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




#### **Bipartisan, inter-branch, bicameral structure**



### **Big Picture: System Under Stress**




## Crime, Prison Population & Recidivism Rates Have All Increased

#### JFA 10 Year Prison Population Projection





### **Revocations Driving WI Prison Admissions**




#### **Supervision Period Has Doubled**

#### **Percent Returned to Prison**








## Justice Reinvestment Policy Framework for Wisconsin

#### Goal: Increase Public Safety & Reduce Spending on Corrections



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#### **1. Focus Supervision Resources**

Goal: To keep supervision resources focused during the initial months and year of supervision, limit extended supervision time to no more than 75 percent of confinement time

- A. Limit the length of extended supervision imposed at sentencing to no more than 75 percent of confinement time.
  - Exclude sex offenders and Class A-C offenders from this policy change
  - Balance this limit on ES time with the need to ensure an adequate period of time to collect victim restitution
  - Apply this policy only to offenders sentenced on or after the enactment date

## 2. Reallocate Revocation Expenditures to Community-Based Strategies

Goal: Reduce resources currently allocated to incarcerate people revoked from extended supervision with no new sentence and expand community-based mental health and employment strategies


#### **Reinvestment:**

MH Services: \$4m / yr Employment: \$6m / yr A. Establish a swift and certain reconfinement period of 6 months for an ES revocation with no new sentence

- Allow DOC to hold offenders an additional 90 days for institutional infractions or failure to participate in required programs
- Streamlines revocation process and frees up jail space and court time
- B. Expand community-based mental health services for high risk/need individuals on extended supervision
  - Leverage matching federal resources
- C. Coordinate & expand employment strategies for 10 percent of the postrelease population
  - Focus resources on high risk offenders on post-release supervision

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## 3. Create Sentencing Option to Reduce Risk Prior to Release

Goal: Provide the court with a sentencing option that creates an incentive for an offender to complete programs prior to release while adhering to the principles of Wisconsin's truth-insentencing system.

- A. Allow the court to impose a risk reduction sentence (at threequarters of confinement time) in addition to an offender's confinement sentence.
  - Offenders must successfully complete one or more programs as determined by a valid risk/needs assessment and the secretary of corrections.
  - Require the DOC to notify the judge of the assessment findings and programs that will be required.
  - Upon completion of programs required by DOC, the offender shall be released after serving 100% of their risk reduction sentence.

### 4. Set Recidivism Reduction Goal

Goal: Improve the assessment processes, align supervision resources according to risk and needs, connect offenders to the right services to reduce violations, and tailor responses to violations to improve compliance.


#### **Reinvestment:**

Community-Based ATRs -\$5m/year

- A. Establish a statewide goal of reducing recidivism rates for people on probation and released from prison by 25 percent from 2008 levels by 2011.
  - Measure the reduction in revocations to prison from probation and post-release supervision, re-conviction rates, and re-arrest rates.
  - Expand the capacity of community-based alternatives to revocation (ATRs), such as substance abuse treatment, day reporting centers, and other sanctions and services.

#### Reentry Council

- ✓ Coordinate resources aimed at reducing recidivism
- ✓ Review policies related to effective reentry

#### • Evaluation

- $\checkmark$  Monitor the impact of policy changes
- Regularly assess the quality of prison and community-based programs
- ✓ Update prison population projection based on policy changes




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
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#### **Projected Impact of Policy Options**
