Summer Scholars Bridge Program Kenosha

The transition from high school to college can be especially tough for at-risk and firstgeneration students. The Summer Scholars program recognizes that this transition is made all the more challenging when the freshmen entering college require remediation of their academic skills. Great Lakes provided the funding that enabled 15 at-risk students to participate in a four-week residential program that offered academic credit in a small class setting featuring tutoring and structured study sessions. Summer Scholars not only gave the students the opportunity to get a jump start on their academic careers, it also helped them with improved self confidence, social support, and the chance to connect with an academic advisor and peer mentors. The success of the Summer Scholars Bridge Program is undeniable. All 15 participants completed the program and attended UW-Parkside in the fall of 2009. And better yet, all 15 returned in the spring of 2010.

Nehemiah Community Development Organization

College Campus Visits Madison

Having the opportunity to visit college campuses is often a key determining factor for first-generation and low-income students as they make decisions about whether or not to pursue education beyond high school. Great Lakes' funding of the Nehemiah Community Development Organization's On Ramp College Tour 2010 program allowed 24 students from Madison East and Madison West high schools to visit historically African American college campuses throughout the southern United States. Students were given the opportunity to meet with admissions officers and tour classrooms, dormitories, bookstores, computer labs, and athletic facilities. They also ate in the cafeterias and socialized with current college students who answered questions and shared their own college experiences. For many of these students, this was the only chance they had to experience a college campus. As for results, the general consensus from students who took part in the tours was that seeing college life firsthand helped them picture themselves as college students, and encouraged them to continue to take steps to get there. In other words, the trips made college "real" for them.

Admission Possible Standardized Test Preparation Milwaukee

Study after study indicates that students who receive help preparing for the ACT or SAT are more likely to complete the other steps necessary to go on to a postsecondary education. And because student ACT and SAT test scores are such a critical part of the college admissions decision-making process, Admission Possible strives to "level the playing field" by ensuring the scores of low-income students accurately reflect their true aptitude for higher education. Funding from Great Lakes allowed Admission Possible to bring their nationally recognized program to 75 low-income juniors and seniors at South Division and Milwaukee School of Languages high schools for the 2009-2010 school year. Participants spent the year intensively preparing for the tests, including taking four fulllength practice exams prior to the "real" tests in April. The program exceeded its goal of raising the juniors' average ACT score by 12 percent; actual improvement averaged 15 percent.

Moving Forward

As we continue to support programs serving disadvantaged students and families, we also strive to better understand which elements are making the biggest impact in getting more students into college. Our goal is to share this information to generate additional support within the affected communities and to help other communities embrace similar programming to help their students in need. By working together, we can all make an investment toward the success of Wisconsin's neediest students and families.
