## 9/28/04 Special Committee on Tax Exemptions for Residential Property Bureau of Housing, Division of Community Development, Department of Commerce

The Bureau of Housing's mission is to preserve, improve and increase housing opportunities for Wisconsin residents of modest means (80% or below county median income). This is accomplished by providing state and federally-funded housing grants to local organizations, coordinating housing assistance programs and policies with those of other state and local agencies, and providing information and technical assistance. Annually, in partnership with 300 local agencies, we assist 3800 renters, 1700 homebuyers, 1,100 existing homeowners and thousands of homeless persons.

The potential withdrawal of residential property tax exemptions undermines the financial viability of homeless facilities and housing projects that the bureau supports as well as future low income-housing efforts. There are two activities where residential property taxation has the largest impact for us --beds/units in facilities designated for homeless persons and rental housing projects developed under our federal HOME program.

Homeless: Last month 40,746 nights of shelter were provided by homeless provider agencies across the state. Homeless persons stayed overnight in facilities owned or leased by a variety of local agencies. There are over 2900 emergency shelter beds and approximately 2500 transitional and supportive housing units utilized by homeless persons and households. Commerce coordinates funding of nearly \$9 million annually in support of homeless providers. We support shelter operations, transitional and permanent housing programs and facilities. Homeless providers already struggle mightily to provide services and affordable housing in a variety of settings to growing numbers of participants without shouldering added property tax payment burdens. Demand for Commerce's homeless funds greatly exceeds supply (over \$3 million unfunded requests) limiting our ability to support local property tax payments.

Rental Developments: The threat of property tax levies presents a serious threat to our current inventory of tax exempt affordable housing and poses a chilling effect on future affordable housing development across the state. Most of these units, developed with onetime grant funds and owned/managed by local community based organizations, are rented to the most vulnerable in our society - developmentally disabled, frail seniors, domestic abuse victims, individuals on fixed and extremely low incomes. The Bureau of Housing currently oversees the long-term affordability of 93 projects valued at \$10.5 million. These projects are underwritten on the assumption the property would remain tax exempt. The federal funds utilized to acquire/develop these projects are available for development capital only, there are no ongoing subsidies. Even after many years these properties rarely cash flow due to restrictive federal requirements and the static incomes of residents who pay no more than 30% of income for rent. Property tax payments would make these units unaffordable resulting in possible eviction of tenants and likely foreclosure of the property. Failure to comply with long term HUD affordability restrictions on these projects could force the state to make millions of dollars in payments back to HUD. If agencies cannot rely on future tax exemptions it is a huge disincentive to develop additional housing units. This puts at risk millions of future HUD dollars that won't be spent in the state for needed housing.

## Legislative solutions to this issue should keep in mind that:

- \*In the state's Consolidated Plan lack of affordable rental housing is one of our highest priorities. Thousands of families are on waiting lists for our programs and other HUD rental assistance programs. The higher rents associated with property tax levies on previously exempt properties makes it much tougher to keep housing affordable to currently assisted low income households with no positive impact on the thousands of individuals currently waiting for help.
- \* Low-income housing development can be very effective when associated with mixed income/mixed use property. The higher revenues are used to subsidize low-income residents. Tenants can benefit from association with differently incomed households or the services and goods offered in the nonresidential space. Proration of the tax-exempt benefits to such properties is important.
- \* Many tenants residing in supported housing need special attention and care. Case management and supportive services are critical to the self-sufficiency of residents and very important to the success of the project. Project owner staff or other agencies under contract often provide these services. A too strict interpretation of allowing property tax exemption only if rental income proceeds are exclusively used for debt repayment and maintenance undermines this successful approach.
- \* Tax exemptions carry with them a cost but affordable housing projects enrich local communities in many positive ways; They provide quality accommodations for minimum/low wage workers (retail clerks, cleaning and other service workers on whom our society depends). Community based housing for persons with developmental disabilities is a cost effective alternative to institutionalization, whereby substantial public funds are saved. Affordable housing is frequently developed on properties that need extensive redevelopment (such as infill on empty lots, brownfield cleanup, and demolition work). Eliminating eyesores and restoring properties to productive use adds value to the community and often serves as a stimulus to the improvement of adjacent areas. By the way, this type of development often requires long lead times and construction timeframes that may take years to complete. Levying taxes during the holding and construction periods will render projects unfeasible or require yet more scarce public subsidies.

In the face of statewide homelessness (>2000 persons daily with more than a quarter of them children), lack of affordability (almost half of low income households pay more than 50% of income for rent,) every program \$, every bit of savings generated, every in-kind donation and every property tax exemption is absolutely critical to solving our housing problems!
