1 AN ACT *to create* 767.001 (5m) and 767.41 (4) (f) of the statutes; **relating to:**

Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau

This bill is explained in the Notes provided by the Joint Legislative Council in the bill.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

Joint Legislative Council's Study Committee on Child Placement and Support. The bill specifies that if a court grants a shared physical placement schedule for a child with both parents, the court must order that whenever a parent needs to obtain child care from someone outside the household, the parent needing the child care must first offer the opportunity to the other parent before seeking outside care, if practicable considering the available time and distance between residences. This is sometimes referred to as a "right of first refusal" provision and under current law can be included by agreement of the parents in their settlement arrangements.

Under the bill, the other parent is under no obligation to provide the requested care, and providing the care does not modify child support. The bill also specifies that the other parent who is providing the child care will provide the necessary transportation unless the parents agree otherwise.

The bill defines "shared physical placement" as a court-ordered physical placement schedule under which both parents have periods of physical placement of at least 25%.

Section 1. 767.001 (5m) of the statutes is created to read:

767.001 (5m) "Shared physical placement" means a court-ordered placement schedule under which both parents have periods of physical placement of at least 25 percent.

Section 2. 767.41 (4) (f) of the statutes is created to read:

767.41 (4) (f) If the court grants a shared physical placement schedule, the court shall order that whenever a party needs to obtain child care from someone outside the household, the parent needing the child care must first offer the other parent the opportunity to provide care for the child before seeking outside care, if practicable considering the available time and distance between residences. The other parent is under no obligation to provide the requested child care. If the other parent elects to provide the care, it shall be done at no cost and without affecting the child support order. The parent providing the child care shall also provide the necessary transportation unless the parties otherwise agree.
