Overview

Residential Care Apartment Complex

Definition

A Residential Care Apartment Complex or RCAC is apartment housing with long term care services regulated under Chapter 50 of the Wisconsin Statutes.

Distinguishing Features

- Units are private apartments, with kitchens or kitchenettes and full private baths.
- Residents are not assigned to room with strangers.
- A range of services is available: meals, housekeeping, laundry, personal care (i.e., bathing, dressing, grooming, assistance with toileting, etc.), health monitoring and medication administration/management. Additional services, including nursing, are optional up to a 28 hour per week maximum.
- RCAC units may be intermixed with independent living apartments
- Expectation and risk agreement procedure to promote resident autonomy.
- RCACs regulations are less prescriptive and the state has fewer enforcement powers than for other facility types.
- Registered facilities serve only private pay residents; certified facilities may accept Medicaid Waiver funding. Registered facilities cannot be fined.
- RCACs cannot admit people who are "incapable of recognizing danger, summoning assistance, expressing need or making care decisions.".

Care Services

Growth of RCACs

The number of RCACs grew from 89 to 174, or 96%, between Feb. 2000 and Feb. 2005. The number of RCAC units grew from 3,006 to 6,741, or 124% during that time.
