SUBJECT: Maternal and Child Health Programs

This memorandum provides information on the state's maternal and child health (MCH) programs administered by the Department of Health Services (DHS) and the home visiting program administered by the Department of Children and Families, including state and federal funds that are available to support these programs.

Maternal and Child Health Block Grant

Title V of the Social Security Act authorizes the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) to distribute federal funds to states under the MCH block grant program. Federal law specifies the eligible uses of these funds, which include activities to enable states to meet the following objectives:

- Reduce infant mortality and disabling conditions among children;
- Increase appropriate immunizations for children;
- Increase the number of children in low-income households who receive assessments and follow-up diagnostic and treatment services;
- Ensure comprehensive perinatal care for women, preventive and child care services, comprehensive care and long-term care services for children and youth with special health care needs (CYSHCN), and rehabilitation services for blind and disabled children who are eligible for Supplemental Security Income; and
- Facilitate the development of comprehensive, family-centered, community-based, culturally competent, coordinated systems of care for CYSHCN and their families.

In federal fiscal year (FFY) 2010-11, Wisconsin's MCH block grant allocation was \$10,732,515.

States must submit an expenditure plan for this grant to DHHS each year. Wisconsin's expenditure plan for 2010-11 allocates \$6,071,735 for local public health departments and tribes, and \$4,660,780 to support staff and state operations in the Division of Public Health (DPH).

States must use at least 30 percent of the grant funding on preventive and primary care services for children, and at least 30 percent on CYSHCN. To receive this funding, each state must maintain total funding for state-funded qualifying MCH programs at a level at least equal to the amount the state expended for these programs in 1989 (\$4,721,800). There is also a state match requirement of \$3 of state funding for every \$4 of federal funding that the state receives (a 75% match requirement).

Local Aids. DHS provides \$6.1 million of the Title V MCH block grant to local units of government, tribal agencies, and non-governmental agencies. This funding is allocated as follows: (a) \$4.2 million in grants to local public health departments and tribal agencies; (b) \$1.2 million in funding for regional centers for CYSHCN; (c) and \$0.7 million for statewide projects.

Attachment 1 lists the local aids programs supported with Title V funding in FFY 2010-11. The attachment shows that over half of this funding is distributed for MCH contracts to local public health departments (\$2.0 million) and for the provision of family planning services in 50 counties (\$1.3 million). Family planning services in the remaining 22 Wisconsin counties are provided with federal Title X block grant funding, which DHHS provides directly to Planned Parenthood of Wisconsin. Additional information on the projects listed in the attachment can be requested.

State Operations. In FFY 2010-11, DHS has allocated \$4.7 million of MCH block grant funds to fund state operations. This funding supports 35.06 FTE positions in the DHS Division of Public Health (DPH). The total FTE positions does not reflect the number of individuals whose positions are partially supported with Title V funding, as many positions are funded with a combination of Title V funding and other state and federal sources. Table 1 lists the types of positions in DPH that are currently supported with Title V funds.

Public Input on Title V Expenditures. Federal law requires each state to make public its annual allocation of MCH block grant funds "in such a manner as to facilitate comment from any person (including any federal or other public agency) during its development and after its transmittal." Annually, DHS has sought input from dozens of individuals, both from within and outside of the Department, who have expertise in MCH issues relating to maternal and child health. Attachment 2 lists individuals from whom DHS has sought recommendations in the current year.

In addition, the DHS MCH website allows individuals to submit comments on the state's MCH block grant application. The website currently contains links to the federal fiscal year 2010-11 grant application, as well as the most recent state five-year needs assessment for 2011 through 2015, completed in September, 2010.

State Title V Matching Funds

As described above, Wisconsin must satisfy a 75% state match requirement to qualify for Title V funds. In its FFY 2010-11 application, DHS demonstrated its compliance with this requirement by listing the following state and local funding sources and programs identified in Table 2.

Wisconsin also generates approximately \$7.7 million in fee revenue for family planning services provided by counties. These fees are charged on a sliding scale based on income.

Other Federal Funding for State Maternal and Child Health Programs

As part of the annual application for Title V MCH block grant funding to DHHS, DHS identifies other federal funds administered by the Department that deal directly or indirectly with MCH issues. The total identified in the FFY 2010-11 application is approximately \$109.8 million. Two programs account for over 90% of this funding -- the women, infants and children (WIC) supplemental food program (\$91.3 million) and the immunization program (\$4.7 million). Attachment 3 provides a list of these programs and grants, and the amount budgeted for each.

Home Visiting Program

The federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act of 2010 (Affordable Care Act) authorizes states to create home visiting programs to: (a) strengthen and improve the programs and activities carried out under the MCH block grant; (b) improve coordination of services for at-risk communities; and (c) identify and provide comprehensive services to improve outcomes for families who reside in at-risk communities. Home visiting programs provide case management

services, health education services, and related social support services in the home to pregnant women or families with an infant by an appropriate health professional or by a qualified nonprofessional acting under the supervision of a health care professional.

As a condition of receiving the MCH block grant in FFY 2010-11, each state was required to conduct a statewide needs assessment that identified the state's capacity for providing substance abuse treatment and counseling services to individuals and families in need of such treatment or services and the quality and capacity of existing programs or initiatives for early childhood home visitation in the state. The assessment also had to identify communities with concentrations of: (a) premature birth, low-birth weight infants, and infant mortality; (b) poverty; (c) crime; (d) domestic violence; (e) high rates of high-school drop-outs; (f) substance abuse; (g) unemployment; or (h) child maltreatment. This assessment was required to be submitted by September 20, 2010, in order for a state to receive its allocation of the MCH grant.

In addition, the federal Affordable Care Act provides \$1.5 billion for grants to states for the home visiting program over a five-year period. In FFY 2009-10, \$100 million is appropriated for the home visiting program. The funding increases to \$250 million in FFY 2010-11, \$350 million in FFY 2011-12, and \$400 million in both FFY 2012-13 and FFY 2013-14. In FFY 2009-10, an allocation was set aside for each state to access based on the number of young children in families at or below 100% of the federal poverty level.

To apply for these grants, states had to submit an application for the funding, submit the required statewide needs assessment, and submit an updated state plan that incorporates an effective home visiting model targeted to at-risk communities based on the assessment.

Wisconsin submitted an application for its allocation of home visiting grant funding for FFY 2009-10. The application was approved and a grant in the amount of \$1,212,698 was awarded to the Department of Children and Families on September 16, 2010. The following table shows the expenditures for the first year grant funding from the federal Affordable Care Act's home visiting program. The state may expend these funds over a two-year period.

The MCH home visiting nurse consultant will be a full-time position to provide guidance in the development of a coordinated statewide system of early childhood home visiting and to assure connection to the MCH program. Subcontracts would include interagency agreements with: (a) DHS to update the data system to include reports needed for the benchmark outcome measures under the federal Affordable Care Act; (b) the University of Wisconsin-Extension for training on assessment tools and skill-building sessions; and (c) the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee for the local evaluation process. The remaining subcontracts will be awarded through a request for proposals process to carry out the home visiting program.

This funding was awarded based on the application, which specified the expenditures as shown in the table above. These funds may not be used for another purpose.

States must demonstrate, at the end of a three-year period and at the end of the five-year period, improvements in: (a) maternal and newborn health; (b) the prevention of child injuries, child abuse, neglect, or maltreatment, and the reduction of emergency department visits; (c) school readiness and achievement; (d) the reduction in crime or domestic violence; (e) family economic self-sufficiency; and (f) the coordination and referrals for other community resources and supports. The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services has awarded only FFY 2009-10 grant funding. It is anticipated that the state would have to re-apply for future grants over the five-year period.
