
College Access Challenge Grant 2009-2010 Annual Report



Successfully Preparing Wisconsin Students for College



The state's fastest growing portions of the population are the least likely to go on to a higher education of any kind. This makes the importance of the CACG services clear—give Wisconsin's future workforce the tools necessary to make higher education a reality.

The Goal

The primary goal of Wisconsin's College Access Challenge Grant (CACG) is to motivate Wisconsin high school students to attend college and to help them prepare both academically and financially.

About the CACG

Since October 2008, Great Lakes Higher Education Guaranty Corporation (Great Lakes) has been collaborating with college access organizations and high schools across the state, with priority given to the more than 120,000 ninth through twelfth graders attending schools in low-income communities. Our team of College Access Advisors provides services and hands-on support, including workshop and event hosting, and personal assistance for students and families.

The \$1.8 million grant from the U.S. Department of Education is administered by Great Lakes on behalf of the Wisconsin Department of Administration. Great Lakes also contributed an additional \$918,000 in matching funds over the two-year grant period to help make over \$2.7 million in free services available to students and families in Wisconsin.

We're pleased to share the results of the second year of the CACG and the work accomplished to help students and families plan, prepare, and understand the options for paying for education beyond high school.

Counselors and advisors attended workshops

College Access Advisors hosted 92 workshops for school counselors and advisors. These workshops provided attendees—who are often pressed for time given their schedules and responsibilities—the latest information on financial aid, completing the FAFSA, and admission testing, as well as noteworthy regulation and policy changes.

Test Prep is a free online resource that helps get students ready to take the ACT and SAT. Available on KnowHow2GOWisconsin.org, Test Prep provides practice sessions, test taking tips, and progress monitoring, and is personalized to each student's ability.

All high schools are eligible to take advantage of CACG services, with priority given to schools serving disadvantaged students. 183 of the schools served by advisors this year had priority status under the CACG.

MULTIPLYING THE IMPACT: 1,000 More Students Aspiring to College

On May 4 and 5, 2010, more than 1,000 fifth graders in Eau Claire and nearby school districts participated in an engaging visit to the UW-Eau Claire campus to learn about college life and how to get there. The event was the culmination of an exciting partnership between campuses to replicate the successful UW-Green Bay Phuture Phoenix program.

Through the CACG, the UW-Eau Claire Blugold Beginnings program successfully replicated the Phuture Phoenix program, which has helped over 6,000 at-risk kids realize that college is possible since it began in 2003. The programs pair at-risk fifth graders from elementary schools in the surrounding area with college student mentors and role models.

The highlight of the program is the annual campus tour, which brings area fifth graders to a college campus for a tour, class visits and demonstrations, and interaction with the campus community from current college students to the chancellor. College student mentors continue contact with those fifth graders throughout their schooling until they graduate from high school.

Through this successful program, UW-Eau Claire has planted th seed for higher education for more than 1,000 young students.
