

HIGHLIGHTS OF POPULATION AND VITAL STATISTICS IN WISCONSIN

State and County Population — Wisconsin's 2012 population was officially estimated to be 5,703,525, a .29% increase over the 2010 U.S. Census count of 5,686,986. The state grew 6.0% in the 2000s and 9.6% in the 1990s. By contrast, the growth in the preceding decade from 1980 to 1990 was less than 4% and represented the smallest increase in decennial census counts in state history. The greatest increase occurred between 1840 and 1850, the decade in which Wisconsin became a state, when population jumped 886.9% from 30,945 to 305,391.

Between 2000 and 2010, population increased over 20% in Calumet and St. Croix Counties, while population decreased in 19 counties. St. Croix County was the fastest growing county during the decade, with a population increase of 33.6%. Dane County had the largest absolute growth, adding 61,547 people, followed by Waukesha County, which grew by 29,124 people.

Population by Race and Age — In responding to the 2000 and 2010 U.S. Censuses of Population, individuals were given the opportunity to identify themselves as being of more than one race. About 1.2% and 1.8% of Wisconsin's population selected multiple races in 2000 and 2010, respectively. As a result, comparisons between the 2000 and 2010 Censuses and earlier censuses must be made with caution. It is not clear whether someone who selected Asian and white, for example, for the 2010 Census would have selected Asian or white in 1990. Only those who selected a single race are used in the following comparisons. Between 1890 and 2010, the nonwhite population in Wisconsin increased from 0.7% to over 13.8%. Wisconsin Indians were the largest minority group from 1890 until 1950; Blacks have been the largest since 1950. In 2010, Milwaukee County had the largest Black population at 253,764, followed by Dane County with 25,347, Racine County with 21,767, Kenosha County with 11,052, and Rock County with 7,978. 55.2% of the population of the City of Milwaukee was nonwhite. Wisconsin's Hispanic population increased by 74.2% from 2000 to 2010, reaching 336,056. The Asian population increased by 45.6% to 129,234.

The 2010 Wisconsin Indian population was 54,526, an increase of 15.5% over the 2000 population of 47,228. Wisconsin has 11 Indian reservations.

According to the 2010 Census, Wisconsin had a voting age population of 4,347,494 or 76.4% of the total population.

Vital Statistics — In 2011, Wisconsin recorded 30,287 marriages and 16,635 divorces and annulments. In 2011, the state had 67,736 live births (11.9 per 1,000 population), 427 infant deaths (6.3 per 1,000 live births), and 368 fetal deaths (5.4 per 1,000 deliveries). Total deaths in 2011 numbered 48,101 (8.4 per 1,000 population).

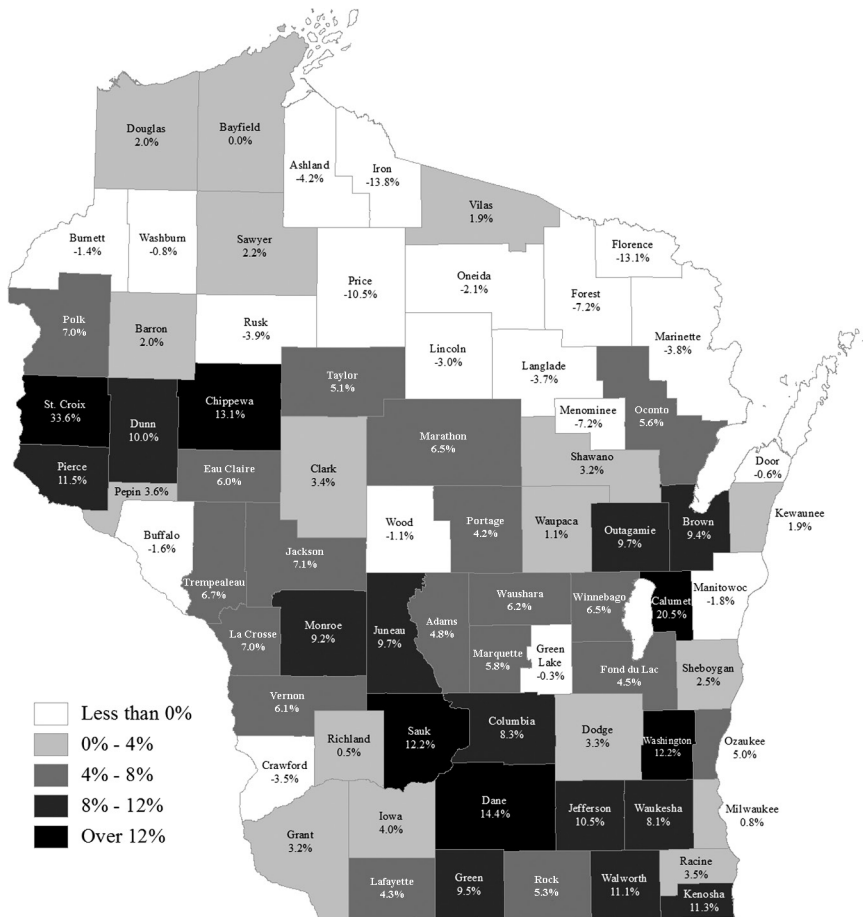

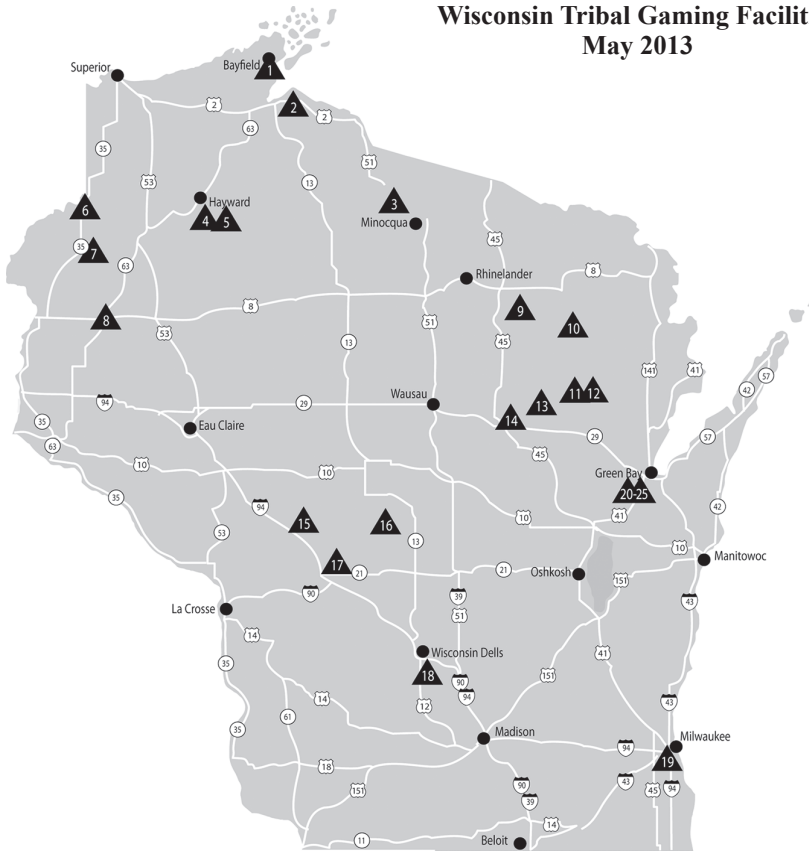
