truths. God is infinite, and we reflect God's image in our infinite variety.

Some of our trans and non-binary youth have know who they are from when they are young. They have led us to better understanding of the complexity and diversity of human biology and gender. In our congregations, we celebrate that diversity, and the beautiful and diverse expression of it among our people.

Studies have shown that LGBTQ youth who have just one place that honors their gender or sexuality are at lower risk of suicide. LGBTQ youth are at higher risk of suicide than their straight and cis peers because of rejection from parents and peers. According to the Trevor Project's 2021 National Survey on LGBTQ Youth Mental Health, 42% of LGBTQ+ youth seriously considered attempting suicide in the past year, including more than half of transgender and nonbinary youth, and the rates are higher for BIPOC youth. Transgender and nonbinary youth who reported having pronouns respected by all the people they lived with attempted suicide at half the rate of those who did not have their pronouns respected by anyone with whom they lived. LGBTQ+ youth who had access to spaces that affirmed their sexual orientation and gender identity reported lower rates of attempting suicide.

Just over 1 in 3 transgender and nonbinary youth found their home to be gender-affirming, and 52% found their school to be affirming. The Trevor Project's research consistently finds that LGBTQ+ young people report lower rates of attempting suicide when they have access to LGBTQ+-affirming spaces.

This bill, AB103 will take away one of those spaces, often the only space where LGBTQ+ youth find affirmation of their identity. This will increase suicide attempts among these beautiful, sacred, precious young people. Their lives are sacred. They deserve to have just one place that affirms them. They deserve to be celebrated! They deserve a chance to make it to adulthood.

Please, vote no on AB103.

Chairman Kitchens, esteemed committee members, I'm the Reverend Hannah Roberts Villnave, and I serve as one of the ministers at the Fox Valley Unitarian Universalist Fellowship up in Appleton, WI. I'm here today to voice my firm opposition to Assembly Bill 103.

Wisconsin values are at the core of who I am – I was born and raised in Racine, graduated from 13 years of excellent public education there, and now I'm so glad to be raising my own kids in beautiful Northeast Wisconsin along the Fox River. Growing up here taught me that being a Wisconsinite means working hard, investing in my local community, and looking out for my neighbors. I took those early lessons to heart and so it saddens me to see legislation that is so profoundly harmful to people in my community sponsored by my representative (Tusler) and senator (Jacque).

I'm a Unitarian Universalist minister, which means, among other things, that I minister to a congregation with several trans, nonbinary and gender diverse kids, youth, and adults. It's a blessing and a privilege to be in community with these folks, but it also gives me a window into the struggles they face to live authentically. I've pastored them through serious mental health crises – frequiently ignited by the indignity of needless regulation and restrictions that make it difficult for them to be called by their correct names and pronouns. From an NIH study: "For transgender youth who choose a name different than the one given at birth, use of their chosen name in multiple contexts affirms their gender identity and reduces mental health risks known to be high in this group."

So it's as simple as that. Using a trans student's name and pronouns reduces their risk of suicide.

Assembly Bill 103 interferes at a granular level with how schools support trans, nonbinary, and gender diverse students. It dictates the conditions under which teachers and principals can provide the life-saving intervention of using a trans student's correct name and pronouns.

I don't know about you, but knowingly increasing the suicide risk for children seems pretty clearly opposed to our values as Wisconsinites. And truly, I know deep in my bones that if you vote for this bill, you will have blood on your hands.

To the Wisconsin Assembly Committee on Education:

My name is Robyn Schultz. I live in the City of Milwaukee, where an important aspect of my life involves serving as President of the Southeast Wisconsin chapter of Pride at Work, the AFL-CIO's LGBTQ+ constituent group. It is partly in that capacity that I would like to submit testimony on the matter of Assembly Bill 103, a bill that I strongly oppose.

I have been living a transgender experience for my entire life. It was only much later in life that I was able to come to terms with this and come out as the person I am. Looking back, there were so many indications that I was not actually the boy I was identified and raised as. Looking back, I can hardly believe that I survived to talk about this today, or that I have to deliver this testimony in an effort to try and stop life saving care from becoming any more difficult to obtain for the people that will be impacted by AB 103.

Like AB 100, this bill stands to take away important mechanisms for navigating life from a group of young people that are more isolated than average. It needlessly complicates the lives of people that face challenges that few have to experience, challenges that are hard to imagine or explain.

The requirements spelled out in this bill are a little difficult for me to process, but it clearly stands to impose some pretty significant burdens on families, as well as onto state administrators, local school boards, principals and teachers already trying to do too much with too little. Perhaps there are some efficiencies in this that are not apparent to me.

One of the requirements of this bill is puzzling to me. The condition in Section 1(3)2a that requires series of requirements including '(T)he pupil has changed the pupil's legal name', describes something that does not seem possible, and is certainly unlikely to happen without significant support from a parent or guardian. Having gone through that process as an adult, I assure you it's a hassle,

Testimony of Dan York and Margaret Bowman regarding AB 100 and 103

To the members of the Assembly Committee on Education

We are writing to express our strong opposition to these proposed bills. Our opposition to AB 103 is very personal. Our young adult daughter is transgender. Using the name she chose for herself along with the corresponding pronouns was extremely important to her after she transitioned in middle school. Using incorrect pronouns was insulting and offensive to her. Imagine what it would feel like if someone would use an incorrect name or pronoun for you during a conversation.

It takes great courage for transgender youth and adults to transition to the gender that properly aligns with their identity. Hearing someone use an incorrect name or pronoun – those that do not align with their identity - is disturbing. It can readily lead to anxiety and depression as well as teasing and bullying.

Our daughter simply wanted to be recognized as a girl and to fit in with her peers. Failure to adjust to and use chosen names and pronouns makes this more difficult. The choices of names and pronouns is a matter for families working with their educators to address, not the state legislature.

While my daughter did not participate in school athletics, we also strongly oppose AB 100 for related reasons. Denying opportunities for our transgender youth to participate in school sports prevents them from gaining the many benefits that such participation yields. The reasons most cited for banning transgender youth from school sports are based on misunderstandings and mischaracterizations about what it means to be transgender. There are practical, workable solutions to address such concerns as locker rooms and physical differences in body types.

Our transgender youth need strong support from their families, friends, educators, coaches, and society. Our daughter and the wider transgender community face an increasingly intolerant and hateful environment. The progress with acceptance and support for our transgender daughters and sons that we had witnessed a decade ago has been quickly reversing course. The unacceptance, hostility, and even violence towards transgender people have grown over the past several years. This environment and all the anti-trans laws that are being proposed and enacted deeply affect our daughter and all her transgender brothers and sisters. She has a high degree of social anxiety and lives a very sheltered life with us just for trying to be who she truly is.

AB 100 and AB 103 would be yet two more policies that would further marginalize a very small, but very real segment of our population. Please do not enact these bills.





TRANS STUDENT WELLBEING IN WISCONSIN SCHOOLS

The number of students identifying as lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, and other gender-expansive (LGBTQ+) students has expanded, and these youth need greater access to school-based support. The number of students who identify as transgender, LGBT, or questioning more than doubled in the two years since 2019 (Centers for Disease Control, 2023; McCoy, 2020). Among over 100,000 students in grades 9-12 who participated in Wisconsin's 2021 Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS), 20% of students identified as LGBTQ+ and 4% (n=4,739) indicated they were transgender (trans) or questioning their gender identity.


KEY TERMS





School-based supports are critical to trans and LGBTQ+ student wellbeing.

Trans and LGBTQ+ youth are more likely to report unsafe school climates and mental health concerns compared to their cisgender, heterosexual peers, especially in when students also report discriminatory school policies, curricula, and practices (Kosciw et al., 2022; Johns et al, 2020). Several protective school factors can improve trans and other LGBTQ+ students' well-being. These supports include the presence of student groups like gender and sexuality alliances (GSAs), inclusive curricula and policies, and the support of adults in schools (NASEM, 2020; Russell et al., 2021). Results from the 2021 Wisconsin and national YRBS survey indicate a critical need for continued youth access to supportive school-based resources to offset the mental health risks faced by LGBTQ+ students (CDC, 2023; McQuillan, 2021).




SCHOOL CLIMATE AND MENTAL HEALTH

Trans and LGBTQ+ youth report unsafe schools at higher rates than their cisgender, heterosexual peers.

Only 66% of WI trans youth report feeling safe at school, compared to 75% of LGBTQ+ youth, and 83% of cisgender, heterosexual youth. Similarly, trans students are more than three times as likely than their cisgender, heterosexual peers to have been bullied at school (37% of trans youth report being bullied within the past 12 months vs. 28% of LGBTQ+ youth and 15% of cisgender, heterosexual students). These school safety issues contribute to differences in belonging and skipping school. Relative to cisgender, straight students (83%), only 66% of trans and 75% of LGBTQ+ reported they believed they belonged in their school. Among trans youth, 8% of students indicated they skipped school because they feel unsafe compared to 12% of LGBTQ+ youth and 5% of cisgender, heterosexual students.

Trans and LGBTQ+ youth face mental health risks.


Trans and LGBTQ+ youth report experiencing depression, anxiety, selfharm, and suicidality more than their cisgender, heterosexual peers. In addition to reporting unsafe schools, trans and LGBTQ+ youth mental health risks indicate a need for greater protective factors in schools.



THE ROLE OF SUPPORTIVE ADULTS AS A PROTECTIVE FACTOR

Trans and LGBTQ+ youth discuss depression with adults in schools more than cisgender, straight youth.

Trans and LGBTQ+ youth are more likely to discuss feelings of depression and anxiety with adults who are not their parents or guardians, including teachers and school staff, when compared to cisgender, straight youth. They are also less likely to discuss mental health concerns with parents or guardians when compared to straight, cisgender students. Our research supports claims that school-based protective factors, especially trusted adults in schools, can provide critical support for trans and LGBTQ+ students experiencing mental health issues.

In Christian scripture, in the Gospel of John, Jesus says that he cares deeply for humanity and our wellbeing, just as a good shepherd cares for each and every sheep in their flock. He says that he came to earth in order that we might have life, and have it to the full.

It is my own desire that all people might have fullness of life that brings me to oppose Assembly Bill 103. This bill is a transparent attempt to ostracize transgender children, using social pressure to keep them closeted.

The consensus of medical and mental health professionals is clear that transgender people of all ages exist, and that they do not stop being transgender just because they are in a hostile environment. It is also abundantly clear that trans youth in hostile environments suffer devastating impacts to their mental health. A 2024 study found that youth under 18 whose states passed at least one anti-trans law, like the bill we're discussing today, were between 7 and 72% more likely to attempt suicide than trans youth in other states.¹

But we don't need statistics to know that this bill would negatively affect trans youth. It's common sense.

I have worked with many middle and high school youth, including trans youth, in my years as a pastor. If you can think back to being twelve years old, or fifteen years old, you'll remember that being understood and accepted by one's peers often feels like the most important thing in the world.

Under this bill, a trans teenager whose parents did not support their identity would be forced to sit in a classroom day after day, being called by a name and pronouns at odds with who they are. The gender dysphoria this teen could face from this experience would be devastating.

That's cruel.

Under this bill, a trans child who was fully affirmed and supported by their parents but had not undergone a legal name change would be at risk of being outed as trans to their classmates when their name in a roll call didn't match the name they used.

That's cruel.

I'll close with a message to those proponents of this bill, and those of you here today, who share my Christian faith. I remind you, as my siblings in Christ, that it is our responsibility to love what Christ loves. Christ loves life, and wants fullness of life for all people, including transgender people. Christ calls us to love our neighbors, including transgender people.

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This bill would hurt children. It restricts life, and it is not love.

Testimony in Opposition to AB 103

My name is Sarah Luetzow. I live in Stoughton and I'm a mental health therapist who specializes in trauma and working with the LGBTQ community.

I'm deeply concerned that these proposed bills harm children rather than protect them. Every child deserves to know love - to feel valued, worthy, and celebrated for being exactly who they are. They should be able to be called by their names, and pronouns, without any unnecessary barriers.

I'm concerned that a bill like this implicitly tells trans and non-binary youth that there is something wrong with them, that they do not belong, that their rights don't matter. And what do messages like that do to someone's sense of self worth? Or to their mental health?

I wonder, can you think of a time in your own life when you have felt like you didn't belong, or your rights or dignity didn't matter? Do you remember what that felt like?

As a mental health professional, I'm very concerned about trans youth being at increased risk for suicide, and research shows that even just proposing bills like the ones we are discussing has a negative impact on the mental health of LGBTQ youth. I was heartened to hear Representative Dittrich say she cares very much about mental health of our youth, and heard the emotion in your voice when you said that. I hope you will withdraw this legislation based on listening to the all of the concerns and evidence expressed here today about negative mental health impacts of this bill.

I also want to respond to this bill being a parents' rights bill. I'm concerned about how emphasizing parents rights and assuming parents' goodness and on the other side seeing educators as suspect and bad secret keepers reinforces black and white thinking, and my concern is that the needs and dignity of our trans and nonbinary youth get lost in the process of creating this oppositional narrative where educators are the enemy. Emphasizing parents rights above all else reinforces the cultures of isolation and secrecy within family systems and perpetuation of cycles of trauma.

Again, I'm concerned that these bills hurt children, and trans youth in particular. I'm also concerned that this legislation harms you, Representative Dittrich and other legislators who would choose to support it - because you are caught in a dream of forgetting that trans and non-binary youth are not separate from you. Doing something that harms anyone hurts you, too. You have already done harm by proposing this legislation, but you have an opportunity here to prevent further harm by not continuing to support it, and could still work to repair the harm and express care for our trans and non-binary youth and rejoin beloved community. It's not too late. You're invited. We are all invited. The stakes are high here - we are in times where we get to decide if we listen to the deepest whispers of our hearts that yearn for freedom, and justice, and collective care - or if we get pulled into hatred, and division, and stories that are not true. Please, do not pass this legislation. Do not let it get out of committee. Thank you for your time.

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Amy Scott Testimony Re: LRB 1245 Pronouns Bill Contraction of the second state of the

My name is Amy Scott and I am the proud mother of three children attending school here in Wisconsin. As a strong supporter of parental rights, I am in full support of this bill which would prohibit schools from changing pronouns or names of students without the knowledge and parental consent of the parents.

Children under the age of 18 cannot get a tattoo, drink a beer, receive medicine at school, or even sign legal documents without parental consent. If a child under 18 isn't legally allowed to drop out of school without parental consent, how is it that a school is allowed to create a whole new identity for that same child without their parents' consent? Doesn't the seriousness and severity of both situations require the involvement of a parent in the same way?

Except in rare cases of true child abuse, parents are the best advocates for their children and have their children's best interests at heart. And for those rare cases of abuse, Wisconsin law already has robust policies, via social services and courts, to resolve those issues and help children in need. Bypassing parents entirely skips the legal process and assumes guilt without evidence. Also, parents may be aware of a mental health concern or another issue going on with the student or family that the school and teachers could not possibly know.

These efforts at "transitioning" children without parental knowledge can cause permanent harm in response to what is just a temporary, normal phase of growing up. What if a girl is just a tomboy as many are? What if a boy just likes playing with dolls or watching the movie Frozen? That doesn't mean that he is actually a she or a they.

Allowing teachers and school administrators to make decisions for children regarding the pronouns and gender identity of kids is putting those people in the position of psychiatrist or psychologist without proper training or education in the pathology of mental health disease. Encouraging pronoun and name changes without a true underlying medical need can cause permanent mental, emotional, and ultimately physical challenges. There is true danger in leaving those decisions in the hands of people not qualified to understand the risks involved.

Teachers and school staff encouraging children to take on new identities without parental involvement also erodes trust that parents have in schools and education in general. There is a major trend towards homeschooling that is due in no small part to the fear that school staff are working behind parents' backs to encourage these transitions. If parents are to continue to have faith in the school system, there needs to be respect for the place that parents should and do have in their children's lives. Nobody should have a say in what happens to children besides their parents or legal guardian.

Our state's laws already recognize the fundamental rights of parents. Take Troxel v. Granville (2000) for example, which affirms parents' authority and right to make decisions about their children's care and identity.

Also, Wisconsin Judge Michael Maxwell ruled in the B.F. v. Kettle Morraine School District 2023 case ruled that allowing school staff to use names or pronouns inconsistent with a student's biological sex without parental consent violated parents' constitutional rights under the Wisconsin Constitution.

It is the duty of teachers and school staff to provide a quality education to the students of our state. The courts have ruled that changing a child's identity, name, or pronouns is a medical

issue. Therefore, parents are the only ones that should have the right to consent to make those changes for their children's well being,

President Trump noted in his address to Joint Session of Congress that all children are born perfect in the image of God. I believe that to be absolutely true and that untrained members of school staff have no business encouraging children to believe otherwise.

Passing this legislation protects children's mental health, respects parental rights, and helps build up trust in our schools. Decisions about a minor's identity and ultimately their health need to stay where they belong....with the parents.

Dear Members of the Assembly Committee on Education,

My name is James Foster. I have lived here in the Madison area for most of my life, and I am the father of a six-year-old enrolled in Madison public schools. I am testifying today on how the passage of AB100 and AB103 would do real harm to my child.

About a year ago, my kid told me that they don't feel like either a boy or a girl. That they feel like a "They." They have been absolutely consistent on this point.

Now, I need you to understand who my kid is. They are kind. They love art and soccer and Yahtzee. They find the kid in class who is lonely, and try to make friends. They aren't a threat to anyone. Nobody needs to be protected from them.

My kid is brave, way braver than I was at six. They are happy to correct adults, to explain who they are when they get misgendered. My kid honestly doesn't understand why the world sees them as a girl. And luckily, so far, nobody has bullied them about who they are.

I'm sure you will hear a lot of testimony today about the literal effects of AB100 and AB103. I want to talk about the message that their passage would send.

AB100 tells my kid that who they feel they are is invalid. That they need to be either a boy or a girl. That the world is divided into two immutable groups, and they belong to neither, that they belong nowhere.

AB103 tells my kid that someone else - their school, their government, their parents - gets to tell them who they can be. I don't know if any of you have kids, but that really doesn't work. It doesn't change them. All it does is make them ashamed of who they are.

Together, these bills tell the world that my child is something to fear, to ostracise, or to ignore. They invite shame, they encourage bullying. They are cruel bills.

I firmly believe that anyone who enters public service does so to make the world a better place, by their understanding. The power and responsibility invested in you, as public servants, is awesome. Please don't use that power to hurt my child. They need your protection, not your cruelty. Please vote against the passage of these bills.

Thank you for your time. I hope you will consider my testimony in the spirit of compassion.

Chair Kitchens and Members of the Assembly Committee on Education, thank you for your attention today.

I am here to express my strong opposition to Assembly Bills 100 and 103, and I appreciate the chance to discuss these significant issues. As a National Board-Certified Teacher and a Ph.D. student at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, where I focus on the role of adults in supporting trans youth in education, I bring both my professional experience and academic focus to this discussion.

While I assume no direct ill will, I specifically raise that this piece of legislation, even as a proposal that stands little chance of becoming law in the current legislative cycle, victimizes an especially vulnerable group of youth in our community, causing indirect harm (Nath et al., 2024). Trans students who are accepted by *at least* one adult report lower odds of attempted suicide in the last year (Price & Green, 2023). This legislation removes a foundational mechanism of support offered to these students: calling them by their name. My colleagues and I find that compared to their cisgender peers, when feeling depressed, anxious, or suicidal, trans youth are more likely to seek support from *adults* in schools than their *parents* (McQuillan et al., 2024). We published this peer-reviewed, open-access work in the Pediatric Journal of the American Medical Association late last year using data that reflects a representative sample of over 100,000 high school students from our state and are happy to share it today.

Second, I want to address the exclusionary athletic bill associated with AB100. My research, drawing on responses from over 300,000 Wisconsin high school students through Wisconsin's Youth Risk Behavior Survey, demonstrates that trans students already participate in physical activities much less than their cisgender peers. This bill does not serve the health and well-being of our considerable population of trans and gender-expansive youth, who make up about 4%, or one in every twenty-five students, in our schools.

Last, I note with reference to AB100 that most school information systems do not currently record or display students' pronouns by default. This piece of legislation could lead to significant but unintentional legal consequences. For example, when you see names like "Robin" or "Lindee," which we have represented here today, or names like "Alex," "Same," or names with which one is simply unfamiliar, there's a real risk of making incorrect assumptions about an individual's gender. Schools seeking to comply with this bill may choose to print or provide students' pronouns, especially because the lack of definition of the word "consistent" used in the bill may be reason for overcompliance. I would remind the committee that students' pronouns, especially if tied to other bio-demographic data, are considered an aspect of student identity clearly defined under federal privacy protections; this bill may inadvertently lead to violations of such law.

I remind the committee that the federal circuit court overseeing the state of Wisconsin (along with Indiana and Illinois) has repeatedly affirmed court rulings (*Whitaker v. Kenosha Unified School District No. 1*, 2017, *Doe v. Mukwonago Area School District*, 2023; *Doe v. Elkhorn Area School District*, 2024) that find 1) a school's interest in preventing physical, psychological, & educational harms to transgender students outweigh school's interest in protecting the privacy interest of other students and 2) discrimination based on gender identity is sex discrimination & denying a student access to facilities or recognition because they are transgender discriminates against them based on sex. While a legal case you've likely heard about today did find a school district violated parental rights under the state constitution, this decision from a Wisconsin circuit court (*T.F. v. Kettle Moraine School District*, 2023) has limited applicability across the state, applying only to Waukesha County. A separate decision in the wider federal court (*Parents Protecting Our Child, UA v. Eau Claire Area School District*, 2024) found that parents who did not have trans students did not have standing and could not be "harmed" by the school district's policies regarding the affirmation of trans youth in school.

Beyond the dubious (at best) legality these bills would force schools to navigate comes a considerable administrative burden. Implementing these changes would require substantial adjustments in school record-keeping systems, training for staff on new policies, and ongoing management to ensure compliance. The mechanisms defined by the bill for considering changes to nicknames and pronouns would require additional time and careful administrative attention in a system that already overburdens individuals with bureaucratic efforts that take time away from focusing on instruction. This administrative complexity, coupled with the potential for increased legal challenges and the need for clear and consistent updates to stay aligned with legal understanding, makes these bills not only legally precarious but also practically burdensome for educational institutions.

I urge the committee to table these bills. As these proposals stand, they are poised to do more harm than good, particularly to one of our most vulnerable groups of youth. Thank you for considering my perspective and the evidence I shared today. Please ensure this information is included in the record of this committee hearing.

Across states, the median number of pediatric inpatient psychiatric beds per 100 000 children was 15 and ranged from 0 in Alaska to 75 in Arkansas (**Figure**). Higher statewide median household income (r = -0.42; P = .003) and higher percentage Hispanic population (r = -0.37; P < .009) were associated with fewer beds per capita. The percentage rural population (r = 0.21; P = .15), percentage minority racial groups (r = -0.16; P = .28), and Medicaid expansion status (Wilcoxon rank sum, P = .34) were not associated with beds per capita.

Discussion | US pediatric inpatient psychiatric bed capacity did not change from 2017 to 2020, but capacity varied substantially by state. Despite increases in pediatric mental health emergency visits,⁶ bed availability has not increased. Over 90% of pediatric inpatient psychiatric beds were in urban areas, raising concerns about access for rural children. Attention is needed to ensure national pediatric inpatient psychiatric capacity is sufficient to meet population mental health needs and that resources are equitably distributed. Study limitations include the self-reported nature of AHASD data and inability to assess need for inpatient services using this data source. Important next steps include identifying factors in geographic variability in bed capacity and assessing differences in quality of inpatient services by hospital type and location.

Transgender Adolescent School Climate, Mental Health, and Adult Social Support

Despite well-established health disparities between transgender and cisgender youth,¹ state bills restricting genderinclusive school supports and health care have dramatically expanded since 2019.² While parental support for transgender


youth strengthens healthy development,³ unsupportive parents contribute to suicid-

ality and homelessness.⁴ This study examines (1) whether school climate and health gender inequities hold in Wisconsin, a politically contested state without nondiscrimination or bullying legislative protections for transgender youth, and (2) gender differences among adolescents who sought help when depressed or anxious.

Methods | The 2021 Wisconsin Youth Risk Behavior Survey (WI-YRBS) collected data from September to December 2021 for 92 316 high school students with valid responses in our main outcomes of interest (eAppendix and eTables 1 and 2 in Supplement 1). We tested for statistically significant differences in transgender vs cisgender students' health risks and support using Poisson and multinomial logistic regression, accounting for the complex, multistage sampling design with WI-YRBS-provided sampling weights and cluster robust standard errors. transgender categorization, exclusion of potentially inaccurate observations,⁵ and stratification by race and ethnicity. We followed Strengthening the Reporting of Observational Studies in Epidemiology (STROBE) reporting guidelines and received approval from the University of Wisconsin-Madison and New York University institutional review boards.

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Results | *School Climate and Mental Health.* Compared with cisgender students, transgender students reported higher risk of bullying (adjusted relative risk [aRR], 1.96; 95% CI, 1.84-2.08) (**Table**), skipping school because of feeling unsafe (aRR, 2.45; 95% CI, 2.18-2.76) and not belonging at school (aRR, 2.70; 95% CI, 2.51-2.90). Transgender students faced greater risk of anxiety (aRR, 1.54; 95% CI, 1.51-1.57) and reported about 2 to 3 times the risk of depression (aRR, 1.95; 95% CI, 1.89-2.01), self-harming behavior (aRR, 2.77; 95% CI 2.68-2.87), considering suicide (aRR, 2.89; 95% CI, 2.75-3.05), planning suicide (aRR; 3.01, 95% CI, 2.84-3.19), and attempting suicide (aRR, 3.29; 95% CI, 3.03-3.58) compared with cisgender students.

Adult Support. Transgender youth reported a greater likelihood of identifying at least 1 adult in school they could talk to compared with cisgender peers (aRR, 1.39; 95% CI, 1.31-1.47), but a lower likelihood of seeking help from 5 or more adults (aRR, 0.39; 95% CI, 0.35-0.44), identifying adults who helped with basic needs (aRR, 0.89; 95% CI, 0.87-0.90), or finding help when needed (aRR, 0.54; 95% CI, 0.49-0.60) compared with cisgender peers (Figure and Table). More cisgender youth reported not feeling depressed or anxious (18.6%) than transgender youth (1.4%). Among students who felt depressed or anxious (Figure and Table), transgender students sought help from parents (aRR, 0.25; 95% CI, 0.20-0.32), friends (aRR, 0.73; 95% CI, 0.61-0.87), and siblings (aRR, 0.50; 95% CI, 0.39-0.67) and reported uncertainty about who to seek help from (aRR, 0.70; 95% CI, 0.58-0.85) less than adults in schools when compared with cisgender students.

Discussion | These novel findings suggest that schools serve as sites for both victimization and support for transgender youth. While YRBS design issues limit some inferences (eg, crosssectional sample, exclusion of adolescents not enrolled in school), Wisconsin transgender students reported poor school climate and health concerns, which is consistent with past research¹ and adds to a small but growing state-based literature. Importantly, we leverage the Wisconsin YRBS's recent, unique adult social support items to reveal that adults in schools play a differentially greater role, and parents play a smaller role, when depressed or anxious transgender vs cisgender youth seek help. When situated in the literature discussing social supports as buffers to suicidality, depression, substance abuse, and other health risks,^{1,4} our study exposes the danger of restrictive education laws when school supports fill a critical need for transgender youth.

Prioritizing Data Privacy and Security in Pediatric AI

To the Editor We read with great interest the article by Handley and colleagues,¹ which discussed the safe and equitable use of artificial intelligence (AI) in pediatric care. The authors timely and insightfully discussed the path of AI's integration into pediatric clinical settings. We thought highly of their emphasis on engaging end users and stakeholders, which ensures algorithm evaluation and implements robust monitoring strategies. However, we believe that there is still room for a more in-depth consideration of data privacy and security, which is a crucial aspect that warrants specific attention when addressing AI in pediatrics.

As a special group, children are inherently more vulnerable to data breaches and misuse. Existing research shows that children are 3 times more likely than adults to be targeted by cyberattacks.² The unique vulnerability is compounded by the My name is Virginia Kamp. I grew up in Appleton, Wisconsin, did my Bachelor's Degree here at UW-Madison, taught for nearly a decade in Wisconsin schools, and am currently a stay at home mom to two young children in Wauwatosa in Assembly District 13. As someone who cares deeply about Wisconsin schools and Wisconsin kids, I am here today to strongly urge you not to move forward with bills AB100 and AB103.

As a young teenager in Appleton, Wisconsin, I knew I was gay the way your lungs know to breathe air. It was not a choice, it was simply who I was. I didn't even have a word for it until I overheard some students at my middle school telling anti-gay jokes. I simultaneously learned who I was, and also that it probably wasn't a safe idea to tell anyone.

Every Trans person that I know would say that they feel the same way about being Transgender, that it is ingrained in their being, but that recognizing it within themselves can be a scary and lonely realization. If these bills were to pass, I fear that we would see a serious increase in self-harm and suicide among our young people.

I hope that is enough for you to put a stop to these bills. But in case it isn't, let me also speak to you as a former educator. Before I took a step back to raise my two young children, I was a classroom teacher for over 11 years, mostly at public charter schools here in Wisconsin. Like most of the teachers I know, I went to teach in the classroom because I have a strong belief that every child deserves to have a safe place to learn and the ability to meet their fullest potential.

I am deeply concerned that these two bills will make it harder for teachers to do that. DPI's 2022 Workforce Analysis showed that we are already losing four out of every ten teachers within their first six years in the profession. Teachers want to make their students feel safe at school, and if these bills pass, I fear that we will lose even more good teachers.

It was not easy growing up gay in Wisconsin, and I can't imagine it's easy for Trans kids growing up today. But I came back to raise my kids in this state because most of the Wisconsinites I know prize kindness and neighborly love above partisanship. Today I ask you to do the same. Please stop these bills, and keep Wisconsin a great state to raise all children. To the members of the Assembly, Representatives Dittrich, Behnke, Jacobson, Kreibich, Maxey, O'Connor, Tusler, and Mursau AB103 and AB100:

These bills to amend parts of statutes 118 actively add additional challenges to the already complicated lives of transgender youth. As a non-binary person raised female, I always knew I was different - that I didn't fit in with my assigned gender. Forced interaction with people who did not see me for who I was only entrenched internalized self-hatred and led to mental health issues it took over a decade to cope with. These bills promote internalized transphobia - self-hatred no child should have to endure.

Not all children's parents are affirming of their identities, which is why I take particular issue with AB103. School is often the only safe place for children whose parents deny how they identify. Teachers and classmates should have the liberty to choose to support their transgender community members regardless of parental approval. To support this point, here is a quote from an article from the National Library of Medicine written in 2023, "...internalized transphobia was significantly associated with greater depression and anxiety. ... Only lower perceived parental support was associated with greater depression and anxiety across all steps of the regression models." Putting such emphasis on the sex someone was assigned at birth denies their lived experience - how they have come to know and understand themselves. Along with AB100, being forced to use accommodations that do not align with these children's lived experiences only promotes self-hate, isolation, and discrimination.

Let children who identify as a specific gender, regardless of their sex assigned at birth, use the facilities that align with their lived experience. Anti-transgender laws like these proposed today have caused up to a 72% increase in suicide attempts among transgender youth across the US. Let's work to protect and validate the experiences of all our community members.

Dear Members to the Assembly Committee on Education,

My name is Elise, and I have been a citizen of Wisconsin for most of my life. My childhood was spent in the North woods just over the Michigan border, then high school and college in central Wisconsin, before finally moving to Madison three years ago. This is my home, and I am terrified that it is about to end up on the wrong side of repeating history.

To explain why I oppose assembly bills 100 and 103 I'd like to take us back to June 28th, 1969, In the years prior, the government enacted anti-Igbt laws and policies that violated people's civil rights based on their sex and identity. Laws that started like these ones. In 1969, law enforcement regularly raided Igbt friendly establishments, and arrested anyone in drag and women not wearing feminine clothing. In this particular instance, officers took suspected trans folk to a bathroom to have their genitals "inspected". Additionally, women who were frisked were groped and assaulted. These are the events that led to the Stonewall riots, and our increasing fight to protect our basic rights to our own bodies.

However, assembly bills 100 and 103 would be a massive step backwards and affect the most vulnerable population, our youth. These laws are touted as protection, but what kind of protection opens up the very real and historically verifiable risk that if a student doesn't look and conform exactly to your idea of gender then a coach might ask them to *prove* it? It is no business of the state of Wisconsin what genitals a student happens to have in their pants, nor to create laws dictating if they can throw a ball around because of it.

Youth who are trans and other members of the lgbt community already face enough. Research has shown that they are several times more likely to commit suicide. A rate that drastically drops when they are given support instead of being ostracized. Up to forty percent our nation's homeless youth are part of the lgbt+ community. A stat I know all too well, as it was my biggest fear when I started questioning my own orientation. Bills like this do irreparable harm to an already vulnerable generation, and are a gross government overstep into our civil liberties. For the sake of our youth's mental and physical well being, I urge you all to vote NO on both bills 100 and 103.

For them, their new name was a chance to express their individuality. As teachers, we should honor the expression of our trans students. Many times, I have seen the light in my students' faces when I get their names right and their crestfallen expressions when I get it wrong (of course I correct myself). Please help teachers make our classrooms places full of lit up faces and not crestfallen ones. Let us show our students we value their individuality, their expression and their identities. Let us use our students' chosen names (and pronouns).

To the members of the committee on education:

My name is Julia Jones, my pronouns are she/her, and I live and work in Madison. As a mental health counselor who specializes in working with queer youth, I am personally and professionally opposed to Bill 100 and Bill 103.

Trans children are loved and valued members of our community and by excluding and misgendering them our schools would cause harm and distress to these children. Trans youth need safe spaces where they can learn, play, socialize, be included, and be themselves just like any other kid. Schools are where kids spend most of their day, and are therefore a very important safe space. Without gender affirming safe spaces trans children can experience anxiety, depression and are at increased risk of suicide.

90% of LGBTQ+ young people said their well-being was negatively impacted due to recent politics. 54% of transgender and nonbinary young people found their school to be gender-affirming, and those who did reported lower rates of attempting suicide, according to The Trevor Project. Thank you for hearing our testimonies today. My name is Karen Polnitz, I am a resident of Madison, a queer woman, an educator, a mother, and I am here today to request your votes in opposition of AB 100 and AB 103.

As a teacher and mother, it has been my great honor to bear witness to moments of youth experiencing gender euphoria. The Trevor Project defines gender euphoria as "satisfaction or joy caused when one's gendered experience aligns with their gender identity". The sense of comfort my student felt when we found gender neutral pronouns they could use to describe themselves in Spanish class, the joyful ease with which another student refers to himself as a "dude" and the glimmering sparkle in my daughter's eye when she puts on a princess dress. These are the experiences we should be fighting for our children and students to have.

AB 100 and AB 103 will not only keep kids from experiencing euphoria but quite directly place them in positions of discomfort, fear, and danger. We know that our trans and nonbinary beloveds experience bullying at high rates and those who are not supported in living authentically are at increased risk of suicide. Preventing gender diverse youth from having their identities supported with a simple acknowledgement of their correct name and pronouns and being able to play on their correct sports teams will increase both of those harmful scenarios. According to The Trevor Project, 90% of LGBTQ+ young people are negatively affected by recent politics surrounding their identities. Even the proposal of policies such as these proposed today are negatively affecting our children. 45% of transgender and nonbinary youth report that their families have considered moving to another state due to anti-LGBTQ+ policies in the last year. Is this what we want for Wisconsin? To create dangerous conditions for youth that drive families away?

I want to trust that all on the committee do not wish harm upon our children. AB 100 and AB 103 will undoubtedly cause harm to our children and I strongly urge you to vote against them. Please reject the lies about trans people. I am here to oppose bills AB100, a proposed trans athlete ban, and AB103, a bill restricting the rights of transgender students from using the correct name and pronouns.

I have lived in Wisconsin for 35 years, Madison for almost 20 years, and am speaking on my own behalf as a private citizen. I have held director-level positions at multiple pharmaceutical companies in Madison and my husband is an associate for a Wisconsin-based engineering firm. We also contribute to our community, volunteering at our children's school and coaching. If these bills are passed, we are considering leaving Wisconsin.

My child is 9 years old, identifies as non-binary, and uses they / them pronouns. They realized their gender identity on their own at the age of 7 and communicated their preferred name and pronouns to me and their dad. Until then, there had been no discussion of gender identity in our household. My child does karate, swims, plays football and basketball, all of which are co-ed, and have not required that they identify with either gender binary. If required to participate in sports based on their gender assigned at birth, they will choose not to participate. My child more closely identifies as trans when forced into the gender binary. Participating based on their gender assigned at birth would put my child at odds with their sense of self and put them in a situation where they would face more discrimination and bullying. Legislators are counting on our trans children to not to participate in sports. Why should our trans children forego affirmation of self to participate in school athletics alongside their peers? We know the benefits of participation in sports. We know the benefits of self-affirmation. Our trans children deserve equal rights.

My child is intelligent, both intellectually and emotionally, kind, respectful, and happy. They are supported by their family, their school, and their community. There is no evidence of mental illness as some would lead us to believe. My child is strong and capable, and the only issue that breaks them is when their preferred name, pronouns, or gender identity are intentionally not respected. My primary purpose as a parent is to ensure the well-being of my child. This is not something we were expecting and it totally caught us off guard. Upon her insistence, we now call her she and she lives her best life wearing dresses growing out her hair. It has become apparently clear that she is a much happier and well adjusted kiddo living as a girl.

I strongly oppose these bills because trans children and youth, like all of our students, have the right to an equal and inclusive education, free from harassment and discrimination. To the members of the committee:

I am a transgender educator, and I would have been a transgender athlete during high school had my school not made the decision to ban me from being allowed to participate in gym classes, sports teams, and the use of bathrooms. Now, over ten years later, these bills are asking me to perpetuate that violence. I am against bills AB100 and AB103. After reading AB100 and AB103 I have questions about the enforcement of both bills.

- 1. Title IX allows girls on boys teams if no girls teams exist for them, how would this bill affect that?
- 2. If the definition of sex, as written in this bill, is based on a physician's decision at birth, are intersex people banned from all sports? Or must they provide documents that inaccurately describe their birth sexes?
- 3. Under line 2(a) of bill AB100 schools are required to designate athletic teams based on the sex of the participating pupils; is this making co-ed sports unlawful? How do we address the increased costs of disbanding co-ed teams in order to create sex segregated teams? Many schools may have to end important sporting programs if they can't afford two separate teams.
- 4. Are these bills claiming that those designated female at birth are inherently less capable than, or inferior to, those designated male at birth?
- 5. Legal name changes are financially prohibitive, and especially for pupils in rural areas who cannot access traveling to the courthouse for a hearing. This leaves working class and rural students at a disadvantage. Are the writers of this bill implying their acceptance of this fact?
- 6. With a requirement for both parents to be notified and to approve of a name change, how should schools approach situations where there is an abusive or estranged parent? This places schools in the position of having to make complicated legal decisions with no clear guidance, opening them up to potential lawsuits.
- 7. Line 4(c) of bill AB103 has an allowance for nicknames so long as they are a shortened version of the students first or middle name. How should schools approach girls named Charlotte wanting to be called Chuck? Boys named Samuel going by Sammy? Students who are called by their last names? Students with nicknames that have nothing to do with any of their given names or a gender identity, but who use those names in their daily life? Do they need an affidavit or a legal name change to be allowed to use a nickname like 'Junior'?

These bills put students at risk of financial, mental, emotional, and physical harm. When we have as many as 2 to 3 of every 5 transgender students attempting suicide before their 18th birthday, this bill will have blood on its hands.

Greetings members of the assembly and public, my name is Dr. Samantha Bosco, I am a WI resident here in Madison and I work as a postdoctoral researcher at the University of Wisconsin. I am testifying about Assembly Bills 100 and 103, which seek to compel all public and private educational institutions in WI to enforce a completely false ideology of binary gender and immutable sex expressions, through government overreach in school sports and curtailing inclusive language to aid with social transitioning for trans youth in educational settings.

First, these bills are flat out discriminatory and dangerous. AB100 singles out trans women and girls, forcing them into places that will increase the risk of bullying and demoralization¹. AB103 discriminates against trans youth from using inclusive language, and makes them prove that they are not "sex offenders", "fraudulent", or "infringing on the rights of others". And yet you can so hypocritically then go and infringe on the rights of trans youth. These bills will be vetoed and defeated in the courts, you are wasting our time and tax dollars.

In the case of AB100, how would you enforce this when discrepancies arise? How would you verify that a student's birth certificate matches their anatomy or karyotype²? The doctors first designated it by visual inspection, does that mean school administrators will be visually inspecting student's genitals? Is that not a sex offense and sexual abuse?! Is that not an infringement on the rights of WI students?!

If you truly want to help women's sports, perhaps you could propose legislation to correct the funding discrepancies that actually favor men's sports^{3,4} rather than waste taxpayer dollars on an estimated five, yes f-i-v-e trans middle and highschool athletes in this entire nation⁵.

Lastly, I speak to you today as someone with a PhD in agricultural sciences and who has taught biology at an Ivy League University. It is plain to see that both of these proposed bills are based on factually incorrect ideas about "biological" sex as only existing in a binary⁶.

You see, Something about me that often gets a lot of attention is my curly red hair. Did you know that 2% of the earth's population has red hair? You can probably think of several... Did you know that about that same percentage of people on earth are born with, or later develop, intersex characteristics that do not fit into either male or female categories. In fact more than "two genders", did you know that there are 30 genetic variations in human sex chromosomes⁷?!

I've lived in Wisconsin for a few months now as a graduate student and have done research with college students on the introduction of bills, such as AB103 and AB100, and the negative impact they have on how students think about places.

In that research, I have become familiar with how even the proposal of bills such as this one can be harmful to youth, with the Trevor Project finding that 86% of transgender and nonbinary youth had negative impacts on their mental health from the discussion of these kinds of bills.

However, I write today in opposition to the measures proposed in AB103. I am currently 21, so my life since I was 3 has been spent in schools. Over those many years, I have had the pleasure of meeting many people who had transitioned, were in the process of transitioning, and folks who experimented with their pronoun usage. In knowing these people, I was able to see the impact that having access to the choice to change their name and/or pronouns (at least in the educational setting) had.

Particularly for friends I had come to know before they had begun to transition, I was able to see them blossom as people. People who seemed disengaged from school and life had smiles so wide and felt more invigorated once they were able to take the big step that is making a name change or a pronoun change. Classmates who were consistently quiet and withdrawn were then filled with the confidence that comes with being able to express oneself more truthfully.

It is my opinion, through observing these people I had come to know, that access to name changes, pronoun changes, and the freedom of expression provided through those actions allowed these students to be more engaged with their education.

My name is Tony Panciera, I live in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, 53211. I am opposed to the passage of AB 103.

I am a business owner and have the pleasure of working for clients across our community in Southeastern Wisconsin. I do small scale carpentry, woodworking, and cabinetry. I have clients that are queer. I have clients that are trans. I have people in my community with children who are trans. The impact of AB 103 putting barriers in place for schools to be able to support trans kids is that trans kids are less likely to have spaces where they are supported. These bills DO succeed in adding bureaucracy into schools and reduce safety for kids who might not have it at home. Trans people are 4x more likely to be victims of violent crime. More than 40% of transgender adults in the US have attempted suicide (https://williamsinstitute.law.ucla.edu/press/transpop-suicide-press-release/). To think that they only turned to self-harm as adults is asinine.

For a parent trying to support their kid (I have two children), requiring legal name change documents or an affidavit in order to change the name they are called at school, is truly wild. Navigating school selection, transportation, childcare, making enough money to pay for childcare, and figuring out how to support and develop socially well rounded and kind children is enough work. Perhaps it's easier for folks above my tax bracket, but for most of us normal folk, it's a lot. Adding legal barriers to make it more complicated for parents (and teachers, paraprofessionals, school resource officers, nurses, aides, secretaries, etc.) to love and be kind to children, feels like a particular type of cruel.

I aim to focus my life on loving others and my community, as Jesus did. I cannot imagine that Jesus would have supported this type of law, with the parable of the Good Samaritan coming to mind. You do not have to know someone or understand someone to be kind and loving. Adding barriers to parents and schools to support kids don't seem Jesus-like to me. I strongly encourage you to act out of love and vote against AB 103.

I initially moved to Wisconsin in 2010 for graduate school, and I made the decision to stay in Wisconsin after my education had concluded because I loved so many things about this state--especially its history of progressive values, always aiming to propel the state and its people Forward. But AB103 would push Wisconsin Backward.

In various teaching and tutoring capacities, I have worked with a wide array of students, from 6th graders through high school students and undergrads at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. One thing all of my teaching experiences have had in common is the paramount importance of trust. I am a better teacher, and my students are more engaged and receptive to learning, when we trust each other. That means that when my students tell me their names and pronouns, I use them. I make my students feel comfortable and safe, and they, in return, do the work I set out for them so that they can build skills and blossom into happy, educated, productive adults. When students cannot trust the adults around them, however, their academic performance suffers.

This bill would make that level of trust impossible to achieve. It would bar students from the chance to explore who they are in a safe environment, even when their home environment is less safe. And it puts an unfair burden on students and parents to jump through the difficult hoops of the legal system just for the chance to be acknowledged as the people that they are.

The bill makes an explicit exception for "a pupil using a shortened version of the pupil's legal first or middle name." This means that Thomas James can be Tommy or TJ, and that Margaret Leigh can be Peggy or Leigh. Clearly, the writers of this bill are aware that using a name that is not the student's full legal name does not, actually, place an administrative or professional burden on schools and teachers. When students from other countries move to the U.S., they often take on a new "American" name at school, even as the name on their passport remains unchanged. There are many, many cases where students use names in school that do not match their legal documents. Why should trans children be treated differently?

My name is Sol Kelley-Jones and I write to you today as a parent, an educator and a proud Wisconsinite who has had the privilege of knowing, working with, and loving many transgender young people in our community for the past 20 years. I am deeply concerned about Assembly Bill 103 and its attack on transgender and gender nonbinary young people and the educators and support staff who affirm their identities through using the pronouns and names that affirm their identity in their school communities. Research shows that using the chosen name and pronouns of transgender and gender nonbinary students dramatically improves their sense of well-being and belonging in school – things we want all students to feel at school! A 2018 study by the Journal of Adolescent Health found that transgender youth who were able to use their chosen name and pronouns had 71% fewer symptoms of severe depression, a 34% drop in reported suicidal thoughts and a 65% decrease in suicide attempts. Using transgender and nonbinary young people's chosen names and pronouns literally saves lives.

I have a non-binary 1st grader who is kind and silly, loves animals and art and inventing things and is eagerly planning a very elaborate rainforest themed birthday party this next week for their 7th birthday. They remind us every day that when we let kids just be themselves, and be seen in their fullness – which includes calling them by the pronouns and name that affirm their self identity – young people thrive. Teachers and staff calling my child by their chosen pronouns makes my child - and young people like them - feel seen, valued, and part of a community. My name is Harper DePagter and I am from Brown Deer, WI 53223. I am writing to express my opposition to AB 100 and AB 100. I am a transgender woman educator who taught social studies and science to 5-12th graders. Two weeks ago I lost my teaching position in part of the attack on DEI and transgender individuals. Wisconsin already has a teacher shortage so why are we trying to make it worse? Instead of focusing on improving our education in our schools like our reading and math scores, the elected officials of the Assembly and Senate take it upon themselves to target an extremely small minority group of people and make their lives more difficult.

Lessons can be learned from social studies teachers and the attacks on minority groups in American history. An example is the Declaration of Independence when women, freed blacks, and Native Indigenous people were left out of the identifying as "all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness." Then when the Constitution was written once again women, freed blacks and Indigenous people were left out of the Constitution to have any rights. It has taken several movements and Constitutional Amendments to start to establish Constitutional rights for minority groups. Each time in American history when a minority group of people is "noticed" by the majority, the majority has the power to create laws to restrict and make the minority group of people's lives more difficult. How is it that we still have not learned from our past and continue to make the same mistakes over and over again? We are ALL human beings. The Constitution says "We the people," transgender men and women are people, or like I say to all my students we are ALL humans.

Transgender humans want to be like any other human being. They have emotions and feelings just like a cis human. In AB 100 it states "Sex" means the sex determined at birth by a physician and reflected on the birth certificate." I have taught science and unless each physician performs a DNA test to determine the actual chromosomal sex, the physical appearance at birth can be deceiving because there are intersex humans. "Intersex is a general term used to refer to individuals born with, or who develop naturally in puberty, biological sex characteristics that are not typically male or female. That is, a person with an intersex condition is born with sex chromosomes, external genitalia, or an internal reproductive system that is not considered typical for a male or female." Examples of chromosomal intersex are XXX, XXY, and X. The expression: don't judge a book by its cover resonates in this context.

As a transgender woman, I wish I had the opportunity to grow up as my authentic self in a safe space; however, growing up in Oostburg Wisconsin, which is a small rural Christian community it was extremely difficult to be my authentic self. I hid for almost 30 years and I caused severe microaggressions on myself because I lived in fear of the hate I would receive. When I came out in 2022 to my family who still live in Oostburg, I received the worst hateful things said to me by my mother, father, brother, sister, and grandparents. I wasn't accepted. I was cast out of the community. I was still human and I was just trying to live as my authentic transgender self and be joyful but for some reason, the beliefs they had were to hate me and attack me because I am different. The Wisconsin State Assembly and Senate are no different than my family attacking me with hateful messages. It is also no different than what the federal government is doing. There is no unity in these bills to make Wisconsin better when it focuses on such a small minority of people. Invest in our future by investing in our families, education, mental health, and our economy. Do not create a problem where there is no problem because then nothing gets accomplished for the people of

Wisconsin. There are working lower-class families who are feeling the effects of the Trump administration tariffs and what does this Wisconsin Legislature focus on, AB 100 restricting transgender girls from participating in girl's sports and AB 103 legal name change with pronouns. Nothing in the bills addresses restricting transgender boys from not participating in boy's sports. AB 100 is unconstitutional because it only focuses on only half the population of a minority group. AB 103 violates Title VII.

I have heard from both sides of the aisle of government overreach and the guilty party only has to look in the mirror. Once again, they wanted to put the fear into the community that I was a groomer and predator in the classroom. Hateful words were spoken about me that were completely untrue. It's one thing to be an adult and hear these words but imagine a teenager who is transgender who might have to hear these same words said to them. Of course, none of you will ever know what it is like to be transgender. I encourage you to have a conversation with a transgender individual. Actually, have eight different conversations with them before voting on the bill because that is how many times it takes to make an impression on someone.

Transgender people should not see their rights restricted like all other racial, ethnic, and cultural groups and women before them who had to fight for over a hundred years for their rights. It is 2025 and we should be better than its 1789 restricting rights because someone is different. Only the guilty party needs to look in the mirror. Dear Legislators,

I am an endocrinologist who treats transgender patients.

You may wonder if I think it is "right" for people to declare themselves transgender. The complex biochemical variation within human brains that we cannot measure or quantify with medical science has led my assertion that "right" or "wrong" are moot points: to you and those creating laws, I encourage you to simply balance the questions of "who could this legislation hurt?" And "who could it help". You may also ask the question, "does it need to be a law?"

A law to restrict the capacity of children to say how they would like to be addressed at school.

Who does it help?

The mental health benefits of allowing people to live in their affirmed gender have been welldescribed, particularly via reduction in suicide rates and depression scores. I bear witness to these effects every day, and it is wonderful to see people who have had such improvements.

Who does it hurt? I'm grasping at straws here: clerical workers?

Perhaps also, it might make some people feel "uncomfortable", and people might not like the pressure of remembering the right pronouns. While I understand this feeling, and do feel uncomfortable worrying about misgendering someone—I have to come back to my statement above—just because something causes a bit of discomfort doesn't mean there needs to be a law against it.

And a side note: many of the trans people living in our community never get mid-gendered because they are perceived by others as their preferred gender-no one even needs to know they are trans.

In a nation that prides itself on freedom of choice and self-expression, where people are allowed to take supplemental hormones of many ilks and purposes, (melatonin, DHEA, testosterone, estrogen, GLP1, may be some that sound familiar), where people wear makeup, have plastic surgery, legally change their names, go by nicknames, etc, why do we need to attempt to restrict people so?

I went to school with a William, "Dubs", Quinn "Fifi", and Christopher "Himiss". My father-in-law went to an elite East Coast boarding school with "Biffy", "Bussy" and "Budgy". None were (to my knowledge) trans, but also (to my knowledge) none were told that they could not use a preferred name, no matter how it sounded.

- 6. **Educational Environment:** Creating a safe and supportive educational environment for all students is essential for students. Policies that do not affirm students' identities can lead to bullying and exclusion.
- 7. **Alternatives:** Schools should focus on inclusive education and training for staff on how to support all students, rather than implementing restrictive policies.

Thank you for considering and opposing this bill in order to help stop the attack on human rights.

My name is Rebecca Pochert and I am a resident of Pewaukee, WI. I have two children ages 12 and 15 and they both attend public school in the Pewaukee district. My 15 year old is transgender.

I'm writing today to ask that you please vote NO on AB103. Our state assembly should not pass a bill instructing schools to adopt policies that will make it harder for transgender kids to be recognized and respected in school. This bill unnecessarily targets the 1% of students who identify as Transgender in the state of Wisconsin by making them to go through additional administrative hoops in order to be addressed in school the way all other kids are addressed- by their preferred names and pronouns.

There are reasons why the school would need to keep the legal name and biological sex within the school system documents. There are certain documents like class transcripts that need to align with other state and federal documents so they can link back to the child in question. But there is absolutely no need for the school to create a process that makes it more difficult for staff to use the preferred names and pronouns for their students. Kids have long used 'nicknames' at school without issue. We do not need a bill passed that documents exactly what nicknames are or are not allowed. And we don't need a bill that dictates which pronouns a teacher will be REQUIRED to use. The request of the student should be enough, as it has been for many, many years.

Take for example a student at my child's school where everyone calls him Junior. He shares his father's Legal name which does not contain the name "Junior" and for his whole life everyone (family, friends, teachers) have called this kid Junior. Junior is not his first name or his middle name. It is a suffix which is not listed as one of the exceptions in this bill. So, presumably his family will be required to complete additional paperwork in order to use "Junior". Junior uses he/him pronouns so that part would not be of concern to him.

Or how about the girl that I went to grade school with 30 years ago? Her legal name was Michael- spelled exactly as it is, named after her dad. She (a biological female) did not use the name Michael- ever. She used a nickname at school. So, her family would be required to complete additional paperwork to use a nickname. She used she/her pronouns so that part would not be a concern for her.

My child uses his birth name and he/him pronouns but the documents on file with the school show 'female'. Our school already has a process for updating the school records with preferred names and pronouns. My child's preferred name and pronouns are on file with the school with his signature as well as mine and his dad so that the teachers use he/him pronouns when addressing my son with other students and staff. If this bill passes, it will not matter that me, my student, and my school agreed to this. The bill states that the school would not be allowed to pronouns other than the pronouns provided at the time the pupil first enrolled in the school district. We enrolled in 2019 before my child started his transition and those documents all show 'female'. Please do not take this away from us. My son has come so far from the days of self-harm and suicidal ideation. He is getting As and Bs in school and the only major 'transition' for him was to cut his hair and use he/him pronouns.

I encourage you think about people in your own life. I'm willing to bet you can think of at least one person that you know that uses a nickname that doesn't align with their first or middle name. This bill creates unnecessary work for the schools and purposefully makes it harder for transgender students to be addressed the way they seem themselves at school.

Please don't pass a bill that will inevitably force teachers to address kids by names (or pronouns) that they don't use.

A written statement by Dr. Laura Berghahn, MD and Dr. Shefaali Sharma, MD regarding the Assembly Committee on Education hearing for Assembly Bill 103, relating to school board policies regarding changing a pupil's legal name and pronouns on Thursday March 6th, 2025.

Written Statement:

We are Dr. Laura Berghahn, MD and Dr. Shefaali Sharma, MD. Not only are we OB/GYN physicians, we are also mothers and working hard to raise children in a world that seems to be determined to crush the spirit of humanity while allowing violence, hunger, and misinformation to flourish.

We have written this testimony in opposition of the Assembly Bill 103. We are struggling to understand how respecting a student's pronoun choices can raise opposition enough to create this bill, while today, one of our children is currently undergoing a lockdown drill in their third grade classroom because of the very real, physical threat of gun violence in our schools. How is it that it is normal for lockdown drills, but not okay to respect a student's desire to use pronouns that reflect who they are? We question those who support this bill. Those who are willing to crush the well-being and happiness of individuals who want nothing more than to just simply exist. To simply be loved and be happy, be confident and who they are. How is using they/them any different than calling Michael, Mike? Or Stephanie, Steph? Those individuals didn't need to seek their parent's permission or legal changes for their name request to be honored and respected. Pronouns are no different.

Furthermore, while one might experience discomfort using words like "pronouns" or "they/them", this discomfort is far surpassed by the inner turmoil, depression, and oppression our children face as they encounter hate and disrespect, again, for simply existing as their true selves. According to the Trevor Project and ACLU, passage of these types of legislation are associated with increased risk of depression, anxiety and suicide among LGBTQ youth. My name is jamie wohlgamuth, and I have lived in Wisconsin for 16 years. I am a parent of two children, one of whom has thrived in a school environment that respects and supports students in expressing their identities safely. I am testifying today in strong opposition to AB103, a bill that would place unnecessary and harmful restrictions on how schools recognize and affirm students' names and pronouns.

This bill seeks to take away a student's ability to be addressed by the name and pronouns that reflect their identity unless explicitly authorized by their parents or legal guardians. I am writing to you to oppose AB103. My name is Elizabeth Ehrke, and I have lived in Wisconsin for nearly my entire life. I was born in Pewaukee, WI and I now reside in Milwaukee with the zip code of 53207. I am writing to you as a member of the community and a concerned citizen.

I am writing this testimony on behalf of all of the trans and non-binary kids that don't have parents like me. My 8 year old has known their assigned gender at birth has not matched who they are since they were three. My child came home sobbing from daycare when their teacher called them a girl. For the next two years, my child and I learned about gender and they explored what gender felt right for them. Shortly before starting Kindergarten, they identified as a boy and we started calling them Max instead of their birth name. I called and emailed the school for them to change their gender marker and name on all the records that were visible to school staff. Max started school as a boy. We did not officially change their name and we did not need to submit any type of documentation other than a written email. We were letting Max explore what felt right. It was the first environment they were in that everyone only knew them as Max and as a boy. This created the most marvelous change in my child. They were happy and expressive in a way I had never seen before. They seemed to come alive. About 2/3 of the way through the school year, my kiddo really started considering that being a boy might not fit either. After some hard consideration, they determined they were nonbinary, wanted to use they/them pronouns, and wanted to use their birth name again. I called and emailed the school and made the appropriate name, gender and pronoun changes. This was all done the same day. This was so incredibly supportive for my child, and they were able to be their full selves at school. They are still identifying as non-binary and using they/them pronouns. Your bill would not have allowed these incredibly supporting and affirming actions by the school. My child loves school and is doing very well in school. I know they would not be in this place if they had not received this type of support from their school. They would have experienced significant distress if the school was required to call them by a name and pronouns that don't fit their gender identity. Given some of the things my child has said through this journey, I would be significantly worried about suicide or self harm if my child's school did not refer to them by their correct gender and pronouns, which obviously do not match their legal sex. This bill is targeting a small group of kids that are some of the most marginalized and unrepresented groups. What if my child did not have a parent that was willing to support and advocate for them? I worry about all the kids like mine that don't have supporting parents. From many of the trans and non-binary adults I have met through the journey of educating myself for my child, so many parents do not support their trans children. There are many stories of just one supportive adult or teacher in a kid's life that supported their self-identified gender, pronouns and name that made the difference between life and death for these kids. Schools should be allowed to support the state's children in this way. This bill will only harm children and absolutely no good will come of it.

Dear Representatives Kitchens, Goeben, Mursau, Duchow, Snyder, Dittrich, Penterman, Melotik, Brill, Hong, Cruz, Phelps, and Sheehan,

Thank you for the opportunity to testify today, and my apologies for not being able to be here in person. I am writing **to oppose AB103**, relating to school board policies related to changing a pupil's legal name and pronouns.

Frankly, it is difficult to know what to say about this bill when it is so obviously absurd. Students deserve to decide what they want to be called. This bill is explicitly discriminatory and violates teachers' freedom of speech. It is not right to prohibit teachers from using a student's chosen name and pronouns. It has protections for cis students to use nicknames—assuming the nickname is a shortened version or a middle name—but for trans students, it requires written permission from parents for a teacher to use a student's chosen name. This imposes a clear double standard for cis and trans students, where cis students can be called what they want to be called, while trans students must get written permission from their parents. This is something they may not be able to do, if their parents are unsupportive, but even for those whose parents are supportive, this imposes an added burden on these students that their cis peers do not have to face.

Beyond being transphobic, I also want to point out that this bill is sexist. The bill prohibits the use of "a name or pronouns that do not align with the pupil's biological sex." I ask this committee what it even means to have a name that aligns with one's biological sex. I understand that names tend to be gendered, but who determines whether a name matches someone's sex? Gender neutral names (Sam, Terry, Kelly, Charlie, for instance) exist. In high school, I knew a girl who went by Pinky—is that a feminine enough name, do you think? Or would she have had to get her parents' written permission to use that under this law? The language in this bill seems to ignore the reality that names do not have an inherent gender—they have the meanings and associations that have developed over time.

I do not understand what purpose this bill could possibly have aside from making it more difficult to be a trans student in Wisconsin. Good teachers want to support their students in any way they can, including by using the names and pronouns preferred by the student. This bill would prevent teachers from being able to support their students, and for what purpose? I genuinely question what alleged problem this bill is trying to fix. Parents deserve to have input on their children's lives, but that does not mean they should get to control every aspect of their lives. Being able to control the name and pronouns a child uses at school is beyond what is reasonable. Those decisions belong to the student and school staff. Finally, this bill would negatively impact trans students' wellbeing. Trans youth already face a number of challenges, such as difficulty accessing care, lack of acceptance, and discrimination. Being able to socially transition and use the names and pronouns that align with their gender makes their lives easier. Please do not try to take that ability and agency away from them.

I oppose AB103 and urge you to vote against it. Please do not make students' lives harder than they already are.

This is especially detrimental to LGBTQ+ students, who are statistically at an increased risk of mental health issues and suicide as a result of factors including social stigmatization and mistreatment (as per a 2022 survey by the Trevor Project, in Wisconsin 44% of LGBTQ youth seriously considered suicide in the past year, including 56% of transgender and nonbinary youth; additionally from this survey, 74% of LGBTQ youth reported experiencing symptoms of anxiety and 59% of LGBTQ youth reported experiencing symptoms of depression). This unnecessary targeting of students who are often already part of marginalized groups only discourages and detracts from creating an environment in schools where students are supported and enabled to focus on learning and receiving an education, which ultimately impacts their ability to contribute to our state as adults in a negative way.

I'm Rev. Julie Wilson (she/her) Lead Pastor of Bethany United Methodist Church in Madison. I'm writing against AB-103. I am a lifelong Wisconsin resident. I grew up on the NorthEast side of Madison and lived several places around the area before returning to live on the West Side of Madison a few years ago. My parents were hard working middle class people. My mom worked as a cook for Central Wisconsin Center often working weekends and holidays. My dad was lucky to get a "good" job working at Oscar Meyer as a ham deboner for more than 40 years. My parents taught me and my siblings many important lessons including being kind to others and always helping others if you could.

In the United Methodist faith our founder John Wesley had three General Rules for a Christian life. They are Do No Harm, Do Good and Stay in Love with God. These are similar to what my parents taught and modeled for me and my siblings. I believe this bill violates that very first rule - Do No Harm. Quite simply this bill will cause unnecessary harm to children. There is no harm caused to anyone by simply addressing a child by the name they prefer. No other students, teachers or administrators are affected in any way by the use of someone's preferred name. Every child deserves to be treated with dignity and respect and using their preferred name is a simple way to demonstrate that.

Your job as legislators is to protect our children and this bill does not do that. It will harm children and affect their ability to learn. Plain and simple this bill is mean spirited and hurtful in so many ways. I urge you to vote no on AB-103 and respect children as beloved members of our community. Thank you.

To the members of the Assembly,

I am writing in opposition of this bill. AB 103 would force teachers and other educators to use the wrong name and pronouns for students who are unable to obtain legal support, or who have home environments that do not support them. Names are an intrinsic part of human dignity, and the name a child chooses to use is no less valid than the one given to a child at birth. Obstetrician-gynecologists should ask patients about their name and which pronouns they use. Asking all patients routinely for their gender identity and gender pronouns normalizes the interaction and allows patients to disclose without being targeted; good practice includes reciprocal disclosure (eg, "Hello, I am Dr. X and I use she/her pronouns. Is the name on your chart what you would like me to call you? What pronouns do you use?").

The patient's pronouns should be documented in the patient chart.

Common choices include (note: this is not an exhaustive list):

- She/her/hers
- He/him/his
- They/them/their: Neutral pronouns used by some who have a nonbinary or diverse gender identity.

Other gender-neutral pronouns include zie (ze) or hir.

Dear Members of the Assembly Committee on Education,

My name is Maddie, and I am a resident of Madison. I've lived in Wisconsin for 23 years, grew up going to public school in WI, and I identify as non-binary.

I am writing to urge you to vote NO on Assembly Bill 103. As a Wisconsinite, I am opposed to this bill because it limits youth from the essential and crucial self-discovery and self-identification process that helps them develop into young adults who can bring their full authentic selves to whatever they do. Specifically, this bill encourages the most vulnerable youth to hide who they are and encourages adults to control youth instead of allowing youth to freely explore and express. The role of adults in youths' lives should be to encourage positive decision-making out of empowerment, not control, and rules for youth should only be in place to protect their safety. Using a different name and pronouns is not dangerous for a youth or anyone around them. Youth are humans who grow up into adults, and should be treated with the respect of self-identification that should be afforded to human beings.

This bill would also impact any cisgender youth who wants to use a nickname. As a youth growing up in Madison schools myself, when I had no language for my own identity, using a nickname was empowering, and also a neutral, extremely normal non-issue for those around me. Nicknames are extremely common for youth and adults alike. Controlling cis and trans youth through this bill sends a strong message to youth: "the adults around you don't want you to grow up into an adult with agency and self respect: these adults around you want you to grow up rigidly controlled, into an adult who fears the world around you and the consequences of being even slightly outside of a social norm in any way." Is that really the world we're trying to create? Youth already bully and scrutinize each other, because AND regardless of their differences. Don't we want to be teaching youth kindness towards one another, instead of encouraging social control and state-mandated bullying towards anyone who is a little bit different?

If none of these arguments about human rights and autonomy feel compelling to you, consider the administrative burden that a bill like this would place on schools and the wildly inefficient use of state dollars in public schools through excessive administrative time spent policing the genders of all children who use a different name or a nickname. I presume that the assembly would like to prioritize efficient and responsible use of state funds towards public education. If so, this bill should be opposed.

I am writing to express my opposition to AB 103. I am concerned about both aspects of the bill. I write in my roles as an educator, as a researcher, and as a parent.

- My 30 years of teaching experience have convinced me that students succeed when they feel safe, secure, and respected in the classroom. Conversely, they tend to struggle when they feel unsafe. Names and pronouns that reflect the student's gender are key elements of safety and respect.

My experience as a researcher who has spent the past five years studying the experiences of LGBTQ+ youth, tells me that being misgendered and called by a name that no longer applies can have terrible consequences for their physical and mental safety.
Finally, my experiences as a parent who deeply loves my own transgender nonbinary child have taught me that using the name and pronouns that make them feel safe and that

reflect who they are is a fundamental act of care.

The requirement that students have legally changed their name in order to have their formal school record reflect their preferred name and gender means that families with fewer economic and logistical resources will be less able to support their child in this regard.

The requirement that teachers will be forced to ignore a student's name and gender preferences unless parents write and sign a document giving permission ignores the fact that not all students live with parents and/or guardians. Students whose parents are abusive and hostile and who would not sign such a document will thereby face a double-jeopardy of an unsupportive school environment.

Using a student's preferred name and pronouns harms no-one; not doing so is potentially life-threatening.

I have been an educator for 17 years. I taught 4th and 2nd grade in public schools in Delaware and Milwaukee before becoming an instructional coach in the Madison Metropolitan School District. I am now an adjunct professor at Madison College, teaching aspiring educators. I vigorously oppose Bill 103, which would deny students the right to use their preferred names and pronouns at school.

There is nothing more important than schools being places of belonging for all students. If students do not feel a sense of belonging, they quite literally cannot learn. When we feel cared for, our brain is flooded with neurotransmitters and hormones like oxytocin, which tell our pre-frontal cortex, the thinking part of the brain, that all is safe. When the brain feels safe, it is able to take on new learning. When humans don't feel safe, stress hormones like cortisol flood the brain and divert blood from the pre-frontal context to the amygdala. When the amygdala is activated, our brains prepare for fight or flight - absolutely no learning can happen under those conditions. If we do not allow our children to be called by the names and pronouns that they prefer, that make them feel safe, then we are literally preventing them from learning.

Even more disturbing, if we deny our students the right to be called what they want, we are denying their humanity at school. Children are full humans and should have the right to be referred to by the names and pronouns that make them feel like themselves. There are disproportionally high rates of suicide risk and poor mental health among transgender and nonbinary youth, due to the stress and mistreatment they experience in an anti-transgender society. Data indicate that 82% of transgender individuals have considered killing themselves and 40% have attempted suicide. How could anyone possibly support a bill that will make it even harder for transgender youth to feel safe at school, knowing these heartbreaking statistics?

In my 12 years in public schools, I knew 3 children who asked to be referred to by pronouns different than their biological sex. When these students' wishes were honored, I watched them thrive in school. I watched the children around them accept them with zero hesitation. It makes me sick to think of what would have happened to these beautiful souls had they been denied such a basic human right.

Schools should do everything they can to make sure all youth, including transgender youth, feel loved and accepted and politicians should not be making it harder for them to do so. Every student deserves the freedom to be themselves in school.

My name is **Dawn Berney**, and I live at **Madison**, **WI 53711**. I have been a proud resident of Wisconsin for several decades, am the retired Executive Director of Jewish Social Services of Madison, and I am writing to **strongly oppose Assembly Bill 103**.

My 20 year old son attended public school from kindergarten through 12th grade. When he transitioned in 7th grade, his school supported him fully with his name and gender changes—and as a result, his mental health improved significantly. By the time he graduated from high school, he was a percussionist at the highest level for the Wisconsin Youth Symphony Orchestra, volunteered regularly with older adults in the community, maintained nearly a 4.0 grade point average and scored in the 99th percentile on his ACTs. He would have been a great asset to the UW-Madison. However, despite growing up here, he chose to attend the University of Chicago in Illinois, in part because of worries about legislation like this. Wisconsin's population is expected to decline over the next 25 years. When my son graduates college, he'll be an incredible asset wherever he goes, but if Wisconsin does not protect children like the one he was, he will likely never return.

This story illustrates just how important it is for schools to be safe and welcoming places for all students, including those who are transgender. AB 103 imposes barriers that would make it harder for kids like my son to receive the support they need. Instead of letting them focus on thriving academically and socially, this bill introduces fear, uncertainty, and the risk of being outed to unsupportive parents—putting vulnerable students at risk.

I believe in a Wisconsin where every child can succeed and feel respected. AB 103 does the opposite: it creates a school environment that fosters mistrust and makes it harder for young people to safely and openly be who they are. Having watched my child, I know that he always knew who he was much better than I did. I respectfully urge you to **oppose Assembly Bill 103** and protect the well-being of all our students.

Allowing students to determine the names and other words used to refer to them while they are at school poses no harm to anyone. Rather, it promotes a feeling of safety and creative freedom that should be fundamental in school settings. Furthermore, it is essential that students feel safe sharing personal details with their teachers, as those are the adults that they spend the most time with after their parents or guardians. Giving unequal amounts of decision-making power to principals in these scenarios sows distrust between students, teachers and families.

I believe that students, teachers, families and school administrators should work together to support the health and well-being of students, and that students themselves should be central in determining what that looks like. I urge you to consider these points and oppose AB103. Thank you for your time and consideration.

My name is Megan Spielbauer Sandate, and I am a queer Madison resident. I am testifying to state my opposition to AB103. Like AB100 and other bills like this one, this type of anti-trans legislation is harmful to all students but particularly trans and nonbinary students. This type of legislation steals liberties from students and allows an agent of the state, a principal, to tell an individual who they are and what they should be called by their friends and teachers.

Trans and nonbinary students deserve to have the people around them call them **by their name**, not refer to them by a name that is on a piece of paper. The legal name change process is difficult and expensive. It's unreasonable to expect students to navigate that process as a minor for the simple human right of being called by your own name.

What are we teaching young people as a society with a bill like this? This bill tells young people that you do not need to respect a person if they ask you to call them by their name. This tells young people that they can be the arbiters of who another person is just by looking at them or reading a piece of paper about that person. How are we to build a more kind society if this is the type of legislation that we are passing?

Additionally, I don't think that the legislators who have brought forth this bill have thought through the complexities and logistical issues that it presents. For example, what about an individual whose birth certificate says they are female and they go by the name "Sam" instead of "Samantha"? According to this legislation, shortened versions of names are allowable; however, "Sam" is a nickname used for both "Samantha", a "girl-coded name" by society, and "Samuel", a "boy-coded name" by society. Is it only okay for this student to go by "Sam" if they dress in typical "girls" clothes? If they dress more "boy-ish", will the principal have the leeway to decide that using a shortened name is inappropriate? All Wisconsinites should be extremely concerned that Wisconsin would be giving principals' the power to "look at" our students and determine who they are. What about people who are from other countries or have names in other languages? How will a principal determine if a name is aligned with their perception of a student's gender identity? What about students that use "American" names in classrooms so they do not constantly deal with their teacher saying their legal name wrong? Will the state be paying for each teacher to receive multilingual training? Or, will students and families of color and of immigrant backgrounds be required to do more work so they can experience school in the same way their white, US-born peers do?

My name is Rev. Douglas Clement, my pronouns are he/him/his, and I am an ordained United Methodist pastor serving in the state of Wisconsin. I am writing in opposition to the proposed AB 103.

Growing up, I was taught that being a Christian and being an American meant embracing the wide diversity of thought, practice, and personhood that exists in our communities. I remember learning how Jesus told us we were to "love one another" (John 13:34) and how, as people living in the United States, we had the right to "live, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness". While there have certainly been times when we haven't always lived up to these ideals, the act of striving for them (and of believing they should be for all people) were (as I understood it) fundamental to who we are.

As a United Methodist, I am part of a tradition and a movement that has fought throughout our history to make this a reality. Our own Social Principles call us to "condemn all attempts to deny individuals their basic rights or freedoms or to strip human beings of their inherent dignity and worth" and to "reject within the church and wider society any act of discrimination, hatred, or violence directed against individuals or groups based on national origin, tribal affiliation, ethnicity, age, gender identity, disability status, economic condition, sexual orientation, religious affiliation, or any other factors." (¶163, *The United Methodist Book of Discipline, 2020/2024*). Which is why I feel compelled to speak out against these bills.

AB 103 seeks to amend statute 118.125, such that it would "prohibit school staff from referring to a minor pupil by a name or pronoun that does not align with the pupil's biological sex without written authorization from the pupil's parent or guardian", and bar transgender students from living into their gender identity. By singling them out because they are transgender, this bill gives credence to the falsehood that they are somehow "dangerous" and "unsafe to be around". It gives space for hateful rhetoric, for bullying behavior, and for discriminatory practice. In fact, it *requires it* (by prohibiting these particular individuals from being identified and addressed according to their identity when no such prohibition exists for any other category of student).

There are multiple instances, both in scripture and in the history of our nation, where we have witnessed the consequences of our failure to include and care for those on the margins. As the Apostle Paul observed in his letter to the churches in Corinth, we are all members of one body (i.e. community). "If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honored, all rejoice together with it." (1 Corinthians 12:26). My name is Katie McGlasson, I'm a public high school teacher in Madison Wisconsin and live within the 53703 area code of Madison. I'm writing to encourage you to vote against the 2025 Assembly Bill 103. I'm honored to spend my days caring for and teaching some of the most vulnerable students in the 2nd largest district in our state, and have witnessed first hand how this bill will negatively impact and endanger students. Aside from the direct harm to the young people it will impact, this bill perpetuates dangerous and divisive narratives that distract from the real issues facing our state & specifically the real issues facing our schools.

A 2018 study in the Journal of Adolescent Health found that transgender youth who could use accurate names and pronouns experienced 71% fewer symptoms of severe depression, a 34% drop in reported suicidal thoughts and a 65% decrease in suicide attempts. Studies since then have reiterated these findings, and have outlined the connection between use of preferred names & pronouns and positive impact on mental health and suicide prevention.

Each year, I have students who want to be referred to by names or pronouns that for a variety of reasons, they do not feel comfortable being called at home. Explanation as to why youth would prefer to be referred to by different names and pronouns at school rather than with guardians have ranged from risks of being unsafe or becoming unhoused because of disagreements in beliefs within their household, youth wanting to be sure of their identities within a safe environment of peers before coming out to parents, or simply unnamed reasons. Whatever the student rationale is, this is something that I know goes towards improved mental health outcomes and can in some cases be an act of suicide prevention. That's enough for me. If an action I take can directly contribute to the positive wellbeing of my students, that is the course of action I am going to take.

As a teacher my priority is that students are able to learn. However, learning can only take place when students are safe, cared for, and are not overwhelmed by stress or anxiety. Respecting the wishes of students in how they're referred to is an easy way to address the safety and care needs which means they're more likely to engage in the learning aspect of schooling. Supporting student identities is a direct effort to support student learning.

Additionally, this topic hits close to home from when I was in school as a student. My own sibling, and many friends experienced severe mental health crisis' in their teens directly stemming from the unwillingness of family members to respect (not even support, just respect) their gender identities. When students aren't supported or safe at home, school can be one of the only places they experience structure, consistency, and care. By forcing schools to become an unwelcoming place, we're further isolating youth who are already deeply isolated.

I wish that I had the eloquence in this moment to really get my point across. This bill is part of a larger trend in narratives that divide our communities. It casts unwarranted distrust on our schools, isolates youth from their school & home communities, and puts staff in a position where they're forced to choose between care & basic human decency to the youth we've devoted our lives to and compliance with this bill. Additionally, it's another attack upon communities who are facing constant attacks in media & the legislatures. Continued legal attacks on LGBTQIA people only encourages

hateful rhetoric in schools, homes, and communities as it shows the government supports the dehumanization of this marginalized population. Hateful rhetoric leads to violence, which this community is already disproportionally subjected to.

I think as humans our decisions should be based on making sure we do the most good and the least harm to those around us. As those in some of the highest seats of power in our state, I ask you to take this into consideration. This bill does no tangible good. No one's lives will improve because of this bill. However, the harm that would be perpetuated by this bill is vast and will ripple out from our schools, creating greater harm within our broader community.

This bill has no respect for our youth nor any concern for their safety and wellbeing. I oppose it wholeheartedly and I request you do the same.

I am writing to urge you, most strongly, to **vote against AB 103** regarding use of student preferred names and pronouns in schools in Wisconsin. I believe it would lead to harmful results in several ways, with impacts on the students themselves and for school administrators and staff.

While a policy requiring parental written approval to change how a student is addressed may sound reasonable at first glance — sure, it would be nice if all children and teens felt comfortable discussing sensitive personal issues with their parents or guardians, and if all these adults were open-minded and supportive — we all know this is not the case. Many children who are wrestling with their identity start by keeping it close, among friends then perhaps at school if they feel staff will be supportive. Many parents would NOT accept these changes, and forcing children to keep their identity hidden will lead to more harm, anxiety, and mental health struggles.

Furthermore, a policy requiring written notification from parents will create new burdens for school administration and staff, who will have to collect and keep track of the forms, instruct and remind teachers which students are or are not allowed to request use of a different name or pronoun, develop procedures to monitor for and react to "violations" of said policy, etc. Our teachers are already burdened enough — please don't add more mandates and rule-following-requirements to make their jobs yet more stressful and force them to act against students' best interests.

As for my experience, I am a lifelong Madison resident, having attended public schools here while growing up. I now have two children who are MMSD high school students. My older child was struggling with anxiety and depression as they entered high school but mostly kept it hidden from parents and family. They came to identify as gender-nonconforming, and began using different pronouns and a variant of their given first name, first with friends and then at school. Even with liberal, supportive, LGBTQ-ally parents, the child was not comfortable raising the subject with us, despite having no overt reason to fear a hostile reaction. To the members of the Assembly Committee on Education,

My name is Isabel Haynes, I have lived in Madison my entire life, currently in the Tenney-Lapham neighborhood, 53704. I am a high school teacher. For the sake of the young people I teach, I am writing in opposition to Assembly Bill 103.

Adolescence has always been a time of transformative self discovery. For many young people, it is a time in their life when they first really begin to grapple with the question, "Who Am I?" In English class, I see students explore that question every day, in their writing, in their style, and in the conversations they have in and out of the classroom. I have had many students come through my classroom who have used a name that is different from the one their parents chose. In every single case, choosing that name and having it respected at school made the student feel more comfortable and more empowered to learn.

Many students who experiment with their gender in high school choose not to undergo a full gender transition. A girl in my 9th grade class this year spent most of her middle school years being addressed as a boy and going by a different name at school. Upon reaching high school, she decided that it no longer suited her and returned to the name her parents had given her. In a reflective essay she wrote last month, she spoke about her experience prior to middle school, feeling depressed, lonely, lacking the confidence to make friends or make herself seen in or out of school. Changing her name helped her feel independent, in control of her own self image, her own life, and her own learning. Knowing that she could change something so fundamental to her identity gave her the confidence to shape herself into the person she wanted to be. Now, she is a social butterfly; I could hardly believe that the 6th grader she described in her essay was the same person.

I often think about how stressful it must be for a teen, who is totally dependent on their parents, to tell them that the name they gave you doesn't feel right. To stand up and say, "In this part of my life, I know myself best." To take such a stand feels so significant, such a big leap, that to then go back on one's decision must feel like a surrender-an admission of being wrong. I can tell you with confidence that teens do not often admit they were wrong. This bill would force teens into legally changing their name before they can even use it where they learn and interact with their peers.

One of the most important aspects of high school education, in my professional opinion, is helping students become independent thinkers. Free thought is a cornerstone of our democracy and of a functional society. In an age where teens are constantly inundated with information and other people's opinions, blasted at them from a dozen social media sites every hour, they need to learn to think for themselves. To deny them the right to choose how they present themselves, how others refer to them, seems directly contrary to that ideal. It seems to project the message, "You are too young to know yourself or to make a decision about who you are." If they believe they are too young to have an opinion about their own name, why should they believe they are old enough to have an opinion about anything else?

Finally, I would be remiss if I did not mention the detrimental impact this policy will have on the safety and educational outcomes of transgender students. There are students who have made up their minds that they are not the gender they are assigned at birth and that the name they were given is not the name that represents them. Whether anyone else likes it or not, these students are committed to their identity. Using the wrong name for these students disrupts their learning and their often fragile mental health in a way I think many of you in this room would struggle to understand. One student described the experience as, "touching the side in operation but across your whole brain and body." Such a stressful experience completely shuts down the students cognitive functioning and makes them often entirely unreceptive to new information.

You might say that parents have a right to know if their child feels this way, but in many cases telling one's parents that one is transgender is a catastrophic life event. Many teens are disowned, kicked out of their homes, berated, or generally ostracized for even expressing these feelings. This causes further decline to their mental health and further reduction of their ability to learn. In cases where teens believe that their parents would be receptive to learning about their identity, they share their feelings with their families when they feel confident about their identity and their safety. I have had several conversations encouraging teens to speak with parents about their gender feelings and supporting them in having those conversations, rather than bottling those feelings up and suffering from them.

It is my job to educate every single child that comes into my classroom. Regardless of their identity or my own personal views. I want every student I teach to be comfortable partly because it is proven that a comfortable mental state significantly enhances learning outcomes. I have seen students use school as a place to explore who they are and in doing so, they become more outgoing and more actively engaged members of the class.

To conclude, I don't believe it is the job of the government to dictate how our young people choose to shape their own identities or to police the independent thoughts they have. In order for educators to do our jobs, we need students to feel safe and comfortable in school and I believe this bill directly undermines that objective. In addition to worsening some students' mental health and their trust in their educators, it deprives them of a method of self expression. It takes away an opportunity to learn something about themselves, to explore who they are. In my personal and professional opinion, this is directly contrary to the free thinking education we want our young people to have.

I've had the pleasure of spending a great deal of time with teachers over the years, as a student, as a friend, and as a partner, and while I know it is cliche to say, you will truly never find a more hardworking group of people. In fact, the very reason I'm writing this instead of my husband is that he is spending this evening (as he does nearly every other night of the week) doing even more teaching.

As a proud resident of Wisconsin and college educator, I feel it is my duty to speak out in opposition to proposed anti-trans legislation.

Wisconsin Assembly Bill 103 is an explicit attack on the rights of transgender and nonbinary youth. This bill imposes unnecessary, and I believe unconstitutional, barriers that will harm their well-being. This bill prioritizes a parent's control over a child's identity rather than respecting the young person's independence and self-awareness of their own gender identity. Authentic gender expression, and a safe place to do so, is essential for a student's mental health and academic success.

To that point, research shows over and over again that affirming a trans person's chosen name and pronouns dramatically reduces mental health risks. A 2018 study from The Journal of Adolescent Health determined that transgender youth who are permitted to use their chosen names had 71% fewer markers of severe depression and a 34% decrease in suicidal ideation. Additionally, the American Academy of Pediatrics and the National Association of School Psychologists emphasize that affirming gender identity is essential for student success and well-being. This is why I have always used a student's chosen name and pronouns with no questions asked.

Policies like AB103, which require parental approval before a student can be called their chosen name and pronouns, could expose trans youth to outing themselves in dangerous situations, such as if they live in abusive home environments where parents will take retaliatory transphobic action against them. Thus, this bill should be rejected as it may unnecessarily expose students to harm at home.

Moreover, this bill places an undue burden on teachers and school staff by requiring educators to police students' identities instead of fostering an inclusive learning environment. As a teacher myself, I firmly believe that schools should be places of support and must fight tirelessly against discrimination. We must resist our nation's recent backlash against trans people, which goes against our constitutional protections against discrimination based on an individual's gender identity.

In sum, AB103 would strip trans students of their fundamental right to determine who they are. Dear Committee on Education:

I am writing to oppose Assembly Bill 103 which addresses the use of a student's preferred names and pronouns at school. I grew up in Wisconsin and I am a graduate of Platteville High School and the University of Wisconsin School of Medicine and Public Health. I am a long term resident of Wisconsin, a physician and the parent of a transgender child who graduated from Platteville High School in 2016.

The goal of our schools is to educate our children. Schools try to create an environment that is conducive for learning. Using preferred names and pronouns shows respect for the students and does not detract from the learning experience. Misnaming or misgendering a child's preferred name and pronouns disrupts the child's ability to learn. I saw this when my child was misgendered or misnamed at school. My child would shut down mentally, not sure if they should correct the teacher and draw attention to themselves or let it slide and deny their identity. My child would not be able to focus on the class or to concentrate on school work. My child did much better academically in classes where a preferred name is used.

It takes time and money to legally change a name in Wisconsin. Changing gender on a birth certificate can be arduous if not impossible. These documents may not reflect a student's identity. I was trained as a physician to ask what name my patients want to be called by. This shows respect and facilitates the doctor patient relationship and doesn't require any paperwork or documentation. It is not hard to use a person's preferred name and pronoun. Many people go by a nickname which is used at school without needing to show documentation.

The process for a student to be called by their preferred name and pronoun seems lengthy and unnecessary. It is a hurdle that will disenfranchise a student and make them feel not a part of their school. Schools need to promote unity and inclusivity for an environment conducive to learning.

Many parents are supportive of their child using a preferred name and pronoun. Some parents are not. Outing a name and pronoun preference to a parent may put the child at risk of emotional and physical abuse. Some may be kicked out of the home. For their own safety at home a student may choose not to go by their preferred name and pronoun so as to not be outed to unsupportive parents. This will further isolate the student and add to their emotional stress. Again a situation that does not facilitate a learning environment.

In conclusion, using a student's preferred name and pronoun at school is respectful and does not interfere with the student's ability to learn. Using a student's preferred name and pronouns is not difficult and certainly does not require a lengthy process and legal documents. Teachers do this already. This bill would add stress to students and interfere with their education and potentially place them in harm's way. Please promote a quality education for all students in Wisconsin and do not move this bill forward.

My name is Miranda Hassett and I'd like to speak to AB103. I have read this bill in detail, and I can see how it probably sounds really reasonable to a lot of people. It's just saying that schools and teachers need parental permission to change the name or pronouns they use for a child; who could object to that? But as with a lot of proposed legislation dealing with transgender people, it actually makes things more complicated and difficult under the guise of something simple.

I'm a pastor, and my church community and extended church network includes a lot of families with transgender or nonbinary members - adults, youth, and kids. It is certainly true that we don't have a clear societal consensus on what to think when a young person says that they are trans or wants to try out a different name and pronouns. One way that manifests is that it's pretty common for parents not to be on the same page. Sometimes they work through it, listening to their child and each other, and learning from experts and from other families, and get to a place where both parents can support their child. (This process is explored really beautifully in the book Becoming Nicole, which I heartily recommend for anybody who wants to understand better what it's like for a family to learn that one of their young children is transgender.)

But sometimes disagreement over how to handle that situation deepens and can even become part of the fracturing of a marriage - or another battleground in a contentious co-parenting relationship after a marriage has already ended. In such a situation, it is deeply unfair and damaging to hold a child's needs hostage to a requirement a that both parents have to sign off on allowing a different name or pronouns to be used.

More broadly, I just don't understand what legislation like this is trying to accomplish. Republican legislators claim to be very concerned about gender-affirming medical care for transgender kids - though your concern would be more convincing if you were equally concerned about the same care when it's provided to cisgender kids. If you're concerned that medical care is too big a step, why are you making it more difficult for children to socially transition, and at least explore their identity and meet their needs in those ways? It makes it seem like you're not really concerned about the kids' wellbeing at all.

Members of the Education Committee:

Thank you for accepting my written testimony in lieu of personal attendance. I am writing in favor of the advancement of AB103 through committee.

In a civil society, one assumes that the parent or legal guardian of a minor child holds the primary responsibility for their child's upbringing and welfare. Even more basic than that, however, is the constitutional right of the parent or guardian to name their child. Frankly, the fact that this creates any contention at all is simultaneously laughable and tragic, so I commend Representative Dittrich, Senator Jacque, and all of this bill's co-sponsors for taking steps to secure our most basic constitutional rights.

Parents and guardians should not be faced with the battles that have plagued Eau Claire, Madison, and other Wisconsin school districts who have placed student privacy above parental rights. Parents and guardians have the right to direct the education of their children, and that includes the environment and identity of their children. The 2023 KMSD decision made great strides in clarifying this order of primacy, but we still lack statute. Unfortunately, this leaves our state vulnerable to bad actors who unduly place themselves into a position superior to a parent or guardian in a child's life. Schools are subject to parents in the natural and constitutional order, and it's time to enshrine this order statutorily.

Speaking colloquially: It's silly that we're even at this point, but here we are. I appreciate that the "adults in the room" are accepting the responsibility to advance this legislation that, hopefully with many other bills, will restore common sense and order in our great state. Thank you for advancing this bill; in doing so, you are protecting our children and our parental rights.

I am writing to oppose bills AB100 and AB103.

I have lived in Wisconsin for 47 years, have served our community as a healthcare worker, foster parent and community volunteer, and am speaking on my own behalf as a private citizen.

I strongly oppose these bills because trans children and youth, like all students, have the right to a supportive, caring, equal education free from harassment and discrimination.

Targeting children —who are just learning who they are— is unethical-and teaches all children that their community in Wisconsin does not support its children for who they are. Trans and non-binary youth have a very high suicide rate (Four-times increased risk compared to cisgendered youth) —and trans youth of color are even more at risk (upwards of 33% increased risk). We need to do all we can to help all children survive their childhood and thrive—and limiting them from sports and using the correct names/pronouns is only going to hurt them. I would like to start my testimony by focusing on the fact that, once again, the legislative body is considering interfering in the local control of elected school boards. Wisconsin school districts are many and varied. They are urban, suburban and rural and range in size from 68,000 students to 50 students. The local needs of those school districts can be vastly different from each other. This is why each district has a locally elected school board (who sometimes represent more people than our state representatives do) to manage the needs of their community's schools and students. We do not need the state legislature to dictate a one size fits all "solution" to a perceived problem in our schools. I think, in fact, that you would be hard pressed to find a district that doesn't have some sort of policy or procedure that covers every scenario that could exist in schools. Instead, I would love to see the legislature focus on partnering with us to ensure our schools are better places to learn and grow. I would love to sit down and have a conversation about what education in Wisconsin could look like if we worked together.

Dear Chair Kitchens,

Thank you for your service to our great state, and for the opportunity to submit thoughts regarding AB 103, and AB 100.

Speaking from the experience of one school board member to a former, I would ask that you focus on legislating real change that can help the districts in your area and around the state. I know you care about our kids.

Given the current state of affairs both in the state and at the federal level regarding education and education funding, I respectfully request that you and your committee work to address current issues that can make the lives of all Wisconsin students better, rather than on bills that are from a national mandate, override the local control (that you appreciated as a board member), or have already been addressed through collegiate or state organizations like NCAA or WIAA.

For example, the disparity in special education funding and reimbursement is the single most important issue for districts around the state. We also have child care, early childhood education, and literacy challenges in all counties of Wisconsin. Consideration of sum sufficient special education funding, fully funding early childhood education (4K), public-private partnerships, wrap-around care, and teacher training would go much farther in helping all Wisconsin families.

Additionally, how many students in Sturgeon Bay are receiving free and reduced price lunch or the community eligibility provision? How many students benefit from Title dollars? How would changes to Medicaid impact your students and constituents? How many of your students benefit from Pell grants, UW schools, or the technical college? These are all at risk at the federal level. What are you and your committee working on for these contingencies, are you considering what would happen if these programs all come back to the state?

There are some simple things that could be done by your committee legislatively that could help all school districts. For example, changing the start date for public schools to be commensurate with private schools, making the payment structure for school districts to have more state funding at the beginning of the budget cycle rather than at the end (to avoid short-term borrowing), and revising the seat time requirement so districts can innovate in delivery of career and technical education. These are all low hanging legislative fruit that will benefit all.

I respectfully ask you to focus on the many issues that can make real, positive change for kids and families in the communities your serve.

I am a mental health professional and can say from professional experience how much of a negative impact these bills will have on the mental health of our youth who are already very vulnerable. I've lived in Wisconsin my whole life and feel most scared for its future when extreme conservative Ideas like these try to take away rights of the people in my community. Please consider this testimony when making such an argument that effects the lives of everyday children.

My name is Tina Meister and I am speaking in strong opposition to bill AB100 & 103. I am here because the most beloved person in my life is trans. I am here because not too long ago I was sitting in the back of classrooms next to kids who knew their parents well, and that's precisely why they were scared. They were scared because they knew that they were entirely dependent on these adults who were the only ticket to their survival, no matter the cost, and some of them did put their survival on the line.

It's frustrating to me that my government hasn't managed to fulfill the basic needs of student's physical and mental wellbeing in their public education system, but is instead devoting time and resources producing bills to police children's bodies and safe personal expression.

Access to extracurricular activities should be the right of every child, no matter their gender presentation. I am alarmed and saddened to imagine the further exclusion and ostracization of children based on such an invasive and harmful bill. Children's sports are, fundamentally, about teaching our children teamwork, inclusion, and diversity of ability. What message are we sending to our kids when we strictly categorize and exclude a child based on information that, frankly, our schools should not be in the business of regulating? The emotional harm of forcing children to change in rooms they do not feel comfortable points to a solution more focused on gender-inclusivity and neutral options, not regulating and maintaining records of children's assigned sex.

Thank you for reading my testimony against both AB100 and AB103. My name is Blair Mosner Feltham. I live in Madison (53704). I am a long-time public school worker -- this is my 13th year working in public schools. I am also an elected member of the Madison Metropolitan School Board. Today, I write to you as an individual with experience in public schools, expertise in adolescent development, and a hope to see our state have a bright future.

The reason I am against these bills is because I don't think they support my hope for our state to have a bright future. These bills are both repressive, seeking to curtail the rights of individual children. I think in general, a bill that limits a child's expression of who they are or might be is probably a mistake. When you think about the future you want to live in, I wonder if you imagine that future as one where all children are forced by law to subscribe to particular ideas about who they are, or one where children's exploration and expression are protected by law.

Sometimes I hear that these repressive laws are necessary because, somehow, trans children are a threat to other people. That couldn't be further from the truth. Not only are trans children generally much more endangered (including by bills like this, which stigmatize them) than children who are not trans, their transness is not a threat to others. It is **not** true that trans athletes are damaging the sports experiences of non-trans students. I think that hateful, socially corrosive forces have manufactured this fear of threat, and I think they use the relative numbers of trans people to non-trans people to do it. I think members of this Committee should be skeptical of claims that a very small group of people who are themselves vulnerable are a threat to the whole and should think critically about why this issue is taking center stage when there are so many more pressing issues for children generally (including inadequate state funding for schools) and for girls in particular.

As for the question about school and student names and pronouns, the purpose of this bill is not to protect parents' rights--that claim is false rhetoric. The purpose of the bill is to tell young people and the people who serve them that being trans or wondering about who you are is a bad thing. Wondering about who you are, exploring, and experimenting are part of human development. Of course parents have rights, but I do not believe it is the right of the parent to say who the child is. Do you know the poem by Kahlil Gibran? It's beautiful and beautifully set to music by Sweet Honey in the Rock. Here's an excerpt:

"[Your children] come through you but not from you And though they are with you yet they belong not to you

You may give them your love but not your thoughts For they have their own thoughts You may house their bodies but not their souls For their souls dwell in the house of tomorrow

Which you cannot visit, not even in your dreams You may strive to be like them But seek not to make them like you For life goes not backward, nor tarries with yesterday"

Being trans is a wonderful way to be. Trans people, in making room for themselves, make more room for the rest of us. I know that there are people out there, maybe including you, who don't understand it or think it's weird, but the fear and distaste some people have about trans people is manufactured in order to repress and control all of us. This is an old manufactured fear, but it is not innate and it is not helpful for our state moving Forward to a brighter future.

Discomfort and danger are different things, and I urge you not to pass laws that are based on your personal discomfort.

I am writing to you to voice my opposition to two bills: Assembly Bill 100 and Assembly Bill 103.

Assembly Bill 100 is the latest step by lawmakers to discriminate against transgender people in our community. Transgender athletes make up less than a tenth of a percent of highschool athletes, and there is no research to prove that transgender students outperform or in any way receive greater recognition than other students in highschool sports. A transgender sports ban does NOT make sports safer for female athletes, who are much more likely to be endangered by their coaches and medical personnel than their fellow athletes. How would this ban be enforced, a genital inspection? The thought of such should make any reasonable person sick.

I was a student athlete, and I believe welcoming anyone interested into sports creates a better environment for all. I am writing today in opposition to bills AB 100 and AB 103. I am a social work professor and mental health researcher and a parent. While Republicans declare themselves to be for small government and personal liberty, they have taken aim at trans people's rights to normally engage in day to day life and define themselves in their day to day interactions. As a mental health researcher, I'm concerned about the effect of anti-trans legislation, as a 2024 article in the journal Nature Human Behavior (State-level anti-transgender laws increase past-year suicide attempts among transgender and non-binary young people in the USA, by Lee, Hobbs, et al) has found that the introduction of state-level anti-trans legislation increases the risk of suicide attempts in transgender youth. At a time when youth suicide rates are already higher than the historical average, we must take every possible step to avoid the irreparable harm of bills such as AB 100 and AB 103.

Regarding AB 100 - it is an example of governmental overreach, with no public benefit. Rep Dittrich stated that approximately "a half dozen" transgender youth are involved in school sports in Wisconsin. Creating legislation that is targeted at less than 10 youth in the entire state is inappropriate and harmful. This also violates the privacy of youth athletes, by aggressively questioning by their presenting gender.

Regarding AB 103 - youth should have the freedom to define themselves and how they wish to be addressed. Parents do not own their children and school districts should honor their right to choose how they are acknowledged and addressed in the school room. Schools should work to make sure all youth are accepted by their school communities, not create barriers against self expression. There is no one harmed by a student being able to make choices regarding how they prefer to be addressed.

Thank you for taking the time to read my letter.

I am writing to express my opposition to legislation regarding student name and pronoun use (AB100) and gender-based restrictions in school sports (AB103). These bills impose unnecessary and harmful restrictions on students and infringe on personal and parental rights while also creating exclusionary and hostile environments for transgender, non-binary, and potentially gay and lesbian youth.

Both bills strip students of individuality and uniqueness and disregard their fundamental right to be unique. While it has been a while since I attended elementary, middle, or high school, it was awkward for all of us. Schools often represent safe spaces for youth. It is a space where we can find adults to confide in, grow our circle of friends, and experience all the weirdness of growing up. Forcing schools to effectively out a small population of students removes the safety net provided by schools. It ruins the trust of instructors, principals, and administrators. These policies are not in place to protect students but to discriminate against them. There is nothing supporting student well-being in these bills. Forcing children to withhold their identity leads to poor mental health, poorer grades, and poor overall well-being.

Restricting sports to "biological sex" ruins intramural sports and team building at large while creating exclusionary environments. What is crucial about sports is that they allow people to participate in athletics, which affirms and builds confidence regardless of identity. Athletics also provide mentoring, leadership, discipline, and personal growth opportunities. If the fear is trans or non-binary youth sharing locker rooms and bathrooms with cisgender youth, the remedy is simple: Gender-inclusive locker rooms and bathrooms make those spaces safer for all.

Moreover, we are discussing a student body comprising 0.6-1.5% of the teen population. The LGBTQ youth of Wisconsin is fragile and tender and needs any support they can find. They feel more awkward than their peers. My students know I may not recall their names, but my goal as an educator is to see them for who they are and not what they are. When we start seeing youth for who they are, their confidence blossoms.

These bills do not serve the best interests of Wisconsin students. They contribute to stigma, discrimination, and harm against a vulnerable population. I urge you to oppose these measures and focus on policies that better support our students and educators. We must ensure our schools are welcoming, inviting, and inclusive learning environments.

My name is Ashley Jolly, and I am a counselor working in Janesville, Wisconsin at Empowered Therapy LLC. I am writing to you today to speak on behalf of the mental health and well-being of all students, particularly transgender and nonbinary youth, who are directly impacted by policies AB100 and AB103 which aims to restrict students' choice of name and gender use in schools and limit their participation in sports. I firmly oppose AB100 and AB103 and hope that you will do the same.

As a mental health professional, I work with young people every day. I see the devastating effects of rejection, isolation, and systemic barriers to identity affirmation. Research is clear: when transgender students are supported—when their names and pronouns are respected and they are allowed to participate fully in school life—their mental health outcomes improve significantly. Conversely, when they face restrictive policies, their risk of anxiety, depression, self-harm, and suicide increases. A study published in by the Journal of Adolecent health found that using a trans student's chosen name in affirming environments reduced suicide risk by over 56%.

School should be a place where every student feels safe, valued, and able to learn. Forcing educators to police names and pronouns, or banning students from sports teams that align with their identities, sends a message that some students don't belong. This is not just a political issue—it's a crisis of mental health and human dignity.

Policies that target transgender youth do not protect anyone; they harm some of our most vulnerable students. Instead of placing unnecessary restrictions, we should be fostering environments of belonging, where every student has the chance to thrive. As legislators, I urge you to listen to the mental health professionals, the educators, and most importantly, the students themselves. Their well-being and lives depend on it.

As a cisgender woman and a former high school varsity athlete from Port Washington, Wisconsin, I can tell you that the genitalia of my teammates were not among my many high school concerns. I was a lot more concerned about the mental health of my teammates, a common challenge for transgender people. There is research that shows that teens who get gender affirming care have better mental health than transgender people who wait until they are adults--I have attached the scientific study here.

Just because a competitor was born male doesn't mean they're going to be better than every girl on the team. This bill totally ignores the complexity of the biologic picture and the variation of human ability, in addition to the mental health of transgender students being forced into a role that doesn't fit them. It ignores the fact that transgender girls on hormone replacement therapy are likely to perform similarly to other girls on the teamand if they're better, it might just be because they're great athletes, not because they're transgender. There were plenty of girls that were significantly better than I was, and plenty that were worse, and transgender kids can fall anywhere on that spectrum just like anyone else. Testimony on AB103 and AB100 Hannah Sedlacek

Hello, my name is Hannah Sedlacek, and I am a proud member of the LGBTQ+ community living in Dane County for the past 2 years. As someone who works closely with LGBTQ+ teens, I am deeply troubled by AB103 and AB100. These bills do not exist to protect children—they exist to erase trans kids, perpetuate stigma, and force them into environments where they are unsafe, unwelcome, and unseen.

We know the harm that policies like these cause. Research has consistently shown that **increased stigma, forced silence, and an unsupportive atmosphere lead to poor mental health outcomes and increased risk of suicide.** According to The Trevor Project, LGBTQ+ youth who live in affirming communities attempt suicide at **less than half the rate** of those in unaccepting environments. These bills send a clear message to trans kids: *You don't belong. You aren't wanted. You aren't valid.* And for many, that message can be deadly.

Forcing trans students to be misgendered by teachers, to use facilities that do not align with their gender, and to be excluded from sports is not about fairness—it is about control. It is about **punishing** trans kids for existing and forcing them into spaces that actively endanger them.

So I ask you: Are you willing to abandon these kids for the comfort of a few?

Silence is not a shield. The cost of inaction is too great. We have a responsibility to protect all children in our communities—including trans children. We do not get to pick and choose which kids deserve safety, dignity, and belonging.

Let's choose **courage** over fear. Let's choose **integrity** over silence. And most importantly, let's choose **them**. I am writing today in opposition to bills AB 100 and AB 103. I am a Psychiatric Nurse Practitioner in Milwaukee and mother of two small children. While Republicans declare themselves to be for small government and personal liberty, they have taken aim at trans people's rights to normally engage in day to day life and define themselves in their day to day interactions. As a mental health provider, I'm concerned about the effect of anti-trans legislation, as a 2024 article in the journal Nature Human Behavior (Statelevel anti-transgender laws increase past-year suicide attempts among transgender and non-binary young people in the USA, by Lee, Hobbs, et al) has found that the introduction of state-level anti-trans legislation increases the risk of suicide attempts in transgender youth. At a time when youth suicide rates are already higher than the historical average, we must take every possible step to avoid the irreparable harm of bills such as AB 100 and AB 103.

Regarding AB 100 - it is an example of governmental overreach, with no public benefit. Rep Dittrich stated that approximately "a half dozen" transgender youth are involved in school sports in Wisconsin. Creating legislation that is targeted at less than 10 youth in the entire state is inappropriate and harmful. This also violates the privacy of youth athletes, by aggressively questioning what their presenting gender.

Regarding AB 103 - youth should have the freedom to define themselves and how they wish to be addressed. Parents do not own their children and school districts should honor their right to choose how they are ackowledged and addressed in the school room. Schools should work to make sure all youth are accepted by their school communities, not create barriers against self expression. There is no one harmed by a student being able to make choices regarding how they prefer to be addressed.

My name is Scott Hershberger, and I am a Madison resident. I am testifying that two bills currently before the Assembly, AB100 and AB103, would have a negative impact on our students and should not become law. I am a straight, cisgender man, but I have many transgender friends who would have been harmed by this legislation if they were still in school.

I had several transgender friends in high school. My college roommate (still a dear friend years later) is a trans man. Many people in my current friend group are trans women. All these friends have shared with me painful stories of discrimination that they faced after coming out individual acts of dehumanization as well as policies that created huge bureaucratic hurdles and decreased their quality of life.

When people call them by a name or pronoun that they do not identify with, this creates deep emotional wounds. If this has never happened to you, take a moment and imagine someone intentionally doing it to you. Maybe there was a bully when you were in school who always called you a name you hated. It doesn't feel good. Now imagine your teachers calling you that name, over and over. That's dehumanizing, and that would have long-lasting mental health impacts. That's what AB103 would do to trans kids.

Now, imagine that you went through this trauma because you wanted to get a competitive edge in sports. Would that be worth it? No, it wouldn't. Trans kids who are athletes just want to be kids playing sports as their authentic selves. One of my friends who is a trans man played soccer growing up, both before and after he transitioned. He had a much more positive experience after the transition, once he was playing with other boys. And his teammates were happy to have him. AB100 would prevent kids from enjoying sports the way every kid should be able to. Again, this would cause long-lasting harm to their mental health.

It's easy to think that these policies would only hurt trans kids. But that's wrong. These policies would hurt all kids by teaching them to discriminate, teaching them to ignore others' wishes, teaching them to disrespect their peers.

Instead of institutionalizing discrimination, we need to institutionalize empathy and understanding. We need to educate our kids with the tools to value everyone's perspectives so that they can interact respectfully regardless of gender identity.

Statement of Opposition to Assembly Bills 100 and 103:

Dear Members of the Assembly Committee on Education,

I strongly oppose Assembly Bill 100, the proposed transgender athlete ban, and Assembly Bill 103, which would restrict the rights of transgender students to use their correct names and pronouns. These bills are not only unnecessary but potentially devastating to an already vulnerable population.

Impact on Mental Health and Suicide Risk:

We cannot ignore the severe mental health implications of such discriminatory legislation. According to data from the Trevor Project, 85% of transgender and nonbinary youth report that political attacks on their identity have negatively impacted their mental health. More alarmingly, studies consistently show that transgender youth experience disproportionately high rates of depression, anxiety, and suicidal ideation compared to their cisgender peers. When we exclude young people from activities fundamental to social development and well-being, and deny them the basic dignity of being addressed by their correct names and pronouns, we compound these risks. Transgender youth who feel supported in their identity and included in school activities show significantly better mental health outcomes. By contrast, exclusionary policies increase feelings of isolation and rejection precisely the factors that contribute to the heartbreakingly high suicide attempt rates among transgender youth.

The Reality of Transgender Participation in Sports:

AB100 purports to solve a problem that simply doesn't exist at scale. Transgender youth represent approximately 1.4% of the youth population, and only a fraction of these young people participate in competitive sports. In states that have already implemented inclusive policies for years, there has been no evidence of widespread competitive advantage or disruption. The Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association already has thoughtful policies in place to ensure fair competition while being inclusive of transgender athletes. This bill represents unnecessary government overreach into decisions best left to athletic associations, schools, medical professionals, and families.

Benefits of Inclusion vs. Costs of Exclusion:

Sports participation provides all youth with critical opportunities for physical health, teamwork, leadership development, and social connection. For transgender youth specifically, inclusion in sports can be life-affirming, offering a place of belonging during a challenging developmental period. The supposed "costs" of inclusion have been greatly exaggerated. When implemented with appropriate guidelines, transgender inclusion in sports preserves both competitive fairness and the dignity of all athletes. By contrast, the costs of exclusion are concrete and severe: increased mental health risks, decreased physical activity, lost educational opportunities, and the message to transgender youth that they don't belong in our communities. Similarly, AB103's restrictions on name and pronoun use would create hostile learning environments where transgender students are constantly misgendered, undermining their sense of safety and belonging in educational settings that should be supportive for all students. I urge this committee to reject both of these harmful bills and instead focus on policies

that support the well-being of all Wisconsin youth. Every child deserves to participate fully in school life, including sports, and to be recognized for who they truly are, regardless of gender identity. Our transgender youth are watching to see if you will stand up for their rights to simply be kids - playing the sports they love and being addressed with the basic respect all students deserve.

On behalf of the LGBT Center of SE Wisconsin, we oppose the passing of AB 100/103, which prohibits trans athletes in Wisconsin from participating in college and K-12 sports that align with their gender identity.

It is discriminatory to prevent trans athletes from competing on the teams and in the individual events that align with their gender identity. Discrimination has no place in athletics. Period.

Athletics is about inclusivity, setting individual goals, working as a team, and creating confidence and a sense of well-being. If we think that winning is the only goal of college athletics, we have lost the purpose of 18-21-year-olds competing in sports.

The real losers of this bill will be all female athletes, especially those who don't conform to gender norms regardless of whether they are cisgender, transgender, or gender non-conforming. Preventing trans athletes from competing will mean you have to test. That would be an invasive procedure to determine genitalia, chromosomes, and other features that an athletic director would use against anyone they chose. My name is Julie Guckenberg. I live in Wauwatosa, in the 53213 zip code, in Wisconsin Assembly District 13 and Senate District 5. I have lived in Wisconsin for over 14 years. I have 2 kids who attend public schools in Wauwatosa, and I am deeply concerned with the proposed AB103 and AB100.

I am writing to urge you to vote against these bills, AB100 and AB103. These bills harm children and deny them equal opportunity. Transgender kids deserve the same opportunities as cisgender kids. Trying to legislate the experiences of children in our schools will serve only to belittle them. As a proud lifelong Wisconsinite and former public school educator, I vehemently oppose Assembly Bills 100 and 103. These bills stand contrary to the Wisconsin motto of "Forward" and our strong progressive history, and will only harm the young people of our great state.

During my tenure as a Wisconsin public educator and now as an arts educator for Wisconsin non-profits, I see every day the positive impact respecting children for who they are and valuing each unique child can have on young lives. I have worked with many children who use names and pronouns that are different from those assigned to them at birth. Calling them by their names and by correct pronouns is the most basic of ways that I show respect as an adult in their lives. It is that simple: I respect them and value them, and I want them to know it.

To force educators to use names and pronouns that do not match a child's identity is denying them the basic respect all humans deserve and shows them that school is not a safe place for them. With school shootings and lockdown drills making our children afraid for their lives, shouldn't they at least be able to feel that school is a safe place just to be who they are? It may seem like a small thing, but to that young person, it can be everything.

Also, in all my years as an educator, I have seen how much participation in extracurriculars can be a worthwhile and powerful experience for students. Students who are in a sport, or a play, or clubs, or any other activity are more invested in the school experience. They find community, they learn new skills, they expand their circle of trusted adults, they are more invested in academics, and they discover more about who they are. Denying this opportunity to students because of their gender identity is just wrong. Why should only cisgender young people have the experience of being on a team?

I remember several years ago, working as part of the production team at a local high school. We had several students who were gender non-conforming. The students used the dressing rooms that worked for them. Their peers had no ill-will, no fear, no anger about sharing their dressing rooms. Those few students who were given the opportunity to be in spaces that felt right to them appreciated it so much; they felt seen. Don't we all just want to be seen for who we are? Why should only those of us who just happen to identify with the gender we were assigned at birth be the only ones who get to feel that way?

According to a study published in fall of 2024 in the journal *Nature Human Behavior*, the rates of suicide attempts among trans and gender nonconforming youth who live in states that passed laws aimed at these minors saw a marked increase up to 72%. Do you want the blood of Wisconsin children on your hands? Because young people will lose hope in the face of their government telling them they should not exist. And some of them will choose to no longer.

My name is Kat Kaybee and I am a resident of Milwaukee, WI. I am testifying against Assembly Bill 100 and Assembly Bill 103. I was an elementary teaching assistant at a character-education-based charter school for four years, and I'm a trans/non-binary adult who was out to my school community - teachers, students, and parents alike. I am sickened by the lack of compassion and understanding being shown in these bills, and the insertion of the government in the private business of individuals.

During my time in the classroom, I interacted with hundreds of different students. A handful of these children were trans/non-binary, but for most students, I was the first out trans person that they met. Let's talk about me as a trans adult in that space. Do you want to know what impact my transness had on them? For cis students, it made them aware of another type of person they can encounter in the world. It confused them sometimes, just like any new piece of information might confuse someone as they add that information to what they already know, but that's to be expected as kids learn about new things in the world. But for trans students, my transness gave them an adult they could trust and be honest with about their inner feelings of self - someone who actually understood what they were going through.

Transness is being talked about as this big, scary, deviant "other" when it's just another way of being. The trans/non-binary children who passed through my classroom were just like any other kid. They had homework to worry about, soccer tryouts to practice for, piano lessons they were dreading, friends who ate lunch with them every day... And teachers who loved them and wanted to provide a caring, nurturing environment for them to grow to be their best selves. For some kids, that's going to mean social transitioning, a.k.a. going by a different name and different pronouns. And some kids who want to start that social transition don't have adults at home who would respond with care and nurturing like their teacher would. This is what adults who are afraid of children transitioning are missing.

There are countless situations where the only adult a child trusts is at school, for whatever the reason may be. Likewise, there are important, overlooked reasons that some children are asking *teachers* to call them a new name/new pronouns *without* asking their parents the same thing. These kids are having to do the hardest and saddest thing a kid could ever have to do - weigh whether or not their adult at home is a safe adult or not. I know that sounds harsh against those parents - I know that those parents are worrying about what is best for their child. They fear permanent change that'll be regretted, or they fear damnation, or they simply fear something they're unfamiliar with. But outing a kid to parents who would keep their kid from transitioning doesn't make the feelings of transness go away - it puts them in danger, and pushes them away further, showing them exactly who they can and can't trust with their truest self. If a kid doesn't want their parents to know they are trans, the issue isn't the teachers at school "hiding" this information. The issue is parents who let fear overcome their responsibility to love UNCONDITIONALLY. *Why* does that kid not want their parents to know? What resources

can we provide to support children who don't feel safe to be themselves at home and who don't feel that trust with their guardian? What resources can we provide their guardians? To the Members of the Assembly Committee on Education,

My name is Rev. Rachel Young Binter and I am a resident of Milwaukee, residing at 1830 N 51st Street, 53208. I am also the mother of a trans daughter and served as a pastor to many trans and nonbinary youth in my former call as a Lutheran campus pastor at UW-Milwaukee.

I am writing to oppose AB100 and AB103, which would strip the rights away from transgender athletes to play sports or use locker rooms that align with their gender and eliminate the right for trans students to use the name and pronouns they identify with in our schools.

These bills actively discriminate against and harm children born with a whole body that does not conform to the gender assigned to them at their birth based on a part of their body. These bills also actively dismiss the science that documents that there is and always has been gender diversity within the chromosomes, hormones, brains, and organs of human beings and that this means intersex, non-binary, and transgender people have always existed within the human population.

Children within these minority populations already face tremendous obstacles in navigating the world and society, with 82% of all transgender individuals having considered suicide and a full 40% attempting. A recent peer reviewed study by the Trevor Project found that suicide attempts increase as much as an additional 72% for transgender and gender noncomforming teenagers in states that pass anti-transgender laws aimed at minors.

As a mother and pastor to trans people, these numbers are not abstract to me. They represent gifted, beautiful young people that I know and love - many of whom almost did not make it as they fought to find their way in a world that is fearful and turned against them. They include my own most precious child, who I carried into existence through my own body, held at my chest as my first born, and have loved since her first breath. My daughter is funny and smart and adored by her family and friends. She gives back to our community daily in the challenging work she does compassionately caring for vulnerable populations of people in the emergency room of a local hospital. She is an advocate for the least among us, as taught to her by her pastor mother, the congregations in which she grew up, and the teachings of Jesus Christ. She grounds my life with her wisdom and makes me a better Christian every day through the witness of her own courage.

Like so many parents of trans children, however, I almost lost her as she faced the struggle of coming out. She knew I would advocate for her life, but she knew the rest of the world would not, and it was the hardest thing she has ever done, but she knows if she hadn't done it, she wouldn't be alive. She is here and contributing to the world with power and grace because she has chosen to stop fighting who God created her to be and has finally allowed others to see her as I trust God has always seen her. Yet I constantly live with the fear that someone will beat her or take her life because we live in a society that is demonizing her very existence. There is nothing holy about denying people the right to exist as God created them to be. Jesus, in the Gospel of Matthew, says of the gender nonconforming people of his time, the eunuchs, "For there are eunuchs who were born that way, and there are eunuchs who have been made eunuchs by others—and there are those who choose to live like eunuchs for the sake of the kingdom of heaven. The one who can accept this should accept it." I don't know why government officials feel they can legislate against people Jesus himself accepted and against a biblical witness that uplifts again and again our need to love and care for those who are vulnerable in our society. I don't know why the life of my daughter and other children, who it is proven will gain strength to live by being able to play sports with friends and be called by the names and pronouns that affirm their innermost being, are being actively targeted by laws that will take their lives away from them. I don't know why sports are considered more holy than the life of a human being, especially when people of all genders have widely different levels of strength, agility, and capacity. (I can assure you, my daughter would be no threat on any sports team, even before estrogen decreased her strength and muscle mass). I don't know why scientific knowledge of the diversity of humankind is being ignored in order to punish innocent children who want to thrive in the bodies given to them.

This legislation is cruel and defies what has proven to be true, which is that the lives of gender nonconforming children are stabilized by even one caring adult or institution. As a mother who lives every day swallowing down the fear that her child will come to harm in a world mounting against her and that I will face the greatest fear of her life being taken away from me, I beg you to oppose this legislation. I beg you on behalf of myself, I beg you on behalf of the two other women I work with with trans children and every parent of a trans child, and I beg you on behalf of our society that needs the gifts our children bring to the world. In my many years of campus ministry, it was so often my trans and nonbinary students who brought the biggest and most caring hearts into the room, because they knew how life saving it was to have someone care for them and this is true of my child as well. I believe this is why Jesus tells us that salvation will come from the least among us. May we listen to him and protect those who carry in their very holy, God-created bodies our own path into the kingdom of heaven.

Amie Hoag Regarding AB100 and AB103 6 March 2025

Hello, I'm Amie Hoag, and I've lived in Wisconsin most of my life. I've chosen to raise my daughter here because I know the people of Wisconsin are some of the most genuinely kind people on the planet. What is represented in AB100 and AB103 does not represent Wisconsin.

I'm reading a book called *An Immense World* by Ed Yong. This book explores the senses of the animal kingdom, laying out the way mammals, birds, insects, fish, and reptiles experience the world around them, and how different it is from the way humans experience that same world. It even goes so far to explore how human beings experience some senses, like the sense of smell, in wholly unique ways. For some people, for example, sweaty gym socks smell like vanilla. Imagine that. Doesn't smell like vanilla to me.

Why am I talking about sweaty gym socks when we're talking about transgender kids in Wisconsin? Because this is just one illustration of how each one of us experiences this vast and mysterious world in our own unique way, and it's harmful to assume that the way I experience the world is the *only* way to experience the world — or the *right* way to experience the world.

This legislation, AB100 and AB103, take aim at a remarkably vulnerable part of our population. Children are already naturally vulnerable, and children who are being told they can't be who they know at their core they are? Well, they are the ones we need to protect the most.

These pieces of legislation amount bullying for that vulnerable population and fear-mongering for the broader population. I took a look at the numbers.

- * According to the Williams Institute at UCLA, **0.6% of the US population** age 13 and older identifies as transgender.
- * In Wisconsin, there are a little more than **412,000 middle and high school students**, about 7% of our state's total population of 5.961 million.
- * If you apply that nation-wide percentage to the middle and high school populations in Wisconsin, that means we have about 2,472 transgender students in the state of Wisconsin, which amounts to about 0.04% of our state's total population.
- * Let's go a little further. Wisconsin has 359 middle schools and 514 high schools, for a total of 873. That means there is **an average of fewer than 3 transgender students at each school.** Hardly enough to make a sports team out of, and certainly not a burden to learn the preferred names of.

Now, I know that transgender numbers are certainly underreported — and who could blame a kid for hesitating to share who they really are in an environment like this? But if you take those numbers at face value, that means this body is targeting 0.04% of our state's population, an average of less than 3 kids per school. **If that isn't bullying, what is?**

Laws like these not only make our state less safe for this small population of vulnerable kids, they make it less safe for every single person. Because where will you draw the line? How about you draw it right here and vote no on this discriminatory and bigoted legislation.

As a cisgender female, I do not fear my transgender siblings nor competing with them. Furthermore, I am fully capable of taking care of myself in all situations and do not need your so-called "protection" of me.

AB100 would prohibit those assigned as males on their birth certificates from participating in sports usually ascribed to females. AB100 would also prohibit males from access to locker rooms assigned to females.88 I I⁹9⁹

While on its face these may seem reasonable, the reality is quite different. Further consideration of both bills indicates a troubling, and unnecessary, point-of-view that females are in need of protection from males. If this is not the case, why did you not propose a similar bill prohibiting those assigned as females from participating in sports usually ascribed to males? Let me be very clear that I would oppose such a bill as a violation of Title IX and the Senate rejection of a bill excluding transgender students from school sports (https://www.aclu.org/press-releases/senate-rejects-bill-excluding-transgender-students-from-school-sports.)

AB103 would require schools and their staffs to address students solely by their legal name as stated on their birth certificate and refer to students using solely pronouns that are consistent with the gender ascribed to them on their birth certificate. This would shut down students' process of inquiry into who they are and who they want to be and isn't restricted to names and pronouns but also education and career paths. I am writing in opposition to Assembly Bills 100 and 103. I am a nurse practitioner and certified nurse-midwife and have worked with many transgender patients and provided education and training to staff on transgender healthcare throughout my career. Additionally, I count a number of transgender individuals as dear friends.

It is well established among major medical organizations that gender affirming care is life saving care. Often one of the first steps a transgender individual takes towards gender affirmation is using pronouns and/or a name that aligns with their gender. Perhaps you have never known a transgender individual, perhaps you have never seen the joy and relief when their most basic request about their bodily autonomy is respected and honored. Perhaps also, you have never seen the harm it can do to be denied this respect. I ask you to consider how it would feel for you to be called by a name or pronoun that does not align with your personal sense of who you are - it is no different for transgender folks.

In a perfect world all transgender youth would find love and support from their parents, sadly this is not the world we live in and by requiring educators to deny the identity of their students without explicit parental consent, this bill creates an unnecessary barrier to teacher student trust, student learning and has the potential to cause even greater harm. School may be the only safe place for a student to be out as transgender. Are you aware that transgender youth have higher rates of suicidality than their cisgender peers? Are you also aware that this difference in rates drops dramatically when they are able to live in alignment with their gender?

For all of the reasons listed above I also oppose the restriction of transgender youth from participating in sports that align with their gender. Passing a bill to ban a very small percentage of students from enjoying the experience and opportunities that school sports provide seems unnecessarily cruel. Furthermore, determining the students eligibility for sports based upon "biological sex" bases the law on the false premise that biological sex is easily defined and falls into a binary.

I use the strongest evidence and guidelines-based care to help me support my patients' health goals. It is distressing to see proposed laws and policies go against biological facts, scientific evidence, and medical guidelines. I urge you to reject these anti-science, anti-medical, and ultimately anti-child bills, which will put transgender, non-binary, and gender non-conforming children at risk. Schools and sports are supposed to be safe spaces for children, and these bills would make them less safe.

I am a Wisconsin parent of two boys. When I was a kid, I tried desperately to fit in. Sometimes I wanted to be cool, sometimes I just didn't want to get made fun of, and sometimes I just wanted to blend in. I was like a lot of kids.

My parents loved me. They supported me and gave me lots of opportunities. Even with that love, I didn't always feel comfortable telling them everything, at least not at first (like when I knew I was doing poorly in a class at school, when I crashed my car, when I started dating someone new, etc). But, eventually I would share most of these things with them, because I knew they loved me. I just needed time to figure out how I was feeling about it first and how I wanted to bring it up. I think lots of kids go through this.

If we want kids to be open with parents and heed our advice, we can't legislate the procedures by which these uncomfortable topics must be shared. As a parent, being patient often allows me to hear the most honest story from my own kids and creates a space where they are most open to my opinions.

I think AB100 and AB103 will ultimately make these difficult situations harder for parents to navigate. Kids will be less likely to share how they are feeling with their parents and will be less likely to hear and follow their parents' wisdom.

My name is Harper DePagter and I am from Brown Deer, WI 53223. I am writing to express my opposition to AB 100 and AB 100. I am a transgender woman educator who taught social studies and science to 5-12th graders. Two weeks ago I lost my teaching position in part of the attack on DEI and transgender individuals. Wisconsin already has a teacher shortage so why are we trying to make it worse? Instead of focusing on improving our education in our schools like our reading and math scores, the elected officials of the Assembly and Senate take it upon themselves to target an extremely small minority group of people and make their lives more difficult.

Lessons can be learned from social studies teachers and the attacks on minority groups in American history. An example is the Declaration of Independence when women, freed blacks, and Native Indigenous people were left out of the identifying as "all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness." Then when the Constitution was written once again women, freed blacks and Indigenous people were left out of the Constitution to have any rights. It has taken several movements and Constitutional Amendments to start to establish Constitutional rights for minority groups. Each time in American history when a minority group of people is "noticed" by the majority, the majority has the power to create laws to restrict and make the minority group of people's lives more difficult. How is it that we still have not learned from our past and continue to make the same mistakes over and over again? We are ALL human beings. The Constitution says "We the people," transgender men and women are people, or like I say to all my students we are ALL humans.

Transgender humans want to be like any other human being. They have emotions and feelings just like a cis human. In AB 100 it states "Sex" means the sex determined at birth by a physician and reflected on the birth certificate." I have taught science and unless each physician performs a DNA test to determine the actual chromosomal sex, the physical appearance at birth can be deceiving because there are intersex humans. "Intersex is a general term used to refer to individuals born with, or who develop naturally in puberty, biological sex characteristics that are not typically male or female. That is, a person with an intersex condition is born with sex chromosomes, external genitalia, or an internal reproductive system that is not considered typical for a male or female." Examples of chromosomal intersex are XXX, XXY, and X. The expression: don't judge a book by its cover resonates in this context.

As a transgender woman, I wish I had the opportunity to grow up as my authentic self in a safe space; however, growing up in Oostburg Wisconsin, which is a small rural Christian community it was extremely difficult to be my authentic self. I hid for almost 30 years and I caused severe microaggressions on myself because I lived in fear of the hate I would receive. When I came out in 2022 to my family who still live in Oostburg, I received the worst hateful things said to me by my mother, father, brother, sister, and grandparents. I wasn't accepted. I was cast out of the community. I was still human and I was just trying to live as my authentic transgender self and be joyful but for some reason, the beliefs they had were to hate me and attack me because I am different. The Wisconsin State Assembly and Senate are no different than my family attacking me with hateful messages. It is also no different than what the federal government is doing. There is no unity in these bills to make Wisconsin better when it focuses on such a small minority of people. Invest in our future by investing in our families, education, mental health, and our economy. Do not create a problem where there is no problem because then nothing gets accomplished for the people of

Wisconsin. There are working lower-class families who are feeling the effects of the Trump administration tariffs and what does this Wisconsin Legislature focus on, AB 100 restricting transgender girls from participating in girl's sports and AB 103 legal name change with pronouns. Nothing in the bills addresses restricting transgender boys from not participating in boy's sports. AB 100 is unconstitutional because it only focuses on only half the population of a minority group. AB 103 violates Title VII.

I have heard from both sides of the aisle of government overreach and the guilty party only has to look in the mirror. Why is the government and politicians so concerned with someone else's life and what they are called based on pronouns? I find it a little hypocritical that the Trump administration and Republicans wants Americans to call the Gulf of Mexico now the Gulf of America. Well, Gulf America is now its chosen name and we can't do that because that is considered DEI. See how ridiculous it sounds out loud when one gets that nit-picky about a name and pronouns. As a teacher who just wants her students to recognize me as a human being trying to be my authentic self and do the job she loves to be called Ms. D., I am not in the classroom to indoctrinate the students, if I was going to do that, I would have indoctrinated all students to complete all school work on time and never get off task. I loved my students and I loved teaching. The real issue has been creating problems for teachers and not letting them do their jobs. Students trust their teachers and teachers provide safe places for students. When I came out in 2022 as a transgender teacher I created a safe place for students; however, colleagues and community members had a different view of me. I was sexually harassed at the school I worked at in 2022 and I was blamed for the sexual harassment. The administration said it was my fault. Once again, they wanted to put the fear into the community that I was a groomer and predator in the classroom. Hateful words were spoken about me that were completely untrue. It's one thing to be an adult and hear these words but imagine a teenager who is transgender who might have to hear these same words said to them. Of course, none of you will ever know what it is like to be transgender. I encourage you to have a conversation with a transgender individual. Actually, have eight different conversations with them before voting on the bill because that is how many times it takes to make an impression on someone.

Transgender people should not see their rights restricted like all other racial, ethnic, and cultural groups and women before them who had to fight for over a hundred years for their rights. It is 2025 and we should be better than its 1789 restricting rights because someone is different. Only the guilty party needs to look in the mirror. Right now AB 100 and AB 103 are bills looking for negatives in a positive and you will get electrocuted. What I mean by that is this, There is always a positive in a negative, but if you look for a negative in a positive you will get electrocuted. Thank you for the opportunity to speak about AB100 (K-12 Trans athletic ban) and AB103 (restrictions on the use of pronouns for trans and non-binary youth).

These bills are breathtaking in their scope and the harm they can inflict, with no evidence that their good outweighs this harm.

Only 1.4% of all youth in the US ages 13-17 identify as transgender. I couldn't find statistics for Wisconsin, or national statistics for ages 12 and under. Why do you need AB100 when only a tiny number of youth identify as trans and it is likely that not all of those want to participate in sports? And what business is it of the state to legislate the use of pronouns? Why is it in the state's interest to interfere in this deeply personal part of people's lives? We have much more pressing issues in this state to address.

I want to remind you that it was in the late 1990s, that marriage equality for gay couples a hot button issue. Bills were introduced to ban or support gay marriage, and it was highly politicized. Miraculously, the more we as a nation talked about it, the more we became aware of family members who were gay, and became personal. Now a significant majority of Americans support gay marriage. In 2023, 80% of Wisconsinites approve of it.

Many of us are only recently, becoming aware and educated about what it means to be transgender. And only a few of us, especially in my generation, have transgender people in our lives. Thankfully this is beginning to change. My son and daughter have transgender people in their lives, including my daughter in law's trans sister. Transgender kids are so brave, and we should be celebrating their discovery of identity, not condemning it. They should be allowed to play sports with other children of their gender and be referred to by their correct name and pronouns.

I didn't know I was trans until college, and it was (and still is) a challenge to get people to respect my pronouns. If I had to manage the misgendering when I was a child, I'm not sure that I would have been able to cope. Students, especially those in middle and high school, have so much going on in their day-to-day and they deserve basic levels of respect so they have the energy to manage all the other things life is throwing at them. They shouldn't be forced to be deadnamed or misgendered every single day. That is a miserable and exhausting way to live. I want trans kids to grow up to be trans adults and these bills will be huge factors in preventing that. "The Trevor Project's 2023 U.S. National Survey on the Mental Health of LGBTQ Young People found that 41% of LGBTQ+ young people seriously considered attempting suicide in the past year, including roughly half of transgender and nonbinary youth¹". Transgender and gender-nonconforming students have the right to be safe and be themselves at school. Wisconsin Statute 118.13 requires school districts to have a formal complaint process called "pupil nondiscrimination. Federal law prohibits discrimination based on sex, which includes gender identity, potentially requiring schools to accommodate students' preferred names and pronouns. Public schools have a responsibility to create a safe learning environment. Wisconsin school districts are required to comply with federal law prohibiting discrimination based on a student's sex-- and generally also gender identity. I implore the Education Committee to promote educational equity and access to educational opportunities for each student in our public schools through non-discriminatory policies.

My name is Virginia Kamp. I grew up in Appleton, Wisconsin, completed my Bachelor's Degree at UW- Madison, and am currently a resident of Wauwatosa. I am writing to strongly urge you not to move forward with bills AB100 and AB103.

When I was a high school student in Appleton, I knew that I was gay. But I also knew that I wanted to be seen as a "good" student, so for a long time, I didn't tell anyone. But later, I got to know other students who were openly LGBT, and who were bullied and made to feel unsafe because of it.

So, along with a few other students, I started a Gay-Straight Alliance at my school. I still did not tell my teachers that I was gay, but they knew I was part of forming this organization. And to this day, I can still remember how I felt in each of my high school classrooms after my teacher's found out this information. There were some classrooms where I felt safe to learn, safe to be myself. But unfortunately, there were lots of classrooms where I did not feel that way.

I am deeply concerned that these bills will only serve to increase self-harm, self-hatred, and even suicide among Wisconsin's kids.

I hope that that is enough for you to not move these bills forward. But in case it's not, let me also share my perspective as a former classroom teacher. We are already having a hard time keeping teachers in classrooms, and I fear that we will lose more teachers - good, kind, loving teachers - if you tell them that they can't listen respectfully when a child asks them to use a preferred name or pronouns.

There is one final thing I hope you will consider. When I did finally start coming out as gay, I remember that there were certain people who surprised me. People I expected to be disgusted who instead were curious and kind, who kept our connection and our communication open long enough to get to actually know me, and for me to actually get to know them. I see a Wisconsin where it's possible for that type of kindness to overcome partisanship. Let's be the state where you can be a Republican or a Democrat, where you can disagree wholeheartedly, but where we don't let fear or hatred prevent us from taking care of all of our kids.

My name is Morgan Lange, I am a registered nurse, a parent, currently a public health nurse for Madison & Dane County, a family member and friend of individuals in the LGBTQ+ community in Madison, and a former school nurse.

I am testifying to oppose the anti-trans legislation being proposed in AB100 and AB103. I was a school nurse for 5 years in the Madison Metropolitan School District (2019-2024) and know firsthand how harmful and dangerous this type of legislation is for trans youth and the school community overall.

These bills completely take away the power of an individual to determine their identity and instead give it to a person of power (the school principal). NO ONE should be allowed to tell anyone who they are. This is a completely inappropriate guideline for a school community - as one of the foundational pillars of the school environment is acceptance of others and being unafraid to be yourself. Specifically, the sports team environment fosters teamwork and working with others, and engaging in camaraderie. These bills create a tableau for others in the school to fear and discriminate against their trans peers or their trans students.

More than 1 in 10 LGBTQ+ young people attempted suicide in the past year, and 39% of LGBTQ+ young people seriously considered attempting suicide in the past year — **including 46% of transgender and nonbinary young people.** (These statistics are from theTrevorProject.org). I want to emphasize that LGBTQ+ youth are **not** more prone to suicide because of their gender identity or sexual orientation but rather because of how society has treated them and stigmatized them.

I also want to point to the statistic from the <u>trevorproject.org</u> that clearly shows 49% (almost HALF) of LGBTQ+ youth experienced bullying at school. As a school nurse - this is something I have personally witnessed. I have taken care of many trans students in the health office, in mental health distress or even crisis from bullying or discrimination that they are experiencing from peers, and in some cases from school staff. As someone who has worked in the middle and high school environments, I can say with absolute certainty, that stigmatizing trans youth, but disallowing them to express themselves will have a

devastating, and likely deadly effect on the youth in our Wisconsin schools and the education community. I am completely horrified that these bills are even being proposed; schools are a place for inclusion and acceptance of self-expression, *not* hate and discrimination.

Thank you for hearing/reading my testimony. I hope you will consider what I have shared with you today, and stand up for trans youth (and all people) in Wisconsin by opposing AB100 and AB103 which severely harms trans students in the state of Wisconsin.

I am a parent of a cisgender child, but fully support the full inclusion of transgender athletes in sports at all levels. I believe that students, regardless of their gender identity, should have the opportunity to compete and thrive in a welcoming and equitable environment. Transgender students are already at greater risk for depression and anxiety. However, a 2022 study done by of the Human Rights Campaign (HRC Foundation) and the University of Connecticut 2022 LGBTQ+ Youth Study found that high school-aged transgender and non-binary student-athletes reported higher grades, lower levels of depression, and were less likely to feel unsafe at school than those who did not play sports.

In 2023, when the Wisconsin State Assembly signed off legislation limiting transgender participation in youth sports, author Barbara Dittrich (R) said she was aware of only six transgender athletes in Wisconsin. I don't have concerns with my daughter playing sports with transgender athletes. I do have increasing concerns on genital checks being required if any student's sex is called in question.

As the parent of a trans person, I have witnessed how beneficial it is to have a trans person referred to as the chosen name and pronoun that identify as. Attacks on transgender people, especially youths have life long emotional and mental health difficulties. Those that have Gender Dysphoria are trying to live their true, authentic selves and school should be a place where they can focus on their education. Transgender is not a new concept, across the world many cultures have thousands of years of history that includes transgender people. Current focus on transgender people now is not about the best interest of them, it is emboldening a society of hate on a marginalized group and any vote to restrict their right to exist can only been seen as an act of hate.

Assembly Bill 100 is another needless assault on transgender individuals. It invites gender policing that could subject any woman to invasive tests or accusations of being "too masculine" or "too good" at their sport to be a "real" woman. My name is Maks Kopish, I am a constituent from La Farge, WI (54639). I've lived in Vernon County for the past six years, and I am in training to become an interfaith minister. Four years ago, I decided to change my name with the realization that my interior self is much more masculine-leaning than people would assume based on the sex (female) and name I was assigned at birth.

I discovered that there is a name for a feeling I had my entire life, the feeling of not really fitting within the category of "girl" or the social expectations of girl/womanhood. The word is dysphoria. Gender dysphoria is what I felt when I'd open birthday presents from my mom to find pink clothes, barbie dolls, and heart-shaped jewelry, when my young self wanted army men, spy gadgets, and science books. Gender dysphoria is what I felt when I had to wear a dress to prom and felt like a man in drag. Despite being biologically female, I have never fit within the box of girl/womanhood, and I knew it from the earliest age I can remember.

Changing my name and adopting gender neutral pronouns (they/them) was a massive relief for my mental and emotional health. I immediately felt more confident, happy, and excited about life. I was getting to know myself better, no longer hiding under labels that always felt off. I was being more honest with my friends and loved ones about who I really am. Changing my name and pronouns was one of the most important and life-affirming things I've ever done. My only regret is that I was kept from my own truth for so many years trying to fit within a category I didn't belong.

Please do not cause misery for our kids. They have it hard enough with everything going on in the world. Just let them be themselves. Gender is not some big scary thing. Gender expression should be fun and interesting. Don't you want to know who people really are, in all of our wonderful and wild glory, and as our Creator, rather than our government, intends?

Please do not pass AB100 and AB103. Trans kids should be able to use the locker room that suits their self-understanding of their gender; and refusing to use a person's name and pronouns is not only supremely disrespectful but also massively harmful for that person's internal well-being and sense of self. Just let us be.

Dear Members of the Assembly Bill on Education,

I am writing to oppose Assembly Bills 100 and 103.

For Bill 100, I am opposed because school sports are not professional sports. All children and youth are still developing and develop at different rates regardless of gender and that includes transgender kids. Blocking transgender children and youth maintains them as second class participants and reminds me of the days when girls were only allowed to play half-court basketball, or were only allowed to wear dresses and skirts, or when we forced left-handed children to try to become right-handed--all within my parents' lifetime. All children and youth play and participate in athletics because first and foremost it's fun, it's something they enjoy. In a world where transgender children and youth are more likely to be bullied. Studies from the National Institute of Health show that 53% of cisgender boys and girls are likely to be bullied, but that rate is 83% for transgender kids. Disallowing trans children and youth from participating in athletics, including locker room use, contributes to the sense of isolation and poor mental health and well-being, as shown in that same study. Inclusion of transgender children and youth has the opposite effect of building self-esteem and acceptance among all children and youth, including both transgender and cisgender kids. The percentage of transgender youth ages 13-17 is less than 1.5 percent of the entire U.S. youth population. We are talking about a small number of children and youth who just want to be treated like everyone else. Please oppose Assembly Bill 100 to assure fair treatment and mental well being for all of our children and youth.

For Bill 103, I am opposed because people change names and use nicknames all the time. Are we going to not allow children to use the nickname they prefer? Are we going to insist they use the last name they are registered in, even if they are not in the custody of that parent and choose to use a different family last name? This is an unnecessary bill. For transgender children and youth, studies have shown that using their preferred names and pronouns boosts self-esteem and mental well-being. This is the same for cisgender children. I myself was given a nickname by my family that has been used my whole life; when someone uses my full legal name I know they do not know me personally and do not know who I really am. I know other cisgender adults who were given a nickname by their family and as they became teens they stopped using it because they found it didn't fit. Why would we do this to children and youth? This seems unnecessarily cruel. Allow children and youth to use the names they prefer. Pronouns are also a similar way of declaring who someone is, and it seems rather ridiculous to tell someone they aren't who they know themselves to be. But not only is it ridiculous, it is harmful, and contributes to bullying. Studies from the National Institute of Health show that 53% of cisgender children and youth are likely to be bullied, but that rate is 83% for transgender kids. This seems like

a waste of legislation to target a small percentage (<u>less than 1.5% of all children</u> <u>and youth in the U.S.</u>) and would also affect cisgender children who use a different name at school. Vote no on Assembly Bill 103.

My name is Laura Stoesz, and I am a licensed professional counselor in training with a Master's of Science in Counseling from the University of Madison. These are my own views, and they are informed by psychological science. As a psychotherapist, I work with children and adults who have been harmed by anti-trans legislation like AB 100 and AB 103. I ask that you vote no on both these bills because they will harm children and adults in our state, leading to public health impacts, lost productivity and creativity, and lost faith in your work as politicians.

Trans, gender nonconforming, and nonbinary people have always existed. It is society's prejudiced views, policies, and actions that harm non-cis people, not their gender identity. The evidence in scientific literature is clear. As researcher Ilan Meyer established in his seminal 2003 peer-reviewed paper, "stigma, prejudice, and discrimination create a hostile and stressful social environment," which leads to mental health problems and can lead to negative physical health effects. (Meyer, "Prejudice, social stress, and mental health in lesbian, gay, and bisexual populations: Conceptual issues and research evidence," Psychological Bulletin, 2003). We have known this for over twenty years, and yet bills like these continue to inflict minority stress on people, causing public health impacts that reverberate for decades.

Lost productivity and creativity: As nonbinary author Alok Vaid-Menon says in Beyond the Gender Binary, "Gender non-conforming people face considerable distress not because we have a disorder, but because of stigma and discrimination. There is nothing wrong with us, what is wrong is a world that punishes us for not being normatively masculine or feminine." Pronouns are a zero-cost affirmation of identity. If you could affirm a child with a word, why would you refuse to do it? I'm not talking about potentially hurtful words. Using a correct pronoun or name is morally neutral, costs nothing, and affirms a child without harming another person. The discomfort of the person being asked to use the correct name or pronoun is not harm; dysphoria is. Dysphoria is traumatic, and the more gender nonconforming children and adults are forced to experience it, the more trauma builds up, leading to challenges in life functioning, just as we see in PTSD, and in fact, sometimes rising to the level of clinical PTSD. This mental trauma of being misidentified, stigmatized, and ostracized has a social cost, as traumatized people often need additional support from friends, family, or social systems. Traumatized people and their allies pay the cost, but so does society, when a person's potential goes underutilized and their relationships and lives are affected by trauma. Some people still excel despite these stacked odds, like trans athletes, and they are my inspiration.

Trans-inclusive sports can still be fair. Trans athletes in sports aligned with their gender should be allowed to compete. Overcoming transphobia and adapting to changing bodies are challenge enough for trans athletes. They should not be subjected to exclusionary practices just to be able to enjoy their sport. Far worse outcomes can and do happen to girls and women in sports than competing with trans athletes, who pose no threat to safety. Look at the recent US Olympic Gymnastics team and how many were systematically abused by a cis male team medical provider, who did present a threat to safety and who was allowed to continue far too long. Look at the intrusive testing being proposed to police women's categorization as women just to participate in their sport. Inflicting this testing would be traumatizing, objectifying, and unnecessary.

Lost faith in you as an elected official: It's not a good look to be anti-trans. It may seem politically expedient now, when others are attacking trans rights. But in the years to come, anti-trans politicians will suffer the consequences of alienating so many people -- allies, loved ones of trans people, folks who come to realize what brilliant, beautiful contributions trans people bring to society. I watch Roller Derby, a sport that is inclusive of trans athletes, BECAUSE it is inclusive of trans athletes. At games, I get to witness gender diversity, excellence in sport, and welcome for all. At the most recent game, competitors wore shirts that affirmed, "Trans Athletes Belong Here." There was a palpable joy in the arena and on the bleachers. Children clamored to high-five all the athletes at the end of each game. This is the positive impact inclusion can have: sportsmanship, compassion, and inclusion. Who doesn't support those values? Anyone who votes for AB 100 or AB 103.

To the respected Representatives of the Assembly Committee on Education,

My name is Hal M. DeLong, and I am a resident of Assembly District 10. As I am unable to attend today's hearings in person, I have submitted this testimony in addition to my testimony on Assembly Bill 100. I vehemently oppose these additions to state statutes put forth in Assembly Bill 103, and I kindly ask that you also reconsider your support for this bill.

Again, my name is Hal. I am 24 years old and have lived in the city of Glendale since I was two, where I attended Nicolet High School before heading off to Lawrence University in Appleton, where I obtained my BA in German and geoscience. I am a lifelong learner, and I deeply value the quality education I have received thus far in my life. Looking back, it is easy for me to see how fundamental my experiences at Nicolet were in shaping the kind of man and learner I would become.

Had you met me as a child, you might be surprised to hear that I would grow up to be a man. Yes, my name might be Hal, but that has not always been my (legal) name. I am a transgender man, meaning I was assigned female at birth. I do not merely identify as a man-I am a man. I did not choose this for myself, nor did any person or group of people cause me to be this way. A word to the men of this Committee, my masculine identity is just as innate as your own. But unlike you, it has taken a considerable amount of work to express myself in such a way. I knew growing up that I wasn't like my female peers, even well before I learned about transgender people or even considered the possibility that I might be transgender myself. It took a lot of learning outside the classroom and self-introspection before I could even begin undertaking the steps needed to help me physically become the man I was meant to be.

I mention learning outside the classroom explicitly as that's what learning about **trans**gender people was for me. I graduated from high school in 2019, but even at that time, transgender people and the issues facing them only ever came up in the classroom a handful of times. School was nonetheless the place where I felt I could be my true self before I felt ready to come out to my family. I spent just shy of three full school years going by Hal and using he/him pronouns in high school before making it known to my family that that was the only way I wanted to be addressed. Were other students kind to me about it? Not always, and there were certain teachers who were less than kind about it too. But it was worth it. It was worth it taking what could have been three abjectly miserable years of trying to pretend to be someone I wasn't and turning it into something better, into three years in which I could find a time and place to be myself. The number of peers and teachers who supported me in this way vastly outnumbered those who opposed the changes I'd made. For someone who couldn't medically transition at that time, all that meant was using the right name for me, Hal, and the right pronouns for me- even if that wasn't yet what I went by outside of school.

My story is the reason why I see it as imperative that I submit this testimony today regarding Assembly Bill 103. For many students, using a name and/or pronouns that don't align with what you might see on their school records and legal forms is one of the only ways they can try to express themselves as gender-diverse youth. As my story illustrates, I was one such student. I found comfort in the name and pronouns that I advised others to use for me, even if they didn't match my records at the time. Quite honestly, I had a lot of company in that sense in regard to my name- sure, I might have been the only Hal who was then legally referred to by a very feminine name, but the Dans and Sams and Chrises and Maggies with longer legal names were all technically in the same boat. The same can even be said for some of the representatives germane to today's hearings, such as one Representative Kreibich who helped introduce this bill on Tuesday. Would it at least irritate you, Representative, if people were required to only ever call you Robin even though you publicly prefer Rob? You may explicitly exclude such shortened nicknames from consideration under this bill, but there's plenty of people out there of all ages who instead use a completely different first name than their legal name. Where do they fit into this equation? Would you care about a David who wants to go by Jude if they didn't happen to be transgender? What's the difference if they were?

Attempting to exert control over what names people can and can't prefer to be called is thus an exercise in futility. It is impossible to legislate trans people- including trans youth, who are already much more subject to legislation and parental control on account of being minors- without hurting us all. To repeat a point I raised in my testimony against Assembly Bill 100, exclusion is a barrier to equity. Childhood is a time of exploring oneself and one's place in the world, and all children deserve the right to express their identities in ways that allow them to feel more secure in the world. Perhaps there are some children out there who adopt a name and pronouns other than the ones they are expected to use and later drop them- no harm has come to them in the end, and with any hope they still come out of it with a stronger sense of who they are. But for those like me who made that switch for life, it means the world to be supported for who you are within one of the places you spend the most time as a child.

I love learning and I love this state. I wish to remain in this state for future postgraduate education. I long for the day when all Wisconsin students are treated equitably in their educational pursuits, regardless of who they are or who they might become. But as long as bills like these are being considered, the more I worry that that day is being pushed yet farther away. The 'M.' in my name is for Mark, by the way- the name of a high school teacher who changed my life for the better and encouraged me to be my truest self, all while helping me become someone ready and willing to help make the future a brighter one. And that is exactly why I have written these testimonies for you today. Will you make this future a brighter one for all Wisconsinites?

Sincerely, Hal M. DeLong Thank you to the Assembly Committee on Education in receiving my written testimony . I wish I could be there in person, but I have prior commitments.

My name is Amy Wall and I live in Sun Prairie. I oppose AB100 and AB103. These bills were both authored by Rep. Dittrich, who seems to have a particular obsession with this topic.

I testified late 2023 against AB378, a bill very similar to AB100, whereas anecdotal evidence was used to try to justify barring transgender students from participating on sports teams that match their gender identity. This bill, AB100, is particularly focused on transgender girls and completely ignores the existence of non-binary students and transgender boys. There are reasons for that, misogyny being at the top of the list, which is ironic, given the other bills Rep. Dittrich has authored in support of women's rights.

The bill does not seem to directly explain why this is justified. The subtext is that women are weak and need to be "protected".

The other reason this bill was authored, along with AB103, is purely for bigoted reasons. As we know, conservative lawmakers in our country at both the state and federal level do not want to acknowledge the existence of transgender people. They are singularly obsessed with this topic. Transgender people make up hardly 1% of the population, yet we waste so much taxpayer money and legislator time on this.

I am a transgender woman. I am 52 years old. And I am real. And if you spent time with me, you would not call me a man.

For bill AB103, it approaches its anti-transgender bias by putting the decisions on the school board and in particular, gives the school principal the decision to force a child's legal name and pronouns to be used unless parental permission is given.

There are so many reasons why trans kids should not have to get parental approval on how to be addressed in school. Parents can be very cruel to their children and not listen to them even as they would plead they are not the gender assigned at birth.

I acknowledge it is difficult for a cis-gendered adult to understand this, but I assure you, it is so important for a student to be called by their desired name and pronouns. When I came out as transgender to my employer, after my name was changed on corporate email, the feeling was indescribable. That I finally had my name on email and it was me. When the name change went through I sat and just looked at a draft email from me for 10 minutes.

Please do not allow AB103 to interfere with how children come to terms with their gender identity. I wish I had this opportunity when I was a child. I have had to struggle a lot to fully realize life as a woman. When you begin this process as a child, you avoid so much difficulty, you avoid depression, you avoid so many issues with having to live as a gender you do not identify with.

Please kill AB100 and AB103. They do not deserve to be made law in Wisconsin. It's purely for cruelty and because the sponsors do not want to recognize that we are real and we exist.

As a high school educator for almost 14 years, I have had several students over the years that have been transgender or nonbinary that have wanted to be addressed by a name other than on their legal documentation with the district. The emphasis for nearly all of my schools has been on building relationships with students as an essential foundation to educating them. Calling them by the name they prefer is the first step in establishing that relationship, whether that be a nickname or if they are figuring out their identity just like every one of the peers in school. Schools are meant to be a safe place for students to figure out who they are and as an educator, my role is to create that space for them to grow as a person. If I will be expected to use the nickname of students whose name choice conforms to their assigned sex at birth (for instance, if I preferred to shorten my name to Mike) without confirming with their parents, then equal protection under the law entails that I should respect a student who prefers a name that does not match their assigned sex at birth. Considering that studies have shown laws like this have caused suicide attempts among transgender and nonbinary youth by 72% in recent years (The Trevor Project), I believe it would be far more damaging to these students if I were not able to meet them at the ground level of using their preferred name.

My name is Rek Kwawer, and I am a resident of Madison. I've lived in Wisconsin for over 15 years, and one of the reasons we moved to Madison was that we believed it was a good place to have a family. Many of my friends have children who are currently in local high schools. They have praised our local schools, in particular highlighting the supportive and committed teachers who helped their children (several of whom have ADHD or autism, and several of whom are LGBTQ) to succeed in school. While none of my friends' kids play sports at a high level, they have played on their high school teams or local Little League teams because they enjoy athleticism and teamwork.

Since moving here, I have worked for several nonprofits as well as for the State of WI in the Department of Public Instruction. One of the things that was striking when I worked for DPI was the emphasis in Wisconsin on local control, and local control over education and schools.

I am writing to urge you to vote NO on Assembly Bill 100 and Assembly Bill 103. As a Wisconsinite, I am opposed to these bills because they create a hostile and unsupportive learning environment for our children, and encourage suspicion of any student who may not fit in. We encourage kids to play sports, and tell them about the importance of learning teamwork and healthy competition. We need to be backing that up with support, rather than creating discriminatory barriers to participation.

AB100 targets transgender youth and encourages their peers to treat them with suspicion, rather than as teammates. This bill particularly targets transgender girls. We know that transgender women are often victimized by physical violence. This bill teaches transgender girls that they are not valid, and encourages their peers to view them as potential threats, rather than as people who are way more likely to be the victims of violence. Our teachers can be some of the most influential people in our children's lives.

AB103 limits the ways that teachers can support their students by mandating that their schools prohibit them from referring to kids in the way they want to be addressed. It puts tremendous power in the hands of a principal, and requires parental approval, which is not possible for kids who are facing violence at home (which is sadly a concern in many households). *Both* of these bills trample on the strong tradition of local control by not only mandating that schools have policies on these topics but *what those policies are.* They assume that the state legislature knows better than educators what is good for kids. There are real issues facing children in schools. Parents send their kids to school each day knowing that there is the risk of a school shooting (a tragedy that recently came close to home in Madison).

Child poverty is a huge issue, and rather than addressing it, we talk about cutting NSLP expansions that have been highly successful at feeding kids and removing the stigma from eating lunch at school. Girls *still* face high risks of sexual violence in schools and from adults in their lives. We have a youth mental health crisis, which we have not begun to address. If you want to support safety for youth and for girls in particular, there are real actions you can take, such as gun control laws, providing mental health counseling for youth and their families, ensuring that all children and all families have enough to eat and have stable housing.

AB100 and AB103 are attempting to sensationalize issues that face a small but very vulnerable subset of our youth, and to shield you from criticisms of the issues facing children and youth that you are *failing* to address. If you are serious about supporting youth, you should be providing more funding for schools, not targeting transgender youth.

I cannot testify in person before your committee tomorrow as my husband will be having a hip replacement, but I wanted to share my thoughts with you. I come from a family of teachers. My father was a teacher and coach in the Madison School District for 45 years. My sister taught in the same district and then in higher education all across the country, as her husband did.

I know how important it is for young people to be part of a culture in their schools that allows them to be true to themselves while doing no harm to others. The use of pronouns to identify one's gender is not a harmful action against anyone. Much like preferring a nickname to one's given name at birth it is the identity that the young person knows reflects them the best rather than what their parents gave them a birth.

As a parent of a non-binary identifying adult child and grandparent of an 11-year-old non-binary grandchild I have seen that their ability to use pronouns that best reflect who they find themselves to be is vitally important to their well-being. And it brings absolutely no harm to any other person who chooses to use pronouns that reflect their gender identity at birth.

The assembly bills number 100 and 103 are being discussed, and I would like my voice to be heard. Though I cannot attend this meeting, as I will be in school, I am sending a message. These bills directly impact my education. Though I am a senior, and moving into secondary education, I am heavily impacted to the precedents that these bills send. It is about more than the silencing of children, which means to erase the ideas of trans children across the state. It is about the politicians and people that have been trying to erase our histories from the moment they began. Being transgender is not a new idea. I could not be there in person, but wanted to write to share my concern over the bills regarding student athletes and pronouns in schools (AB100/AB103). I fiercely advocate to make this world a safer place for transgender and non-binary children.

Testimony Regarding Assembly Bill 100 & Assembly Bill 103:

To the Assembly Committee on Education,

The vilification of trans youth is abhorrent and does not belong in the Wisconsin legislature.

Transgender people comprise 1.6% of the human population. Of that fraction, even less play sports. Only 34 trans athletes have openly competed in U.S. college sports to date and fewer make it to the professional level. The largest disparities in sports fairness come from the socioeconomic disadvantage of marginalized populations, not trans participation. Proximity to privilege predicts success in sports, not testosterone levels or biological markers. Meanwhile, disparities faced by the trans community begin at a young age and impact all facets of life including sports access. Trans youth are 9 times more likely to experience homelessness than their cisgender peers, and 68% experience bullying in middle school and high school. 22% of trans women surveyed in 2015 reported that they were bullied so badly in school that they dropped out. Many trans students worry about where they will use the bathroom at school, never mind which locker room to use. Without supportive services to help them navigate these additional challenges, it's tougher for them than their peers to make it through classes, let alone onto a soccer field. (Thank you to ACLU for the use of their stats and statistics)

These bills are only fueling anti-trans rhetoric that trans women have an unfair advantage in sports, despite a lack of consistent research to suggest this. As a woman, please do not speak for me to say that this bill is protecting mine or my daughter's rights, when in truth it is only limiting the rights of small group of individuals who should be receiving care, support, and affirmation instead of hate.

To the Members of the Assembly Committee on Education -

I am writing to oppose bills AB100 and AB103.

I have lived in Wisconsin for 30 years overall. As a child, I attended public school in Stevens Point, and now my children are attending Madison Public Schools. While I am an active Quaker and Board member for the Tenant Resource Center, I am speaking on my own behalf as a private citizen.

I strongly oppose these bills. Trans children are not a danger to my children, and in fact have improved their educational experiences. Varied gender expression has made more space for my own kids to be who they are, and they know themselves better as they have grown up in an inclusive environment.

As I'm sure you'll hear in the hours of testimony before you, kids need to be able to live as their honest gender expression (including pronouns at school, and full participation in sports), or else face crushing depression and suicidality. The trans youth I have known - community members, friends of my kids - have gone through a period of suicidal ideation before stepping into themselves and living their lives fully. When I have seen these types of bills come before this committee in the past, I get the sense that legislators do not seem to care if these youth live or die. I do. I want them to live. I want Wisconsin law to tell them that they are free to be themselves.

It is astonishing to me that people believe that trans girls in sports endanger other girls. In fact, this is not the case. Because of gender dysmorphia, trans girls are the ones who least want to expose their unaltered bodies to other girls, and often hide or change separately. If this committee wishes to protect girls or youth generally in sports contexts, I suggest: stop asking about kids' genitals. Banning trans youth from any context makes it much more likely that adults will feel compelled to check children's genitals, which is a breathtaking safety risk for all children. In fact, children are much more likely to be sexually assaulted by a coach than by another athlete, trans or no. The NIH has a number of studies that speak to this, but one says, "that 0.5% of adolescents experienced sexual abuse involving a coach," and "When considering all adolescents who experienced sexual abuse in their lifetime (10.2%), it appears that 5.3% of them were victims of sexual abuse by a coach."

In truth, the schools have very little way to verify who is transgendered and who is cisgendered amongst the children that attend our schools, aside from self identification. Legislation such as this has little enforceable impact, and only serves to tell trans youth that they do not belong. I inherently oppose this stance.

My name is Sarah Forzley, and I am a Madison resident. I've lived here since 2012, and my husband and I settled here to be near his family, just like all his siblings. I say this to emphasize that even while pursuing a masters, a doctorate, and a corporate career, I continue to prioritize family values. Additionally, I am a former instructor at the University of Wisconsin, a former high school teacher, and a former elementary school teacher. Given that I live according to my family values, and that I spent over twenty cumulative years teaching young people and participating in girls' and women's sports myself, I care deeply about safety and equity in school and in sport.

For these reasons, I urge you to vote NO on Assembly Bills 100 and 103. These bills do not increase safety or equity in schools or sports. Trans girls and trans women do not threaten the success of individual women or of women's sports in general. I have seen this myself as both an athlete and a teacher. Instead, they reveal a fundamental misunderstanding of sex assigned at birth, of the actual threats that girls and women face every day, and of athletic competition. Sex assigned at birth is not a perfect way to identify a person's sex. I have had students with different medical conditions whose sex assigned at birth did not take into account their chromosomal makeup because the doctor simply visually assessed the baby's features. I also have had students who felt that they belonged nowhere because they did not "fit in" with the boys or girls at their school. I would have loved to see those students to fear and discriminate against their peers. These bills teach our students that the definition of "girl" or "woman" is ever narrower. These bills threaten to drag us back into a time when the United States was more sexist, when women had even fewer opportunities in sport.

After my master's degree, I taught at a university in Paris and ran for a team there. I was just a run-of-the-mill varsity athlete in college, but in France I quickly climbed the national rankings. Why? Because France has less gender equality than the United States. I know that sometimes, conservative folks fear that liberal folks are not proud of the United States. I can say without hesitation that I am proud of the United States for how far we have come in girls' and women's sports since my mother's time. In France, I faced more sexual and physical harassment, more restrictive expectations for my gender, and more inequality in sport than I face here. Though it meant giving up my excellent ranking in France, I was relieved to return to the competition scene in the United States because, frankly, I love how many women in the United States are faster than I am – women's sports here have thrived under Title IX to the benefit of all, including mediocre athletes like myself. We are carried along in the wave of those who run faster than we do. It is in our interest to compete against as diverse a group of women as possible so as to improve our training and overall times.

Perhaps, if you feel that discussing nonbinary genders is polarizing, you can remember a time in your life when you did not fit in. Remember how uncomfortable that was, how isolating, how sad you felt. Trans students do not choose to be trans; nobody chooses to have a more difficult life in this way. Allowing trans students to participate in sports, allowing trans students to use the bathroom most comfortable for them, tells them that they belong. Nobody would undergo so

much social stigma just to cause harm to others. Trans students are not trying to harm anyone, and they certainly don't threaten our sports. Do you know what does threaten girls and women in school and sport? Sexual harassment by male students, teachers, administrators, and clergymen. Bias from adults who do not believe girls or women have what it takes to lift weights, to succeed in STEM, to obtain advanced degrees. Let's focus on real problems instead of an imagined one.

My name is Ani Miskowski. I am a resident of Milwaukee. While I believe that there is plenty of evidence detailing the harm Assembly Bills 100 and 103 will cause, part of me fears that those points do not matter to you. I fear that hearings like these have become an easily dismissible formality where the physical presence of a committee is meant to placate us. I hope I'm wrong. I cannot force you to open your hearts, and I would not want to. All I have is my hope that you will let yourself hear me.

I was born into a God-fearing family. We went to church every week. We communed with people who shared our faith and our values. But despite all of the faith that my parents claimed to have, they were afraid every day, afraid of making even one misstep, afraid of others, afraid of themselves, afraid of God, and afraid of punishment. That fear destroyed our relationship. I was not brave enough to ask them then, so I ask you now, those of you with open hearts who truly believe trans children are hurting themselves and genuinely want to protect them:

What if you're wrong? What if God's priority isn't the names or pronouns of these children but whether they are accepted and loved? What if trans children are not perverting their bodies but are transcending them, embracing a divine energy inspired by God?

I can't answer for you. I understand it might be scary to grapple with these questions regardless of what faith you may or may not hold. Your mind might conjure memories of shame or even physical punishment, times where you were deemed not masculine or feminine enough. Or perhaps you witnessed others receiving similar treatment and vowed to avoid it. Your instinct might be to defend these corrections, to insist they were acts of love, but *you know what it feels like to be loved*. Love is incompatible with the rejection of mental and physical autonomy. Do you know how it feels to find joy in who you are only for someone else to insist "You are who *I* say you are." If you know how that feels, if you remember that confusion and frustration, how can you carry that pain forward? How can you give it to *children*?

I feel sorry for you. Because I see the joy in these children. I see the love and transformation they bring to their families. Why don't you trust their joy? What messaging have you received that taught you their truth is in opposition to yours?

The only people you are protecting with these laws are yourselves, and, while you might feel like you've done something good (despite overwhelming evidence to the contrary), you are also holding yourself back. You are running away from your cognitive dissonance because you are afraid of what will happen if you're honest. As long as you avoid honesty, you will never know true peace. I do not want you to be trans if you're not trans. I do not want you to change your name unless you'd like to. I want you to have the freedom to celebrate differences in others and in yourself without fear of punishment. I want these children to lead long, happy, and fulfilled lives.

I beg you to use this moment and your power to show trans children love and acceptance. My name is Aislinn Hutchinson and I am a concerned resident of the city of Madison. I've lived in Wisconsin for five years and have called Madison home for all of them. I am a business owner, spouse, and active member of my community. I am also trans. I am testifying on bill AB100 and AB103. I am testifying both about allowing trans youth to participate in sports according to their identified gender as well as their ability to use their chosen name and pronouns in school.

I am testifying about this because I myself just came out as non-binary this year. I am also a former college D1 athlete, and sports were and are my entire life. I recently had to find a new league to play hockey in because all of this hate that is being spread towards trans people is becoming a problem everywhere. My league tried to ban all trans players, including non-binary players. This significantly impacted my mental health as hockey is the place I go to play, have fun with my friends, decompress, and get physical activity. There was absolutely no scientific reason for banning athletes like myself from participating in sport, and the same thing is happening to youth if this bill is passed.

I wanted to share my story because I believe all PEOPLE should have the right and access to sport, as well as to use the pronouns of their choosing. Sports, and feeling safe in a dressing room are so important. This is a place where youth are able to learn skills about teamwork, camaraderie, and how to accept one another but this bill creates a scenario in which people will be taught to fear and discriminate against their trans peers. We are just people, wanting to respectfully be shown respect and honor like any human person deserves. The way this bill specifically targets trans youth is abhorrent and I will not stand for it in my community. Madison is a welcoming community for all trans and queer people and I have never felt safer to be myself in a community. To the members of the 2025 Assembly Committee on Education:

Wisconsin Assembly Bills 100 and 103 are yet another installment in the latest wave of legislation aimed at destroying the rights and freedoms of transgender individuals -- this time, attacking our children. These bills will prevent transgender students from participating in the school sports that align with their gender identity and also forcibly out transgender students if they in any way request staff to recognize their authentic selves. They are not just unnecessary wastes of Wisconsin taxpayer dollars; they are actively harmful.

Supporters of AB100 argue that the bill protects fairness in women's sports. These claims, however, are based on misleading political narratives and reject widely respected scientific evidence. Countless major medical organizations, including the American Academy of Pediatrics as well as the American Medical Association, recognize and confirm that transgender athletes do not inherently have an unfair advantage over cisgender athletes, and sports governing organizations such as the International Olympic Committee already have policies ensuring fair competition regardless of gender. AB100 is really just a solution in search of a problem, and in the process of trying to fabricate a crisis, it singles out and excludes transgender youth, sending a message that these children are not welcome.

AB103 is another attempt to marginalize transgender students -- this time by restricting how schools recognize and respect their identities. This bill would prevent schools from using a student's chosen name and preferred pronouns unless they align with a legal name change and are formally requested by a parent. If any parent or legal guardian makes such a request, ALL guardians will be given the opportunity to intervene. I know several people whose parents divorced or separated due to deep disagreement over whether their child should receive lifesaving care. Had AB103 been law they would have been subjected to the whims of their anti-trans parent, whether or not they were involved in their daily lives. Such policies disregard the lived experiences of transgender and nonbinary youth and will force their guardians to weigh whether to risk outing their children to unsupportive family members, who themselves will have the power to override a supportive parent. Or likewise, if they will risk the scrutiny of potentially unspportive or even bigoted school administrators, personnel who may not even know the child in question. These barriers to simply existing at school are only in place for students the author deem unworthy of identity; students who request a name or similar accommodation who are not transgender are not burdened by AB103. Respecting a student's chosen name and preferred pronouns should not be a matter of politics; it is a matter of dignity, mental health, and safety. AB103 is not about parental rights or educational integrity; it is about policing identity and forcing schools, teachers, and staff to participate in discrimination against transgender youth.

Wisconsin's AB100 and AB103 are not about fairness or protection -- they are about discrimination and control. The bills target an already vulnerable population, ignoring general scientific consensus and the voices of transgender people themselves. If these bills become law, they will cause real harm, not only by worsening stigma and mental health, but also the likelihood of self-harm among transgender youth.

A study published in the Journal Nature¹ September of 2024 assessed 19 states where anti-trans legislation passed from 2018 to 2022 and found an up to 72% increase in past-year suicide attempts by transgender and nonbinary youth, with a causal relationship by those states' anti-trans legislation.

Children's suicide rates increased across all states where anti-trans bills had been passed, and specifically as a result of those bans being enacted by their state legislatures.

These bills kill children born the same way as I was – created by God to find and live as our authentic selves. At best, they are intended to penalize and subjugate children who themselves are unknown by this bill's authors or the members of this committee. But in effect, this body will be setting policy that certain children are unwelcome in our schools, and unwelcome in our society more broadly. How many children must die before their lives are considered by this body?

I firmly believe what my church teaches: that all children, transgender nonbinary or otherwise, are created by God to find and embody our authentic selves and live out our lives as any other child of God. These bills attack that purpose, and with it our dignity and humanity. Would this body cosign the hatred, verbal and physical attacks transgender Children of God will be forced to endure by their peers, teachers, administrators, extended family and community? Will this body shield itself from the reality that children will be subjected to conditions which guarantee they will be told they are unwelcome in our society? This was a reality I was forced to live through for many many years, and as a result I regularly considered ending my own life beginning at the age of 13. I know many others like me who considered the ultimate sin, and I can only wonder how many more people would be alive today had they not experienced the same. I pray this body looks beyond themselves to see the humanity they will be snuffing out by putting their political careers over the lives and safety of fellow Children of God.

Sam Nesovanovic Regarding the Assembly Committee on Education 3/5/2025

My name is Sam Nesovanovic, and I am a concerned Wisconsinite and youth worker. I am testifying on how bills AB100 and AB103b will further isolate trans youth, which is detrimental to their wellbeing.

As a nonbinary adult who went to Wisconsin public schools for the entirety of my youth, I know firsthand how difficult it can be to feel that you need to tuck away parts of yourself so you can survive and fit in. I didn't have the language back then to describe my gender, but I knew I was different from the rest of my peers. I didn't feel like I could truly connect with my classmates, I lacked confidence, and I didn't feel as if I belonged at school. When people used my legal name, it felt confusing and wrong. Now that I am older, and have had the space to explore and assert my nonbinary identity, I have felt so much more at home within myself. I feel more in touch with the skills that I have and positive attributes I hold, and that allows me to show up for my community more than I have ever been able to in my life.

I feel it is necessary for me to testify today because I know the harm this bill will cause to current and future students in Wisconsin. These bills will strip away important spaces for trans youth to explore their passions, build connections with their peers and community, and feel more confident in their identity. Banning trans youth from playing sports on the team that matches their gender will isolate them from their peers. As someone who had close friends play on various sports teams in high school, I've seen how important being a part of a team was for their personal and professional growth; AB100 would eliminate that critical opportunity for Wisconsin's trans youth. Likewise, AB103 will cause trans youth to hide at school. They will lose the ability to trust adults at school, and potentially even their peers due to their fear of being outed. The reason that trans youth come out at school and not with their parents or guardians is because they don't feel safe enough to be out at home. The transgender community is already under attack on so many fronts in public and private spaces, and this pair of bills will further sharpen the target on their back.

I thank the Assembly Committee of Education for taking the time to read my testimony. I urge each of you to vote NO on this legislation. Children's lives and wellbeing are at stake.

My name is Elizabeth Di Salvo I am from Madison, Wisconsin and reside in the 53719 zip code area. I have been a Madison area resident since 2002.

In regards to the anti trans bills AB100/AB103 I strongly oppose these bills.

As a parent of a child in the trans community these bills if passed will have detrimental impact on a small but important group of people.

Calling an individual by their preferred pronouns is one of the simplest ways to acknowledge a person for who they are. It may take effort to learn this, but it is simple and easy and respectful of another human being's freedom of choices.

My child also participated is school extracurricular activities including sports. the choice to participate in the gender that they identify with is important.

As explained in Harvard Health from July of 2021 by Sabra L. Katz-Wise, PhD (she/her) who is an assistant professor in adolescent/young adult medicine at Boston Children's Hospital, in pediatrics at Harvard Medical School,

"Imagine a scenario in which you are called the wrong pronoun or honorific — for example Mr., Ms., or Mrs. — multiple times a day. It might happen in person, over the phone, or via email. Each time it happens, you must decide whether it is worth it to correct that person or easier to let it go. Imagine that you are repeatedly confronted with this experience and the decision of whether or not to correct it throughout the day every day. As we know from research, and as I've also heard from the TNB people I know, this is both exhausting and demoralizing. When people are misgendered, they feel invalidated and unseen. When this happens daily, it becomes a burden that can negatively impact their mental health and their ability to function in the world."

I can testify that since using the aligning pronouns, of their choice, my child, has had a **huge** shift in their attitude and outlook on life. As well as participating in sport that align with their preferred identity.

We have much bigger issues in the state of Wisconsin to address, than attacking and focusing on restricting the trans community. A group of individuals that just want to be free to be whom they are and be respected in their communities.

My name is lassic or Moss and I use they/them or he/him pronouns. When I first came out as trans I was in 8th grade, it was 2017 or 2018, I cant remember. But what I do remember was the level of care and support I got from my teachers. I remember on the first day back from summer break, all of our name cards were laid out on our desks, and everyone looked at me as I sat down at a desk with a name card that others didnt recognize. My teacher sat everyone down and explained that I would be going by a new name and that I would be using he/him pronouns from now on. Many kids in my class understood but some did not. It was my teacher that helped me get through the bullying and harassment, and my teacher who helped me feel safe at school. If it wasnt for my teacher being able to help me advocate for myself and for other students like me I dont know what would have happened. But I know that if it wasnt for me being able to go by lassic, to use he him and they them pronouns, that i would have ended up just like the 40% of trans kids who attempt suicide. That is around four out of every ten trans kids. Two out of every five. But those statistics are from 2022, the number now is around 72%, seven out of ten kids. We should be worried about what collages were going to get into, not about whether or not were going to live to graduate high school.

I'm now that teacher, and the times have not changed. Trans and nonbinary youth now more than ever need teachers and safe adults on their side to help them advocate for themselves and to help show them they are wanted, loved and appreciated. The way we do this is by using their prefered name, using their prefered pronouns."

My name is Rebecca Johnson, I am a resident of Madison, ZIP code 53704, and I am writing to express my opposition to AB 100 and AB 103.

As a former teacher, I've had multiple students that preferred a name that was different from their legal name, and preferred pronouns that didn't align with their assigned sex at birth. Being able to respect those students' identities is a necessary first step to building trust. Without the trust of my students, I would be fundamentally unable to do my job. Classroom management requires that respect goes both ways. If my students don't feel respected in my classroom, why should they respect me? Why should they listen to me at all?

And why waste everyone's time with this bill to prevent trans students from participating in sports? The number of trans girls playing on girls' sports teams in the nation is likely in the single digits, so how many even are there in Wisconsin? The only thing that this bill would serve to do is signal that trans students are dangerous or untrustworthy. These kids are already being bullied, already facing much higher rates of mental health struggles and suicide, and already feeling ostracized from their peers. For a bill that purports to be about protecting vulnerable students, it is certain to have the opposite effect.

I identify with the gender that was assigned to me at birth, but not only do bills like this directly harm the trans people in my life, they are the first step towards stripping away the rights and dignity of other LGBTQ+ people. After that, who's next? What other measures that are supposedly meant to "protect our students" will actually infringe on our civil liberties?

I hope that the members of the Committee on Education take a stand to protect our most vulnerable students, and vote against AB 100 and AB 103.

To the members of the Assembly Committee on Education,

I am writing to ask you to oppose Bills 100 and 103. These bills would create an environment of surveillance and discrimination that would especially hurt transgender children and children who don't fit specific gender roles, but they also have the potential to harm all children in our schools.

Regarding AB 103

I grew up in the 1990s, where all the messaging I saw said girls could do anything boys could do, including sports. We celebrated news stories of girls joining the boys' hockey or even football team if their school didn't have a girls' team. I saw countless TV shows, movies, and commercials where girls were pitted against boys, on the field and elsewhere, and proved themselves just as strong and capable as the boys. In sixth grade, my best friend and I, both cisgender girls, were inspired by these kinds of stories and signed up for the touch football club in the after school program. We were the only girls. Admittedly, we didn't know how to play at first because no one had ever taught us before, but we had fun, learned a lot, and gained a lot of confidence.

But this bill is only about stopping certain kids from joining the *girls'* team, you say? Let's talk about the message that this kind of bill sends to cisgender girls. I find it deeply disturbing how far our culture has backslid on this issue in the last decade, all to target what amounts to a very small minority of people who just want to be themselves. The primary argument I see against allowing transgender girls to play sports with other girls is that "boys" are inherently stronger, more powerful, more dangerous than "girls." Is this really the message we want to be sending young female athletes? That no matter how hard they work, they will never be as good or as strong or as capable as kids that happened to be born with a penis are. How is it protecting girls to say that boys are just naturally better than them at sports without even having to try, and that's why anyone perceived as a "boy" can't be allowed to play or compete with them?

Singling out, scrutinizing, and demonizing transgender girls does the most damage to those girls, and to other transgender and intersex children who don't neatly fit into rigid **categories**. It sends a message to these children that we think they're dangerous, predatory, and suspicious just because they challenge our society's rigid concepts of gender. They are the ones I am most motivated to protect in speaking against bills like this one. However, because the counter-argument seems to be interested in "protecting" cisgender girls, I think it's crucial that we take a step back and ask what messages these actions *really* send to the only children the bill's supporters claim to care about.

Regarding AB 100

School is a place where children learn academics, but it's also where they learn about who they are and how they interact with peers and people in positions of authority outside of their families. For kids whose home may not be safe for them to be fully themselves, it can be truly life-saving to have a place away from home to express themselves. But requiring schools to monitor, police, and report on children's gender expression (and yes, even experimentation) through name and pronoun changes is not only harmful and potentially dangerous. It's also a poor use of already stretched school resources and staff time. As a child, I was considered a tomboy because at a certain age I stopped liking "girly things." But rather than police my expression or go to my parents like I was doing something wrong, my teachers treated me like any other kid in the classroom. They encouraged my interests, took notice of subjects that I excelled at, and only monitored my academic performance and looked out for behavior that indicated I was having a hard time. I was fortunate to have parents who also supported my personal expression even when they didn't totally understand it. I consider myself very lucky that the adults in my life never made me feel ashamed or wrong because of something like how I expressed my gender. But I have plenty of friends who did, and even in their 30s and 40s they are still dealing with the consequences of that. It would be a travesty for Wisconsin to follow the trend of states passing laws to not only allow but require harmful messaging and surveillance, when ample research shows that affirming and supportive environments lead to better short- and long-term emotional wellbeing.

Please do not move these bills forward. Thank you.

According to the WIAA "Students that participate and are engaged in school programs ... have less truancy, lower drop-out rates, fewer disciplinary issues and better grade point averages on average than their peers that have no involvement... students who took part in more vigorous sports like soccer or football performed nearly 10 percent better in math, science, English and social studies classes... participation in extracurricular activities gives all students--including those from disadvantaged backgrounds and those without stellar academic accomplishments in high school--measurable improvements on college admission exam scores. Furthermore, students who compete in sports in high school were more likely than those not participating to be active in volunteering, voting, speaking publicly and being aware of current events." PFLAG is a nonprofit which originated in 1972. A mom decided to march next to her kiddo with a sign that said, "I love my gay son." Since that time PFLAG has become a national organization. Its mission is to create a caring, just, and affirming world for LGBTQIA people and those who love them. We established PFLAG Cambridge (53523) in October of 2019 to further promote this mission at a local level through eastern Dane and western Jefferson counties. We write to you today as constituents and as PFLAG members.

The world does not treat our LGBTQIA loved ones fairly. The bills known as AB100 and AB103 (bills disallowing trans kids in sports and declining to use their chosen pronouns) are stark examples of how transgender people, who already face so many hardships, are treated unfairly based on their transgender identity. Allowing for this unfair discrimination creates further hardships for our loved ones. And for that reason we ask that you vote against these bills.

Discriminatory actions cause additional hardship for the people targeted. The harm this discrimination causes is quantifiable and unacceptable. GLSEN, the Gay, Lesbian, & Straight Education Network, is an organization founded in 1990 which has been gathering data on the safety of LGBTQIA youth in school and their safety for over 20 years. According to their 2021 biannual survey 68.0% of LGBTQ+ students felt unsafe at school because of their sexual orientation, gender identity and/or gender expression characteristics—50.6% because of their sexual orientation, 43.2% because of their gender expression, and 40.3% because of their gender (<u>https://www.glsen.org/sites/default/files/2022-10/NSCS-2021-Full-Report.pdf</u>). According to the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) Transgender individuals are nearly four times as likely to experience a mental health condition. NAMI further states that forty percent of transgender adults have attempted suicide. (https://www.nami.org/Your-Journey/Identity-and-Cultural-Dimensions/LGBTQ).

Discriminatory actions have real world results. These bills communicate to every transgender person in Wisconsin that the people elected to protect us see them as less than whole, and not worth the same protection and respect as their peers. We strongly urge you to vote against the bills known as AB100 and AB103 (bills disallowing trans kids in sports and declining to use their chosen pronouns).

First, trans athletes in sports. Believing and perpetuating myths and misconceptions about trans athletes is harmful. Denying trans people the right to participate is discrimination and it doesn't just hurt trans people, it hurts all of us, including cis women.

Second, forcibly out transgender students could threaten their well-being, and we already know that LGBTQ+ young people are not inherently prone to suicide risk because of their sexual orientation or gender identity but rather placed at higher risk because of how they are mistreated and stigmatized in society.

Suicide is the second leading cause of death among young people aged 10 to 14, and the third leading cause of death among 15-24 year olds (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, 2022). Lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, and questioning (LGBTQ+) young people are at significantly increased risk.

LGBTQ+ young people are more than four times as likely to attempt suicide than their peers (Johns et al., 2019; Johns et al., 2020).

My name is Molly Vande Slunt and I'm a concerned resident of Wisconsin.

I am testifying against the proposed bills limiting children's identity and participation in school and sports. I'm not a parent myself, but I care deeply for the children within my family and social circles and in general.

These bills are not only a waste of the legislature's time, but extremely harmful to children and their development. There are no proven risks of letting children who identify as trans or gender nonconforming playing in sports that don't match their assigned gender at birth, nor letting them have control over their name and pronouns in a school setting. There are however, plenty of documented risks in preventing these children from living their authentic lives. Roughly 1% of children in the state identify as transgender or gender nonconforming, while rates of suicide are exponential among trans youth with roughly 44% seriously considering and/or attempting suicide.

To claim that transgender youth pose a serious risk to other children is an absolute farce, proven within the language of the bills themselves. For example AB100 only references children assigned male at birth being prohibited from competing with girls or entering a girls locker room. There's no mention of children assigned female at birth entering male sports or locker rooms and no acknowledgement of gender nonconformity or nonbinary children. These bills are written with extreme ignorance, bigotry, and lack of understanding of the actual children it targets.

These bills are ambiguous and are unenforceable. They open up children, whether cis or trans to harassment from adults and put an undue strain on already limited teacher and administrative resources. Instead of this faux moral outrage, I would prefer the law makers, whose salary is funded by my tax dollars, focus on real proven issues facing school children. Roughly 16% of our children face food insecurity which is proven to impact development. 59% of high school students in Wisconsin report facing at least one major mental health challenge over a 12 month period, with another 18% seriously considering suicide. Wisconsin has a huge teacher retention problem, with 4 out of 10 first year teachers leaving the state or profession altogether within 6 years. Quality teachers and teacher/student ratios are another proven metric contributing to the health and well-being of our children. Wisconsin school children face many challenges. Their transgender friends and peers are not one of them.

I am submitting my testimony today as a Milwaukee resident and constituent of Wisconsin. I have lived here for 31 years of my life and during this time, I have been proud to recognize our great state as a safe and affirming place for many queer and transgender individuals to live. I also work in both research ethics and give much of my free time advocating for women's reproductive rights. I am submitting my written testimony against Assembly Bills 100 & 103 that was proposed during the Assembly Committee Meeting on March 6th.

I strongly oppose both AB 100 & 103 that seek to limit trans girls from school sports and require adult "permission" to use different names and pronouns within the school setting, respectively.

AB100 and 103 are clearly crafted as a trans athlete ban and to restrict name and pronoun changes. These bans come at a time of unprecedented anti-trans legislation proposals across the US and do nothing but alienate transgender kids and create a climate of fear rather than cultivation.

As one of your non-transgender constituents, I implore you all to vote against these proposed bills. I stand in solidarity with these members of my community and vehemently oppose these bills that are meant to deny their rights as human beings. I have known many kind, gracious, and generous trans individuals in my lifetime and consider them friends, my family, and my chosen family. They have been there for me through some of the most painful moments of my life, and it would behoove me to not stand for them now as they have for me in the past.

Many of these bills have been submitted to the courts under the guise of "protecting women and girls", AB 100 is no exception. I do not, nor have ever, felt at risk due to the presence of a transgender individual in any restroom, locker room, public space, or sports team. If men, or any individual who wishes to harm students, will do so as they have historically: as themselves and because they believe they have the right to violate someone else's privacy and autonomy. Trans girls (who these bills unjustly target) are not the problem, adult predators concerned about the supposed genitalia of a child are.

These are all the same fear mongering tactics utilized in the early aughts regarding gay and lesbian access to locker rooms and bathrooms. We've done this before, do we really need to do this moral panic again? If we give an inch regarding transgender children, national movements to limit gender affirming care, marriage rights, adoption, and even public life will be made. This will affect not just trans people but LGBTQ+ community as a whole and we will be systematically legislated out of existence under the guise of "protecting women".

If you so desperately want to protect women, propose stronger sentences for sexual assault and rape. If you want to protect women, promote complete and scientifically-based sexual education. If you want to protect women, do more to protect access to affordable healthcare for mothers and programs like WIC and SNAP programs that keep them fed. If you want to protect women, advocate for comprehensive, scientific reproductive healthcare and research- including access to abortion.

If you want to protect women, allow trans girls the safety and opportunity to become trans women.

AB 103 seeks to limit trans girls and children from making autonomous decisions about themselves and their identity and the most crucial time of their development. Legislation such as this will put more children at risk from abuse at home and exacerbate worse mental health outcomes, including suicide. A sense of belonging, that can be achieved by simple expressions of compassion like utilizing chosen names and pronouns, in one of the largest protective factors against trans youth suicide. Students deserve to learn in a place where they feel safe, accepted, heard, and seen for who they are and who they will become. Instead, these laws seek to further alienate them and legislate them out of existence.

Trans people exist and will continue to exist despite these efforts. Nothing will erase the beautiful variation of the human experience, especially that of trans people. To enact these bills is to enact violence on trans people. As representatives in Wisconsin, I ask that you acknowledge all of the trans people you represent, and in good conscience vote against AB 100 and 103.

My name is Rufus Jupiter, and I am a resident of Vernon County in Wisconsin. I was born in Wisconsin and have lived here for 35 years, in both urban and rural locales. I am writing you today in opposition of Bills AB100 and AB103.

I am a 43 year old, nonbinary transmasculine person. I identify neither as male nor as female, and I use they/them pronouns since that is the language that feels comfortable to me. As a young person growing up in the 1980s and 1990s, there was not widespread language to describe people whose gender was other than binary male or female. There were no visible, out LGBTQ+ individuals in my life and few in the public eye who I could look to for guidance. I lived a childhood feeling no true sense of who I was as a person (although I was told by others who I was all the time). By the time I was an adult, I was diagnosed with severe anxiety and depression; I felt lost and worthless, unseen, unknown to anyone, even myself.

It took until my mid- 30s for language to appear in the mainstream dialogue that accurately mirrored who I was. As transgender people and people on the gender spectrum became more visible in the public eye, I began to recognize myself. My anxiety and depression fell away as I finally began to understand and claim my identity.

Today, while visibility of LGBTQ+ folks has expanded greatly, we face a future of uncertainty and fear. How is it, in this country where individual liberties are a supposed right of all citizens, that members of my community still fight for the privilege of being accepted for who we are? AB100 and AB103 are deplorable bills that target a tiny, very vulnerable population of youth. These are bills that directly tell the youth in question that who they are, deep down in their core being, is fundamentally wrong. These are bills, made by grown adults, that purposefully and loudly shame, invalidate, and ridicule children. AB100 specifically singles out transgender youth (who likely are already misunderstood or bullied by peers) and prevents them from participating in healthy extracurricular activities on teams that match their true sense of self. AB103 encourages the shaming and outing of children in school, a setting that should be safe for all children. My name is Kim Suhr, and I live in Wales, 53183. I appreciate the opportunity to voice my position on AB100 and AB103.

I encourage you to vote NO on AB100 the bill that would ban trans athletes from competing on sports teams that align with their gender identity. It seems most people aren't too concerned with trans boys (individuals who had been assigned female at birth but now identify as male) competing in boys' sports, but the thought of even the very small number of trans girls (individuals who had been assigned male at birth but now identify as female) competing in girls' sports makes many Republican lawmakers think they must "protect" cis-gender girls on these teams. People do not choose to be gay, bi-sexual, homosexual, trans, etc. I understand that there are particular reasons why it might be unfair for a trans female to compete in women's sports or the reverse may also on occasion be true. However, identification with a specific gender that is not the birth gender is traumatic for a family and difficult enough for a child.

Please understand that being a trans person or a gay person is not a choice people make. This is a fact of nature or a choice from God. People do not choose to be different, etc. If this was really a choice people make in life do you think people would really choose to make life this hard for themselves? Try to put yourself in the position of a gay person or a trans person. How would you feel if there were laws passed to keep you from being who you truly are? Being a trans person is tough enough without having to deal with legislation against your unique identity. If you study the science of LGBTQ identity I think you will realize that laws can't change life for people whose identity differs from what you might consider "normal."

Dr. Stephanie Budge, Madison, Wisconsin Regarding Assembly Bill 100 and Assembly Bill 103 To: The Wisconsin State Assembly Committee on Education

My name is Dr. Stephanie Budge and I am a resident of Wisconsin who has a specialty in understanding the mental health impacts of discrimination related to transgender individuals. I am a licensed psychologist in the state of Wisconsin. While I am testifying as a private citizen, my role as a Professor of Counseling Psychology at the University of Wisconsin-Madison provides me with the expertise necessary to comment on this bill (I have published 100+ academic articles mostly focused on transgender people, over 180+ conference presentations mostly focused on transgender people, and have engaged in clinical work related to over 200 transgender people). I have worked in the field of transgender research and clinical work for 17 years.

I am testifying that the passing of these bills and the subsequent actions from these bills have a high likelihood of causing both physical and mental health impacts on youth. For the record, I oppose the proposed bills AB100 and AB103 based on the scientific research presented below.

Broadly, psychological science has used the concept of "minority stress" to understand and explain the reasons why transgender people (and members of other minority groups) experience physical and mental health disparities (see Meyer, 2003; Hendricks & Testa, 2012). The minority stress model indicates that there are three types of minority stressors: 1) external stressors, 2) expectations of external stressors, and 3) internal stressors. Examples of external stressors experienced by transgender people include discrimination, prejudice, harassment, rejection, and non-affirmation of gender identity. Examples of internal stressors experienced by transgender people include concealing one's gender identity, internalizing gender-related stigma, and constantly thinking about one's gender. Transgender people will often expect that they will experience external stressors due to having actually experienced them in the past, as well as witnessing or hearing about other transgender people who have experienced external stressors. This lens can assist with understanding the impacts of both exclusion from sports teams (AB100) and the impacts of not being able to use chosen names and pronouns in required settings, such as schools (AB103).

Sports Participation

For children and young adults, school-sponsored sports offer lifelong benefits and have a positive developmental impact that is second only to family support. These benefits can be seen in a variety of realms in students' lives, including social and emotional development as well as physical and mental health. With regards to social benefits, students who participate in sports are given the opportunity to make friends and become part of a supportive community of teammates and peers (Boone & Leadbeater, 2006). Athletes spend considerable time with their teammates, often experiencing high-pressure situations together that lead to deeper friendships and students who participate in sports also can build teamwork, discipline, and leadership skills (Thompson et al., 2022). They learn the importance of working as part of a team to achieve a common goal and the importance of each teammate's role in bringing about that goal (Salcinovic et al., 2022). Moreover, coaches and other staff members provide students who participate in sports access to meaningful mentorship and guidance. (Mills & Clements, 2021). This mentorship can extend beyond school sports, guiding students through other areas of their lives.

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With regards to emotional benefits, school sports provide an opportunity for youth to gain confidence. They also reduce the effects of risk factors, such as stressful life events, that lead to increases in depression. Furthermore, learning how to manage stressful events at a young age provides benefits to student athletes throughout their lives, such as learning how to regulate their emotions. Students who participate in sports experience significantly lower levels of externalizing issues (for example, aggression and delinquency) and anxiety/depression (Vella, 2019). Students also experience the success and personal fulfillment achieved from discipline, hard work, and perseverance through many hours of practice and competition, all of which helps students develop positive habits that can benefit them in many other areas of life (Eime et al, 2014).

Based on my experience working with transgender youth, it would be psychologically damaging for a transgender youth to be banned from playing sports on equal terms with cisgender peers. This type of discrimination causes irreversible and severe damage to transgender youth development. Specifically, discriminating against transgender youth athletes leads to an increase in youth anxiety, depression, trauma, and suicidal ideation/attempts as well as an increase in physical health concerns for transgender youth (Chan et al., 2024). Barrera et al. report that the physical consequences for transgender youth of not being able to participate in sports include worse cardiovascular outcomes, poor bone mineral density, and poor neurocognitive development when compared to cisgender youth. In addition, physicians report that participation in sports is often one primary method through which transgender youth gain access to regular medical care, and if they do not participate in sports, it increases the disparity between cisgender youth and transgender youth (Hughes et al., 2022). In addition to the physical and mental health consequences of not being able to participate in sports, transgender people report greater experiences of harassment, prejudice, rejection, and bullying as a result of legislation focused on restricting transgender people's rights (Tebbe et al., 2022).

Transgender youth will also internalize the shame and stigma of being excluded for a personal characteristic (being transgender) over which they have no control and that already subjects them to prejudice and social stigma. Fear of additional discrimination and violence are two primary outcomes that stem from transgender youth being excluded from sports (Kosciw et al., 2022). Not only are there the actual consequences outlined above that occur from direct discrimination, but fear of additional sports-related discrimination leads transgender youth to avoid gym/physical education class, locker rooms, and athletic fields and facilities. Also, being misgendered (i.e., requiring transgender girls to participate in boys' sports) is associated with the internalization of stigma and the subsequent mental health consequences that arise from internalized stigma (McLemore, 2015).

Importance of Social Transition

The incongruence between a person's gender identity and sex assigned at birth can manifest in clinically significant distress, which the American Psychiatric Association calls gender dysphoria. Gender dysphoria is codified in the American Psychiatric Association's Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders (APA, 2022; DSM-5-TR) and is the medical and psychiatric diagnosis for distress associated with gender incongruence. Two current diagnostic categories are used by mental health and medical providers when children and youth are transgender: Gender Dysphoria in Childhood and Gender Dysphoria in Adolescents and Adults. Although individuals who are diagnosed with gender dysphoria can experience a diversity of symptoms, the shared diagnostic criteria that is required for both includes clear, distinct, and significant distress from the incongruence between the sex the individual was assigned at birth and their gender identity.

For transgender individuals, social transition can be an important aspect of treatment to reduce the symptoms of gender dysphoria. As part of a social transition, an individual will typically, among other things, use a name and pronouns congruent with their gender identity and use sex-designated facilities such as restrooms that align with their gender identity. To be clinically effective at alleviating the distress associated with gender dysphoria, a social transition must be respected consistently across all aspects of a transgender individual's life—for example, at home, in school, and at work. It is the aim of treatment to assist the individual in successfully integrating their internal identity into a life that allows them to function consistently in accordance with that identity and not feel shame for who they are. For those transgender adolescents for whom social transition is part of treatment of gender dysphoria, it is likely that serious distress will result if clinically indicated aspects of transition are impeded, as is suggested in both AB 100 and AB 103.

The precise treatment for gender dysphoria depends on the individual. For most transgender individuals, a gender transition is considered psychologically and medically necessary. Transition can take either or both of two forms: (a) social transition, and (b) medical treatments that change a person's body to align with their gender.

Gender dysphoria reduces significantly when the treatment aligns with the individual's goals, and the medical community has known for decades that there are effective interventions to reduce gender dysphoria. Every major medical association in the United States agrees that medical treatment for gender dysphoria is safe, necessary, and effective (Lockmiller, 2023).

For transgender individuals, social transition can be an important aspect of treatment to reduce the symptoms of gender dysphoria. As part of a social transition, an individual will typically, among other things, use a name and pronouns congruent with their gender identity and use sex-designated facilities such as restrooms that align with their gender identity. To be clinically effective at alleviating the distress associated with gender dysphoria, a social transition must be respected consistently across all aspects of a transgender individual's life—for example, at home, in school, and at work. It is the aim of treatment to assist the individual in successfully integrating their internal identity into a life that allows them to function consistently in accordance with that identity and not feel shame for who they are. For those transgender adolescents for whom social transition is part of treatment of gender dysphoria, it is likely that serious distress will result if clinically indicated aspects of transition are impeded.

Psychotherapy to reduce the harmful effects of stigma and improve resiliency can also be an important form of support for individuals of any age with gender dysphoria (see Budge et al., 2025; Budge et al., 2021; Exposito-Campos et al., 2023). While psychotherapy can be useful as a support tool, it is not a substitute for social transition and medical treatments needed to reduce/eliminate gender dysphoria (see Lindley et al., 2023).

Attempts to "cure" transgender individuals by seeking to change their gender identity to match their assigned sex are ineffective and cause extreme psychological damage (see APA, 2021). All major associations of medical and mental health providers, including the American Medical Association, the American Psychiatric Association, the American Psychological Association, and the American Academy of Pediatrics, consider such efforts unethical.

Failing to support a transgender minor's gender identity can cause serious harm to their long-term health and wellbeing because transgender youth experience that mistreatment as a profound rejection of their core self. This harm often includes significant psychological distress

and difficulty maintaining healthy interpersonal relationships and developing emotional resilience, among others. Research demonstrates the importance of social transition for transgender youth. Research from the longitudinal TransYouth Project (TYP) indicates that transgender youth who have socially transitioned demonstrate similar mental health patterns when compared to cisgender youth (Durwood et al., 2017; Olson et al., 2016). Additional research demonstrates that social transition processes are related to less depression, less suicidal ideation, and less suicidal behaviors (Russell et al., 2018). Consequently, delaying social transition is detrimental for transgender youth. Horton's (2022) qualitative study of parents of transgender youth provides an in-depth analysis of the consequences of delaying social transition for children, notably mentioning the psychological distress that results from delaying social transition. In the largest nationwide survey in the U.S. focusing on discrimination experiences of transgender people 18 and older, impeding social transition processes (for example, not being able to change one's name) is directly related to experiencing harassment and assault (James et al., 2016). In a large (N = 1,519) nation-wide Canadian survey of transgender youth, findings similarly demonstrate that not being able to access social transition components/processes is also directly related to experiencing harassment, assault, and denial of services (Taylor et al., 2020).

In addition to studies that focus generally on external stressors, there have been several studies that delve into specific types of external stressors. For example, there is one type of external stressor called "misgendering" that includes communications or actions that convey that a person's gender is misperceived or is being purposefully denied, as is being highlighted in both AB 100 and AB 103. Examples of misgendering can include using a name or pronouns inconsistent with a person's gender identity or denying them access to gendered facilities that are consistent with their gender identity (McLemore, 2018). In a study with 1,091 participants, researchers reported higher anxiety scores for participants who reported more instances of misgendering (Jacobsen et al, 2023). As well, McLemore (2015) found that experiences of being misgendered were associated with anxiety and negative affect (e.g., hostility and guilt), lower self-esteem related to appearance, and felt stigma. In a follow-up study with more specific measures regarding mental health, McLemore (2018) again reported that experiences of being misgendered were related to depression, anxiety, stress, and felt stigma. In addition to depression and anxiety, Colson et al. (2024) found that participants reported post-traumatic stress symptoms as a result of misgendering.

Misgendering, along with other forms of external stressors, is considered a form of social exclusion. Social psychology has established that seeking social acceptance is one of the most basic human needs and that the harms of social exclusion based on identity are widespread and can be catastrophic. On an individual level, social exclusion impacts one's sense of belonging, self-esteem, sense of existence, and self-control. Social exclusion is associated with an increase in maladaptive behaviors and risk-taking behaviors. On a systematic level, social exclusion is often reinforced by organizations and institutions adopting policies and procedures that can enforce discrimination toward certain groups of people. Social exclusion is considered harmful in general; however, it can be even more harmful when people in positions of power perpetuate notions that isolate and stigmatize transgender people. Research on social identity theory describes the harm that results when people of higher status—usually people in power such as administrators—fail to affirm or actively disaffirm lower-status individuals with a marginalized identity (Hogg, 2016). This often leads to external forms of harm such as ostracization and discrimination against the individual by peers and others, as well as internal harms such as internalized shame and self-hatred. These internal and external factors can be directly related to

psychological distress, such as post-traumatic stress disorder, depressive disorders, anxiety disorders, and hypertension, amongst myriad other health concerns.

In a study involving 610 transgender individuals (Galupo et al. 2020), study participants provided information about their experience of gender dysphoria. When asked about the impact of being misgendered or otherwise discriminated against based on their being transgender, they provided descriptions such as "it's like a visceral, violating, physical manifestation of psychological pain for me" and "each of those [misgenderings] is a knife." In our recent publications on the experiences of gender dysphoria, the data indicate that gender dysphoria is distressing (Lindley, Lee, Norton, & Budge, 2024) and that social experiences, like misgendering, increase gender dysphoria (Lindley, Pulice-Farrow, & Budge, 2023).

Misgendering and Gender Discrimination Have Long Lasting Mental Health Effects

Transgender people report extensive exposure to mistreatment, harassment, and violence (James et al., 2016). One of the largest nationwide studies in the United States focused on LGBTQ+ youth demonstrates that transgender youth experience significant amounts of harassment, bullying, and violence (Kosciw et al., 2022). In a report from the data that compared transgender and cisgender youth (GLSEN, 2021), 84.4% of transgender youth felt unsafe at school when compared to 20.6% of their cisgender LGBQ+ (lesbian, gay, bisexual, and queer, but not transgender) peers. In addition, 43.6% of the transgender sample reported missing school because they felt unsafe or uncomfortable, compared to 24.9% of their cisgender LGBQ+ peers. The study indicated that 77.3% of transgender students reported experiencing discrimination at school, compared to 46.1% of the cisgender sample. In the overall report (Kosciw et al., 2022), 80.3% of youth reported hearing biased language regarding gender expression and 65.2% reported hearing anti-transgender language while at school. Of those youth, 72% reported that there was a staff member present while hearing those remarks and that 91% of staff did not intervene. In one of the largest nationwide Canadian studies to focus on transgender youth (Taylor et al., 2020), 66% of youth reported being bullied, 35% were physically threatened or injured, 9% were threatened with a weapon; 63% reported experiencing verbal sexual harassment, 34% reported physical sexual harassment. In another study, transgender youth reported high rates of physical violence at school (57%) and nonphysical victimization at school (68%) (De Pedro & Gorse, 2023).

Transgender children and adolescents experience a great deal of victimization in the school environment, including bullying, physical assault, sexual assault, maltreatment, property victimization, and witnessing/indirect victimization. In their systematic review, Martin-Castillo et al. (2020) examined the effects of school-based victimization throughout 19 studies covering over 23,000 transgender people. Results from this systematic review indicate that transgender youth experience significantly higher rates of victimization at school than their cisgender peers.

There also is robust data regarding the psychological impact of external stressors for transgender youth and young adults. Exposure to discrimination has been linked with higher reports of depression, anxiety, post-traumatic stress disorder, self-harm, and suicidality (e.g., Chozden et al., 2019; Price-Feeney, Green, & Dorison, 2020; Veale et al., 2019; Wilson et al., 2016). Pease and colleagues (2022) note that external minority stressors were directly related to psychological distress for young adults. In addition to this finding, they also note that experiencing more anti-transgender discrimination leads to higher levels of gender dysphoria, which then increase psychological distress for young adults. A recent meta-analysis noted that gender related discrimination, gender related rejection, gender related victimization, and nonaffirmation of gender identity were all positively related to depression and anxiety (Wilson et al., 2024).

Regarding mental health disparities, transgender youth consistently report higher instances of mental health concerns when compared to their cisgender counterparts. When compared with cisgender matched controls, transgender youth displayed a twofold to threefold increased risk of depression, anxiety, suicidal ideation, suicide attempt, and self-harm (Reisner et al., 2015). In their study, Fox et al. (2020) report that transgender adolescents were 8 times more likely to report depressive symptoms when compared to cisgender adolescents and were 5 times more likely than cisgender adolescents to report self-harm and suicidality. There is a large body of research demonstrating that these disparities can be explained primarily by the presence of external stressors. One study by Suarez et al. (2024) analyzed data comparing 98,174 cisgender and transgender youth and found that transgender students were more likely than cisgender students to report experiences of violence, poor mental health, suicide risk, some sexual risk behaviors, unstable housing, and felt less belonging at school. A recent meta-analysis noted that transgender young adults experienced significantly higher rates of 7 types of victimization (violent victimization, sexual victimization, intimate partner violence victimization, stalking, bullying, microaggression, and discrimination) when compared to cisgender young adults (Daigle et al., 2024).

Although all psychological distress deserves attention, suicidality (suicidal ideation, suicide attempts, and completed suicide) is perhaps one of the most devastating outcomes due to the finality of completed suicide. For transgender youth, the evidence indicates that suicidality is an overwhelming mental health disparity. Data indicate that transgender youth are more likely to attempt suicide when compared to cisgender youth; for example, that 45% of transgender youth compared to 12% of cisgender boys and 24% of cisgender girls (Zell & Kerr, 2024). Additional studies indicate that transgender youth are 2.71 times more likely to attempt suicide than cisgender youth (Jackman et al., 2019). In one of the largest samples of transgender young adults (age 18-25) in the US, 66% of respondents indicated an experience of suicidal ideation (Wang et al., 2024). In addition, in a sample of transgender youth, 86% reported suicidal ideation and 56% reported a previous suicide attempt and that external stressors such as harassment and bullying were directly related to suicide attempts (Austin et al., 2022). As noted above, these disparities can be explained primarily by the presence of external stressors. A recent systematic review indicated that safety and connectedness at school were amongst some of the primary protective factors from suicide attempts for transgender youth (Christensen et al., 2023).

Studies demonstrate that a negative school climate is not only detrimental to transgender youths' mental health, but also impacts their academic achievement. When compared to cisgender youth, transgender youth were three times more likely to be truant from school due to feeling more unsafe and distressed (Day et al., 2018). Additionally, transgender youth reported greater victimization at school and poorer academic performance when compared to cisgender LGBQ+ peers (Poteat et al., 2021). Transgender youth are statistically more likely to fail a class than cisgender youth and are less likely to take advanced math classes by the end of their school (Wilkenson et al., 2021).

Conclusion

I urge the Wisconsin Legislature to understand the mental health effects of excluding transgender youth from playing on sports teams that match their gender identity and effects of not using the correct name and pronouns for youth. As outlined above, these effects can be

detrimental and are considered discriminatory. Your consideration of these matters is very much appreciated.

My name is Kaelee Heideman and I am an elementary school counselor and 2023 Wisconsin State Teacher of the Year in Oshkosh, Wisconsin, zip code 54904. Although I am unable to attend the hearing in person, I am writing to respectfully submit the following testimony in opposition of Assembly Bills 100 and 103 relating to proposed bans on trans athletes and pronouns and names.

Private parts are just that, private. As an elementary school counselor, I spend part of every school year teaching my students about protective behaviors. We review that our whole bodies belong to us and no one should be looking at or touching the private parts of your body without a good reason. Excluding student athletes from school athletic activities based on the private parts of their bodies is nothing short of discriminatory and a violation of privacy. It is no one's business what lies underneath another person's clothing. A trans girl is a girl, no questions asked. A trans boy is a boy, no questions asked. If you attempt to exclude a student from participating in a school athletic activity based on their sex assigned at birth, you are making a decision based solely on the private parts of that child's body. Ask my elementary students if this is right or wrong, and even they will tell you that talking about someone else's private parts is wrong.

Pronouns save lives. Every person, every child, deserves to feel safe and loved for who they are. This means that our trans students deserve to be called by the correct name and pronouns. Unfortunately, our trans youth are not always safe to be out at home, in part because proposed bills like these perpetuate the negative stereotypes that exist around trans folks. When home is not safe for students, school often becomes the place where students are wrapped up in care and unconditional love. Schools become the place where trans youth are safe to come out and use their names and pronouns. Guardian consent should not be required in order to use a child's name and pronouns. This is a major safety concern because it could require educators to unknowingly out their students and create unsafe reactions at home. I always tell my students that my job is to keep them safe and the passing of AB103 would keep me from being able to uphold that promise. When the adults at home are safe people for their children, the children rarely have a problem sharing who they really are with their adults. Schools should not have to be put in the position to break trust with the kids who need us most. Quite frankly, it is concerning that we are so focused on regulating the name a child can be called at school when many adults have seamlessly transitioned from calling the Gulf of Mexico to calling it the Gulf of America and they did so without permission from that body of water.

The passage of Assembly Bills 100 and 103 will only harm our students. I strongly oppose the possibility of putting students at risk for serious harm by outing them through practices that include identifying a child solely on their sex assigned at birth or requiring guardian permission to use certain names or pronouns in a school setting. Our job is to protect all students, and all means all.

My name is Izak Messany and I live in Baraboo, WI 53913.

I am completing this written testimony to protest three anti-trans bills introduced by Republican state assembly representatives. My name is Mica, and I am a concerned Madison resident writing to express my strong opposition to Assembly Bills AB100 and AB103. These bills are plainly discriminatory against transgender youth and represent a significant step backward in the fight for civil rights. We should be supporting and protecting our trans youth, especially in such a hostile political climate. Research consistently shows that transgender youth are at a higher risk of depression, anxiety, and suicide, with lack of community support being a significant contributing factor. Addressing students by their chosen name and pronouns and allowing them to participate in sports is a basic, yet crucial, way to affirm their place in our community.

I want to share my personal experience to highlight the critical importance of community support. I was born in Stoughton but moved to Madison in middle school. From a young age, I felt an internal conflict over my gender. I have diary entries from as early as third grade lamenting that I wasn't allowed to sing with the other girls or join my sister in her dance classes. This was long before I even knew that trans people existed or had ever been taught about gender identity. My first exposure to other trans people was online. In digital spaces, I could be my authentic self, whereas in school, I often felt withdrawn and alienated.

At 14, I finally decided to come out as trans to some online friends. Unfortunately, I was outed to my broader community without my consent. The backlash was devastating—I received harassing and inappropriate messages from strangers, while people I knew mocked me and distanced themselves. I felt ashamed, dehumanized, and sexualized in ways that were deeply painful. The treatment I received led me to believe that I was the problem, and I attempted to suppress my identity in order to make others more comfortable. In doing so, I suffered greatly. I became depressed, irritable, and constantly anxious.

By my senior year of high school, pretending to be someone I wasn't became unbearable. I began skipping school, which led to conflicts with my parents. By that time, I had already attempted suicide once and felt trapped between another attempt or finally coming out to my parents. I chose the latter. Fortunately, they were supportive and advocated for me with the school, allowing me to graduate despite my attendance issues.

College was a turning point. Meeting other queer and trans people alleviated my isolation, and though I still struggled with my mental health, I finally felt like my life was improving. I joined a campus support group for gender-diverse students and, for the first time in years, experienced genuine happiness. Then COVID hit, and I, like many others, felt isolated again. Since that period, I have worked to rebuild my sense of community connection slowly.

Recently, I started a new job as an advocate for sexual assault survivors. Though the work is challenging, it is also deeply rewarding. In the future, I plan to return to school to

study mental health care and pursue a career in the field. I want to support those who are struggling and feel alone because I understand firsthand how much of a difference compassion and affirmation can make. I myself am profoundly grateful to be here today, to have experienced so much joy that I never thought possible, and to have a loving partner, family, and friends who have supported me through my journey. Their kindness and advocacy saved my life.

It is crucial and life-saving to affirm and support transgender and non-binary youth in their gender expression. I urge our state to take a stand against discrimination and ensure that all students, regardless of gender identity, are treated with the dignity and respect they deserve by opposing these bills.

I would like to register my opposition to bills AB100 and AB103.

I am not transgender. But I am a man of science, and of common sense, and with a passion for high school sports. And both science, common sense, and support for school sports stand in opposition to this bill. The science is that designating sex by birth the way this bill does is incredibly presumptive, ignoring the realities of individuals with both male and female chromosomes, genitalia, and a host of other conditions that fall under the intersex umbrella. The fact is that in more cases than you want to admit, when the physician designates a biological sex at the time of birth, sometimes they're guessing, and sometimes they guess wrong. This law ignores that reality in favor of an imaginary binary.

Common sense is that if boys pretending to be transgender in order to dominate girls' sports or get into girls' locker rooms was a genuine problem in need of legislation, it would actually be happening. Incidents of legitimately transgender girls finding athletic success in Wisconsin are scarce if not non-existent, transgender girls share locker rooms with other girls peacefully every day, and if someone is determined to be a creep in a girls-only space, no law is going to stop them, but they will be rooted out and dealt with quickly.

And let's not forget the reason school sports exist in the first place: to give kids the opportunity to play sports. Arguments pretending to care about scholarship opportunities and competitive imbalance--none of which are truly impacted by transgender athletes--fail to acknowledge that those take a backseat to letting kids play sports. Barring academic ineligibility or misconduct, we should always err on the side of letting kids play sports. There is no harm done by allowing transgender athletes to play sports, but there is much harm in denying them that chance.

I have lived in Wisconsin my whole life. I grew up on my grandpa's dairy farm. And I know how great Wisconsin can be. How helpful Wisconsinites can be to each other. I am asking you to be a helpful Wisconsinite.

I am not able to be at the Capitol in person today, but I am submitting my written testimony to implore you to vote "no" on assembly bill 100 and Assembly bill 103.

From what I understand of reading Assembly Bill 100 and other information about it I believe that if this bill is passed it will hurt many student athletes. I believe that students should be allowed to be in whatever sport they choose to participate in. If a girl would like to play football or wrestle, I believe she should be able to. If a boy would like to play volleyball I believe he should be able to. I think that children should be able to explore different opportunities and interests to figure out what they enjoy doing and who they truly are. The only way that is possible is to allow children to participate in whatever activity interests them. In addition, I do not believe letting trans or non binary children participate in sports, on sports teams that fit the gender they have transitioned to/identify with is harmful to anyone.

Transgender and nonbinary children just want to be able to be who they are and feel safe and comfortable in their body. They are NOT trying to pull a fast one on anyone to win medals or championships. Or to hurt anyone. They just want a happy, healthy, normal life like everyone else. They don't want to be othered by anyone and they don't want to be made unsafe.

My understanding of assembly bill 103 is that it will make it harder for kids to be called by a chosen name or nickname and gender in school. I do not understand why this is something that would need to be a law.

Schools are supposed to be safe places for kids. Some kids, it is the ONLY safe place that they have. Passing a law that would only allow kids to be called by a chosen name or nickname and gender in school if their parents approve will be devastating to many children.

There are many kids who do not have parents that understand them. I do have friends who have kids that are nonbinary. These children are lucky because their parents love them, are understanding and want them to be who they are. But, not all parents are like that. Some parents will not understand their kids or even try to. Some parents only love their children if they do EXACTLY what they want and act EXACTLY as the parent wants. There are many parents who are abusive.

Not allowing children to be called what they would like to be called at school, without parents permission or having the school call parents about it and out children to their parents will be very dangerous. If a kid doesn't feel safe with their parent they will ask for these things at school where they may feel safer. This bill will take away that safety and any trusted adult. And that is heartbreaking.

All children deserve to have at least one adult they can trust and turn to when they need help. Passing this bill will force teachers to not be a safe adult to kids ever again. That will have severe consequences for all students. Not just trans and nonbinary students.

When I was young I didn't like my name, so I decided not to answer to it. My mom had to call me a different name for me to answer her. What if there is a student that has a similar experience to me and because of this bill they can't be called the name they want? I am not transgender and that had nothing to do with me not answering to my name. As a matter of fact, I thought my given name was a "boy's name" and I'm a girl, so I made my mom call be a "girl's name" before I'd answer her. Now, as an adult I like my name. But, as a little kid I was trying to fit in and figure out who I was. Shouldn't all kids be able to do that freely?

I fear that having changes like this is targeting children who are vulnerable and are already in more danger than their peers. Transgender and nonbinary youth have a more than four times greater rates of suicide attempts than their cisgender peers. Also, laws that are anti-transgender cause a 72% increase in suicide attempts in transgender and nonbinary youth. Those statistics are shocking and terrifying. We should all be able to agree that children being put in situations where they think suicide is better than the situations they are forced into is bad. We should all want to prevent that from happening. Please keep these children safe. Please prevent children's deaths.

Please vote no on these assembly bills. Please keep all kids safe, especially the truly vulnerable ones who get put in more danger when bills like this are passed.

I use the strongest evidence and guidelines-based care to help me support my patients' health goals. It is distressing to see proposed bills go against biological facts, scientific evidence, and medical guidelines. I urge you to reject these anti-science, anti-medical, and ultimately anti-child bills, which will put transgender, non-binary, and gender non-conforming children at risk. Schools and sports are supposed to be safe spaces for children, and these bills would make them less safe.

Re: AB103: this bill goes against gender affirming actions for gender diverse children as affirmed and recommended by The American Academy of Pediatrics(1), American Psychiatric Association (2), and American Psychological Association (3).

I oppose the proposed bills assembly bills 100 and 103 regarding athletic sports and the sex of partificpants and changing a pupil's legal name and pronouns. I personally know a transgender girl who is just now entering the Madison public school system and it saddens me to know that the authors of these bills seem to deny her very existence and attempt to limit her future ability to participate in essential activites like school sports and use her preferred pronouns.

Kids learn a lot of important life lessons in sports: leadership, confidence, self-respect, advocacy and what it means to be part of a team. When we tell transgender girls that they can't play girls' sports— or transgender boys that they can't play boys' sports—they miss out on this important childhood experience and all the lessons it teaches.

It can be hard to understand what it means to be transgender, especially if you've never met a transgender person. And it's common to have questions at first. But we can all agree that transgender kids should be treated with dignity and respect, just like everyone else. Transgender athletes have for many years been beneficial parts of teams throughout Wisconsin.

Transgender and nonbinary youth athletes play sports for the exact same reasons as other students their age: Staying healthy, being part of a team, and fostering friendships—all lifelong benefits of playing a sport.

There is no scientic root in the assertion that individuals should be referred to by pronouns tied to their biological sex. The research predominately shows that denying the a child's self-identified gender has negative outcomes later in life, including a higher risk of suicide. Intersex people, despite clearly not conforming, biologically, to either binary sex, are not accounted for by these pronouns. Legally defining gendered pronouns as being tied to biological sex, then, since not based in science, must be based in arbitrary values. I do not believe these are the values of community, and I believe are informed by the fringe religious beliefs of a vocal minority, which have no place in our laws and schools.

My name is Molecula Hopkins-Sheets. I live within the city limits of Madison, WI and I am writing into this hearing to oppose Bills AB100 and AB103. If I could be there in person, I would.

First, I would like to address the proposed ban on allowing youth trans athletes to participate in the sport under their gender. This is the wrong move to make for the youth of Wisconsin. I am a woman. I was biologically born a woman, and I identify as a woman. I grew up playing on both girls and boys soccer teams until I was 18. I can honestly say the gender of the participants of each team I played on made no difference to how I played and to the rank I held while I played. I was a starting player on both the girls and boys teams in this state. You can claim biological differences, but for youth why should that matter? Why should we not let them play sports? I urgently ask you to oppose Bill AB100 and Bill AB103.

Regarding Bill AB100:

Education-based athletics is founded on a commitment to equitable, inclusive, and welcoming learning communities for all students. All students, including transgender students, deserve the chance to participate in activities like sports, which offer valuable lessons in teamwork, leadership, self-discipline, and contribute to both physical and mental well-being. This right is protected by Title IX.

Furthermore, as cited in Gender Explained: A New Understanding of Identity in a Gender Creative World by Diane Ehrensaft, PhD and Michelle Jurkiewicz, PsyD, research shows:

Transgender and gender-diverse youth have a lower risk of suicide, greater feelings of safety, are less likely to experience victimization or harassment, and are less likely to skip class due to safety concerns when they attend schools with inclusive policies, whether or not they play sports.1

• Cisgender girls' participation in school sports either remained the same or increased after instating inclusive policies, such as in California, where cisgender girls' participation rose by approximately 14 percent in the six years following the enactment of gender-inclusive sports policies in 2014 (as opposed to a decrease in cisgender girls' sports participation in states with gender exclusive policies).2

• Transgender students in states with fully inclusive athletic policies were 14 percent less likely to have considered suicide than students in non-inclusive states.3

Not only do inclusive policies not harm cisgender girls, but inclusive policies help protect transgender girls, an already vulnerable student population.

Oppose Bill AB100 and let all our children play.

Regarding Bill AB103:

We expect our schools to be safe environments for our children to learn and grow. A lot is expected from students each day—they need to stay focused, do their work, and put in their best effort. However, if they are continuously called a name and/or pronoun that does not align with their identity, it will not only be distracting but also painful. Using the correct name and pronoun is the most effective way to say, "I see you." That builds trust and safety.

If a cisgender person was constantly referred to by a name or pronoun different than what they identified with, it would be seen as harassment. It would have the same negative impact on their education and mental health. Transgender students deserve the same consideration as cisgender students—to be called by the name and pronoun with which they self-identify.

Bill AB103 makes it a requirement of schools to out children to their parents before the children are ready. If a child wants to try out a new name and pronoun at school before coming out to their parents, it hurts no one. It is no different than trying out a nickname. A variation on a birthname is allowed, so why not a chosen name? Using a child-chosen name is respectful to the child. Moreover, forcing a child to out themselves to a family that may not be supportive of them could endanger their safety.

I advocate for the rights of trans and non-binary kids because they matter. They exist. They are just as valid as cisgender kids and deserve the same respect to be called by the name and pronoun with which they identify.

As a resident of Wisconsin for nearly 35 years, I am proud of the times in our state's history when we prove to live by our motto, "Forward." I'm proud that in 1982, Governor Lee Dreyfus signed into law a bill that made it illegal for state or private businesses to discriminate based on sexual orientation in employment and housing, nine years before any other state granted that same protection. Let's not go backward. Let's live by our motto and support and protect ALL children.

I whole-heartedly ask that you reject Assembly Bills 100 and 103. I work in secondary education and have seen first-hand that implementing affirming language and policies can save lives.

The Trevor Project reports that over 41% of LGBTQ+ young people have seriously contemplated or attempted suicide, inclusing half of trans and nonbinary young people. My daughter was part of this statistic and we were thankfully able to save her. Two of my friends were not so lucky.

My name is Alicia McQuade, and I am writing to express my strong opposition to the proposed amendments to AB100 and AB103. These amendments, which target transgender students by seeking to restrict their participation in school sports and limit the use of their correct names and pronouns, are harmful, unnecessary, and not supported by research or best practices.

Data clearly shows the harm that discriminatory policies inflict on transgender youth. According to The Trevor Project's 2023 National Survey on LGBTQ Youth Mental Health, over 50% of transgender and nonbinary youth seriously considered suicide in the past year. Importantly, trans youth who have their pronouns respected attempt suicide at half the rate of those who do not. The American Academy of Pediatrics has found no evidence that inclusive sports policies harm cisgender athletes, while excluding transgender students contributes to poor health outcomes, stigma, and social isolation.

Leading authorities in medicine and education—including the American Medical Association, American Psychological Association, and National Education Association—oppose legislation that restricts the rights and dignity of transgender youth. The amendments to AB100 and AB103 are out of step with these expert recommendations and with the values of fairness, safety, and inclusion in our schools.

The proposed amendments are not protecting students; they are actively endangering some of our most vulnerable young people. I urge you to reject these amendments and stand in support of trans students who deserve to learn, grow, and participate in school without fear of discrimination.

Testimony Opposing Bills AB100 & AB103

My name is Kaycie Peck, from Stevens Pont, WI 54481, and I'm writing to you under two hats. The first hat I wear is of a parent of two confident children, one of which is a transgender 7-year-old. The second is as a high school and middle school GSA advisor in rural Wisconsin.

As a parent of a trans child, I oppose both bills AB100 and AB103. We have been following our child's guidance on their gender journey since they were 3 or 4 years old. This is consistent with the American Pediatric Association's information that a child often solidifies their understanding of gender around 4 years old. It was then that our child started saying sometimes they felt like a girl, sometimes they felt like both, and sometimes they felt like neither. In 4K, when the school photographer asked the class to line up in a boys line and girls like, my child fell to the floor crying not knowing which line to go in. Every teacher my child has had has been incredibly supportive, loving, and respectful of my child's identity. They teach age-appropriate discussions of gender, that there are no boy or girl books, toys, jobs, etc. All the public school teachers my child has respect their pronouns, often check in on them and the family to ensure they are doing all right. My child also has a physical disability, Spina Bifida. Despite two very "othering" qualities of their identity, my child is confident, thriving, and proud of all of who they are. Why? Because they are surrounded by people in their life who support and love them for who they are. They are surrounded by love at school, where they are 8 hours a day.

If the bill passes and my child's teachers are stifled from supporting my child, what will happen? The data has shown that trans students who don't have a supportive adult at school have a higher likelihood of depression and suicide. These bills would harm children like my child. My child would no longer have the opportunity to benefit from youth sports. Youth sports teams are not about the competition and the winning. The Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association (WIAA)'s mission statement is to organize an athletic program that will "maximize opportunities for member schools' participation" in interscholastic athletics, as well as "cultivate high ideals of citizenship and sportsmanship". How is a law that forces exclusion from sports supporting cooperation, teamwork, collaboration, common vision, and goal setting that youth sports in schools provide?

If I want my child to be a successful human in this world, these laws are setting them up to struggle if not fail. These laws will not give them the support they need to work within the school structures these laws are tearing down. These laws will also go against my parental wishes and parental rights, which they seem to be claiming to protect.

Under my second hat, I write to you opposing these bills as a GSA advisor to middle and high school students in a rural community outside Stevens Point for almost 10 years now. I have witnessed the struggles that trans and LGBTQ+ students face when they are finding themselves, expressing themselves, or just existing. I have witnessed their struggles, but I have also witnessed their bravery at advocating for what they need in a community that is not always supportive. These bills will close doors to students that work very hard to even reach those opportunities. As my role in education, our goal is NOT to hide things from families. Testimony Regarding Assembly Bill 100 & Assembly Bill 103:

To the Assembly Committee on Education,

The vilification of trans youth is abhorrent and does not belong in the Wisconsin legislature.

Transgender people comprise 1.6% of the human population. Of that fraction, even less play sports. Only 34 trans athletes have openly competed in U.S. college sports to date and fewer make it to the professional level. The largest disparities in sports fairness come from the socioeconomic disadvantage of marginalized populations, not trans participation. Proximity to privilege predicts success in sports, not testosterone levels or biological markers. Meanwhile, disparities faced by the trans community begin at a young age and impact all facets of life including sports access. Trans youth are 9 times more likely to experience homelessness than their cisgender peers, and 68% experience bullying in middle school and high school. 22% of trans women surveyed in 2015 reported that they were bullied so badly in school that they dropped out. Many trans students worry about where they will use the bathroom at school, never mind which locker room to use. Without supportive services to help them navigate these additional challenges, it's tougher for them than their peers to make it through classes, let alone onto a soccer field. (Thank you to ACLU for the use of their stats and statistics)

These bills are only fueling anti-trans rhetoric that trans women have an unfair advantage in sports, despite a lack of consistent research to suggest this. As a woman, please do not speak for me to say that this bill is protecting mine or my daughter's rights, when in truth it is only limiting the rights of small group of individuals who should be receiving care, support, and affirmation instead of hate.

These bills directly impact my education. Though I am a senior, and moving into secondary education, I am heavily impacted to the precedents that these bills send. I cannot testify in person before your committee tomorrow as my husband will be having a hip replacement, but I wanted to share my thoughts with you. I come from a family of teachers. My father was a teacher and coach in the Madison School District for 45 years. My sister taught in the same district and then in higher education all across the country, as her husband did.

I know how important it is for young people to be part of a culture in their schools that allows them to be true to themselves while doing no harm to others. The use of pronouns to identify one's gender is not a harmful action against anyone. Much like preferring a nickname to one's given name at birth it is the identity that the young person knows reflects them the best rather than what their parents gave them a birth.

As a parent of a non-binary identifying adult child and grandparent of an 11-year-old non-binary grandchild I have seen that their ability to use pronouns that best reflect who they find themselves to be is vitally important to their well-being. And it brings absolutely no harm to any other person who chooses to use pronouns that reflect their gender identity at birth.

As a daughter of a coach, I have been an avid supporter of sports as well. And while I can understand there are some concerns about transgender youth performing in sports under the gender that identify they now feel to be accurate versus the one assigned at birth, I feel that this too can be handled in thoughtful ways. And I believe blanket legislation is not the answer.

My name is Amber Anderson, BSN RN and I am a nurse at a local child/adolescent psychiatry unit. I am writing in regard to Assembly Bill 100 and 103. For the past four years, I have worked on an acute-stay child and adolescent psychiatric unit in the Madison area serving patients ranging from six to eighteen years old. The majority of patients I work with are admitted after a suicide attempt and/or after disclosing suicidal ideation. Throughout my years working with this population, I have had the privilege to meet kind, clever, empathetic and resilient kids in our community. Many of these patients identify as either trans or nonbinary. More often than not, the stressor resulting in suicidality is a lack of recognition and acceptance of their preferred name and pronouns. Further supporting this fact, according to the Trevor Project, antitransgender laws cause up to a 72% increase in suicide attempts amongst transgender and nonbinary youth.

The reason I am writing to advocate for this community is simply this: I have seen the ramifications of not accepting a child who identifies as trans or nonbinary, and fear for our youth if these bills were to pass. I implore you that, based on proven statistics, allowing this bill to pass would essentially be signing a death sentence for many of Wisconsin's trans and nonbinary youth.

Additionally, transgender and non-binary young people reported lower rates of attempting suicide when their affirmed name and pronouns were respected.

Our organization serves hundreds of LGBTQ+ people across the state of Wisconsin each year. When elected officials at any level say harmful things about the Trans community or introduce legislation that will impact their rights, our program sees an increase in Trans people and their loved ones reaching out to us for support. So far in 2025, we have received more crisis calls related to anti-trans legislation and executive orders than ever. We know through experience that the data from Trevor Project is accurate: legislation like this has a serious negative impact on the mental health and wellbeing of Trans people in our state.

Transgender youth deserve to have their affirmed name and pronouns used and should have access to the same benefits of participation afforded to all youth in sports, such as belonging to a team, building relationships & camaraderie, and physical activity. These are all things that are linked to improved health and mental health outcomes regardless of age or gender identity, but are particularly relevant, as national data also tells us that acceptance and belonging are powerful protective factors for LGBTQ+ youth.

Please support the wellbeing of young Trans people across Wisconsin; do NOT move forward with AB 100 & AB 103.

I am writing to oppose AB100 and AB103.

As a parent, I am concerned that AB100 could incentivize schools to perform unscientific, invasive physical exams on children who wish to join a girls' sports team. Teaching young girls that it is okay for teachers to ask them to expose their genitals for any reason sets a dangerous precedent. It is also sexist on its face in many ways, not least because the rules around sex determination appear to apply only to girls. I have lived in Wisconsin for over twenty years, and this is the first time I have been afraid at the prospect of my daughter choosing to play on a sports team in high school.

My concerns about AB103 go beyond gender. It is not reasonable or proportionate to expect school administrators to check the names that children ask to be called in class against their birth certificates. I have known many people over the years who go by nicknames not directly related to their first or middle name, whether for cultural reasons (like Chinese immigrants adopting Western nicknames) or personal ones. The extra paperwork that this bill would require for extremely mundane situations like these is potentially humiliating to families and wastes teachers' time.

All of this leaves untouched the issue of civil rights. Transgender people are a small and vulnerable minority. Legislative acts that make them feel unsafe in their gender identity do not protect me -- they make me feel vulnerable, too. I feel afraid that legislating around gender expression will not stop at trans exclusion, but will encroach on the way that I embody femininity, or don't. I cannot be free to be who I am, as a cis woman, when trans people are not. And I want and expect this freedom for my daughter, too.

We have lived in Wisconsin for our entire life, and are speaking on our own behalf as private citizens.

We have personally witnessed the pain of a loved one struggling with suicidal depression stemming from gender dysphoria. Coming out as transgender was a life-changing moment for her for the better, in large part because the people she trusted at home and at school have been supportive and affirming. Being able to use her own preferred name and pronouns has been critical to her emotional health and well-being: she missed most of 8th grade from psychological distress, but is now scoring top marks on schoolwork in 9th grade. I urgently ask you to oppose Bill AB100 and Bill AB103.

Regarding Bill AB100:

Education-based athletics is founded on a commitment to equitable, inclusive, and welcoming learning communities for all students. All students, including transgender students, deserve the chance to participate in activities like sports, which offer valuable lessons in teamwork, leadership, self-discipline, and contribute to both physical and mental well-being. This right is protected by Title IX.

Furthermore, as cited in Gender Explained: A New Understanding of Identity in a Gender Creative World by Diane Ehrensaft, PhD and Michelle Jurkiewicz, PsyD, research shows:

• Transgender and gender-diverse youth have a lower risk of suicide, greater feelings of safety, are less likely to experience victimization or harassment, and are less likely to skip class due to safety concerns when they attend schools with inclusive policies, whether or not they play sports.1

Cisgender girls' participation in school sports either remained the same or increased after instating inclusive policies, such as in California, where cisgender girls' participation rose by approximately 14 percent in the six years following the enactment of gender-inclusive sports policies in 2014 (as opposed to a decrease in cisgender girls' sports participation in states with gender exclusive policies).2

Transgender students in states with fully inclusive athletic policies were 14 percent less likely to have considered suicide than students in non-inclusive states.3

Not only do inclusive policies not harm cisgender girls, but inclusive policies help protect transgender girls, an already vulnerable student population.

Oppose Bill AB100 and let all our children play.

Regarding Bill AB103:

We expect our schools to be safe environments for our children to learn and grow. A lot is expected from students each day—they need to stay focused, do their work, and put in their best effort. However, if they are continuously called a name and/or pronoun that does not align with their identity, it will not only be distracting but also painful. Using the correct name and pronoun is the most effective way to say, "I see you." That builds trust and safety.

If a cisgender person was constantly referred to by a name or pronoun different than what they identified with, it would be seen as harassment. It would have the same negative impact on their education and mental health. Transgender students deserve the same consideration as cisgender students—to be called by the name and pronoun with which they self-identify.

Bill AB103 makes it a requirement of schools to out children to their parents before the children are ready. If a child wants to try out a new name and pronoun at school before coming out to their parents, it hurts no one. It is no different than trying out a nickname. A variation on a birthname is allowed, so why not a chosen name? Using a child-chosen name is respectful to the child. Moreover, forcing a child to out themselves to a family that may not be supportive of them could endanger their safety.

I advocate for the rights of trans and non-binary kids because they matter. They exist. They are just as valid as cisgender kids and deserve the same respect to be called by the name and pronoun with which they identify.

As a resident of Wisconsin for nearly 35 years, I am proud of the times in our state's history when we prove to live by our motto, "Forward." I'm proud that in 1982, Governor Lee Dreyfus signed into law a bill that made it illegal for state or private businesses to discriminate based on sexual orientation in employment and housing, nine years before any other state granted that same protection. Let's not go backward. Let's live by our motto and support and protect ALL children.

Instead of singling them out for exclusion, we should be working to ensure that all young people—regardless of gender identity—have the opportunity to thrive in safe, supportive school environments.

To the members of the 2025 Assembly Committee on Education:

Wisconsin Assembly Bills 100 and 103 are yet another installment in the latest wave of legislation aimed at destroying the rights and freedoms of transgender individuals -- this time, attacking our children. These bills will prevent transgender students from participating in the school sports that align with their gender identity and also forcibly out transgender students if they in any way request staff to recognize their authentic selves. They are not just unnecessary wastes of Wisconsin taxpayer dollars; they are actively harmful.

Supporters of AB100 argue that the bill protects fairness in women's sports. These claims, however, are based on misleading political narratives and reject widely respected scientific evidence. Countless major medical organizations, including the American Academy of Pediatrics as well as the American Medical Association, recognize and confirm that transgender athletes do not inherently have an unfair advantage over cisgender athletes, and sports governing organizations such as the International Olympic Committee already have policies ensuring fair competition regardless of gender. AB100 is really just a solution in search of a problem, and in the process of trying to fabricate a crisis, it singles out and excludes transgender youth, sending a message that these children are not welcome.

AB103 is another attempt to marginalize transgender students -- this time by restricting how schools recognize and respect their identities. This bill would prevent schools from using a student's chosen name and preferred pronouns unless they align with a legal name change and are formally requested by a parent. If any parent or legal guardian makes such a request, ALL guardians will be given the opportunity to intervene. I know several people whose parents divorced or separated due to deep disagreement over whether their child should receive lifesaving care. Had AB103 been law they would have been subjected to the whims of their anti-trans parent, whether or not they were involved in their daily lives. Such policies disregard the lived experiences of transgender and nonbinary youth and will force their guardians to weigh whether to risk outing their children to unsupportive family members, who themselves will have the power to override a supportive parent. Or likewise, if they will risk the scrutiny of potentially unspportive or even bigoted school administrators, personnel who may not even know the child in question. These barriers to simply existing at school are only in place for students the author deem unworthy of identity; students who request a name or similar accommodation who are not transgender are not burdened by AB103. Respecting a student's chosen name and preferred pronouns should not be a matter of politics; it is a matter of dignity, mental health, and safety. AB103 is not about parental rights or educational integrity; it is about policing identity and forcing schools, teachers, and staff to participate in discrimination against transgender youth.

Wisconsin's AB100 and AB103 are not about fairness or protection -- they are about discrimination and control. The bills target an already vulnerable population, ignoring general scientific consensus and the voices of transgender people themselves. If these bills become law, they will cause real harm, not only by worsening stigma and mental health, but also the likelihood of self-harm among transgender youth.

A study published in the Journal Nature¹ September of 2024 assessed 19 states where anti-trans legislation passed from 2018 to 2022 and found an up to 72% increase in past-year suicide attempts by transgender and nonbinary youth, with a causal relationship by those states' anti-trans legislation.

Children's suicide rates increased across all states where anti-trans bills had been passed, and specifically as a result of those bans being enacted by their state legislatures.

These bills kill children born the same way as I was – created by God to find and live as our authentic selves. At best, they are intended to penalize and subjugate children who themselves are unknown by this bill's authors or the members of this committee. But in effect, this body will be setting policy that certain children are unwelcome in our schools, and unwelcome in our society more broadly. How many children must die before their lives are considered by this body?

I firmly believe what my church teaches: that all children, transgender nonbinary or otherwise, are created by God to find and embody our authentic selves and live out our lives as any other child of God. These bills attack that purpose, and with it our dignity and humanity. Would this body cosign the hatred, verbal and physical attacks transgender Children of God will be forced to endure by their peers, teachers, administrators, extended family and community? Will this body shield itself from the reality that children will be subjected to conditions which guarantee they will be told they are unwelcome in our society? This was a reality I was forced to live through for many many years, and as a result I regularly considered ending my own life beginning at the age of 13. I know many others like me who considered the ultimate sin, and I can only wonder how many more people would be alive today had they not experienced the same. I pray this body looks beyond themselves to see the humanity they will be snuffing out by putting their political careers over the lives and safety of fellow Children of God.

My name is Aislinn Hutchinson and I am a concerned resident of the city of Madison. I've lived in Wisconsin for five years and have called Madison home for all of them. I am a business owner, spouse, and active member of my community. I am also trans. I am testifying on bill AB100 and AB103. I am testifying both about allowing trans youth to participate in sports according to their identified gender as well as their ability to use their chosen name and pronouns in school.

I am testifying about this because I myself just came out as non-binary this year. I am also a former college D1 athlete, and sports were and are my entire life. I recently had to find a new league to play hockey in because all of this hate that is being spread towards trans people is becoming a problem everywhere. My league tried to ban all trans players, including non-binary players. This significantly impacted my mental health as hockey is the place I go to play, have fun with my friends, decompress, and get physical activity. There was absolutely no scientific reason for banning athletes like myself from participating in sport, and the same thing is happening to youth if this bill is passed.

I wanted to share my story because I believe all PEOPLE should have the right and access to sport, as well as to use the pronouns of their choosing. Sports, and feeling safe in a dressing room are so important. This is a place where youth are able to learn skills about teamwork, camaraderie, and how to accept one another but this bill creates a scenario in which people will be taught to fear and discriminate against their trans peers. We are just people, wanting to respectfully be shown respect and honor like any human person deserves. The way this bill specifically targets trans youth is abhorrent and I will not stand for it in my community. Madison is a welcoming community for all trans and queer people and I have never felt safer to be myself in a community. My name is Ani Miskowski. I am a resident of Milwaukee. While I believe that there is plenty of evidence detailing the harm Assembly Bills 100 and 103 will cause, part of me fears that those points do not matter to you. I fear that hearings like these have become an easily dismissible formality where the physical presence of a committee is meant to placate us. I hope I'm wrong. I cannot force you to open your hearts, and I would not want to. All I have is my hope that you will let yourself hear me.

I was born into a God-fearing family. We went to church every week. We communed with people who shared our faith and our values. But despite all of the faith that my parents claimed to have, they were afraid every day, afraid of making even one misstep, afraid of others, afraid of themselves, afraid of God, and afraid of punishment. That fear destroyed our relationship. I was not brave enough to ask them then, so I ask you now, those of you with open hearts who truly believe trans children are hurting themselves and genuinely want to protect them:

What if you're wrong? What if God's priority isn't the names or pronouns of these children but whether they are accepted and loved? What if trans children are not perverting their bodies but are transcending them, embracing a divine energy inspired by God?

I can't answer for you. I understand it might be scary to grapple with these questions regardless of what faith you may or may not hold. Your mind might conjure memories of shame or even physical punishment, times where you were deemed not masculine or feminine enough. Or perhaps you witnessed others receiving similar treatment and vowed to avoid it. Your instinct might be to defend these corrections, to insist they were acts of love, but *you know what it feels like to be loved*. Love is incompatible with the rejection of mental and physical autonomy. Do you know how it feels to find joy in who you are only for someone else to insist "You are who *I* say you are." If you know how that feels, if you remember that confusion and frustration, how can you carry that pain forward? How can you give it to *children*?

I feel sorry for you. Because I see the joy in these children. I see the love and transformation they bring to their families. Why don't you trust their joy? What messaging have you received that taught you their truth is in opposition to yours?

The only people you are protecting with these laws are yourselves, and, while you might feel like you've done something good (despite overwhelming evidence to the contrary), you are also holding yourself back. You are running away from your cognitive dissonance because you are afraid of what will happen if you're honest. As long as you avoid honesty, you will never know true peace. I do not want you to be trans if you're not trans. I do not want you to change your name unless you'd like to. I want you to have the freedom to celebrate differences in others and in yourself without fear of punishment. I want these children to lead long, happy, and fulfilled lives.

I beg you to use this moment and your power to show trans children love and acceptance. You have the ability to reject these bills and their rhetoric, and, furthermore, you have a moral responsibility to do so. All it takes is one moment to choose to embrace change. Aren't you tired of being afraid?

My name is Sarah Forzley, and I am a Madison resident. I've lived here since 2012, and my husband and I settled here to be near his family, just like all his siblings. I say this to emphasize that even while pursuing a masters, a doctorate, and a corporate career, I continue to prioritize family values. Additionally, I am a former instructor at the University of Wisconsin, a former high school teacher, and a former elementary school teacher. Given that I live according to my family values, and that I spent over twenty cumulative years teaching young people and participating in girls' and women's sports myself, I care deeply about safety and equity in school and in sport.

For these reasons, I urge you to vote NO on Assembly Bills 100 and 103. These bills do not increase safety or equity in schools or sports. Trans girls and trans women do not threaten the success of individual women or of women's sports in general. I have seen this myself as both an athlete and a teacher. Instead, they reveal a fundamental misunderstanding of sex assigned at birth, of the actual threats that girls and women face every day, and of athletic competition. Sex assigned at birth is not a perfect way to identify a person's sex. I have had students with different medical conditions whose sex assigned at birth did not take into account their chromosomal makeup because the doctor simply visually assessed the baby's features. I also have had students who felt that they belonged nowhere because they did not "fit in" with the boys or girls at their school. I would have loved to see those students to fear and discriminate against their peers. These bills teach our students that the definition of "girl" or "woman" is ever narrower. These bills threaten to drag us back into a time when the United States was more sexist, when women had even fewer opportunities in sport.

After my master's degree, I taught at a university in Paris and ran for a team there. I was just a run-of-the-mill varsity athlete in college, but in France I quickly climbed the national rankings. Why? Because France has less gender equality than the United States. I know that sometimes, conservative folks fear that liberal folks are not proud of the United States. I can say without hesitation that I am proud of the United States for how far we have come in girls' and women's sports since my mother's time. In France, I faced more sexual and physical harassment, more restrictive expectations for my gender, and more inequality in sport than I face here. Though it meant giving up my excellent ranking in France, I was relieved to return to the competition scene in the United States because, frankly, I love how many women in the United States are faster than I am – women's sports here have thrived under Title IX to the benefit of all, including mediocre athletes like myself. We are carried along in the wave of those who run faster than we do. It is in our interest to compete against as diverse a group of women as possible so as to improve our training and overall times.

Perhaps, if you feel that discussing nonbinary genders is polarizing, you can remember a time in your life when you did not fit in. Remember how uncomfortable that was, how isolating, how sad you felt. Trans students do not choose to be trans; nobody chooses to have a more difficult life in this way. Allowing trans students to participate in sports, allowing trans students to use the bathroom most comfortable for them, tells them that they belong. Nobody would undergo so

much social stigma just to cause harm to others. Trans students are not trying to harm anyone, and they certainly don't threaten our sports. Do you know what does threaten girls and women in school and sport? Sexual harassment by male students, teachers, administrators, and clergymen. Bias from adults who do not believe girls or women have what it takes to lift weights, to succeed in STEM, to obtain advanced degrees. Let's focus on real problems instead of an imagined one.

Because of gender dysmorphia, trans girls are the ones who least want to expose their unaltered bodies to other girls, and often hide or change separately. If this committee wishes to protect girls or youth generally in sports contexts, I suggest: stop asking about kids' genitals. Banning trans youth from any context makes it much more likely that adults will feel compelled to check children's genitals, which is a breathtaking safety risk for all children. In fact, children are much more likely to be sexually assaulted by a coach than by another athlete, trans or no. The NIH has a number of studies that speak to this, but one says, "that 0.5% of adolescents experienced sexual abuse involving a coach," and "When considering all adolescents who experienced sexual abuse in their lifetime (10.2%), it appears that 5.3% of them were victims of sexual abuse by a coach."

In truth, the schools have very little way to verify who is transgendered and who is cisgendered amongst the children that attend our schools, aside from self identification. Legislation such as this has little enforceable impact, and only serves to tell trans youth that they do not belong. I inherently oppose this stance.

If we are to protect both cisgendered and transgendered youth, the clear path forward is to oppose these bills. I ask this committee to show the youth across the state that they are safe from harassment and discrimination, and oppose these bills.

I would like to voice my opposition to two anti-trans bills here in Wisconsin. The bills are AB100 and AB103.

Several years ago, I started to notice that people were using their preferred pronouns. As someone born female who presents as a stereotypical female, I did not understand it. I thought it was obvious that I would be a she or a her. But then I educated myself. I started to understand that gender wasn't always about how you look on the outside, but how you feel about yourself on the inside.

I also educated myself on why I should share my preferred pronouns with others. It means that I'm a safe person who respects others. It says to someone, "I support who you are and you matter as a human being." by sharing that I prefer she/her as my pronouns.

Research shows that LGBTQ+ youth are at much higher risk of suicide and self-harm than heterosexual youth, and that is particularly true for trans kids. I am writing in opposition to Assembly Bills 100 and 103. I am a nurse practitioner and certified nurse-midwife and have worked with many transgender patients and provided education and training to staff on transgender healthcare throughout my career. Additionally, I count a number of transgender individuals as dear friends.

It is well established among major medical organizations that gender affirming care is life saving care. Often one of the first steps a transgender individual takes towards gender affirmation is using pronouns and/or a name that aligns with their gender. Perhaps you have never known a transgender individual, perhaps you have never seen the joy and relief when their most basic request about their bodily autonomy is respected and honored. Perhaps also, you have never seen the harm it can do to be denied this respect. I ask you to consider how it would feel for you to be called by a name or pronoun that does not align with your personal sense of who you are - it is no different for transgender folks.

In a perfect world all transgender youth would find love and support from their parents, sadly this is not the world we live in and by requiring educators to deny the identity of their students without explicit parental consent, this bill creates an unnecessary barrier to teacher student trust, student learning and has the potential to cause even greater harm. School may be the only safe place for a student to be out as transgender. Are you aware that transgender youth have higher rates of suicidality than their cisgender peers? Are you also aware that this difference in rates drops dramatically when they are able to live in alignment with their gender?

For all of the reasons listed above I also oppose the restriction of transgender youth from participating in sports that align with their gender. Passing a bill to ban a very small percentage of students from enjoying the experience and opportunities that school sports provide seems unnecessarily cruel. Furthermore, determining the students eligibility for sports based upon "biological sex" bases the law on the false premise that biological sex is easily defined and falls into a binary.

It is my contention that our state legislature could be spending their valuable time and energy addressing issues that support and strengthen the youth of Wisconsin, rather than singling out and stigmatizing a small, already marginalized subset with these bills.

I urge you to side with respect, with bodily autonomy, with safety, and with joy by opposing the passage of Assembly Bills 100 and 103.

My name is Molly Vande Slunt and I'm a concerned resident of Wisconsin.

I am testifying against the proposed bills limiting children's identity and participation in school and sports. I'm not a parent myself, but I care deeply for the children within my family and social circles and in general.

These bills are not only a waste of the legislature's time, but extremely harmful to children and their development. There are no proven risks of letting children who identify as trans or gender nonconforming playing in sports that don't match their assigned gender at birth, nor letting them have control over their name and pronouns in a school setting. There are however, plenty of documented risks in preventing these children from living their authentic lives. Roughly 1% of children in the state identify as transgender or gender nonconforming, while rates of suicide are exponential among trans youth with roughly 44% seriously considering and/or attempting suicide.

To claim that transgender youth pose a serious risk to other children is an absolute farce, proven within the language of the bills themselves. For example AB100 only references children assigned male at birth being prohibited from competing with girls or entering a girls locker room. There's no mention of children assigned female at birth entering male sports or locker rooms and no acknowledgement of gender nonconformity or nonbinary children. These bills are written with extreme ignorance, bigotry, and lack of understanding of the actual children it targets.

These bills are ambiguous and are unenforceable. They open up children, whether cis or trans to harassment from adults and put an undue strain on already limited teacher and administrative resources. Instead of this faux moral outrage, I would prefer the law makers, whose salary is funded by my tax dollars, focus on real proven issues facing school children. Roughly 16% of our children face food insecurity which is proven to impact development. 59% of high school students in Wisconsin report facing at least one major mental health challenge over a 12 month period, with another 18% seriously considering suicide. Wisconsin has a huge teacher retention problem, with 4 out of 10 first year teachers leaving the state or profession altogether within 6 years. Quality teachers and teacher/student ratios are another proven metric contributing to the health and well-being of our children. Wisconsin school children face many challenges. Their transgender friends and peers are not one of them.

I am submitting my testimony today as a Milwaukee resident and constituent of Wisconsin. I have lived here for 31 years of my life and during this time, I have been proud to recognize our great state as a safe and affirming place for many queer and transgender individuals to live. I also work in both research ethics and give much of my free time advocating for women's reproductive rights. I am submitting my written testimony against Assembly Bills 100 & 103 that was proposed during the Assembly Committee Meeting on March 6th.

I strongly oppose both AB 100 & 103 that seek to limit trans girls from school sports and require adult "permission" to use different names and pronouns within the school setting, respectively.

AB100 and 103 are clearly crafted as a trans athlete ban and to restrict name and pronoun changes. These bans come at a time of unprecedented anti-trans legislation proposals across the US and do nothing but alienate transgender kids and create a climate of fear rather than cultivation.

As one of your non-transgender constituents, I implore you all to vote against these proposed bills. I stand in solidarity with these members of my community and vehemently oppose these bills that are meant to deny their rights as human beings. I have known many kind, gracious, and generous trans individuals in my lifetime and consider them friends, my family, and my chosen family. They have been there for me through some of the most painful moments of my life, and it would behoove me to not stand for them now as they have for me in the past.

Many of these bills have been submitted to the courts under the guise of "protecting women and girls", AB 100 is no exception. I do not, nor have ever, felt at risk due to the presence of a transgender individual in any restroom, locker room, public space, or sports team. If men, or any individual who wishes to harm students, will do so as they have historically: as themselves and because they believe they have the right to violate someone else's privacy and autonomy. Trans girls (who these bills unjustly target) are not the problem, adult predators concerned about the supposed genitalia of a child are.

These are all the same fear mongering tactics utilized in the early aughts regarding gay and lesbian access to locker rooms and bathrooms. We've done this before, do we really need to do this moral panic again? If we give an inch regarding transgender children, national movements to limit gender affirming care, marriage rights, adoption, and even public life will be made. This will affect not just trans people but LGBTQ+ community as a whole and we will be systematically legislated out of existence under the guise of "protecting women".

If you so desperately want to protect women, propose stronger sentences for sexual assault and rape. If you want to protect women, promote complete and scientifically-based sexual education. If you want to protect women, do more to protect access to affordable healthcare for mothers and programs like WIC and SNAP programs that keep them fed. If you want to protect women, advocate for comprehensive, scientific reproductive healthcare and research- including access to abortion.

If you want to protect women, allow trans girls the safety and opportunity to become trans women.

AB 103 seeks to limit trans girls and children from making autonomous decisions about themselves and their identity and the most crucial time of their development. Legislation such as this will put more children at risk from abuse at home and exacerbate worse mental health outcomes, including suicide. A sense of belonging, that can be achieved by simple expressions of compassion like utilizing chosen names and pronouns, in one of the largest protective factors against trans youth suicide. Students deserve to learn in a place where they feel safe, accepted, heard, and seen for who they are and who they will become. Instead, these laws seek to further alienate them and legislate them out of existence.

Trans people exist and will continue to exist despite these efforts. Nothing will erase the beautiful variation of the human experience, especially that of trans people. To enact these bills is to enact violence on trans people. As representatives in Wisconsin, I ask that you acknowledge all of the trans people you represent, and in good conscience vote against AB 100 and 103.

My name is Rufus Jupiter, and I am a resident of Vernon County in Wisconsin. I was born in Wisconsin and have lived here for 35 years, in both urban and rural locales. I am writing you today in opposition of Bills AB100 and AB103.

I am a 43 year old, nonbinary transmasculine person. I identify neither as male nor as female, and I use they/them pronouns since that is the language that feels comfortable to me. As a young person growing up in the 1980s and 1990s, there was not widespread language to describe people whose gender was other than binary male or female. There were no visible, out LGBTQ+ individuals in my life and few in the public eye who I could look to for guidance. I lived a childhood feeling no true sense of who I was as a person (although I was told by others who I was all the time). By the time I was an adult, I was diagnosed with severe anxiety and depression; I felt lost and worthless, unseen, unknown to anyone, even myself.

It took until my mid- 30s for language to appear in the mainstream dialogue that accurately mirrored who I was. As transgender people and people on the gender spectrum became more visible in the public eye, I began to recognize myself. My anxiety and depression fell away as I finally began to understand and claim my identity.

Today, while visibility of LGBTQ+ folks has expanded greatly, we face a future of uncertainty and fear. How is it, in this country where individual liberties are a supposed right of all citizens, that members of my community still fight for the privilege of being accepted for who we are? AB100 and AB103 are deplorable bills that target a tiny, very vulnerable population of youth. These are bills that directly tell the youth in question that who they are, deep down in their core being, is fundamentally wrong. These are bills, made by grown adults, that purposefully and loudly shame, invalidate, and ridicule children. AB100 specifically singles out transgender youth (who likely are already misunderstood or bullied by peers) and prevents them from participating in healthy extracurricular activities on teams that match their true sense of self. AB103 encourages the shaming and outing of children in school, a setting that should be safe for all children. Research consistently shows a disproportionately high rate of suicide risk for queer and transgender youth. How will these cruel bills be reflected in those numbers, if they happen to move forward?

I am writing to implore you to vote NO on Bills AB100 and AB103. If passed, these bills will further anti- trans, anti- LGBTQ+ sentiment in this country. I oppose the proposed bills assembly bills 100 and 103 regarding athletic sports and the sex of partificpants and changing a pupil's legal name and pronouns. I personally know a transgender girl who is just now entering the Madison public school system and it saddens me to know that the authors of these bills seem to deny her very existence and attempt to limit her future ability to participate in essential activites like school sports and use her preferred pronouns.

Kids learn a lot of important life lessons in sports: leadership, confidence, self-respect, advocacy and what it means to be part of a team. When we tell transgender girls that they can't play girls' sports—or transgender boys that they can't play boys' sports—they miss out on this important childhood experience and all the lessons it teaches.

It can be hard to understand what it means to be transgender, especially if you've never met a transgender person. And it's common to have questions at first. But we can all agree that transgender kids should be treated with dignity and respect, just like everyone else. Transgender athletes have for many years been beneficial parts of teams throughout Wisconsin.

Transgender and nonbinary youth athletes play sports for the exact same reasons as other students their age: Staying healthy, being part of a team, and fostering friendships—all lifelong benefits of playing a sport.

There is no scientic root in the assertion that individuals should be referred to by pronouns tied to their biological sex. The research predominately shows that denying the a child's self-identified gender has negative outcomes later in life, including a higher risk of suicide. Intersex people, despite clearly not conforming, biologically, to either binary sex, are not accounted for by these pronouns. Legally defining gendered pronouns as being tied to biological sex, then, since not based in science, must be based in arbitrary values. I do not believe these are the values of community, and I believe are informed by the fringe religious beliefs of a vocal minority, which have no place in our laws and schools.

My name is Jennifer Smith, resident of Madison Wisconsin (53714). I'm writing in opposition of bills AB 100 and AB103. These bills are anti trans discrimination with no scientific underpinning and carry the potential for harmful and possibly fatal consequences.

First, trans athletes in sports. Believing and perpetuating myths and misconceptions about trans athletes is harmful. Denying trans people the right to participate is discrimination and it doesn't just hurt trans people, it hurts all of us, including cis women.

Second, forcibly out transgender students could threaten their well-being, and we already know that LGBTQ+ young people are not inherently prone to suicide risk because of their sexual orientation or gender identity but rather placed at higher risk because of how they are mistreated and stigmatized in society.

Suicide is the second leading cause of death among young people aged 10 to 14, and the third leading cause of death among 15-24 year olds (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, 2022). Lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, and questioning (LGBTQ+) young people are at significantly increased risk.

LGBTQ+ young people are more than four times as likely to attempt suicide than their peers (Johns et al., 2019; Johns et al., 2020).

My name is Kaelee Heideman and I am an elementary school counselor and 2023 Wisconsin State Teacher of the Year in Oshkosh, Wisconsin, zip code 54904. Although I am unable to attend the hearing in person, I am writing to respectfully submit the following testimony in opposition of Assembly Bills 100 and 103 relating to proposed bans on trans athletes and pronouns and names.

Private parts are just that, private. As an elementary school counselor, I spend part of every school year teaching my students about protective behaviors. We review that our whole bodies belong to us and no one should be looking at or touching the private parts of your body without a good reason. Excluding student athletes from school athletic activities based on the private parts of their bodies is nothing short of discriminatory and a violation of privacy. It is no one's business what lies underneath another person's clothing. A trans girl is a girl, no questions asked. A trans boy is a boy, no questions asked. If you attempt to exclude a student from participating in a school athletic activity based on their sex assigned at birth, you are making a decision based solely on the private parts of that child's body. Ask my elementary students if this is right or wrong, and even they will tell you that talking about someone else's private parts is wrong.

Pronouns save lives. Every person, every child, deserves to feel safe and loved for who they are. This means that our trans students deserve to be called by the correct name and pronouns. Unfortunately, our trans youth are not always safe to be out at home, in part because proposed bills like these perpetuate the negative stereotypes that exist around trans folks. When home is not safe for students, school often becomes the place where students are wrapped up in care and unconditional love. Schools become the place where trans youth are safe to come out and use their names and pronouns. Guardian consent should not be required in order to use a child's name and pronouns. This is a major safety concern because it could require educators to unknowingly out their students and create unsafe reactions at home. I always tell my students that my job is to keep them safe and the passing of AB103 would keep me from being able to uphold that promise. When the adults at home are safe people for their children, the children rarely have a problem sharing who they really are with their adults. Schools should not have to be put in the position to break trust with the kids who need us most. Quite frankly, it is concerning that we are so focused on regulating the name a child can be called at school when many adults have seamlessly transitioned from calling the Gulf of Mexico to calling it the Gulf of America and they did so without permission from that body of water.

The passage of Assembly Bills 100 and 103 will only harm our students. I strongly oppose the possibility of putting students at risk for serious harm by outing them through practices that include identifying a child solely on their sex assigned at birth or requiring guardian permission to use certain names or pronouns in a school setting. Our job is to protect all students, and all means all.

My name is Reiko Ramos and I am a resident of Appleton, WI. I have over a decade of experience working with the LGBTQ community, most of which time has been dedicated to supporting queer and Trans youth. I currently serve as Statewide Director of LGBTQ Anti-Violence Programs at Diverse & Resilient. I am providing this written testimony in opposition to AB100 & AB 103 because of the harmful impact it will have on Trans youth.

According to the <u>Trevor Project's 2024 U.S. National Survey on the Mental Health of LGBTQ+ Young</u> <u>People</u>, 90% of LGBTQ+ young people said their well-being was negatively impacted due to recent politics. Additionally, transgender and non-binary young people reported lower rates of attempting suicide when their affirmed name and pronouns were respected.

Our organization serves hundreds of LGBTQ+ people across the state of Wisconsin each year. When elected officials at any level say harmful things about the Trans community or introduce legislation that will impact their rights, our program sees an increase in Trans people and their loved ones reaching out to us for support. So far in 2025, we have received more crisis calls related to anti-trans legislation and executive orders than ever. We know through experience that the data from Trevor Project is accurate: legislation like this has a serious negative impact on the mental health and wellbeing of Trans people in our state.

Transgender youth deserve to have their affirmed name and pronouns used and should have access to the same benefits of participation afforded to all youth in sports, such as belonging to a team, building relationships & camaraderie, and physical activity. These are all things that are linked to improved health and mental health outcomes regardless of age or gender identity, but are particularly relevant, as national data also tells us that acceptance and belonging are powerful protective factors for LGBTQ+ youth.

Please support the wellbeing of young Trans people across Wisconsin; do NOT move forward with AB 100 & AB 103.

To the members of the Assembly Committee on Education,

I am writing to oppose AB100 and AB103.

As a parent, I am concerned that AB100 could incentivize schools to perform unscientific, invasive physical exams on children who wish to join a girls' sports team. Teaching young girls that it is okay for teachers to ask them to expose their genitals for any reason sets a dangerous precedent. It is also sexist on its face in many ways, not least because the rules around sex determination appear to apply only to girls. I have lived in Wisconsin for over twenty years, and this is the first time I have been afraid at the prospect of my daughter choosing to play on a sports team in high school.

My concerns about AB103 go beyond gender. It is not reasonable or proportionate to expect school administrators to check the names that children ask to be called in class against their birth certificates. I have known many people over the years who go by nicknames not directly related to their first or middle name, whether for cultural reasons (like Chinese immigrants adopting Western nicknames) or personal ones. The extra paperwork that this bill would require for extremely mundane situations like these is potentially humiliating to families and wastes teachers' time.

All of this leaves untouched the issue of civil rights. Transgender people are a small and vulnerable minority. Legislative acts that make them feel unsafe in their gender identity do not protect me -- they make me feel vulnerable, too. I feel afraid that legislating around gender expression will not stop at trans exclusion, but will encroach on the way that I embody femininity, or don't. I cannot be free to be who I am, as a cis woman, when trans people are not. And I want and expect this freedom for my daughter, too.

My name is Emma Hood, I live in Wisconsin, I am a nurse, and a mother of three children. I am also the proud parent of a transgender child.

Importantly, before I share more, I want to address the vulnerability inherent in sharing my story. I have seen parents in these situations be demonized and the children mocked. And at the same time, I think sharing is necessary right now more than ever. I believe every elected official here has an obligation to try to listen when someone takes risks to write or speak publicly.

I am deeply concerned about the current social and political climate surrounding transgender people, and the degree to which it has been forced into my life and others. These stereotypes have the potential to shape laws and policies in ways that may be difficult to understand, unless you are or love someone who is transgender.

My child was assigned male at birth, and up until three years old, this is what we thought he was. Right after she turned three, she showed a clear interest in dressing in girls' clothing and wanting to grow her hair long. Many of the people around her at this time speculated it was a phase that she would grow out of. But she didn't. It has persisted without change for over 5 and a half years.

One of the myths surrounding parents of trans children is that we are "teaching our children to be trans". And I think this comes from the premise of having limited experience or knowledge on gender expression. I can assure you; I spend more time thinking of ways of trying to keep my child's world as simple as possible these days. Most of the time, parenting her is like parenting any other child except there are certain events or situations that have called on me to really listen and learn more about who my child is. Once, when my daughter was about 4 or 5 years old, I offered her some boys' clothing for her to wear, just to see if she showed interest. It resulted in her crying in my arms for over ½ an hour while she fell asleep. That night she so clearly told me she was a girl. At that age, she did not have words for transgender or even what pronouns were. She just knew who she was. I did not teach her anything. For me, it was clear that I would choose to listen and love my child.

When my daughter was 6 years old, she asked to change her name to a girl's name and said she wanted to be a girl, at home and at school. I was so fortunate to have the support and the expertise of the staff and teachers at the school. Who she is now, secure in herself, is undoubtedly a result of her community. She is a bright, caring and creative child.

Last week, I asked her, what if mom had told you had to be a boy when you told me you were a girl? What would that have felt like? She answered, "I wouldn't feel good, I wouldn't feel free". Trans children have been telling us what it feels like to be in their bodies, and what it feels like to be recognized and supported for a long time.

School policies that support and affirm trans students save lives. It is that simple. There is clear evidence that affirming practices, and the support of caring adults is protective in reducing the risk of suicidality and suicide attempts in trans youth. Additionally, school cultures that allow for harassment

and bullying of any student, for any reason, contribute to a higher risk of anxiety and depression, as well lower academic performance. But we know without me even naming it here, which students are more often the target of bullying and harassment. We cannot talk about the use of pronouns and preferred names without speaking to the growing evidence that deals directly with this topic. Schools have the ability to ensure an environment that is respectful of all students and their families.

Finally, I want to say that I have sympathy for the parents who might feel fearful that their child will transition socially at school without telling them or having knowledge about it. I think it can be hard for any parent to feel like their child isn't as close as you had hoped.

For those parents, I would encourage any parent who has a trans or gender non-conforming child to find other parents and seek support if you need it. Especially if you don't feel like your community or church has been able to. The most protective and loving thing a parent of a transgender child can do is be their safe-haven and the person they trust to be themselves.

There is room in our humanity, within our faith communities and our schools for transgender people, and I hope you are all fortunate enough one day to know and love a transgender person or child. I urge you to support policy and practices that affirms transgender people and oppose bill AB100 and AB103.

As a proud lifelong Wisconsinite and former public school educator, I vehemently oppose Assembly Bills 100 and 103. These bills stand contrary to the Wisconsin motto of "Forward" and our strong progressive history, and will only harm the young people of our great state.

During my tenure as a Wisconsin public educator and now as an arts educator for Wisconsin non-profits, I see every day the positive impact respecting children for who they are and valuing each unique child can have on young lives. I have worked with many children who use names and pronouns that are different from those assigned to them at birth. Calling them by their names and by correct pronouns is the most basic of ways that I show respect as an adult in their lives. It is that simple: I respect them and value them, and I want them to know it.

To force educators to use names and pronouns that do not match a child's identity is denying them the basic respect all humans deserve and shows them that school is not a safe place for them. With school shootings and lockdown drills making our children afraid for their lives, shouldn't they at least be able to feel that school is a safe place just to be who they are? It may seem like a small thing, but to that young person, it can be everything.

Also, in all my years as an educator, I have seen how much participation in extracurriculars can be a worthwhile and powerful experience for students. Students who are in a sport, or a play, or clubs, or any other activity are more invested in the school experience. They find community, they learn new skills, they expand their circle of trusted adults, they are more invested in academics, and they discover more about who they are. Denying this opportunity to students because of their gender identity is just wrong. Why should only cisgender young people have the experience of being on a team?

I remember several years ago, working as part of the production team at a local high school. We had several students who were gender non-conforming. The students used the dressing rooms that worked for them. Their peers had no ill-will, no fear, no anger about sharing their dressing rooms. Those few students who were given the opportunity to be in spaces that felt right to them appreciated it so much; they felt seen. Don't we all just want to be seen for who we are? Why should only those of us who just happen to identify with the gender we were assigned at birth be the only ones who get to feel that way?

According to a study published in fall of 2024 in the journal *Nature Human Behavior*, the rates of suicide attempts among trans and gender nonconforming youth who live in states that passed laws aimed at these minors saw a marked increase up to 72%. Do you want the blood of Wisconsin children on your hands? Because young people will lose hope in the face of their government telling them they should not exist. And some of them will choose to no longer.

Statement of Opposition to Assembly Bills 100 and 103:

Dear Members of the Assembly Committee on Education,

I strongly oppose Assembly Bill 100, the proposed transgender athlete ban, and Assembly Bill 103, which would restrict the rights of transgender students to use their correct names and pronouns. These bills are not only unnecessary but potentially devastating to an already vulnerable population.

Impact on Mental Health and Suicide Risk:

We cannot ignore the severe mental health implications of such discriminatory legislation. According to data from the Trevor Project, 85% of transgender and nonbinary youth report that political attacks on their identity have negatively impacted their mental health. More alarmingly, studies consistently show that transgender youth experience disproportionately high rates of depression, anxiety, and suicidal ideation compared to their cisgender peers. When we exclude young people from activities fundamental to social development and well-being, and deny them the basic dignity of being addressed by their correct names and pronouns, we compound these risks. Transgender youth who feel supported in their identity and included in school activities show significantly better mental health outcomes. By contrast, exclusionary policies increase feelings of isolation and rejection - precisely the factors that contribute to the heartbreakingly high suicide attempt rates among transgender youth.

The Reality of Transgender Participation in Sports:

AB100 purports to solve a problem that simply doesn't exist at scale. Transgender youth represent approximately 1.4% of the youth population, and only a fraction of these young people participate in competitive sports. In states that have already implemented inclusive policies for years, there has been no evidence of widespread competitive advantage or disruption. The Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association already has thoughtful policies in place to ensure fair competition while being inclusive of transgender athletes. This bill represents unnecessary government overreach into decisions best left to athletic associations, schools, medical professionals, and families.

Benefits of Inclusion vs. Costs of Exclusion:

Sports participation provides all youth with critical opportunities for physical health, teamwork, leadership development, and social connection. For transgender youth specifically, inclusion in sports can be life-affirming, offering a place of belonging during a challenging developmental period. The supposed "costs" of inclusion have been greatly exaggerated. When implemented with appropriate guidelines, transgender inclusion in sports preserves both competitive fairness and the dignity of all athletes. By contrast, the costs of exclusion are concrete and severe: increased mental health risks, decreased physical activity, lost educational opportunities, and the message to transgender youth that they don't belong in our communities. Similarly, AB103's restrictions on name and pronoun use would create hostile learning environments where transgender students are constantly misgendered, undermining their sense of safety and belonging in educational settings that should be supportive for all students. I urge this committee to reject both of these harmful bills and instead focus on policies

that support the well-being of all Wisconsin youth. Every child deserves to participate fully in school life, including sports, and to be recognized for who they truly are, regardless of gender identity. Our transgender youth are watching to see if you will stand up for their rights to simply be kids - playing the sports they love and being addressed with the basic respect all students deserve.

I am writing to voice my strong opposition to Assembly Bills 100 and 103, pertaining to the participation of school sports and use of facilities and the use of chosen names and pronouns, respectively.

Firstly, the enforcement of these bills presents a practical challenge for teachers and administrators. A child's sex is not readily identified visually and a visual "inspection" of a child in any form is unsafe and disturbing. This would then require additional documentation and personal information is disclosed to teachers, administrators, and volunteers. Personally identifiable information is protected by law and should not be viewed by any person that does not have a credible reason to do so. This presents risks to data collection, data distribution, and data protections.

Teachers have an enormous responsibility to educate our children. Their duties of creating and delivering an enriching curriculum is more than enough to fill their time. Additional duties of enforcing targeted and prejudiced legislation is inappropriate and unnecessary. It empowers those with prejudiced views to act upon those against the most powerless people in our community, our children.

Most importantly, these bills are dehumanizing and sexist. Students deserve a welcoming educational environment that empowers them to learn and develop into responsible members of our community.

According to the National Institute of Health, students who participate in sports report better academic performance than peers. Student athletes have only a 2% chance of receiving a scholarship of any type to continue athletics in college, regardless of sex. Most student athletes participate in sports to have fun, make friends, and move their bodies. Discouraging children from participating in such activities is antithetical to our American values of protecting life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.

You may think that these laws do not discourage participation, but they do. A female presenting child in a boys' locker room is unsafe. A male presenting child in a girls' locker room is unsafe. The option is to endanger one's self or not participate. That is no choice at all.

Finally, the use of a preferred name and pronoun is just a matter of respect. Whether a child choses a derivative of their name or an entirely new name, children are not the property of their parents. They have an intrinsic right to express themselves freely and define who they are as a person.

Personally, I have loved ones and community members who would be directly and negatively impacted by these bills. As an adult, a voter, a taxpayer, who loves people who will be impacted, I voice my full-throated opposition to AB100 and AB103. My only wish is to see my loved ones and community thrive. The use of pronouns to identify one's gender is not a harmful action against anyone. Much like preferring a nickname to one's given name at birth it is the identity that the young person knows reflects them the best rather than what their parents gave them a birth.

As a parent of a non-binary identifying adult child and grandparent of an 11-year-old non-binary grandchild I have seen that their ability to use pronouns that best reflect who they find themselves to be is vitally important to their well-being. All these friends have shared with me painful stories of discrimination that they faced after coming out individual acts of dehumanization as well as policies that created huge bureaucratic hurdles and decreased their quality of life.

When people call them by a name or pronoun that they do not identify with, this creates deep emotional wounds. If this has never happened to you, take a moment and imagine someone intentionally doing it to you. Maybe there was a bully when you were in school who always called you a name you hated. It doesn't feel good. Now imagine your teachers calling you that name, over and over. That's dehumanizing, and that would have long-lasting mental health impacts. That's what AB103 would do to trans kids.

Now, imagine that you went through this trauma because you wanted to get a competitive edge in sports. Would that be worth it? No, it wouldn't. Trans kids who are athletes just want to be kids playing sports as their authentic selves. One of my friends who is a trans man played soccer growing up, both before and after he transitioned. He had a much more positive experience after the transition, once he was playing with other boys. And his teammates were happy to have him. AB100 would prevent kids from enjoying sports the way every kid should be able to. Again, this would cause long-lasting harm to their mental health.

It's easy to think that these policies would only hurt trans kids. But that's wrong. These policies would hurt all kids by teaching them to discriminate, teaching them to ignore others' wishes, teaching them to disrespect their peers.

Instead of institutionalizing discrimination, we need to institutionalize empathy and understanding. We need to educate our kids with the tools to value everyone's perspectives so that they can interact respectfully regardless of gender identity.

I urge you to reject AB100 and AB103. Thank you for reading my testimony and considering my input.

Wisconsin school districts are required to comply with federal law prohibiting discrimination based on a student's sex-- and generally also gender identity. I didn't know I was trans until college, and it was (and still is) a challenge to get people to respect my pronouns. If I had to manage the misgendering when I was a child, I'm not sure that I would have been able to cope. Students, especially those in middle and high school, have so much going on in their day-to-day and they deserve basic levels of respect so they have the energy to manage all the other things life is throwing at them. They shouldn't be forced to be deadnamed or misgendered every single day. That is a miserable and exhausting way to live. I want trans kids to grow up to be trans adults and these bills will be huge factors in preventing that. "The Trevor Project's 2023 U.S. National Survey on the Mental Health of LGBTQ Young People found that 41% of LGBTQ+ young people seriously considered attempting suicide in the past year, including roughly half of transgender and nonbinary youth¹". Thank you for the opportunity to speak about AB100 (K-12 Trans athletic ban) and AB103 (restrictions on the use of pronouns for trans and non-binary youth).

These bills are breathtaking in their scope and the harm they can inflict, with no evidence that their good outweighs this harm.

Only 1.4% of all youth in the US ages 13-17 identify as transgender. I couldn't find statistics for Wisconsin, or national statistics for ages 12 and under. Why do you need AB100 when only a tiny number of youth identify as trans and it is likely that not all of those want to participate in sports? And what business is it of the state to legislate the use of pronouns? Why is it in the state's interest to interfere in this deeply personal part of people's lives? We have much more pressing issues in this state to address.

I want to remind you that it was in the late 1990s, that marriage equality for gay couples a hot button issue. Bills were introduced to ban or support gay marriage, and it was highly politicized. Miraculously, the more we as a nation talked about it, the more we became aware of family members who were gay, and became personal. Now a significant majority of Americans support gay marriage. In 2023, 80% of Wisconsinites approve of it.

Many of us are only recently, becoming aware and educated about what it means to be transgender. And only a few of us, especially in my generation, have transgender people in our lives. AB100 would prohibit those assigned as males on their birth certificates from participating in sports usually ascribed to females. AB100 would also prohibit males from access to locker rooms assigned to females.88 I I⁹⁹⁹

While on its face these may seem reasonable, the reality is quite different. Further consideration of both bills indicates a troubling, and unnecessary, point-of-view that females are in need of protection from males. If this is not the case, why did you not propose a similar bill prohibiting those assigned as females from participating in sports usually ascribed to males? Let me be very clear that I would oppose such a bill as a violation of Title IX and the Senate rejection of a bill excluding transgender students from school sports (https://www.aclu.org/press-releases/senate-rejects-bill-excluding-transgender-students-from-school-sports.)

AB103 would require schools and their staffs to address students solely by their legal name as stated on their birth certificate and refer to students using solely pronouns that are consistent with the gender ascribed to them on their birth certificate. This would shut down students' process of inquiry into who they are and who they want to be and isn't restricted to names and pronouns but also education and career paths. AB103, which would restrict the speech of students, their families, teachers, and other school staff, based solely on content of such speech, is also likely a violation of the First Amendment.

For all of the reasons stated above, please do NOT go forward with AB100 and AB103.

Hello, I'm Amie Hoag, and I've lived in Wisconsin most of my life. I've chosen to raise my daughter here because I know the people of Wisconsin are some of the most genuinely kind people on the planet. What is represented in AB100 and AB103 does not represent Wisconsin.

I'm reading a book called *An Immense World* by Ed Yong. This book explores the senses of the animal kingdom, laying out the way mammals, birds, insects, fish, and reptiles experience the world around them, and how different it is from the way humans experience that same world. It even goes so far to explore how human beings experience some senses, like the sense of smell, in wholly unique ways. For some people, for example, sweaty gym socks smell like vanilla. Imagine that. Doesn't smell like vanilla to me.

Why am I talking about sweaty gym socks when we're talking about transgender kids in Wisconsin? Because this is just one illustration of how each one of us experiences this vast and mysterious world in our own unique way, and it's harmful to assume that the way I experience the world is the *only* way to experience the world — or the *right* way to experience the world.

This legislation, AB100 and AB103, take aim at a remarkably vulnerable part of our population. Children are already naturally vulnerable, and children who are being told they can't be who they know at their core they are? Well, they are the ones we need to protect the most.

These pieces of legislation amount bullying for that vulnerable population and fear-mongering for the broader population. I took a look at the numbers.

- * According to the Williams Institute at UCLA, **0.6% of the US population** age 13 and older identifies as transgender.
- * In Wisconsin, there are a little more than **412,000 middle and high school students**, about 7% of our state's total population of 5.961 million.
- If you apply that nation-wide percentage to the middle and high school populations in Wisconsin, that means we have about 2,472 transgender students in the state of Wisconsin, which amounts to about 0.04% of our state's total population.
- * Let's go a little further. Wisconsin has 359 middle schools and 514 high schools, for a total of 873. That means there is **an average of fewer than 3 transgender students at each school.** Hardly enough to make a sports team out of, and certainly not a burden to learn the preferred names of.

Now, I know that transgender numbers are certainly underreported — and who could blame a kid for hesitating to share who they really are in an environment like this? But if you take those numbers at face value, that means this body is targeting 0.04% of our state's population, an average of less than 3 kids per school. If that isn't bullying, what is?

Laws like these not only make our state less safe for this small population of vulnerable kids, they make it less safe for every single person. Because where will you draw the line? How about you draw it right here and vote no on this discriminatory and bigoted legislation.

My name is Rev. Rachel Young Binter and I am a resident of Milwaukee, residing at 1830 N 51st Street, 53208. I am also the mother of a trans daughter and served as a pastor to many trans and nonbinary youth in my former call as a Lutheran campus pastor at UW-Milwaukee.

I am writing to oppose AB100 and AB103, which would strip the rights away from transgender athletes to play sports or use locker rooms that align with their gender and eliminate the right for trans students to use the name and pronouns they identify with in our schools.

These bills actively discriminate against and harm children born with a whole body that does not conform to the gender assigned to them at their birth based on a part of their body. These bills also actively dismiss the science that documents that there is and always has been gender diversity within the chromosomes, hormones, brains, and organs of human beings and that this means intersex, nonbinary, and transgender people have always existed within the human population.

Children within these minority populations already face tremendous obstacles in navigating the world and society, with 82% of all transgender individuals having considered suicide and a full 40% attempting. A recent peer reviewed study by the Trevor Project found that suicide attempts increase as much as an additional 72% for transgender and gender noncomforming teenagers in states that pass anti-transgender laws aimed at minors.

As a mother and pastor to trans people, these numbers are not abstract to me. They represent gifted, beautiful young people that I know and love - many of whom almost did not make it as they fought to find their way in a world that is fearful and turned against them. They include my own most precious child, who I carried into existence through my own body, held at my chest as my first born, and have loved since her first breath. My daughter is funny and smart and adored by her family and friends. She gives back to our community daily in the challenging work she does compassionately caring for vulnerable populations of people in the emergency room of a local hospital. She is an advocate for the least among us, as taught to her by her pastor mother, the congregations in which she grew up, and the teachings of Jesus Christ. She grounds my life with her wisdom and makes me a better Christian every day through the witness of her own courage.

Like so many parents of trans children, however, I almost lost her as she faced the struggle of coming out. She knew I would advocate for her life, but she knew the rest of the world would not, and it was the hardest thing she has ever done, but she knows if she hadn't done it, she wouldn't be alive. She is here and contributing to the world with power and grace because she has chosen to stop fighting who God created her to be and has finally allowed others to see her as I trust God has always seen her. Yet I constantly live with the fear that someone will beat her or take her life because we live in a society that is demonizing her very existence. There is nothing holy about denying people the right to exist as God created them to be. Jesus, in the Gospel of Matthew, says of the gender nonconforming people of his time, the eunuchs, "For there are eunuchs who were born that way, and there are eunuchs who have been made eunuchs by others-and there are those who choose to live like eunuchs for the sake of the kingdom of heaven. The one who can accept this should accept it."

I don't know why government officials feel they can legislate against people Jesus himself accepted and against a biblical witness that uplifts again and again our need to love and care for those who are vulnerable in our society. I don't know why the life of my daughter and other children, who it is proven will gain strength to live by being able to play sports with friends and be called by the names and pronouns that affirm their innermost being, are being actively targeted by laws that will take their lives away from them. I don't know why sports are considered more holy than the life of a human being, especially when people of all genders have widely different levels of strength, agility, and capacity. (I can assure you, my daughter would be no threat on any sports team, even before estrogen decreased her strength and muscle mass). I don't know why scientific knowledge of the diversity of humankind is being ignored in order to punish innocent children who want to thrive in the bodies

My name is Kat Kaybee and I am a resident of Milwaukee, WI. I am testifying against Assembly Bill 100 and Assembly Bill 103. I was an elementary teaching assistant at a character-education-based charter school for four years, and I'm a trans/non-binary adult who was out to my school community - teachers, students, and parents alike. I am sickened by the lack of compassion and understanding being shown in these bills, and the insertion of the government in the private business of individuals.

During my time in the classroom, I interacted with hundreds of different students. A handful of these children were trans/non-binary, but for most students, I was the first out trans person that they met. Let's talk about me as a trans adult in that space. Do you want to know what impact my transness had on them? For cis students, it made them aware of another type of person they can encounter in the world. It confused them sometimes, just like any new piece of information might confuse someone as they add that information to what they already know, but that's to be expected as kids learn about new things in the world. But for trans students, my transness gave them an adult they could trust and be honest with about their inner feelings of self - someone who actually understood what they were going through.

Transness is being talked about as this big, scary, deviant "other" when it's just another way of being. The trans/non-binary children who passed through my classroom were just like any other kid. They had homework to worry about, soccer tryouts to practice for, piano lessons they were dreading, friends who ate lunch with them every day... And teachers who loved them and wanted to provide a caring, nurturing environment for them to grow to be their best selves. For some kids, that's going to mean social transitioning, a.k.a. going by a different name and different pronouns. And some kids who want to start that social transition don't have adults at home who would respond with care and nurturing like their teacher would. This is what adults who are afraid of children transitioning are missing.

There are countless situations where the only adult a child trusts is at school, for whatever the reason may be. Likewise, there are important, overlooked reasons that some children are asking *teachers* to call them a new name/new pronouns *without* asking their parents the same thing. These kids are having to do the hardest and saddest thing a kid could ever have to do - weigh whether or not their adult at home is a safe adult or not. I know that sounds harsh against those parents - I know that those parents are worrying about what is best for their child. They fear permanent change that'll be regretted, or they fear damnation, or they simply fear something they're unfamiliar with. But outing a kid to parents who would keep their kid from transitioning doesn't make the feelings of transness go away - it puts them in danger, and pushes them away further, showing them exactly who they can and can't trust with their truest self. If a kid doesn't want their parents to know they are trans, the issue isn't the teachers at school "hiding" this information. The issue is parents who let fear overcome their responsibility to love UNCONDITIONALLY. *Why* does that kid not want their parents to know? What resources

can we provide to support children who don't feel safe to be themselves at home and who don't feel that trust with their guardian? What resources can we provide their guardians? Why do we think banning the change of names and pronouns in schools will make children "safer" when it'll just cut us off from them even further, and leave them vulnerable, hurting, and lost, stuck in a space where they have to worry about personal safety and their rights as an individual, instead of homework and piano lessons? Why are we continuing to believe false claims that trans athletes are taking over sports and introducing bills that will alienate, harm, and dehumanize ALL children - not just trans ones - who just want to play sports and have fun? What actual concrete evidence shows these bills are necessary and not just a Republican attempt to control, belittle, and eliminate a group of people that they have such a baffling hate for?

Children's lives will be put into jeopardy if we rip away these rights to individual privacy and individual determination. Government doesn't get a say in this. Government doesn't NEED a say in this. Fight against Assembly Bills 100 and 103 and stop the misunderstanding and unjustified fear-mongering.

My name is Ani Miskowski. I am a resident of Milwaukee. While I believe that there is plenty of evidence detailing the harm Assembly Bills 100 and 103 will cause, part of me fears that those points do not matter to you. I fear that hearings like these have become an easily dismissible formality where the physical presence of a committee is meant to placate us. I hope I'm wrong. I cannot force you to open your hearts, and I would not want to. All I have is my hope that you will let yourself hear me.

I was born into a God-fearing family. We went to church every week. We communed with people who shared our faith and our values. But despite all of the faith that my parents claimed to have, they were afraid every day, afraid of making even one misstep, afraid of others, afraid of themselves, afraid of God, and afraid of punishment. That fear destroyed our relationship. I was not brave enough to ask them then, so I ask you now, those of you with open hearts who truly believe trans children are hurting themselves and genuinely want to protect them:

What if you're wrong? What if God's priority isn't the names or pronouns of these children but whether they are accepted and loved? What if trans children are not perverting their bodies but are transcending them, embracing a divine energy inspired by God?

I can't answer for you. I understand it might be scary to grapple with these questions regardless of what faith you may or may not hold. Your mind might conjure memories of shame or even physical punishment, times where you were deemed not masculine or feminine enough. Or perhaps you witnessed others receiving similar treatment and vowed to avoid it. Your instinct might be to defend these corrections, to insist they were acts of love, but *you know what it feels like to be loved*. Love is incompatible with the rejection of mental and physical autonomy. Do you know how it feels to find joy in who you are only for someone else to insist "You are who I say you are." If you know how that feels, if you remember that confusion and frustration, how can you carry that pain forward? How can you give it to *children*?

I feel sorry for you. Because I see the joy in these children. I see the love and transformation they bring to their families. Why don't you trust their joy? What messaging have you received that taught you their truth is in opposition to yours?

The only people you are protecting with these laws are yourselves, and, while you might feel like you've done something good (despite overwhelming evidence to the contrary), you are also holding yourself back. You are running away from your cognitive dissonance because you are afraid of what will happen if you're honest. As long as you avoid honesty, you will never know true peace. I do not want you to be trans if you're not trans. I do not want you to change your name unless you'd like to. I want you to have the freedom to celebrate differences in others and in yourself without fear of punishment. I want these children to lead long, happy, and fulfilled lives.

I beg you to use this moment and your power to show trans children love and acceptance. You have the ability to reject these bills and their rhetoric, and, furthermore, you have a moral responsibility to do so. All it takes is one moment to choose to embrace change. Aren't you tired of being afraid?

My name is Aislinn Hutchinson and I am a concerned resident of the city of Madison. I've lived in Wisconsin for five years and have called Madison home for all of them. I am a business owner, spouse, and active member of my community. I am also trans. I am testifying on bill AB100 and AB103. I am testifying both about allowing trans youth to participate in sports according to their identified gender as well as their ability to use their chosen name and pronouns in school.

I am testifying about this because I myself just came out as non-binary this year. I am also a former college D1 athlete, and sports were and are my entire life. I recently had to find a new league to play hockey in because all of this hate that is being spread towards trans people is becoming a problem everywhere. My league tried to ban all trans players, including non-binary players. This significantly impacted my mental health as hockey is the place I go to play, have fun with my friends, decompress, and get physical activity. There was absolutely no scientific reason for banning athletes like myself from participating in sport, and the same thing is happening to youth if this bill is passed.

I wanted to share my story because I believe all PEOPLE should have the right and access to sport, as well as to use the pronouns of their choosing. Sports, and feeling safe in a dressing room are so important. This is a place where youth are able to learn skills about teamwork, camaraderie, and how to accept one another but this bill creates a scenario in which people will be taught to fear and discriminate against their trans peers. We are just people, wanting to respectfully be shown respect and honor like any human person deserves. The way this bill specifically targets trans youth is abhorrent and I will not stand for it in my community. Madison is a welcoming community for all trans and queer people and I have never felt safer to be myself in a community. Passing these bills will create an environment where others can openly hate and fear monger them when all they want is to be accepted for who they are. Just believe them. How does it affect you? Do you know a trans person? Have you loved a trans person? I do, and I have, and they are the most caring people who know themselves deeply, and just want to exist with the same human rights and decency that cis people get. Please, just leave the trans kids alone.

I wish I had access to language like non-binary or trans when I was a kid this age, I would have known myself a lot better then. It took me 29 years to come out. I have never been happier, or thriving more than I am today. I have never felt safer in sport when others use my pronouns and allow me in their locker rooms. Please don't let youth have to deal with hatred from this young of an age. I barely made it to 29 years old, and a lot of these kids will not survive passing a bill like this. Suicide rates dramatically decrease when we allow kids to be themselves, and to be recognized by others as themselves. My solution is to allow kids to use the

pronouns of their choosing, because why does it affect you to respect what someone wants to be called? Let trans kids play sports with their gender, because there is no real difference in athletic ability at these ages, and we all just want to play.

My name is Laura Stoesz, and I am a licensed professional counselor in training with a Master's of Science in Counseling from the University of Madison. These are my own views, and they are informed by psychological science. As a psychotherapist, I work with children and adults who have been harmed by anti-trans legislation like AB 100 and AB 103. I ask that you vote no on both these bills because they will harm children and adults in our state, leading to public health impacts, lost productivity and creativity, and lost faith in your work as politicians.

Trans, gender nonconforming, and nonbinary people have always existed. It is society's prejudiced views, policies, and actions that harm non-cis people, not their gender identity. The evidence in scientific literature is clear. As researcher Ilan Meyer established in his seminal 2003 peer-reviewed paper, "stigma, prejudice, and discrimination create a hostile and stressful social environment," which leads to mental health problems and can lead to negative physical health effects. (Meyer, "Prejudice, social stress, and mental health in lesbian, gay, and bisexual populations: Conceptual issues and research evidence," Psychological Bulletin, 2003). We have known this for over twenty years, and yet bills like these continue to inflict minority stress on people, causing public health impacts that reverberate for decades.

Lost productivity and creativity: As nonbinary author Alok Vaid-Menon says in Beyond the Gender Binary, "Gender non-conforming people face considerable distress not because we have a disorder, but because of stigma and discrimination. There is nothing wrong with us, what is wrong is a world that punishes us for not being normatively masculine or feminine." Pronouns are a zero-cost affirmation of identity. If you could affirm a child with a word, why would you refuse to do it? I'm not talking about potentially hurtful words. Using a correct pronoun or name is morally neutral, costs nothing, and affirms a child without harming another person. The discomfort of the person being asked to use the correct name or pronoun is not harm; dysphoria is. Dysphoria is traumatic, and the more gender nonconforming children and adults are forced to experience it, the more trauma builds up, leading to challenges in life functioning, just as we see in PTSD, and in fact, sometimes rising to the level of clinical PTSD. This mental trauma of being misidentified, stigmatized, and ostracized has a social cost, as traumatized people often need additional support from friends, family, or social systems. Traumatized people and their allies pay the cost, but so does society, when a person's potential goes underutilized and their relationships and lives are affected by trauma. Some people still excel despite these stacked odds, like trans athletes, and they are my inspiration.

Trans-inclusive sports can still be fair. Trans athletes in sports aligned with their gender should be allowed to compete. Overcoming transphobia and adapting to changing bodies are challenge enough for trans athletes. They should not be subjected to exclusionary practices just to be able to enjoy their sport. Far worse outcomes can and do happen to girls and women in sports than competing with trans athletes, who pose no threat to safety. Look at the recent US Olympic Gymnastics team and how many were systematically abused by a cis male team medical provider, who did present a threat to safety and who was allowed to continue far too long. Look at the intrusive testing being proposed to police women's categorization as women just to participate in their sport. Inflicting this testing would be traumatizing, objectifying, and unnecessary.

Lost faith in you as an elected official: It's not a good look to be anti-trans. It may seem politically expedient now, when others are attacking trans rights. But in the years to come, anti-trans politicians will suffer the consequences of alienating so many people -- allies, loved ones of trans people, folks who come to realize what brilliant, beautiful contributions trans people bring to society. I watch Roller Derby, a sport that is inclusive of trans athletes, BECAUSE it is inclusive of trans athletes. At games, I get to witness gender diversity, excellence in sport, and welcome for all. At the most recent game, competitors wore shirts that affirmed, "Trans Athletes Belong Here." There was a palpable joy in the arena and on the bleachers. Children clamored to high-five all the athletes at the end of each game. This is the positive impact inclusion can have: sportsmanship, compassion, and inclusion. Who doesn't support those values? Anyone who votes for AB 100 or AB 103.

Dear Members of the Assembly Bill on Education,

I am writing to oppose Assembly Bills 100 and 103.

For Bill 100, I am opposed because school sports are not professional sports. All children and youth are still developing and develop at different rates regardless of gender and that includes transgender kids. Blocking transgender children and youth maintains them as second class participants and reminds me of the days when girls were only allowed to play half-court basketball, or were only allowed to wear dresses and skirts, or when we forced left-handed children to try to become right-handed--all within my parents' lifetime. All children and youth play and participate in athletics because first and foremost it's fun, it's something they enjoy. In a world where transgender children and youth are more likely to be bullied. Studies from the National Institute of Health show that 53% of cisgender boys and girls are likely to be bullied, but that rate is 83% for transgender kids. Disallowing trans children and youth from participating in athletics, including locker room use, contributes to the sense of isolation and poor mental health and well-being, as shown in that same study. Inclusion of transgender children and youth has the opposite effect of building self-esteem and acceptance among all children and youth, including both transgender and cisgender kids. The percentage of transgender youth ages 13-17 is less than 1.5 percent of the entire U.S. youth population. We are talking about a small number of children and youth who just want to be treated like everyone else. Please oppose Assembly Bill 100 to assure fair treatment and mental well being for all of our children and youth.

For Bill 103, I am opposed because people change names and use nicknames all the time. Are we going to not allow children to use the nickname they prefer? Are we going to insist they use the last name they are registered in, even if they are not in the custody of that parent and choose to use a different family last name? This is an unnecessary bill. For transgender children and youth, studies have shown that using their preferred names and pronouns boosts self-esteem and mental well-being. This is the same for cisgender children. I myself was given a nickname by my family that has been used my whole life; when someone uses my full legal name I know they do not know me personally and do not know who I really am. I know other cisgender adults who were given a nickname by their family and as they became teens they stopped using it because they found it didn't fit. Why would we do this to children and youth? This seems unnecessarily cruel. Allow children and youth to use the names they prefer. Pronouns are also a similar way of declaring who someone is, and it seems rather ridiculous to tell someone they aren't who they know themselves to be. But not only is it ridiculous, it is harmful, and contributes to bullying. Studies from the National Institute of Health show that 53% of cisgender children and youth are likely to be bullied, but that rate is 83% for transgender kids. This seems like

a waste of legislation to target a small percentage (<u>less than 1.5% of all children</u> <u>and youth in the U.S.</u>) and would also affect cisgender children who use a different name at school. Vote no on Assembly Bill 103.

My name is Maks Kopish, I am a constituent from La Farge, WI (54639). I've lived in Vernon County for the past six years, and I am in training to become an interfaith minister. Four years ago, I decided to change my name with the realization that my interior self is much more masculine-leaning than people would assume based on the sex (female) and name I was assigned at birth.

I discovered that there is a name for a feeling I had my entire life, the feeling of not really fitting within the category of "girl" or the social expectations of girl/womanhood. The word is dysphoria. Gender dysphoria is what I felt when I'd open birthday presents from my mom to find pink clothes, barbie dolls, and heart-shaped jewelry, when my young self wanted army men, spy gadgets, and science books. Gender dysphoria is what I felt when I had to wear a dress to prom and felt like a man in drag. Despite being biologically female, I have never fit within the box of girl/womanhood, and I knew it from the earliest age I can remember.

Changing my name and adopting gender neutral pronouns (they/them) was a massive relief for my mental and emotional health. I immediately felt more confident, happy, and excited about life. I was getting to know myself better, no longer hiding under labels that always felt off. I was being more honest with my friends and loved ones about who I really am. Changing my name and pronouns was one of the most important and life-affirming things I've ever done. My only regret is that I was kept from my own truth for so many years trying to fit within a category I didn't belong.

Please do not cause misery for our kids. They have it hard enough with everything going on in the world. Just let them be themselves. Gender is not some big scary thing. Gender expression should be fun and interesting. Don't you want to know who people really are, in all of our wonderful and wild glory, and as our Creator, rather than our government, intends?

Please do not pass AB100 and AB103. Trans kids should be able to use the locker room that suits their self-understanding of their gender; and refusing to use a person's name and pronouns is not only supremely disrespectful but also massively harmful for that person's internal well-being and sense of self. This letter is speaking out against bills AB100/AB103.

I am a parent of a cisgender child, but fully support the full inclusion of transgender athletes in sports at all levels. I believe that students, regardless of their gender identity, should have the opportunity to compete and thrive in a welcoming and equitable environment. Transgender students are already at greater risk for depression and anxiety. However, a 2022 study done by of the Human Rights Campaign (HRC Foundation) and the University of Connecticut 2022 LGBTQ+ Youth Study found that high school-aged transgender and non-binary student-athletes reported higher grades, lower levels of depression, and were less likely to feel unsafe at school than those who did not play sports.

In 2023, when the Wisconsin State Assembly signed off legislation limiting transgender participation in youth sports, author Barbara Dittrich (R) said she was aware of only six transgender athletes in Wisconsin. I don't have concerns with my daughter playing sports with transgender athletes. I do have increasing concerns on genital checks being required if any student's sex is called in question.

Transgender individuals, like all athletes, deserve respect, safety, and the ability to pursue their athletic goals without discrimination or exclusion. Inclusion in sports not only enriches the lives of transgender athletes but strengthens our collective commitment to fairness, teamwork, and community. By ensuring that everyone has access to play and compete, we foster a society that values diversity, acceptance, and human rights. I am calling on the Wisconsin state assembly to reject policies that discriminate against transgender athletes and instead champion efforts to ensure their equitable treatment and participation.

My name is Morgan Lange, I am a registered nurse, a parent, currently a public health nurse for Madison & Dane County, a family member and friend of individuals in the LGBTQ+ community in Madison, and a former school nurse.

I am testifying to oppose the anti-trans legislation being proposed in AB100 and AB103. I was a school nurse for 5 years in the Madison Metropolitan School District (2019-2024) and know firsthand how harmful and dangerous this type of legislation is for trans youth and the school community overall.

These bills completely take away the power of an individual to determine their identity and instead give it to a person of power (the school principal). NO ONE should be allowed to tell anyone who they are. This is a completely inappropriate guideline for a school community - as one of the foundational pillars of the school environment is acceptance of others and being unafraid to be yourself. Specifically, the sports team environment fosters teamwork and working with others, and engaging in camaraderie. These bills create a tableau for others in the school to fear and discriminate against their trans peers or their trans students.

More than 1 in 10 LGBTQ+ young people attempted suicide in the past year, and 39% of LGBTQ+ young people seriously considered attempting suicide in the past year — **including 46% of transgender and nonbinary young people.** (These statistics are from theTrevorProject.org). I want to emphasize that LGBTQ+ youth are **not** more prone to suicide because of their gender identity or sexual orientation but rather because of how society has treated them and stigmatized them.

I also want to point to the statistic from the <u>trevorproject.org</u> that clearly shows 49% (almost HALF) of LGBTQ+ youth experienced bullying at school. As a school nurse - this is something I have personally witnessed. I have taken care of many trans students in the health office, in mental health distress or even crisis from bullying or discrimination that they are experiencing from peers, and in some cases from school staff. As someone who has worked in the middle and high school environments, I can say with absolute certainty, that stigmatizing trans youth, but disallowing them to express themselves will have a

devastating, and likely deadly effect on the youth in our Wisconsin schools and the education community. I am completely horrified that these bills are even being proposed; schools are a place for inclusion and acceptance of self-expression, *not* hate and discrimination.

Thank you for hearing/reading my testimony. I hope you will consider what I have shared with you today, and stand up for trans youth (and all people) in Wisconsin by opposing AB100 and AB103 which severely harms trans students in the state of Wisconsin.

My name is Virginia Kamp. I grew up in Appleton, Wisconsin, completed my Bachelor's Degree at UW- Madison, and am currently a resident of Wauwatosa. I am writing to strongly urge you not to move forward with bills AB100 and AB103.

When I was a high school student in Appleton, I knew that I was gay. But I also knew that I wanted to be seen as a "good" student, so for a long time, I didn't tell anyone. But later, I got to know other students who were openly LGBT, and who were bullied and made to feel unsafe because of it.

So, along with a few other students, I started a Gay-Straight Alliance at my school. I still did not tell my teachers that I was gay, but they knew I was part of forming this organization. And to this day, I can still remember how I felt in each of my high school classrooms after my teacher's found out this information. There were some classrooms where I felt safe to learn, safe to be myself. But unfortunately, there were lots of classrooms where I did not feel that way.

I am deeply concerned that these bills will only serve to increase self-harm, self-hatred, and even suicide among Wisconsin's kids.

I hope that that is enough for you to not move these bills forward. But in case it's not, let me also share my perspective as a former classroom teacher. We are already having a hard time keeping teachers in classrooms, and I fear that we will lose more teachers - good, kind, loving teachers - if you tell them that they can't listen respectfully when a child asks them to use a preferred name or pronouns.

There is one final thing I hope you will consider. When I did finally start coming out as gay, I remember that there were certain people who surprised me. People I expected to be disgusted who instead were curious and kind, who kept our connection and our communication open long enough to get to actually know me, and for me to actually get to know them. I see a Wisconsin where it's possible for that type of kindness to overcome partisanship. Let's be the state where you can be a Republican or a Democrat, where you can disagree wholeheartedly, but where we don't let fear or hatred prevent us from taking care of all of our kids.

To the members of the 2025 Assembly Committee on Education:

Wisconsin Assembly Bills 100 and 103 are yet another installment in the latest wave of legislation aimed at destroying the rights and freedoms of transgender individuals -- this time, attacking our children. These bills will prevent transgender students from participating in the school sports that align with their gender identity and also forcibly out transgender students if they in any way request staff to recognize their authentic selves. They are not just unnecessary wastes of Wisconsin taxpayer dollars; they are actively harmful.

Supporters of AB100 argue that the bill protects fairness in women's sports. These claims, however, are based on misleading political narratives and reject widely respected scientific evidence. Countless major medical organizations, including the American Academy of Pediatrics as well as the American Medical Association, recognize and confirm that transgender athletes do not inherently have an unfair advantage over cisgender athletes, and sports governing organizations such as the International Olympic Committee already have policies ensuring fair competition regardless of gender. AB100 is really just a solution in search of a problem, and in the process of trying to fabricate a crisis, it singles out and excludes transgender youth, sending a message that these children are not welcome.

AB103 is another attempt to marginalize transgender students -- this time by restricting how schools recognize and respect their identities. This bill would prevent schools from using a student's chosen name and preferred pronouns unless they align with a legal name change and are formally requested by a parent. If any parent or legal guardian makes such a request, ALL guardians will be given the opportunity to intervene. I know several people whose parents divorced or separated due to deep disagreement over whether their child should receive lifesaving care. Had AB103 been law they would have been subjected to the whims of their anti-trans parent, whether or not they were involved in their daily lives. Such policies disregard the lived experiences of transgender and nonbinary youth and will force their guardians to weigh whether to risk outing their children to unsupportive family members, who themselves will have the power to override a supportive parent. Or likewise, if they will risk the scrutiny of potentially unspportive or even bigoted school administrators, personnel who may not even know the child in question. These barriers to simply existing at school are only in place for students the author deem unworthy of identity; students who request a name or similar accommodation who are not transgender are not burdened by AB103. Respecting a student's chosen name and preferred pronouns should not be a matter of politics; it is a matter of dignity, mental health, and safety. AB103 is not about parental rights or educational integrity; it is about policing identity and forcing schools, teachers, and staff to participate in discrimination against transgender youth.

Wisconsin's AB100 and AB103 are not about fairness or protection -- they are about discrimination and control. The bills target an already vulnerable population, ignoring general scientific consensus and the voices of transgender people themselves. If these bills become law, they will cause real harm, not only by worsening stigma and mental health, but also the likelihood of self-harm among transgender youth.

A study published in the Journal Nature¹ September of 2024 assessed 19 states where anti-trans legislation passed from 2018 to 2022 and found an up to 72% increase in past-year suicide attempts by transgender and nonbinary youth, with a causal relationship by those states' anti-trans legislation.

Children's suicide rates increased across all states where anti-trans bills had been passed, and specifically as a result of those bans being enacted by their state legislatures.

These bills kill children born the same way as I was – created by God to find and live as our authentic selves. At best, they are intended to penalize and subjugate children who themselves are unknown by this bill's authors or the members of this committee. But in effect, this body will be setting policy that certain children are unwelcome in our schools, and unwelcome in our society more broadly. How many children must die before their lives are considered by this body?

I firmly believe what my church teaches: that all children, transgender nonbinary or otherwise, are created by God to find and embody our authentic selves and live out our lives as any other child of God. These bills attack that purpose, and with it our dignity and humanity. Would this body cosign the hatred, verbal and physical attacks transgender Children of God will be forced to endure by their peers, teachers, administrators, extended family and community? Will this body shield itself from the reality that children will be subjected to conditions which guarantee they will be told they are unwelcome in our society? This was a reality I was forced to live through for many many years, and as a result I regularly considered ending my own life beginning at the age of 13. I know many others like me who considered the ultimate sin, and I can only wonder how many more people would be alive today had they not experienced the same. I pray this body looks beyond themselves to see the humanity they will be snuffing out by putting their political careers over the lives and safety of fellow Children of God.

You all should be spending time fighting back against the takeover we are seeing and cuts to important supports and supporting our education system instead of trying to criminalize gender identity and tell kids that they don't belong. We should be trying to work toward sports teams that are open to all pupils. Why must we continue to separate folks by their gender that people want to maintain is binary when it is not. You should be ashamed of yourself for wasting the time it takes to write and get these before the committee. These bills seek to strip the rights away from transgender athletes to play sports or use locker rooms that align with their gender and eliminate the right for trans students to use the name and pronouns they identify with in our schools. There is not any need to further provide laws against a small and marginalized group of kids. This is blatant discrimination instead of working with kids, schools and parents.

I'm not trans, but I know several people who are and I've taken the time to listen and learn from them. There is a specific friend of mine that was born a female and grew up a girl and always was referred to as a tomboy. This friend of mine who is now an adult had qualified to participate in the CrossFit games and has been an athletic trainer and athlete themselves. They even started a fitness company and helped the roller derby league I was a part of with some training. Within the last few years, they have transitioned to using he/they pronouns and getting gender affirming surgery. He identifies as a non-binary trans male and is now living life as their authentic self. This friend of mine recently took themselves out of the CrossFit games and was disappointed to see this organization comply with an executive order based on fear and without any scientific evidence behind it. How can anyone think this is better for all kids, instead of appeasing the instances of a few people who "think" that they were discriminated against.

Ironically, Bill AB100 would not have applied to my friend as a pupil or athlete in school had they decided to transition sconer, since they are a female at birth and therefore would be able to qualify for male sports since the bill just refers to male at birth folks not able to qualify for female sports participation. Doesn't that just scream for a lawsuit of discrimination? Why would you just making it one gender and not include trans folks that identify as male not be able to participate in female sports?

More importantly, I've worked with skaters in a sport, and students in college who have clearly expressed the fact that they have gender identities that are not easily put into binaries of male and female. Dear Members of the Assembly Committee on Education,

My name is Sarah Forzley, and I am a Madison resident. I've lived here since 2012, and my husband and I settled here to be near his family, just like all his siblings. I say this to emphasize that even while pursuing a masters, a doctorate, and a corporate career, I continue to prioritize family values. Additionally, I am a former instructor at the University of Wisconsin, a former high school teacher, and a former elementary school teacher. Given that I live according to my family values, and that I spent over twenty cumulative years teaching young people and participating in girls' and women's sports myself, I care deeply about safety and equity in school and in sport.

For these reasons, I urge you to vote NO on Assembly Bills 100 and 103. These bills do not increase safety or equity in schools or sports. Trans girls and trans women do not threaten the success of individual women or of women's sports in general. I have seen this myself as both an athlete and a teacher. Instead, they reveal a fundamental misunderstanding of sex assigned at birth, of the actual threats that girls and women face every day, and of athletic competition. Sex assigned at birth is not a perfect way to identify a person's sex. I have had students with different medical conditions whose sex assigned at birth did not take into account their chromosomal makeup because the doctor simply visually assessed the baby's features. I also have had students who felt that they belonged nowhere because they did not "fit in" with the boys or girls at their school. I would have loved to see those students to fear and discriminate against their peers. These bills teach our students that the definition of "girl" or "woman" is ever narrower. These bills threaten to drag us back into a time when the United States was more sexist, when women had even fewer opportunities in sport.

After my master's degree, I taught at a university in Paris and ran for a team there. I was just a run-of-the-mill varsity athlete in college, but in France I quickly climbed the national rankings. Why? Because France has less gender equality than the United States. I know that sometimes, conservative folks fear that liberal folks are not proud of the United States. I can say without hesitation that I am proud of the United States for how far we have come in girls' and women's sports since my mother's time. In France, I faced more sexual and physical harassment, more restrictive expectations for my gender, and more inequality in sport than I face here. Though it meant giving up my excellent ranking in France, I was relieved to return to the competition scene in the United States because, frankly, I love how many women in the United States are faster than I am – women's sports here have thrived under Title IX to the benefit of all, including mediocre athletes like myself. We are carried along in the wave of those who run faster than we do. It is in our interest to compete against as diverse a group of women as possible so as to improve our training and overall times.

Perhaps, if you feel that discussing nonbinary genders is polarizing, you can remember a time in your life when you did not fit in. Remember how uncomfortable that was, how isolating, how sad you felt. Trans students do not choose to be trans; nobody chooses to have a more difficult life in this way. Allowing trans students to participate in sports, allowing trans students to use the bathroom most comfortable for them, tells them that they belong. Nobody would undergo so

much social stigma just to cause harm to others. Trans students are not trying to harm anyone, and they certainly don't threaten our sports. Do you know what does threaten girls and women in school and sport? Sexual harassment by male students, teachers, administrators, and clergymen. Bias from adults who do not believe girls or women have what it takes to lift weights, to succeed in STEM, to obtain advanced degrees. Let's focus on real problems instead of an imagined one.

I am writing to express my strong opposition to AB100 and AB103. These proposed bills are deeply harmful and would actively contribute to an unsafe and hostile environment for queer and transgender students, teachers, administrators, and parents.

AB100 and AB103 are not about fairness or protection—they are transphobic measures that seek to erase and marginalize transgender youth. Particularly under this new administration, trans folks are being targeted, scapegoated and persecuted. Trans people are under attack, and bills like this are nothing more than state-sanctioned discrimination.

Trans people exist. Trans people are not a threat. Trans folks are simply asking for the basic human right to be themselves without fear of persecution.

These proposed bills do nothing but put trans students at greater risk of bullying, isolation, and harm. If the goal of this committee is to protect and support students, then the focus should not be on banning pronouns or excluding children from sports—it should be on addressing the real dangers facing our schools, such as gun violence. Gun violence is the leading cause of death among young people in this country. Instead of wasting precious time and resources targeting one of our most vulnerable student populations, I urge you to prioritize real solutions that will protect all students.

Dr. Stephanie Budge, Madison, Wisconsin Regarding Assembly Bill 100 and Assembly Bill 103 To: The Wisconsin State Assembly Committee on Education

My name is Dr. Stephanie Budge and I am a resident of Wisconsin who has a specialty in understanding the mental health impacts of discrimination related to transgender individuals. I am a licensed psychologist in the state of Wisconsin. While I am testifying as a private citizen, my role as a Professor of Counseling Psychology at the University of Wisconsin-Madison provides me with the expertise necessary to comment on this bill (I have published 100+ academic articles mostly focused on transgender people, over 180+ conference presentations mostly focused on transgender people, and have engaged in clinical work related to over 200 transgender people). I have worked in the field of transgender research and clinical work for 17 years.

I am testifying that the passing of these bills and the subsequent actions from these bills have a high likelihood of causing both physical and mental health impacts on youth. For the record, I oppose the proposed bills AB100 and AB103 based on the scientific research presented below.

Broadly, psychological science has used the concept of "minority stress" to understand and explain the reasons why transgender people (and members of other minority groups) experience physical and mental health disparities (see Meyer, 2003; Hendricks & Testa, 2012). The minority stress model indicates that there are three types of minority stressors: 1) external stressors, 2) expectations of external stressors, and 3) internal stressors. Examples of external stressors experienced by transgender people include discrimination, prejudice, harassment, rejection, and non-affirmation of gender identity. Examples of internal stressors experienced by transgender people include concealing one's gender identity, internalizing gender-related stigma, and constantly thinking about one's gender. Transgender people will often expect that they will experience external stressors due to having actually experienced them in the past, as well as witnessing or hearing about other transgender people who have experienced external stressors. This lens can assist with understanding the impacts of both exclusion from sports teams (AB100) and the impacts of not being able to use chosen names and pronouns in required settings, such as schools (AB103).

Sports Participation

For children and young adults, school-sponsored sports offer lifelong benefits and have a positive developmental impact that is second only to family support. These benefits can be seen in a variety of realms in students' lives, including social and emotional development as well as physical and mental health. With regards to social benefits, students who participate in sports are given the opportunity to make friends and become part of a supportive community of teammates and peers (Boone & Leadbeater, 2006). Athletes spend considerable time with their teammates, often experiencing high-pressure situations together that lead to deeper friendships and students who participate in sports also can build teamwork, discipline, and leadership skills (Thompson et al., 2022). They learn the importance of working as part of a team to achieve a common goal and the importance of each teammate's role in bringing about that goal (Salcinovic et al., 2022). Moreover, coaches and other staff members provide students who participate in sports access to meaningful mentorship and guidance. (Mills & Clements, 2021). This mentorship can extend beyond school sports, guiding students through other areas of their lives.

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With regards to emotional benefits, school sports provide an opportunity for youth to gain confidence. They also reduce the effects of risk factors, such as stressful life events, that lead to increases in depression. Furthermore, learning how to manage stressful events at a young age provides benefits to student athletes throughout their lives, such as learning how to regulate their emotions. Students who participate in sports experience significantly lower levels of externalizing issues (for example, aggression and delinquency) and anxiety/depression (Vella, 2019). Students also experience the success and personal fulfillment achieved from discipline, hard work, and perseverance through many hours of practice and competition, all of which helps students develop positive habits that can benefit them in many other areas of life (Eime et al, 2014).

Based on my experience working with transgender youth, it would be psychologically damaging for a transgender youth to be banned from playing sports on equal terms with cisgender peers. This type of discrimination causes irreversible and severe damage to transgender youth development. Specifically, discriminating against transgender youth athletes leads to an increase in youth anxiety, depression, trauma, and suicidal ideation/attempts as well as an increase in physical health concerns for transgender youth (Chan et al., 2024). Barrera et al. report that the physical consequences for transgender youth of not being able to participate in sports include worse cardiovascular outcomes, poor bone mineral density, and poor neurocognitive development when compared to cisgender youth. In addition, physicians report that participation in sports is often one primary method through which transgender youth gain access to regular medical care, and if they do not participate in sports, it increases the disparity between cisgender youth and transgender youth (Hughes et al., 2022). In addition to the physical and mental health consequences of not being able to participate in sports, transgender people report greater experiences of harassment, prejudice, rejection, and bullying as a result of legislation focused on restricting transgender people's rights (Tebbe et al., 2022).

Transgender youth will also internalize the shame and stigma of being excluded for a personal characteristic (being transgender) over which they have no control and that already subjects them to prejudice and social stigma. Fear of additional discrimination and violence are two primary outcomes that stem from transgender youth being excluded from sports (Kosciw et al., 2022). Not only are there the actual consequences outlined above that occur from direct discrimination, but fear of additional sports-related discrimination leads transgender youth to avoid gym/physical education class, locker-rooms, and athletic fields and facilities. Also, being misgendered (i.e., requiring transgender girls to participate in boys' sports) is associated with the internalization of stigma and the subsequent mental health consequences that arise from internalized stigma (McLemore, 2015).

Importance of Social Transition

The incongruence between a person's gender identity and sex assigned at birth can manifest in clinically significant distress, which the American Psychiatric Association calls gender dysphoria. Gender dysphoria is codified in the American Psychiatric Association's Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders (APA, 2022; DSM-5-TR) and is the medical and psychiatric diagnosis for distress associated with gender incongruence. Two current diagnostic categories are used by mental health and medical providers when children and youth are transgender: Gender Dysphoria in Childhood and Gender Dysphoria in Adolescents and Adults. Although individuals who are diagnosed with gender dysphoria can experience a diversity of symptoms, the shared diagnostic criteria that is required for both includes clear, distinct, and significant distress from the incongruence between the sex the individual was assigned at birth and their gender identity.

For transgender individuals, social transition can be an important aspect of treatment to reduce the symptoms of gender dysphoria. As part of a social transition, an individual will typically, among other things, use a name and pronouns congruent with their gender identity and use sex-designated facilities such as restrooms that align with their gender identity. To be clinically effective at alleviating the distress associated with gender dysphoria, a social transition must be respected consistently across all aspects of a transgender individual's life—for example, at home, in school, and at work. It is the aim of treatment to assist the individual in successfully integrating their internal identity into a life that allows them to function consistently in accordance with that identity and not feel shame for who they are. For those transgender adolescents for whom social transition is part of treatment of gender dysphoria, it is likely that serious distress will result if clinically indicated aspects of transition are impeded, as is suggested in both AB 100 and AB 103.

The precise treatment for gender dysphoria depends on the individual. For most transgender individuals, a gender transition is considered psychologically and medically necessary. Transition can take either or both of two forms: (a) social transition, and (b) medical treatments that change a person's body to align with their gender.

Gender dysphoria reduces significantly when the treatment aligns with the individual's goals, and the medical community has known for decades that there are effective interventions to reduce gender dysphoria. Every major medical association in the United States agrees that medical treatment for gender dysphoria is safe, necessary, and effective (Lockmiller, 2023).

For transgender individuals, social transition can be an important aspect of treatment to reduce the symptoms of gender dysphoria. As part of a social transition, an individual will typically, among other things, use a name and pronouns congruent with their gender identity and use sex-designated facilities such as restrooms that align with their gender identity. To be clinically effective at alleviating the distress associated with gender dysphoria, a social transition must be respected consistently across all aspects of a transgender individual's life—for example, at home, in school, and at work. It is the aim of treatment to assist the individual in successfully integrating their internal identity into a life that allows them to function consistently in accordance with that identity and not feel shame for who they are. For those transgender adolescents for whom social transition is part of treatment of gender dysphoria, it is likely that serious distress will result if clinically indicated aspects of transition are impeded.

Psychotherapy to reduce the harmful effects of stigma and improve resiliency can also be an important form of support for individuals of any age with gender dysphoria (see Budge et al., 2025; Budge et al., 2021; Exposito-Campos et al., 2023). While psychotherapy can be useful as a support tool, it is not a substitute for social transition and medical treatments needed to reduce/eliminate gender dysphoria (see Lindley et al., 2023).

Attempts to "cure" transgender individuals by seeking to change their gender identity to match their assigned sex are ineffective and cause extreme psychological damage (see APA, 2021). All major associations of medical and mental health providers, including the American Medical Association, the American Psychiatric Association, the American Psychological Association, and the American Academy of Pediatrics, consider such efforts unethical.

Failing to support a transgender minor's gender identity can cause serious harm to their long-term health and wellbeing because transgender youth experience that mistreatment as a profound rejection of their core self. This harm often includes significant psychological distress

and difficulty maintaining healthy interpersonal relationships and developing emotional resilience, among others. Research demonstrates the importance of social transition for transgender youth. Research from the longitudinal TransYouth Project (TYP) indicates that transgender youth who have socially transitioned demonstrate similar mental health patterns when compared to cisgender youth (Durwood et al., 2017; Olson et al., 2016). Additional research demonstrates that social transition processes are related to less depression, less suicidal ideation, and less suicidal behaviors (Russell et al., 2018). Consequently, delaying social transition is detrimental for transgender youth. Horton's (2022) qualitative study of parents of transgender youth provides an in-depth analysis of the consequences of delaying social transition for children, notably mentioning the psychological distress that results from delaying social transition. In the largest nationwide survey in the U.S. focusing on discrimination experiences of transgender people 18 and older, impeding social transition processes (for example, not being able to change one's name) is directly related to experiencing harassment and assault (James et al., 2016). In a large (N = 1,519) nation-wide Canadian survey of transgender youth, findings similarly demonstrate that not being able to access social transition components/processes is also directly related to experiencing harassment, assault, and denial of services (Taylor et al., 2020).

In addition to studies that focus generally on external stressors, there have been several studies that delve into specific types of external stressors. For example, there is one type of external stressor called "misgendering" that includes communications or actions that convey that a person's gender is misperceived or is being purposefully denied, as is being highlighted in both AB 100 and AB 103. Examples of misgendering can include using a name or pronouns inconsistent with a person's gender identity or denying them access to gendered facilities that are consistent with their gender identity (McLemore, 2018). In a study with 1,091 participants, researchers reported higher anxiety scores for participants who reported more instances of misgendering (Jacobsen et al, 2023). As well, McLemore (2015) found that experiences of being misgendered were associated with anxiety and negative affect (e.g., hostility and guilt), lower self-esteem related to appearance, and felt stigma. In a follow-up study with more specific measures regarding mental health, McLemore (2018) again reported that experiences of being misgendered were related to depression, anxiety, stress, and felt stigma. In addition to depression and anxiety, Colson et al. (2024) found that participants reported post-traumatic stress symptoms as a result of misgendering.

Misgendering, along with other forms of external stressors, is considered a form of social exclusion. Social psychology has established that seeking social acceptance is one of the most basic human needs and that the harms of social exclusion based on identity are widespread and can be catastrophic. On an individual level, social exclusion impacts one's sense of belonging, self-esteem, sense of existence, and self-control. Social exclusion is associated with an increase in maladaptive behaviors and risk-taking behaviors. On a systematic level, social exclusion is often reinforced by organizations and institutions adopting policies and procedures that can enforce discrimination toward certain groups of people. Social exclusion is considered harmful in general; however, it can be even more harmful when people in positions of power perpetuate notions that isolate and stigmatize transgender people. Research on social identity theory describes the harm that results when people of higher status—usually people in power such as administrators—fail to affirm or actively disaffirm lower-status individuals with a marginalized identity (Hogg, 2016). This often leads to external forms of harm such as ostracization and discrimination against the individual by peers and others, as well as internal harms such as internalized shame and self-hatred. These internal and external factors can be directly related to

psychological distress, such as post-traumatic stress disorder, depressive disorders, anxiety disorders, and hypertension, amongst myriad other health concerns.

In a study involving 610 transgender individuals (Galupo et al. 2020), study participants provided information about their experience of gender dysphoria. When asked about the impact of being misgendered or otherwise discriminated against based on their being transgender, they provided descriptions such as "it's like a visceral, violating, physical manifestation of psychological pain for me" and "each of those [misgenderings] is a knife." In our recent publications on the experiences of gender dysphoria, the data indicate that gender dysphoria is distressing (Lindley, Lee, Norton, & Budge, 2024) and that social experiences, like misgendering, increase gender dysphoria (Lindley, Pulice-Farrow, & Budge, 2023).

Misgendering and Gender Discrimination Have Long Lasting Mental Health Effects

Transgender people report extensive exposure to mistreatment, harassment, and violence (James et al., 2016). One of the largest nationwide studies in the United States focused on LGBTQ+ youth demonstrates that transgender youth experience significant amounts of harassment, bullying, and violence (Kosciw et al., 2022). In a report from the data that compared transgender and cisgender youth (GLSEN, 2021), 84.4% of transgender youth felt unsafe at school when compared to 20.6% of their cisgender LGBQ+ (lesbian, gay, bisexual, and queer, but not transgender) peers. In addition, 43.6% of the transgender sample reported missing school because they felt unsafe or uncomfortable, compared to 24.9% of their cisgender LGBQ+ peers. The study indicated that 77.3% of transgender students reported experiencing discrimination at school, compared to 46.1% of the cisgender sample. In the overall report (Kosciw et al., 2022), 80.3% of youth reported hearing biased language regarding gender expression and 65.2% reported hearing anti-transgender language while at school. Of those youth, 72% reported that there was a staff member present while hearing those remarks and that 91% of staff did not intervene. In one of the largest nationwide Canadian studies to focus on transgender youth (Taylor et al., 2020), 66% of youth reported being bullied, 35% were physically threatened or injured, 9% were threatened with a weapon; 63% reported experiencing verbal sexual harassment, 34% reported physical sexual harassment. In another study, transgender youth reported high rates of physical violence at school (57%) and nonphysical victimization at school (68%) (De Pedro & Gorse, 2023).

Transgender children and adolescents experience a great deal of victimization in the school environment, including bullying, physical assault, sexual assault, maltreatment, property victimization, and witnessing/indirect victimization. In their systematic review, Martin-Castillo et al. (2020) examined the effects of school-based victimization throughout 19 studies covering over 23,000 transgender people. Results from this systematic review indicate that transgender youth experience significantly higher rates of victimization at school than their cisgender people.

There also is robust data regarding the psychological impact of external stressors for transgender youth and young adults. Exposure to discrimination has been linked with higher reports of depression, anxiety, post-traumatic stress disorder, self-harm, and suicidality (e.g., Chozden et al., 2019; Price-Feeney, Green, & Dorison, 2020; Veale et al., 2019; Wilson et al., 2016). Pease and colleagues (2022) note that external minority stressors were directly related to psychological distress for young adults. In addition to this finding, they also note that experiencing more anti-transgender discrimination leads to higher levels of gender dysphoria, which then increase psychological distress for young adults. A recent meta-analysis noted that gender related discrimination, gender related rejection, gender related victimization, and non-

affirmation of gender identity were all positively related to depression and anxiety (Wilson et al., 2024).

Regarding mental health disparities, transgender youth consistently report higher instances of mental health concerns when compared to their cisgender counterparts. When compared with cisgender matched controls, transgender youth displayed a twofold to threefold increased risk of depression, anxiety, suicidal ideation, suicide attempt, and self-harm (Reisner et al., 2015). In their study, Fox et al. (2020) report that transgender adolescents were 8 times more likely to report depressive symptoms when compared to cisgender adolescents and were 5 times more likely than cisgender adolescents to report self-harm and suicidality. There is a large body of research demonstrating that these disparities can be explained primarily by the presence of external stressors. One study by Suarez et al. (2024) analyzed data comparing 98.174 cisgender and transgender youth and found that transgender students were more likely than cisgender students to report experiences of violence, poor mental health, suicide risk, some sexual risk behaviors, unstable housing, and felt less belonging at school. A recent meta-analysis noted that transgender young adults experienced significantly higher rates of 7 types of victimization (violent victimization, sexual victimization, intimate partner violence victimization, stalking, bullying, microaggression, and discrimination) when compared to cisgender young adults (Daigle et al., 2024).

Although all psychological distress deserves attention, suicidality (suicidal ideation, suicide attempts, and completed suicide) is perhaps one of the most devastating outcomes due to the finality of completed suicide. For transgender youth, the evidence indicates that suicidality is an overwhelming mental health disparity. Data indicate that transgender youth are more likely to attempt suicide when compared to cisgender youth; for example, that 45% of transgender youth compared to 12% of cisgender boys and 24% of cisgender girls (Zell & Kerr, 2024). Additional studies indicate that transgender youth are 2.71 times more likely to attempt suicide than cisgender youth (Jackman et al., 2019). In one of the largest samples of transgender young adults (age 18-25) in the US, 66% of respondents indicated an experience of suicidal ideation (Wang et al., 2024). In addition, in a sample of transgender youth, 86% reported suicidal ideation and 56% reported a previous suicide attempt and that external stressors such as harassment and bullying were directly related to suicide attempts (Austin et al., 2022). As noted above, these disparities can be explained primarily by the presence of external stressors. A recent systematic review indicated that safety and connectedness at school were amongst some of the primary protective factors from suicide attempts for transgender youth (Christensen et al., 2023).

Studies demonstrate that a negative school climate is not only detrimental to transgender youths' mental health, but also impacts their academic achievement. When compared to cisgender youth, transgender youth were three times more likely to be truant from school due to feeling more unsafe and distressed (Day et al., 2018). Additionally, transgender youth reported greater victimization at school and poorer academic performance when compared to cisgender LGBQ+ peers (Poteat et al., 2021). Transgender youth are statistically more likely to fail a class than cisgender youth and are less likely to take advanced math classes by the end of their school (Wilkenson et al., 2021).

Conclusion

I urge the Wisconsin Legislature to understand the mental health effects of excluding transgender youth from playing on sports teams that match their gender identity and effects of not using the correct name and pronouns for youth. As outlined above, these effects can be

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detrimental and are considered discriminatory. Your consideration of these matters is very much appreciated.

To the Assembly Committee on Education,

The vilification of trans youth is abhorrent and does not belong in the Wisconsin legislature.

Transgender people comprise 1.6% of the human population. Of that fraction, even less play sports. Only 34 trans athletes have openly competed in U.S. college sports to date and fewer make it to the professional level. The largest disparities in sports fairness come from the socioeconomic disadvantage of marginalized populations, not trans participation. Proximity to privilege predicts success in sports, not testosterone levels or biological markers. Meanwhile, disparities faced by the trans community begin at a young age and impact all facets of life including sports access. Trans youth are 9 times more likely to experience homelessness than their cisgender peers, and 68% experience bullying in middle school and high school. 22% of trans women surveyed in 2015 reported that they were bullied so badly in school that they dropped out. Many trans students worry about where they will use the bathroom at school, never mind which locker room to use. Without supportive services to help them navigate these additional challenges, it's tougher for them than their peers to make it through classes, let alone onto a soccer field. (Thank you to ACLU for the use of their stats and statistics)

These bills are only fueling anti-trans rhetoric that trans women have an unfair advantage in sports, despite a lack of consistent research to suggest this. My name is Amber Anderson, BSN RN and I am a nurse at a local child/adolescent psychiatry unit. I am writing in regard to Assembly Bill 100 and 103. For the past four years, I have worked on an acute-stay child and adolescent psychiatric unit in the Madison area serving patients ranging from six to eighteen years old. The majority of patients I work with are admitted after a suicide attempt and/or after disclosing suicidal ideation. Throughout my years working with this population, I have had the privilege to meet kind, clever, empathetic and resilient kids in our community. Many of these patients identify as either trans or nonbinary. More often than not, the stressor resulting in suicidality is a lack of recognition and acceptance of their preferred name and pronouns. Further supporting this fact, according to the Trevor Project, antitransgender laws cause up to a 72% increase in suicide attempts amongst transgender and nonbinary youth.

The reason I am writing to advocate for this community is simply this: I have seen the ramifications of not accepting a child who identifies as trans or nonbinary, and fear for our youth if these bills were to pass. I implore you that, based on proven statistics, allowing this bill to pass would essentially be signing a death sentence for many of Wisconsin's trans and nonbinary youth.

In summary, as a medical professional who works with this specific population on a daily basis and understands the negative effects these bills would have on youth in Wisconsin, I believe you should not allow Assembly Bill 100 and Assembly Bill 103 to move forward.

My name is Kaycie Peck, from Stevens Pont, WI 54481, and I'm writing to you under two hats. The first hat I wear is of a parent of two confident children, one of which is a transgender 7-year-old. The second is as a high school and middle school GSA advisor in rural Wisconsin.

As a parent of a trans child, I oppose both bills AB100 and AB103. We have been following our child's guidance on their gender journey since they were 3 or 4 years old. This is consistent with the American Pediatric Association's information that a child often solidifies their understanding of gender around 4 years old. It was then that our child started saying sometimes they felt like a girl, sometimes they felt like both, and sometimes they felt like neither. In 4K, when the school photographer asked the class to line up in a boys line and girls like, my child fell to the floor crying not knowing which line to go in. Every teacher my child has had has been incredibly supportive, loving, and respectful of my child's identity. They teach age-appropriate discussions of gender, that there are no boy or girl books, toys, jobs, etc. All the public school teachers my child has respect their pronouns, often check in on them and the family to ensure they are doing all right. My child also has a physical disability, Spina Bifida. Despite two very "othering" qualities of their identity, my child is confident, thriving, and proud of all of who they are. Why? Because they are surrounded by people in their life who support and love them for who they are. They are surrounded by love at school, where they are 8 hours a day.

If the bill passes and my child's teachers are stifled from supporting my child, what will happen? The data has shown that trans students who don't have a supportive adult at school have a higher likelihood of depression and suicide. These bills would harm children like my child. My child would no longer have the opportunity to benefit from youth sports. Youth sports teams are not about the competition and the winning. The Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association (WIAA)'s mission statement is to organize an athletic program that will "maximize opportunities for member schools' participation" in interscholastic athletics, as well as "cultivate high ideals of citizenship and sportsmanship". How is a law that forces exclusion from sports supporting cooperation, teamwork, collaboration, common vision, and goal setting that youth sports in schools provide?

If I want my child to be a successful human in this world, these laws are setting them up to struggle if not fail. These laws will not give them the support they need to work within the school structures these laws are tearing down. These laws will also go against my parental wishes and parental rights, which they seem to be claiming to protect.

Under my second hat, I write to you opposing these bills as a GSA advisor to middle and high school students in a rural community outside Stevens Point for almost 10 years now. I have witnessed the struggles that trans and LGBTQ+ students face when they are finding themselves, expressing themselves, or just existing. I have witnessed their struggles, but I have also witnessed their bravery at advocating for what they need in a community that is not always supportive. These bills will close doors to students that work very hard to even reach those opportunities. As my role in education, our goal is NOT to hide things from families. Our goal is to work WITH families. All these laws will do will harm students who already have so many hurdles to jump to succeed.

Please, be on the side of supporting all students, including all students, not harming or excluding students. Do not pass bills AB100 & AB103.

My name is Alicia McQuade, and I am writing to express my strong opposition to the proposed amendments to AB100 and AB103. These amendments, which target transgender students by seeking to restrict their participation in school sports and limit the use of their correct names and pronouns, are harmful, unnecessary, and not supported by research or best practices.

Data clearly shows the harm that discriminatory policies inflict on transgender youth. My name is Kim Suhr, and I live in Wales, 53183. I appreciate the opportunity to voice my position on AB100 and AB103.

I encourage you to vote NO on AB100 the bill that would ban trans athletes from competing on sports teams that align with their gender identity. It seems most people aren't too concerned with trans boys (individuals who had been assigned female at birth but now identify as male) competing in boys' sports, but the thought of even the very small number of trans girls (individuals who had been assigned male at birth but now identify as female) competing in girls' sports makes many Republican lawmakers think they must "protect" cis-gender girls on these teams. This is paternalistic, unnecessary, and frankly, insulting.

Is there proof that this has happened? Even if so, the cases would be vanishingly small compared to the good that would be done for the trans-athletes who are able to compete on the team that matches their identity. Will some trans-athletes be stronger that some cis-athletes? Of course. And the opposite will be true as well. Were there times I was a stronger athlete than other players who seemed to have a physical advantage and more height? You betcha.

As for AB103, this is a problem looking for a bill. People should be called what they want to be called. Period. They should be called by the pronouns they want to be called. Period. We can find thousands of examples of students being referred to by names other than their legal names across this state without anyone blinking an eye. What does it hurt? And what does it hurt to use pronouns that feel more comfortable to the student? If you have never been misnamed or misgendered by others, you can't know what it feels like. Why would you want to impose that type of insult to other people's children? Maybe you should try it: just for a day, have people call you something other than your name and use opposite pronouns. I am writing in regard to the transgender legislation being considered for Wisconsin. I write as a community member, the interim President of the Board of the LGBT Center of SE Wisconsin, as well as a mental health provider. I write to request no anti-trans legislation be created for our youth or adults in the beautiful state of Wisconsin.

At our Center, we see youth and adults that land all over the gender spectrum. This is for many reasons: normal healthy self -discovery; multiple areas that place a person in both "masculine" and "feminine" categories; perception of themselves vs perception by others of birth body parts; full realization. Additionally, it is widely recognized that a person who is given the time and ability for self discovery is most likely to make healthy decisions and choices with less error. Whereas a youth who has been severely restricted from obtaining information and spending time in self reflection is most likely to self harm, make unhealthy and unsafe choices, increasing the likelihood of costly effects to society.

Neuroscience, genetics testing and studies, and psychosocial assessments have persistently and consistently revealed that a person who experiences more than one gender, or, identifies with a gender other than that specified at birth, actually match cognitively and emotionally with their DNA and genetic markers. We are increasingly aware that what a person believes is their gender matches what their bodies own code tells us, regardless of birth assignment. Amazing information when we stop and listen to the facts.

I will not address the bathroom and locker room challenge right now, except to say we know factually, by shutting people out of youth athletics, bathrooms doesn't make them safer, it makes them less safe. Safety has been almost 90% unsafe because of cisgendered straight males. Consequently, we do not see them at all interested in showing up in a bathroom dressed as a woman. Conversely, we do not see a "female" dressed as a "man" in a men's bathroom.

There is no reason trans students should not be able to play sports with their identified gender.

I have teen aged children and would not be concerned if they were playing with or against trans athletes.

We should allow kids and teens to express themselves in the ways that they feel most comfortable. We use nicknames for cis people. We can use different names and pronouns for trans, non binary and gender non conforming youth. Especially if this prevents them from experiencing depression, anxiety or suicidal thoughts. It's a small act of seeing someone and there should be no rules against our schools supporting youth in this way.

Please do whatever you can to keep trans youth safe and vote or speak against the anti trans bills.

I went through school not knowing about my gender, but I can say how deeply being treated as a man within that environment hurt me. Being forced into gym classes surrounded by boys who bullied and harassed me, since they could tell that something was different about me even if they didn't know what.

A lot of my friends have relatives who are in school right now, who are personally threatened by these proposals. I care about these people, and they deserve to be able to feel safe in their schools. A school refusing to support someone opens the door to bullying and even assault.

Disclosing this kind of information to a kid's parents against the kid's will is also dangerous. Abusive parents exist, and a lot of abusive parents are willing to do incredibly cruel things to a kid to punish them for being part of the LGBT community. I have friends who were abused by their parents for being trans, who barely survived that treatment.

Beyond the emboldening of cruel actions by trans kids peers or abusive adults, constantly being forced to exist in a space that denies you a basic part of who you are is incredibly disruptive to someone's mental health. That does not create an environment where a student can effectively learn, and I know that experience has caused me to want to die before, and that plays a serious role in the high rate of suicide in trans youths. Most of my life I had to hide myself to get by. I am a minority in many different ways, through the color of my skin or my sexuality. My racial background and immigration status made me the target of many jokes and stereotypes. I found myself miserable and longing for belonging. I didn't dare to reveal another part of me that would just be the target of bullying. That is exactly the struggle posed by trans youth today. These bills would only compound their struggle and further isolate them. Being trans is a part of who they are, it is not just a phase or something that can change.

Recognition of someone's new identity should not be restricted by unreasonable obstacles. For many people, being addressed by their preferred name is a sign of dignity. It's frankly the least that someone could do. You wouldn't address a divorcee by their previously held last name?

Trans athletes make up an incredibly small portion of the total athletes in the state. This is not a "rampant" issue. There are many other things that the legislature should be focusing on. In addition, sports are inherently unequal in that they prefer body types that are a few standard deviations from the norm. There's a reason that I had no hopes for the NBA being under 6ft. Would it be reasonable to restrict players over a certain height to make it "fair"? In many sports there is not biological advantage to being born male or female. Frankly the gap in performance comes from underfunding, a lack of infrastructure, and unskilled staff for women's sports. Where is the support for that?

My name is Anna Knapp and I am a resident of Liberty Grove. I've lived in Wisconsin for the last 15 years and grew up right here on the family farm where I currently live with my husband and 2 daughters. I am a parent of a transgender teenager. My daughter has the support of our entire family of 4 as well as extended family--aunts, uncles, grandparents, cousins who also live and vote here in Wisconsin.

I am writing to urge you to vote NO on Assembly Bills 100, 102, and 103. As a Wisconsinite, I am opposed to these bills because these bills discriminate against transgender individuals. I can tell you from a family who lives this reality that my daughter is able to participate in 3 seasons of school sports--volleyball, basketball, and softball. In all cases, she is on the team that matches her gender identity. She has ALWAYS played on these teams. She gains great confidence and self-esteem from being included in our small school sports teams. Her mental and physical health is excellent because she is an athlete on these teams. She is definitely not the best athlete on the team, but she's a part of the school spirit and camaraderie that comes from being part of the team.

The support our community has for my daughter participating on these teams has built a strong social support for her. She has great attendance in school, gets almost all As in her classes, performs well on State and District tests and LOVES school. She is a part of many other organizations and as a Girl Scout, provides valuable community service to our local area. It is because she is accepted by her school community that she is able to be so successful.

Our small school district would not be able to support having multiple teams divided by gender. There are just not enough kids in our school to support this. What will this mean for a kid like my daughter? <u>Exclusion is what it means</u>. Being told that even though you are one of the most "girlie" girls in your grade (by appearance and actions), you don't belong on the girls' volleyball team.

Why would our state government support this kind of discrimination? Let's be inclusive and show support for all kids. As a healthcare provider I see the youth of America at all stages and in all shapes and sizes and expressions of self.

I am a cisgender woman- meaning I was born with female sex parts and identify as a woman in my gender though it's no one's business in my opinion.

I have a privilege of being aligned with both my sex and gender but my job is empathy so I see the pain of many who feel and sometimes physically are misaligned. Because of the privacy and confidentiality of my job I won't give names or identifying information. I will take you on a journey of a story of a young eight year old person. They were born with physical attributes of the sex assigned at birth- feminine —a girl—but always knew they were a boy. When they were told "No you are —" they began to question themselves, their identity and when they finally were seen for who they were a light went on. They asked that their hair change and the way they were dressed altered a bit. They then asked to be called by the correct pronouns. This helped this child find inner solace and joy. My job is empathy and joy especially for youth and families. I understand that what we don't understand can sometimes scare us. Imagine if you were told you weren't the gender you know yourself to be. If you were told you must stop using pronouns because someone outside yourself and your family has a judgement on you.

I know girls who are stronger, faster and tougher than boys. I know boys who are effeminate, sensitive and aren't into athletics. These attributes don't belong to just one gender. They belong to all.

Below you will find my testimony in support of trans youth. Although I wish to remain anonymous to protect both myself, the school I work for and the children who attend---I would thank you for sharing my testimony.

Dear legislators,

There is (and always has been) an alarming degree of misinformation surrounding the LGBTQIAA+ community. I could throw statistics at you to refute numerous bullet points, but instead I would like to let me own human experience speak for itself.

I work in education, serving a small school in rural Wisconsin. We host less than 100 students, but around 75% of our population identifies as being apart of the queer community. Among that 75% are transgender and other youth whose identity falls under the trans umbrella. No one is telling these children how to be or feel. My co-workers and I simply allow them a place to exist and explore themselves.

These children are full of love. They amaze me every day with their compassion for one another. At the beginning of last year, one of their peers suddenly announced they wanted to try out a new name. None of them asked questions, no one pried or made fun. They just switched gears. Half way through the year, the same student announced they would like to be addressed by he/him pronouns. Again. Acceptance without question.

These children advocate for one another and have even shown immeasurable patience and kindness when correcting my coworkers and I if we slipped up and use the wrong pronouns.

Not one adult in our building influenced them or asked them to do that.

At their age, I had joined my much larger school's Gay Straight Alliance. Although this was largely a positive experience, that helped me discover who I am, I remember the infighting. Back then it was "The LGB" community. The B was new and controversial. The "T" was fighting for space. I had same aged peers who felt "the trans kids needed their own club."

The marginalized making their own peers feel smaller than they already felt.

I could never imagine that happening with these children. And by allowing them to exist and find themselves with our fear of judgement, we are saving lives.

Since coming to work at this school 3 years ago, I have often heard the unprompted sentiment, "This school saves lives."

A student once wrote me a letter that said, "You are one of the reasons I am still here."

Aside from concerned, I was confused as this was not a student I interacted with all that often. When I followed up with them, they told me it was because I made them feel accepted.

I had not actively done anything besides respect what that child asked me to call them and let them be themselves.

There are a small handful of children who are thriving and alive in Wisconsin at this very moment, in large part because of their school environment.

Under the legislation that is being proposed, these children might not exist. This legislation creates a hostile environment in which children make the choice to commit suicide.

Trans people have always existed. Trans people have often had to hide. The fact that we are at point in our history where folks can be open and live authentically is amazing!

Our children are brave and they are generation which will usher forth a society wherein people can exist without judgement-- but only of we continue to foster and encourage that loving energy.

Please, do not support the legislation which would make it otherwise. Please do not pass legislation which force people back into the closet and foster an environment of fear.

My name is Ashley Hong (she/hers) and I am a concerned Wisconsinite and educator. Today, I am submitting my testimony in dissent of the Wisconsin Assembly bills number 100, 102, and 103. As a middle school math teacher for 7 years in the Madison school district, every positive relationship I had with students was built on them knowing I was a safe person with whom they could be their truest selves. I've had a number of students either come out to me as LGBTQ+ or seek support in understanding this part of themselves. Any education professional will tell you that earning the trust of students is the number one way to create more positive outcomes for them both academically and social-emotionally.

Too many children are taken from us at a young age by suicide due to the exclusion, ridicule, and ostracization they feel from just trying to be who they are. According to a study done by the Trevor Project, 45% of LGBTQ+ youth seriously considered attempting suicide in the past year. Additionally, 68% LGBTQ+ students felt unsafe in school because of sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression characteristics. To be clear, the startling and negative impact of discriminatory practices on LGBTQ+ youth and their mental health is not due to the presence of their identities, but rather the hatred and exclusion experienced in response to them. I cannot stand idly by and watch yet another systematic erasure of trans and LGBTQ+ students stand in our state. These bills take the power away from individuals to determine their identity and participate in self-affirming activities and instead gives it to another just because they are in a position of power in the school. No one should be allowed to tell anyone who they are. I urge you to take steps to actually support students rather than adding to the reasons for the statistics I listed above. According to that same study by the Trevor Project, LGBTQ+ youth who live in a community that is accepting of LGBTO+ people reported significantly lower rates of attempting suicide than those who do not. This means allowing schools to support students in the ways that affirm them, including, but not limited to, using their preferred pronouns and name, allowing them to compete in the sports in which they identify, protecting their rights as a marginalized group, and much more. To the Wisconsin State Assembly Committee on Education on the topic of trans student athletes and the use of gender affirming practices in schools.

My name is Emma Hood, I live in Wisconsin, I am a nurse, and a mother of three children. I am also the proud parent of a transgender child.

Importantly, before I share more, I want to address the vulnerability inherent in sharing my story. I have seen parents in these situations be demonized and the children mocked. And at the same time, I think sharing is necessary right now more than ever. I believe every elected official here has an obligation to try to listen when someone takes risks to write or speak publicly.

I am deeply concerned about the current social and political climate surrounding transgender people, and the degree to which it has been forced into my life and others. These stereotypes have the potential to shape laws and policies in ways that may be difficult to understand, unless you are or love someone who is transgender.

My child was assigned male at birth, and up until three years old, this is what we thought he was. Right after she turned three, she showed a clear interest in dressing in girls' clothing and wanting to grow her hair long. Many of the people around her at this time speculated it was a phase that she would grow out of. But she didn't. It has persisted without change for over 5 and a half years.

One of the myths surrounding parents of trans children is that we are "teaching our children to be trans". And I think this comes from the premise of having limited experience or knowledge on gender expression. I can assure you; I spend more time thinking of ways of trying to keep my child's world as simple as possible these days. Most of the time, parenting her is like parenting any other child except there are certain events or situations that have called on me to really listen and learn more about who my child is. Once, when my daughter was about 4 or 5 years old, I offered her some boys' clothing for her to wear, just to see if she showed interest. It resulted in her crying in my arms for over 1/2 an hour while she fell asleep. That night she so clearly told me she was a girl. At that age, she did not have words for transgender or even what pronouns were. She just knew who she was. I did not teach her anything. For me, it was clear that I would choose to listen and love my child.

When my daughter was 6 years old, she asked to change her name to a girl's name and said she wanted to be a girl, at home and at school. I was so fortunate to have the support and the expertise of the staff and teachers at the school. Who she is now, secure in herself, is undoubtedly a result of her community. She is a bright, caring and creative child.

Last week, I asked her, what if mom had told you had to be a boy when you told me you were a girl? What would that have felt like? She answered, "I wouldn't feel good, I wouldn't feel free". Trans children have been telling us what it feels like to be in their bodies, and what it feels like to be recognized and supported for a long time.

School policies that support and affirm trans students save lives. It is that simple. There is clear evidence that affirming practices, and the support of caring adults is protective in reducing the risk of suicidality and suicide attempts in trans youth. Additionally, school cultures that allow for harassment and bullying of any student, for any reason, contribute to a higher risk of anxiety and depression, as well lower academic performance. But we know without me even naming it here, which students are more often the target of bullying and harassment. We cannot talk about the use of pronouns and preferred names without speaking to the growing evidence that deals directly with this topic. Schools have the ability to ensure an environment that is respectful of all students and their families.

Finally, I want to say that I have sympathy for the parents who might feel fearful that their child will transition socially at school without telling them or having knowledge about it. I think it can be hard for any parent to feel like their child isn't as close as you had hoped.

For those parents, I would encourage any parent who has a trans or gender non-conforming child to find other parents and seek support if you need it. Especially if you don't feel like your community or church has been able to. The most protective and loving thing a parent of a transgender child can do is be their safe-haven and the person they trust to be themselves.

There is room in our humanity, within our faith communities and our schools for transgender people, and I hope you are all fortunate enough one day to know and love a transgender person or child. I urge you to support policy and practices that affirms transgender people and oppose bill AB100 and AB103.

My name is Alicia Ward, I am a young woman who lives in Baraboo (Zip 53913) and I vehemently oppose Assembly bill 100-103 and I urge the members of the Assembly to vote down these bills.

These bills will not change the threat of injury incurred by playing school sports, on the contrary they will make schools a more dangerous place. Politicizing children is not the path to happy healthy environments for education. Children should be free to explore their identity in a way that is safe and free of harmful persecution, especially by adults. Not using the pronouns that children wish to use, and excluding them from sports, is legally sanctioned bullying of children by adult politicians. This spirit of hate towards people that do not fit a vision of "normal" gender identity will trickle down and lead to more bullying, harassment, and abuse in the classrooms.

The push to exclude transgender students from sports will not make children's sports safer. I understand that this push is done in an effect to make girls sports "safer from men" but this is based in a fallacy as men do not play women's sports and the transgender women that play women's sports do not have advantages based solely on their assigned gender at birth. To demonstrate, I was assigned female at birth and when I played tennis in high school there were other girls on my team, assigned so at birth, that were stronger, bigger, and faster than me. On the other hand, there were girls I was stronger than. On the mens team, there was similar variation and there were certainly men that I was bigger and stronger than. The fallacy this bill is based on is disrespectful to female atheletes who don't need the government to stand up for them in sports. Discriminating against transgender students is no different than discriminating against any student on the basis of physical characteristics, which is inherently unfair and controlling.

Putting restrictions on what students will be called in school and making it harder for students to be called what they wish based on medical information restricts children's freedom. It's a simple issue of free speech but regardless of the blatant infringement of rights, it is known that using individuals chosen pronouns improves mental health outcomes and decreases suicide risk.

I implore the members of the Assembly to consider how this bill will impact the daily lives of students in wisconsin. Many gender conforming students will not notice the effects of this bill, but for the minority of students that do not conform to the binary, these bills will have devastating consequences. I graduated from high school in 2019 and these bills would not have negative effects on how safe I felt in school. Please vote no on these bills and protect ALL of Wisconsin children.

My name is Ashley Hong (she/hers) and I am a concerned Wisconsinite and educator. Today, I am submitting my testimony in dissent of the Wisconsin Assembly bills number 100, 102, and 103. As a middle school math teacher for 7 years in the Madison school district, every positive relationship I had with students was built on them knowing I was a safe person with whom they could be their truest selves. I've had a number of students either come out to me as LGBTQ+ or seek support in understanding this part of themselves. Any education professional will tell you that earning the trust of students is the number one way to create more positive outcomes for them both academically and social-emotionally.

Too many children are taken from us at a young age by suicide due to the exclusion, ridicule, and ostracization they feel from just trying to be who they are. According to a study done by the Trevor Project, 45% of LGBTO+ youth seriously considered attempting suicide in the past year. Additionally, 68% LGBTQ+ students felt unsafe in school because of sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression characteristics. To be clear, the startling and negative impact of discriminatory practices on LGBTQ+ youth and their mental health is not due to the presence of their identities, but rather the hatred and exclusion experienced in response to them. I cannot stand idly by and watch yet another systematic erasure of trans and LGBTQ+ students stand in our state. These bills take the power away from individuals to determine their identity and participate in self-affirming activities and instead gives it to another just because they are in a position of power in the school. No one should be allowed to tell anyone who they are. I urge you to take steps to actually support students rather than adding to the reasons for the statistics I listed above. According to that same study by the Trevor Project, LGBTQ+ youth who live in a community that is accepting of LGBTQ+ people reported significantly lower rates of attempting suicide than those who do not. This means allowing schools to support students in the ways that affirm them, including, but not limited to, using their preferred pronouns and name, allowing them to

compete in the sports in which they identify, protecting their rights as a marginalized group, and much more. You all have an opportunity to directly impact the futures of youth in our state, including whether they have one or not.

Thank you for reading my testimony and giving it serious thought as you consider these bills. I hope you all will do the right thing for the well-being of all young people in Wisconsin.

My name is Lex Williams Page, and I live in Cross Plains, Wisconsin, 53528. I oppose bill AB100.

I attended high school at Middleton High School in the Middleton-Cross Plains Area School District as a teenager, and I have now resided in Wisconsin for seven years. I am a proud member of Madison's community and currently work at a local nonprofit, although I have also worked in public schools and programs serving youth in Dane County. I have several siblings who still attend school in Wisconsin, and I have worked with many children and teens, several of whom are gender nonconforming or transgender students. The trans youth I have worked with, and all trans youth, are normal children - they want to be included by their peers, recognized for who they are as they work to figure out their identities, and to spend time thinking about schoolwork, their friends and families, and all of the other complex and simple parts of life that make up being a child. These children do not want or need to go to school every day worrying about whether they are given the same rights as their peers or allowed to exist in the spaces and roles they most identify with and feel comfortable in. Trans youth are also acutely aware of societal attitudes around transgender and gender nonconforming individuals. They are aware that joining gendered sports will subject them to scrutiny, harassment, and people in positions of authority over them questioning their identities. The choice to join a gendered team sport is likely not a lightly taken or easy decision for these youth. I want to ask the Assembly Committee members what they hope this bill will accomplish. What are we worried will happen if the tiny minority of trans students who wish to play team sports, who identify as female and are comfortable enough in that identity to join a sport and play it competitively, are allowed to participate in an activity that helps them form social bonds and contribute to their communities.

Transgender people make up less than 2% of the US population, and trans women - who this bill specifically targets - make up even less than that. The amount of transgender girls in Wisconsin who participate in team sports is likely an inconsequential number, hardly worth spending legislative time debating and the time, resources, and energy it will take to enforce this bill, except for the fact that this bill joins an onslaught of bills throughout the United States that seek to vilify and persecute a small, already incredibly marginalized community.

Under the guise of 'protecting women and girls,' this bill perpetuates harmful negative stereotypes not only about transgender women, but it also assumes that there is an easy way to identify and persecute trans women that will not have any harmful effects on other students, particularly cisgender women and girls. We have seen cisgender female athletes be persecuted, shamed, and bullied for being suspected of being trans - for seeming 'too strong' or 'too masculine' - not only re-enforcing negative stereotypes about the capabilities and talents of women and continuing to restrict how women are able to express and identify themselves, but also making it more acceptable for people in positions of power to feel comfortable harassing, invading the privacy of, and questioning the identity of women and girls of all identities. Let's be clear: the real threat to women is not trans children. It's people who want to police women.

I encourage all members of the Assembly Committee on Education who care about youth, women and girls, and transgender people in Wisconsin to remember that your duty is to serve your constituents, ensuring we have continued access to our civil rights and protections and a good quality of life. Persecuting trans children is an affront on our right to privacy, discriminatory, and does nothing to help families and youth in Wisconsin. Vote against this bill.

Most of my life I had to hide myself to get by. I am a minority in many different ways, through the color of my skin or my sexuality. My racial background and immigration status made me the target of many jokes and stereotypes. I found myself miserable and longing for belonging. I didn't dare to reveal another part of me that would just be the target of bullying. That is exactly the struggle posed by trans youth today. These bills would only compound their struggle and further isolate them. Being trans is a part of who they are, it is not just a phase or something that can change.

Recognition of someone's new identity should not be restricted by unreasonable obstacles. For many people, being addressed by their preferred name is a sign of dignity. It's frankly the least that someone could do. You wouldn't address a divorcee by their previously held last name?

Trans athletes make up an incredibly small portion of the total athletes in the state. This is not a "rampant" issue. There are many other things that the legislature should be focusing on. In addition, sports are inherently unequal in that they prefer body types that are a few standard deviations from the norm. There's a reason that I had no hopes for the NBA being under 6ft. Would it be reasonable to restrict players over a certain height to make it "fair"? In many sports there is not biological advantage to being born male or female. Frankly the gap in performance comes from underfunding, a lack of infrastructure, and unskilled staff for women's sports. Where is the support for that?

I doubt the legislature will heed my words, but go out and meet a trans person. I guarantee you, it will be like meeting any regular person. These are not any different in the way they think or act. They desire the same human things. They are out friends, family, co-workers, and fellow human beings. There is no reason to deny their right to free expression and existence. It does not impede on the rights of anyone else. Let trans youth live their lives, it's difficult enough being a kid.

My daughter has the support of our entire family of 4 as well as extended family--aunts, uncles, grandparents, cousins who also live and vote here in Wisconsin.

I can tell you from a family who lives this reality that my daughter is able to participate in 3 seasons of school sports--volleyball, basketball, and softball. In all cases, she is on the team that matches her gender identity. She has ALWAYS played on these teams. She gains great confidence and self-esteem from being included in our small school sports teams. Her mental and physical health is excellent because she is an athlete on these teams. She is definitely not the best athlete on the team, but she's a part of the school spirit and camaraderie that comes from being part of the team.

The support our community has for my daughter participating on these teams has built a strong social support for her. She has great attendance in school, gets almost all As in her classes, performs well on State and District tests and LOVES school. She is a part of many other organizations and as a Girl Scout, provides valuable community service to our local area. It is because she is accepted by her school community that she is able to be so successful.

Our small school district would not be able to support having multiple teams divided by gender. There are just not enough kids in our school to support this. What will this mean for a kid like my daughter? Exclusion is what it means. Being told that even though you are one of the most "girlie" girls in your grade (by appearance and actions), you don't belong on the girls' volleyball team.

Why would our state government support this kind of discrimination? Let's be inclusive and show support for all kids. My name is Sager Smith, I am a concerned citizen with many close loved ones that could be or would have been significantly negatively affected by the proposed bills. My testimony will concern primarily the harm that could be done by AB100 and AB103, especially in regard to the mental health, safety, and wellbeing of those that are gender nonconforming or transgender.

My little brother is trans, and went through his transition during high school. One of the most crucial parts of transitioning for him was changing his name and pronouns, freeing himself from some of the dysphoria that his deadname and incorrect pronouns caused. Being able to change them at school, with his peers and teachers was an incredibly positive change for him, and that is an extremely common story for other transgender people. My brother first came out to his friends at school, and that space was where he felt most comfortable beginning that change. He deserved to have that decision respected in that space, regardless of what my parents thought about it. His story is one of success, the support he received from peers, teachers, and other loved ones was integral in improving his mental health. My parents were and are supportive of him; but many parents are not, and the parental power to force a name and pronouns in a school setting risks trans children being unable to receive support in a place where they spend the majority of their waking hours. The decision should be up to the child, like in my brother's case, because children deserve agency and to have their personal identity decisions respected regardless of what their parents think about their name and gender.

I wanted to share this example because it affirms that the parents should not be involved in every decision in every space in their lives. These bills will only serve to make harder the lives of trans and gender nonconforming youth. The main thing that the bills do is allow parents that are bigoted or hateful of trans children to do harm to their children, and prevent those children from participating in spaces that affirm their gender identity.

The only reasonable thing to do in this situation is to stop these bills at this committee, as they do not solve any actual issues, and only serve to allow hateful parents to more easily harm their trans children, which wastes the time and energy that could be better spent helping these kids and other children in the Wisconsin Education system.

Thank you Representative Kitchens very much for considering my words on these bills, and I hope that this will help convince you to vote against these harmful bills.

I am also a member of the United Methodist Church which urges members to speak up for persons who face marginalization of any kind, including because of their sexual orientation or gender identity. "The United Methodist Church commits to befriending and caring for all persons, including LGBTQ persons in our churches and communities".

I am strongly opposed to AB 103 and I urge you to vote against this bill. It is a harmful bill that will have very negative impact on our students. **Conversely,** using a student's chosen pronouns is linked to lower rates of depressive symptoms, suicidal ideation and suicidal behavior

Not only do I have a brother and a son who are gay who have experienced injustice and hatred, but also have an 11-year-old grandchild who for the past year has stated their pronouns are "they/them". Maisie is a well-adjusted, well read, very intelligent, happy 5th grade student who attends a school that does not ban chosen pronouns, rather supports and respects them. The other students have NO problem with non-binary pronouns or those chosen by the youth . This is not unusual as adolescents often question their gender identity and expression and we must honor this and respect their dignity! Showing approval fosters a positive sense of self in a child and allows them to express preferences. It also helps keep lines of communication open and brings them joy and security!

"Health Care for Transgender and Gender Diverse Individuals" Committee Opinion Number 823 March 2021 Pronouns

Obstetrician–gynecologists should ask patients about their name and which pronouns they use. Asking all patients routinely for their gender identity and gender pronouns normalizes the interaction and allows patients to disclose without being targeted; good practice includes reciprocal disclosure (eg, "Hello, I am Dr. X and I use she/her pronouns. Is the name on your chart what you would like me to call you? What pronouns do you use?").

The patient's pronouns should be documented in the patient chart.

Common choices include (note: this is not an exhaustive list):

- She/her/hers
- He/him/his
- They/them/their: Neutral pronouns used by some who have a nonbinary or diverse gender identity.

Other gender-neutral pronouns include zie (ze) or hir.
