Economic Update

Wisconsin's jobless rate hits 8.8%

Number lost during last year is highest since 1939; rate nears national figure

Wisconsin employers cut more jobs in the last 12 months than in any year-to-year comparison in records dating back to 1989. And unemployment rose to 8.8%, its highest rate for February since 1984, according to data released Thursday.

For labor market analysis, the numbers offer further evidence of a sour comomy. For job scokers, they pose another psychological hurdle to step over.

"I've just become numb to the month after month, especially after the first of the year." said Jessi-

ca Frank, 29, who's been seeking a full-time marketing position since November 2007. Even the project . work that Frank has been doing for a research firm in Thienaville since October has been less frequent since January.


"Unfortunately those numbers don't shock me because I've been watching the labor market for the past year plus," Frank said.

From Mirro layoff to her dream job

Ex-cookware employee thrilled with health career

MANITOWOC — Carol Kunstmann was one of the last workers out the door when Mirro pulled out of Manitowoc in fall 2003.

"I was very scared," Kunstmann, 55, recalled last week. She had joined the cookware-bakeware manufacturer just two months after graduation from Mishicot High School 31 years earlier.

In the years since she stopped making cook sets — "I have a lifetime supply for me and my daughter" — her work life has had a dramatic turnaround.

"It was a godsend to me for Mirro to close," said Kunstmann, a certified health unit coordinator in the critical care unit at Holy Family Memorial. "I needed that kick in the butt.

"Now, I have my dream job ... I would love to work seven days a week," said Kunstmann.

DOL Guidance on ARRA Policies

- \$ to locals in 30 days
- Encourages use of Job Banks
- Use economic regions, sectors
- Emphasis on training: OJT, customized training, group training, ABE, apprenticeship
- Timely spending, transparency, accountability
- Increased system capacity & service levels
- Use data, workforce info to guide strategic decisions & targets
- Training in demand occupations & industries
- Community resources should be used, such as community colleges, & community-based training agencies
- Can use \$ for curriculum for special training classes
- Encourages career pathways, apprenticeship as models for career & wage advancement
- Encourages state workforce agencies to collaborate & work with other agencies
- Encourages WP as portal to guide individuals to right resources
- Encourages lifting of state worker freezes, while cautioning that ARRA is timelimited


Unemployment Insurance (UI)

Awaiting DOE guidance but told verbally:

- •Distribute \$ quickly to avert lay-offs and create jobs
- •Use \$ to improve program performance
- Maintain transparency in reporting and accountability
- •Be mindful of funding cliff--\$ time-limited ...don't make investments that are unsustainable
- •Can expect 50% of the allocation by 3/30/09

DOL Competitive Grants

- High growth & emerging industries (\$750M)
 - Energy efficiency & renewable energy (\$500M)
 - Funding for worker training & placement
 - Portion \$ available for research, labor exchange & job training projects for energy career prep
 - Mirrors Green Jobs Act of 2007


